The second in command Major Mercereau is here to interview at the Recruiting Office any of the men who have applied and been rejected here by the Battalion doctor. It has been ascertained that the doctors at Valcartier will accept many of those who have been so turned down.—World.

When nearly one hundred men from "A" Company were turned down here by the regimental doctor, there were many murmurings, but the doctors word was law. Among those turned down were some of our hardest men, men who had worked in the woods and on the river for years and who never knew there was anything the matter with their health, and who are to-day doing the same strenuous work.

Now the officers are asking these men to re-enlist. Some of them have already joined other units, but others are still unattached.

MEN DRIVING ON TRACK CAUSE WRECK

I. C. R. Authorities Will Prosecute All Such Trespassers in Future

As the result of a number of men driving horses along the railway, a serious wreck took place on the International on Monday.

While travelling along at the usual speed near White's Brook Monday afternoon, and rounding a curve the engineer was alarmed to see ahead on the track a number of horses, driven by two men. They were only a hundred yards away so the emergency brakes were put on, which resulted in a bad spill. A number of cars were thrown off the track and two cars of sleepers went over the dump.

Owing to this the I. N. R. train did not reach here until 2 a. m. Tuesday morning.

The I. C. R. authorities intend to prosecute the trespassers. The damage will amount to about \$500.00.

MORE RAIN The rain keeps up. It started again Monday evening and continued until Tuesday evening. Roads in the country are in bad shape and crops now need fine warm weather.

ICE CREAM SOCIAL The ladies of Athol will hold an ice cream social and dance, etc., on the school grounds at Athol on Wednesday, July 12th, in aid of the Soldiers Comforts Association.

APPLIED-REJECTED BUTTONS Recruiting Officer A. McG. McDonald has received a supply of Applied-Rejected buttons. Any person who has taken the medical examination and has been turned down as medically unfit is entitled to one of these buttons, and may procure these by applying in person to Mr. McDonald.

NOW AT THE FRONT No. 444984, Pte. Harry A. McLennan, Signaller, who is now somewhere in France, has had several weeks' experience in front line trenches. He went over with the 55th Batt. and while in England was drafted with a number of signallers to the 19th Batt., 4th Brigade, from Hamilton, Ont. Harry claims a Battalion second to none in the Second Division.

KILLED IN ACTION The name of Geo. Hamilton of Campbellton appears in the casualty list as killed in action. He was a son of Newton Hamilton of this town. When the 26th was being recruited he enlisted but failed to pass the doctor. When the 55th was being raised he again tried, but was rejected. Later he made another attempt and succeeded in passing and going overseas.

SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK Rev. W. A. Ross, Field Secretary of the New Brunswick Sunday School Association will address meetings upon the following dates: Friday, July 7—Matapedia; Sunday, July 9—New Carlisle; Monday, July 10—New Richmond; Tuesday, July 11—Point a la Perte; Wednesday, July 12—Dalhousie Junction.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT Mrs. Joseph Boudreau met with a serious accident Monday night. She was standing upon a chair endeavoring to lower a window, when she fell down the stairs nearby. When picked up and carried up the stairs, she was found to be suffering from shock, and a doctor was hastily summoned, who found a broken arm and many bruises. The injured lady is resting as well as can be expected.

NORMAL EXAMINATIONS Large numbers of pupils will take the Normal Entrance exams, this year. According to the statement of the Educational Department, 46 are taking these here. Fredericton leads, as usual, with a total of 181 candidates; St. John is second with 172, and Moncton third with 157. The other centres of the province are represented as follows: St. Stephen, 73; Woodstock, 108; Chatham, 98; Sussex, 94; Campbellton, 45; Campbellton (convent), 1; Bathurst, 33; Riverview, 27; Aroostook, 16; Florenceville, 32; Richibucto 41; Doaktown 18; and Edmundston 15.

MANY SALMON Large catches of salmon were again made in the Bay nets last Friday and Saturday. The salmon angling up river is now said to be exceptionally good, the fish being of a good size and plenty of them.

ORANGEMEN PARADE The Orangemen will parade to Christ Church on Sunday evening, July 9th. Along with this service there will be a memorial service for the late Sergeant Major Charles Edward Turner and Private Whitney Tope.

WILL RETURN Lieut. R. K. Shives and Lieut. G. A. Mowatt, two Campbellton officers who were wounded while at the front some time ago, are to return to their homes this summer. Both are in hospitals in the same city in England, and are frequently together.

EXTENSION OF TIME An Ottawa despatch says: "In response to numerous requests, the Minister of Finance has extended to July 15th the period within which persons, firms and corporations liable to the business profits war tax may make to the department of finance, the returns called for by the act."

WILL BE KITCHENER Providing the lieutenant-governor-in-council of Ontario ratifies the by-law changing the name of the city, the name "Berlin" will be wiped off the map of Canada, and the city will hereafter be named as "Kitchener". The electors have voted in favor of Kitchener, with Brock as second choice and Advance as third.



OUR GREAT ROADS

The roads throughout Restigouche county, and we understand the same applies to all the northern counties of New Brunswick, are in a wretched state.

Last season thousands of dollars were spent throughout this county on the roads, and in most instances the money was wasted.

Until a different system of road supervision is inaugurated, we will not have any improvement.

What is required is a man in each county, who is a thorough roadmaker, to be placed in charge of the roads in the whole county. Then let him supervise all repairs and see that they are done upon the latest approved plans.

The much talked of trunk road through New Brunswick should be undertaken at once.

Let the province fund the Automobile tax which will shortly amount to \$50,000 per year. Borrow a million dollars and build a trunk road. Let the Municipalities through which it runs contribute towards its construction and upkeep.

Some such scheme should be devised at an early date.

ALL EMPLOYEE WINS DAMAGE SUIT

Judgment for \$2113.00 Given Arthur Guite for Injury to Leg in Mill

Quebec, June 30th.—Judgment was rendered last week by the Superior Court here in the case of Arthur Guite vs. Price Brothers. A few years ago, Arthur Guite, a young man of about nineteen years of age, of Maris, Co. Bonaventure, was working for Price Brothers, at Batiscan, in the Province of Quebec. He was acting as tail sawyer for the rotary saw. While thus working, he was struck by a piece of lumber which broke his left leg.

The Company offered Guite \$198.00, claiming that this was all he was entitled to under the Workmen's Compensation Act. Guite retained the services of the Honorable John Hall Kelly of New Carlisle, who refused the offer, and entered action against the Company. The Company was represented by the firm of Messrs. Pentland, Stuart, Gravel & Thomson of Quebec.

Honorable Mr. Kelly, in the action taken against the Company, set up that the accident was due to two causes. He stated that the Company was sawing short logs at the time, and that instead of placing the logs on the front blocks of the carriage, next to the rotary saw, which would not have caused any extra danger to the rotary tail sawyer, that the log was placed on the rear blocks next to the haul up, which was exposing the rotary tail sawyer to very grave danger, owing to the fact that after the log had gone through the rotary saw, with the forward motion of the carriage, the said sawn logs and slabs while on the live rolls, are very seriously exposed to be hit by the front block of the carriage, while on the reverse, which took place in the present case, and the said small log after thus being struck by the reverse action of the carriage, hit young Guite and caused the accident.

He also set up that the Company made use of a type of carriage which dispensed with one man thereon, to wit, "the dogger". He claimed that this also increased the danger to the rotary tail sawyer and increased the amount of work he had to do, and the rapidity under which it should be done. Young Guite is and has been able to walk around and work since a few months after the accident, but there was a swelling on one side of the leg where the fracture had taken place. For the purposes of the case, Mr. Kelly had his client undergo an X-ray examination, the result of which showed that while the leg had taken, there was a part thereof which was not as solid as it might have been.

The Judgment of the Court grants young Guite the sum of \$2,113.00. This is about the largest amount that has ever been granted for a laborer of Guite's class, for a broken leg in the Province of Quebec since many years.

BLACK CAPE

The deceased, who was fifty four years of age, was born in Black Cape where she had lived all her life and where many friends are left to mourn her loss. She leaves a bereaved husband, one sister Wave, who had always been with her and who waited patiently on her during her illness, two brothers Alston of Wash, U. S. A., and Thomas of Black Cape.

The funeral which took place on Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock, was very largely attended. The service was conducted by Rev. E. J. Rattee and Rev. Geo. S. Anderson, and very touchingly they spoke of the deceased early death, her strong faith and the assurance they had that she had gone to be with Jesus.

The remains were laid to rest in St. Andrew's Cemetery, New Richmond.

The sympathy of the community is extended to the husband, sister and brothers, niece, Jessie Godfrey, in this their hour of bereavement.

NO FURTHER WORD OF LT. MORDEN MOWAT

Commanding Officers Write of His Work and Courage.— Still Hope

Mr. and Mrs. M. M. Mowat have had no further word of their son Morden, of the Royal Flying Corps, who was reported missing May 16th.

The following is a copy of a letter received.
June 19th, 1916
M. M. Mowat, Esq.,
Dear Sir:—

Your letter of May 25th has been given me by our C. O. to answer, as your son was billeted with me while he was with this squadron and as I am a Canadian.

The facts that we have are that he went across the lines and did not get back. The Germans reported bringing him down. There is good reason to hope that he is all right. The German report did not say that he was killed, as it has in a number of other cases.

It takes more than two months for letters from prisoners to be delivered. It was only a few days ago that we received a letter from a pilot who was

taken prisoner three months ago.

I am sorry that I can give you no definite news and hope that the above will help you. Mowat was very popular here and we were awfully sorry when he left us, although it was a step ahead for him and a recognition of his ability as a pilot.

The Colonel's Pluck. Since going to Valcartier Camp, Colonel George W. Mersereau, officer commanding, showed his great grit when he received an injury to his shoulder. He was not off duty a single hour nor would he allow himself to be placed on the sick list, although he was advised by the doctor and staff to go into hospital. He said he would rather run the risk of getting worse and stay in camp with the boys. This is but an earmark of Colonel Mersereau's traits of character and it is character of this kind which counts so much when the men finally reach the firing line.


