### THE COUNCIL HOLD SPECIAL MEETING

Apportionment of Assess-  
ments Made at Tuesday's  
Meeting

#### INTERESTING SESSION

The Town Council held a special  
meeting on Tuesday evening under  
the chairmanship of His Worship  
Mayor Murray for the purpose of  
dealing with the current year's as-  
sessments. Present Councillors  
Sansom, Lunan, Ellsworth, Miller,  
Pinault and Alexander. The min-  
utes of the previous meeting were  
read and confirmed.

A communication was read from  
the secretary of the Board of Health  
regarding the motion of the council  
with reference to insanitary places  
on the Tobique Road, and enclos-  
ing a resolution that all owners  
living within the area of the sewer-  
age system be compelled to connect  
to the sewers. Letter was laid on  
the table for further discussion.

The accounts of the Board of  
Health amounting to \$100.80 were  
ordered to be paid.

A communication from S. M.  
Moore regarding land on Rosebury  
street used by the town was laid on  
the table.

Communication from Timothy  
Mann policeman, for a raise of pay  
was referred to Police and License  
committee.

Communication from S. M.  
Moore regarding balance of unpaid  
accounts was placed on file.

A petition was received from St.  
Andrew's Sunday School relative to  
the act prohibiting the sale of  
cigarettes and tobacco to minors.  
Mr. John M. McLean who was  
present spoke on behalf of the peti-  
tioners and said that something  
should be done to stop the sale of  
tobacco to minors contrary to the  
provisions of the act. He said that  
in many cases these sales had been  
made through ignorance of the law,  
and he desired that publicity be  
given to the provisions and penalti-  
es of the act. He thought that a  
copy of the act posted in a promi-  
nent place would bring the matter to  
the notice of the merchants.

Councillor Lunan expressed his  
sympathy with the petition and  
thought that the council should  
act on the suggestion of Mr. Mc-  
Lean, and even mail a copy of the  
act to every merchant in town.

His Worship said that it would  
be a better way to hand a copy  
personally to the merchants, and it  
was resolved to have copies of the  
act printed and distributed among  
the merchants. Mr. McLean  
thanked the council for their  
courtesy and withdrew. Councillors  
Stewart and White then entered the  
meeting.

Petition was received from John  
Landry for a grocery license to do  
business in the Commercial Block.  
Referred to Police and License  
committee.

The following reports of standing  
committees recommending payment  
of accounts were received and  
adopted.

Councillor Pinault from Public  
Property and Streets committee  
\$320.58; Councillor Stewart from  
Electric Light committee \$639.63;  
Councillor Alexander from Water  
and Sewerage committee \$47.57;  
Councillor Sansom from Public  
Charities committee \$118.80.

Councillor Stewart then intro-  
duced the matter of the request of  
the celebration committee for a  
grant of \$430. Messrs. W. H.  
Marquis and J. Pichette attended as  
a delegation. After hearing Mr.  
Marquis and Pichette being discussed by all  
the members the amount asked was  
voted.

The council then resolved itself  
into a committee of the whole for

### PRESENTATION TO SCHOOL MASTER

A Bathurst despatch of Saturday,  
says: This morning a representa-  
tive gathering of business men met  
at the White House, Bathurst, and  
presented Hugh Harrison, principal  
of the Grammar School, with a  
beautiful leather traveling bag. The  
presentation was made by B. C.  
Mullins, who in a few well-chosen  
remarks expressed the regret of the  
people of Bathurst at Mr. Harrison's  
removal to Chatham, where he has  
accepted the position of principal  
of the Grammar School. Messrs.  
Burns, Bishop, McKay, Veniot and  
others also gave expression to the  
loss Bathurst sustained at the depart-  
ure of one of the best principals  
Bathurst has ever had.

Sinking Fund 7,500  
Interest on School bonds 1,200  
Total \$83,500

The sum assessed last year was  
\$30,000 but when we remember  
that in this year's assessment the  
sum of \$7500 has to be raised for  
a sinking fund, the amounts re-  
quired are less than last year. The  
rate will probably be around 1.60  
per cent.

the Board were instructed to pro-  
ceed against any who refuse to act  
when requested.

His Worship brought forward  
the matter of the proposed bridge  
between Restigouche and Bonaven-  
ture and stated that a delegation  
from Bonaventure and Gaspé de-  
sired to meet with the Council and  
the Board of Trade to arrange  
matters. This meeting will be  
held on Friday 12th inst. Council  
then adjourned.

### JOHN HACHIE KIL- LED BY LIGHTNING

Three Men Struck on the To-  
bique Road During Thurs-  
day Night's Storm

A storm of thunder and light-  
ning struck this locality on Thursday  
evening with unusual severity. No  
damage to buildings was done but  
one distressing fatality is recorded.  
Three young men named Hachie be-  
ing overtaken by the storm while  
walking on the Tobique Road were  
struck by lightning. A teamster  
driving to town found the three  
men lying on the road and on pro-  
curing assistance was horrified to  
find John Hachie a young unmarried  
man had been killed outright while  
the other two were unconscious.  
The dead man was removed to the  
mortuary while the other two were  
hurried to the Hospital where on  
enquiry this morning they were re-  
ported to be making favorable pro-  
gress toward recovery. The dead  
man's clothes and boots were all  
torn by the lightning but beyond a  
slight bleeding from the nose no  
marks were found on him. The  
other two were not injured bodily  
but were rendered unconscious by  
the shock.

The body of John Hachie still  
remains at the mortuary and as he  
has no known relatives the remains  
will likely be taken charge of by the  
county authorities.

#### FAKIR ON THE CORNER

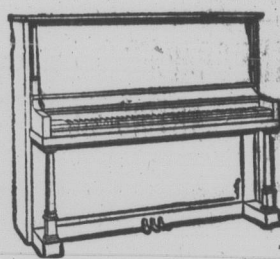
A fakir selling watches and chains who had

week was arranged out of court.

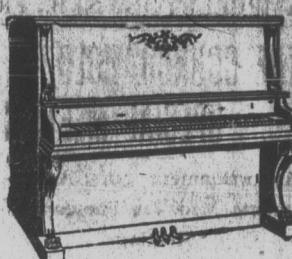

## SEVEN MEN CRUSHED TO DEATH

Six French-Canadians and one Englishman.

Jonquiere, Que., July 2.—A fearful accident resulting in the death of seven men, occurred at Kenogami, near here, late yesterday afternoon. The victims who were in the employ of the Canadian Stewart Co., who are erecting the large pulp mills for the Price Bros. at Kenogami, were at work under a stone crusher, when a beam suddenly gave away said to be due to being too heavily loaded, resulting in the crushing to death of seven men, all French-Canadians, with the exception of one, an Englishman.

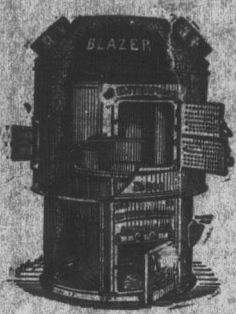

### L. O. L. MEETING

Public Meeting held at Nashes Creek, Saturday evening, June 29th in the interest of the Loyal Orange Association, and the Loyal True Blues, Wilford McLean of Black Point, Past Master of L. O. L. Box 23, called the meeting to order at 8-30. The first speaker called on was the County Master George H. Reed, followed by A. William Hamilton W. M. of L. O. L. Box 22. Past Grand Master David Hildwell of St. John being present was introduced and he responded in a well thought out address in the interest of the Loyal True Blues, and the Orange Association in general. At the close of the meeting the required number of prominent ladies and gentlemen signed the application for a Dispensation to organize a Loyal True Blue Lodge at the above named place. The National Anthem was then sung in closing.

## REGULATIONS FOR FRUIT PACKING

The Dominion Fruit Inspector for New Brunswick, Mr. S. L. Peters, is just now giving particular attention to imparting information regarding the packing and marking of fruit; and with special attention to the marketing of berries and small fruits. It may not be generally known that there is a definite, legal size prescribed for berry boxes and that to use any other than size boxes is punishable.

The fruit inspection and sale act prescribes that a berry or small fruit box must contain one full quart when level full. Any person who packs, sells or deals in boxes of fruit or berries containing less than one quart is liable to a fine of twenty five cents for each and every box found in his possession, and if the fine is not paid is liable to imprisonment, with or without hard labor, for one month. Any person may lay a complaint before the inspector regarding small or undersized boxes and one half of all fines collected under such complaint shall go to the person laying the information. The Inspector may enter upon any premises to make examination of any packages of fruit suspected of violating the requirements of the act, whether such packages are on the premises of the owner or in the possession of a railway or steamship company for transportation.

There are also special and stringent regulations regarding the size of apple barrels and the manner of packing and marking apples, and the Inspector is giving such information to growers, packers and dealers. It is the intention of the Department to stringently enforce the regulation regarding the packing and selling of fruit of all kinds, both for the protection of the consumer and for the benefit of the exporter.

## THE ASSESSMENT

The council have now fixed the amount of assessment required for the current year, which is slightly in excess of last year. This however is necessary owing to the fact that the sum of \$7,500 is required by law as a sinking fund and was not assessed for last year, so that really the council are asking less this year than last. An item of \$1200 for interest on the school bonds is also new, making a total of \$8,700 required this year more than last. The amount assessed in the year 1911 was \$30,000, and this year the required amount is \$33,500, which, when deducting the \$8,700 shows that Finance Minister Miller and his colleagues are making progress in the right way.

The rate last year was 1.65 on a valuation roughly of \$1,800,000. Since that valuation was made a considerable addition has been made to assessable property. Estimating this at \$500,000 will give us a rate this year somewhere in the vicinity of 1.60 per cent. which taking all things into consideration is very reasonable. From now on we can confidently look forward to reduced taxation every year as the heaviest drain on the public purse is now about over.

## BETTER FARMING SPECIAL TRAIN

The inaugural trip of the agricultural instruction train, popularly known as "The Better Farming Special" was brought to a successful close at Campbellton on Saturday. It can be said that the experiment has been eminently satisfactory one in every respect. The object which the Department of Agriculture had in view in promoting and carrying through the idea has been attained and the results of the visits to all sections of the province accessible by railway cannot but be extremely beneficial. Agriculturists in order to attain success today must have special training and technical education, just as much as the engineer, the scientist or the business man.

Early last Fall the Provincial Department of Agriculture in conjunction with the Industrial Department of the Canadian Pacific Railway formulated a plan for carrying, practical education to the farmers of the province by means of a train specially fitted up with exhibits calculated to show the people what is being done along advanced methods of soil culture, supplemented by short talks on pertinent subjects by experts particularly fitted to give such instruction. The co-operation was secured of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, of the McDonald College and of the Intercolonial railway. A train of seven cars was specially fitted up, with exhibits illustrating dairy and beef cattle, poultry and poultry appliances, soils and drainage, weeds and seeds, dairy appliances, insects and insecticides, fruit growing and horticultural work, including practical demonstrations of spraying. Living accommodations were furnished aboard the train for the corps of instructors and train crews. Expert instructors from McDonald College and the New Brunswick Department of Agriculture were in charge of the various exhibits and gave lectures at each stopping point. Mr. Hubbard, Secretary of Agriculture, was in charge of the Farming Special, and Dr. Landry, the Commissioner for Agriculture, was in attendance part of the trip.

The "Farmers Special" started out at Harvey, York county on June 8th, and from there to five demonstrations have been given daily up to last Saturday. Fifty three different places were visited and 26,380 people passed through the cars, examined the various displays, talked with the instructors and profited by the lectures. This is an average of 300 people at each stopping place.

Hundreds of farmers have been interested and instructed by the visits of this "College on Wheels" who could not have been reached in any other way. While the Farmers Institute meetings held in previous years have been greatly beneficial, yet it has never before been possible to take to the farmer the practical demonstrations of results of scientific agriculture that were such prominent and so alluring features of this trip. Farmers who are interested in dairying or beef production saw in one of the cars dairy cows and head cattle of both good and poor types, and were instructed by the officials in charge regarding the valuable and the detrimental

points of each animal. Instruction was given concerning the breeding, rearing and care of the dairy cow, and the cost of such and the profits that may be had from proper care and management of the farm dairy or the beef herd.

If the agriculturist had been interested in the great forward movement of apple growing and fruit culture which has awakened the province the past few years on this train he had opportunities of learning the latest and most scientific horticultural methods and was advised by the experts in charge regarding the selection of trees and their planting and care, as well as the harvesting and marketing of the fruit.

Possibly one of the most beneficial features of the special, and most far-reaching in its effects, was the department showing the various injurious insects which cause annoyance and loss to the farmer. Here were extensive and comprehensive exhibits of mounted insects, including the dreaded brown tail moth, and two of the most competent entomologists in Canada were present to answer questions and impart instruction. At each stopping place many school children visited the train and every one was particularly interested in the exhibits of insects and learned how to combat and prevent them. The signs, it is true, of the noxious weeds with which so many farms are infested; and as the lessons learned at this train are put into practical application on the farms it is certain that farming will be more pleasant and many of the losses which the agriculturist has suffered from insects and weeds will be avoided in the future.

One had but to watch the crowds of people going through the cars to be convinced of their interest and of the value of the demonstration. Every exhibit was critically examined and the instructors plied with questions. Queries regarding every conceivable phase of agriculture was asked and it was extremely fortunate that so capable a corps of instructors were in charge. Each man is an expert in his particular line and they did not talk from theory alone, either, but their information was the result of extensive experience under conditions similar to those met on the average farms of this province.

Taken all in all the Department of Agriculture is well satisfied with the work accomplished and that it will be enlarged upon and extended another season seems assured.

During the tour many thousands of agricultural bulletins and pamphlets were distributed and these being taken home will be of permanent instruction and value.

He expected to have it finished that night.

## BRITAIN'S ARRANGEMENT WITH MARCONI

All Round-the-World Wireless Communication.

A London cable says: The wireless convention, now in session here, which has faced its greatest difficulty to date in dealing with wireless telegraphy as a commercial agent, has at last learned some particulars of the agreement between the Marconi company and the British government. England, like other European countries regards wireless as a great instrument of war and the agreement with the Marconi company has been made with this as the leading thought.

It provides that the British government supply the Marconi company with \$3,000,000 with which to build five great wireless stations, Australia to supply \$500,000, another station, the six to form a wireless circle around the globe at nine points. One station is to be in England, one in Australia, one in India and a fourth at Port Said. The other two, it is presumed will be in South Africa and Hong Kong. There is already a station at Glace Bay, C. B., with land installations across the Dominion of Canada. It is estimated that the work is to begin immediately and the stations will be finished in a year, and England will then have a circuit of communication around the earth, independent of cables.

Each station is to be built as a fortress capable of successful defence. While the stations are to be built by the Marconi company, they will be the property of the government, when completed and ready for service, the Marconi interest ceases.

The \$3,000,000 supplied by the government will pay only for the wireless installation. The grounds, the buildings and everything connected with the stations, will be furnished by the government.

The British government now owns all the country's telegraph and telephone systems and will now also own its own round-the-world communication. This is the reason—this government monopoly—that the wireless convention still finds itself helpless to make rules and regulations for commercial wireless. It was believed that a knowledge of the provisions of the British government's agreement with the Marconi company would simplify the question of commercial rules, but, despite this, it still appears that the convention will adjourn with nothing done to regulate, commercially, the wireless business.

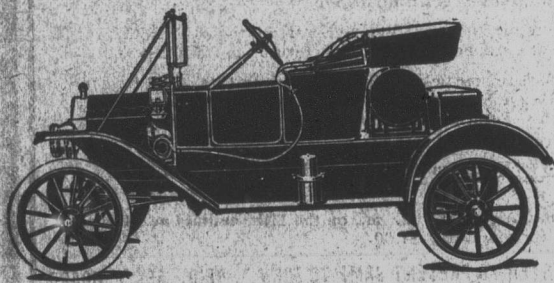

Lord Strathcona, in proposing the toast of the Dominion, declared that what was needed in order to promote the solidarity of the empire and the common interests of its people was a better knowledge of its component parts and its resources. Another important question was that of arranging for a system of defence in which all parts of the empire would bear their proper share. Outside this radius ticket purchasers should ask for standard certificates, which, on being signed by the Secretary of Committee at Campbellton, will entitle holder to return passage free. Good going July 8th and returning up to 15th.

The Bangor and Aroostook Railway will issue single first class return tickets to Van Buren from all points north of Ashland Junction, from the 9th to 13th, good for return up to 16th.

The Canadian Pacific Railway will issue one way return tickets to Van Buren from 9th to the 13th, on standard certificate plan, to be signed by Secretary at Campbellton, good for return up to 16th inst.

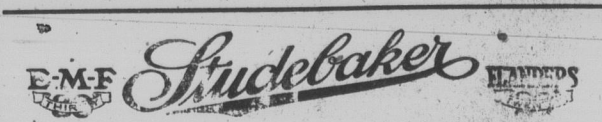
The Quebec Oriental Railway will issue single first class return tickets from all points on their line on the 10th and 11th, good for return up to the 12th.

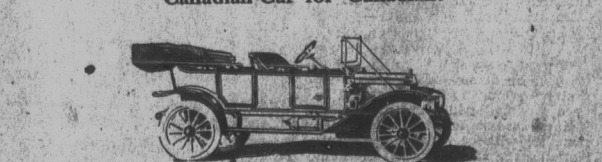
