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HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

From the New Brunswick Reports.
Tuesday, April 16th.
This morning Mr. Street presented a petition from the Master of the Rolls, complaining of the proposed reduction in his salary, and praying to be heard at the Bar of the House, for the purpose of stating reasons why his salary should not be meddled with. Mr. Street moved a resolution to the effect that the petition be received, and that a day be appointed to hear that officer. After considerable discussion, the resolution passed (15 to 13) and Thursday was appointed in accordance therewith.
A Bill to incorporate the Canada, N. B. and N. S. railroad Company was taken up for a 3rd reading. The 2d section of the Bill gives to the Company all the ungranted lands on a line with the railway, extending ten miles on each side; also authorises the Government to purchase all the granted lands on the line, and to give £20,000 Sig. yearly as the work progresses.
On motion of Mr. Barbarie, the House went into Committee on a Bill to regulate that all kinds of Grain hitherto sold by measures to be in future sold by weight.
The House next went into Committee of Supply. Hon. Mr. Partelow moved for £500 to be granted to the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonality of the City of St. John, to enable them to erect a Steamboat Wharf at Reed's Point. Hon. Mr. Partelow, Mr. Ritchie, Mr. Woodward, Mr. Ansley and Mr. Jordan supported the motion but it was lost—the St. John members forming the minority.
Hon. Mr. Partelow for a grant of £50 for returned duty on a Fire Engine, which is being imported from New York to St. John. The Resolution passed.
Hon. Mr. Partelow moved for a grant of £20 to remunerate Mr. Blach for expenses incurred in coming to Fredericton at the opening of the session, for the purpose of reporting the debates.
Dr. Wilson would like to get an explanation. He supposed it was "all right," but he would like to know who authorized Mr. Blach to come to Fredericton to report for the House.
Hon. Mr. Partelow explained; when it was decided that £10 be allowed.
Hon. Mr. Partelow moved for a grant of £85 to Col. Shore, for his services as Adjutant-General of the Militia during the past year. Here a scene followed as absurd as it was ridiculous.
Mr. Ritchie moved, as an amendment, that £10 be granted. He thought that sum was quite sufficient to pay for postage and other incidental expenses incurred in the Militia service during the year; and considering the large salary that officer enjoyed, he might well afford to perform a little extra service for the country.
The amendment was then put and lost—The original motion was also lost by a large majority. Several other motions and amendments were then put and negatived, when the
Hon. Mr. Partelow said, as he had brought in the resolution, he would now move that it be withdrawn, and leave the next House to decide what the adjutant was entitled to for his services in that capacity.
Mr. Ritchie moved a reconsideration of the resolution, which was carried, 17 to 15.—A *fuss* then was made as to how the resolution was to be disposed of. His Honor, the Speaker explained, when Mr. End moved for £55. Lost. Mr. Tibbits moved for £40. Lost. Mr. J. Earle moved for £35. Also lost.
Hon. Mr. Partelow then moved for reporting progress, which motion was also lost—A *pause*.
Mr. Street then moved for £69. Lost.
Mr. Hayward said the most sensible motion the Committee could now make was, for an address to His Excellency to dissolve the Assembly forthwith. They were ruining the Country; and the course he recommended was the most equitable that could be adopted. Hon. Mr. Partelow would press his motion for reporting progress. It was absurd to get on in that manner, delaying the business of the Country. He was convinced the question could be settled in very few minutes to-morrow morning.
The Committee had been engaged nearly two hours on this subject. Progress was reported and the House adjourned.

Dow, Jr., in one of his sermons' discourses as follows:
"The printer is in a very disagreeable situation: his money is scattered everywhere, and he hardly knows where to look for it. You, Mr.—, and Mr.—, and a hundred others that I could name, have taken his paper, and you and your children, and your neighbors, have been instructed and amused by it.—If you miss one paper, you think very hard of the printer—you would rather go without your best than to be deprived of your newspaper. Have you complied with the terms of your subscription? Have you taken as much pains to furnish the printer with his money as he has to furnish you with your paper? Have you paid for his hand work and head work? If you have not, go and pay him off."
EMIGRATION TO CALIFORNIA.
The tide of emigration from the Atlantic and Western States to the golden region of California, continues and increases beyond anything we ever heard of. There is not a steamship which leaves here for Chagres, that is not filled with new adventurers, who have thrown up their occupations and business at home, abandoned all old occupations, and old friends, families and acquaintances, for the purpose of trying their fortunes among the hills and valleys of that wonderful land, with its wonderful deposits of gold. Two steamships, the Georgia and Cherokee, and one bark, sailed from this city on Saturday, with some seven-hundred and eighty passengers; and the Empire City will leave to-day, with four hundred and seventy-five more making in two days a drain of nearly thirteen hundred from the population of the old States, to be added to the new State on the Pacific. Such an immense emigration is without a parallel in the history of this country. In fact, the California fever has become a mania, and the vast emigration which has already gone thither, and that which is expected, begins to excite alarm in some of the Western States, whose prosperity depends on the industry and labour of the very class of persons who are seeking California. There is every reason to believe that the overland emigration, during the present year, will be immensely greater than that of the last, and fears are entertained that some of the extreme Western and Southwestern States will be depopulated.
Of course, all who go to California will not succeed to the extent of their hopes and expectations. Not more than ten or twenty per cent will ever return from there with fortunes, and hundreds and thousands will meet with nothing but disappointment, sick-

ness, disease, and an early grave. Thousands of young men who left the Atlantic cities with their minds unbalanced by the golden prospect which their fancy had created, have fallen victims to disease, superinduced by hard labor, exposure, and want of proper food. None but men of strong constitutions, and who are inured to labor of the hardest and severest kind, should think of encountering California. The hand that has been accustomed to a kid glove has no business in California. Mechanics, handicraftsmen of every kind, and laborers, have every chance to do much better in California than they can in the old States; while to young men brought up tenderly, without trades or professions, and incapable of undergoing labor and the severities of the weather, it offers nothing but an early grave. Such persons should wait until society and business become better organized, when the natural expansion will create a demand for their services in the usual way.
The number of persons who are daily arriving here from all parts of the country, for the purpose of taking passage to California, together with the great number of strangers who are usually in New York at this season of the year, is so great, that every hotel in the city is full to overflowing; and we have even heard that previous to the sailing of the Georgia and Cherokee, many of the passengers were unable to get lodgings, and were actually obliged, some to walk the streets and some to set all night in the reading rooms of the hotels, as they could get no lodging accommodations. Such a rush as this was never before experienced in New York.
Wonderful Preservation.—Barque Sherwood, Capt. Dunbar, which arrived at Boston on Wednesday, from New Orleans, picked up Captain Hunt, of brig John Hill, under the following circumstances:
On the 1st inst. lat. 32 48, lon. 76 56, the man at the wheel heard some one hail the barque, looked to leeward, and saw a man in the water on a canoe house, about a half a mile on the lee quarter, there being a heavy sea on at the time; kept away for him and succeeded in getting on board; he proved to be Capt. Hunt of brig John Hill, of and for Bristol, R. I., from Cardenas, (before reported by brig Yankee, at Charleston, abandoned, and all hands lost but second mate) very much bruised and nearly exhausted, having been in that situation 24 hours. Captain Dunbar immediately bore down for the wreck and thinking he saw one clinging to the wreck, went close to her with the boat, but discovered no one on board. She was laying on her beam ends, both masts gone, decks ripped up, and cargo all out. While aloft on the canoe house, several vessels passed Cap. Hunt but did not see him, he was severely bruised by pieces of the wreck drifting against him, and was several times washed off the canoe house, but managed to get hold again. He suffered severely from cold, having nothing on but his pantaloons, shirt and socks. Capt. Hunt states that the disaster to his vessel on Sunday, 31st ult., in lat 36 10 lon 77, when a tremendous sea hove the vessel on her beam ends, carried away the top of the trunk, cabin, broke lee stanchions, and swept all hands overboard. Capt. Hunt, Alex. Gifford mate, and Mr. Vaughan, a passenger, got on the side of the vessel, and were assisting the crew to get up, when a tremendous sea swept them all off. There were nine persons on board, and all perished except the captain and second mate. (Mr. Brough, who was taken off by brig Yankee at Charleston.)
An Ingenious Swindler, or Confidence Man.—Mr. George W. Vanstavoron, residing at the Irving House; was in Liverpool on the 5th of February last, when he met a person calling himself Doctor W. J. Hull, who applied to him for the loan of twenty five sovereigns, (\$121 25) and represented to Mr. V. that his father was wealthy and resided in Charles street, Baltimore, United States, and that he was himself wealthy; that he wished to purchase a microscope to take with him, and had not the money at hand, having already made a number of purchases, which exhausted his cash; that if Mr. V. lent him the amount, he would pay it at the Irving House, or at his agents, Maiden Lane, on his arrival in this city. Mr. V. placing confidence in the Doctor, lent him the \$121 25. On arriving in this city, by the steamer America, in the latter part of February, Mr. V. called on Hull, at the New York Hotel, and demanded the return of the money. Hull gave him a check on Farmers' and Merchants' Bank of Baltimore, Mr. V. proceeded to Baltimore, and on making enquiry there, ascertained that there was no such bank in that city, and that the representations made by Hull were false in every particular, he having no father living in Charles street.
The pranks of this "Confidence Man" did not end here. It appears that he went to the store of Tiffany, Young & Ellis, corner of Broadway and Chambers street, to purchase some articles of jewelry, on the 28th of March, where he stated that he had just returned from Paris, where he had been to finish his studies as a medical student, and

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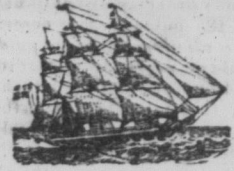
that he was on his way to his father's, in Charles street, Baltimore; and that he desired to take a present home to his sisters, but that it was not convenient for him to pay cash for it then. However, if it would answer as well, he would give his check on the bank in Baltimore. Hull also gave to Mr. George McClure, the man of business in the firm of Tiffany, Young & Ellis, the names of two gentlemen who knew him. McClure, placing every confidence in him, sold him a gold chain and watch for \$80, and received from him a check for the amount on the "City Bank of Baltimore," payable on the 4th of April. The check was forwarded to Baltimore, but no such bank could be found there, and the check was returned protested by a notary public. These facts are taken from the sworn affidavits of Mr. Vanstavoron and Mr. George McClure. A warrant has been issued for the arrest of the confidence Doctor. [N. Y. Herald.]

[We have much pleasure in copying the following extracts from a letter which appeared in the Wesleyan, published at Halifax—from the pen of the Rev. George Miller, at present stationed on this Circuit:]

From the Wesleyan.
ST. ANDREWS, N. B., CIRCUIT.
Mr. Editor.—The Saint Andrew's Circuit is not unknown to you, as I understand, as an early period of your itinerancy, it was under your superintendence. In this direction, you are still kindly remembered, as also your respected brother, the Rev. A. DesBrisay. But the prospects, through the exert of this Station are not as flattering as they were a few years ago. Since my residence here, we have been losing individuals and whole families from our congregations. The pressure of times, and the want of pecuniary means, necessarily have obliged them to leave town and country, in search of support and a living in other places. But we are not left without a people, and without congregations. If we have not a church sufficient to fill our places of worship, they are not unfrequently filled, from other congregations, with our own people. This particularly is the case, in the Town of St. Andrews, where a friendly feeling prevails, between members of the different Protestant churches. As a Wesleyan, I have no disposition, but in feeling and conduct, to quadrate with this spirit, "To be a friend to all, and an enemy to none."
At public worship, the word of the Lord is heard, with reverence and attention; and I trust it is not without its salutary and corresponding effects. Our ordinary religious services, connected with the closing of the old year and the commencement of the new, were favoured with spiritual manifestations, from Divine presence. Contemplating the fact, that we were approaching a remarkable period in time, which never more than once, occurs in the history of any one individual, the centre of a century, and with us the centre of the nineteenth century, and when passed, the like should never again happen, to any mortal then present, might well have its exciting impulse. This inspiring influence from above was in a high degree realized, on new year's day, at the Quarterly-Love-feast, and particularly while the Covenant was renewed.—Most all the members of Society present, gave testimony to what God had done for their souls. But it was in the act of renewing our Covenant, with our Saviour God, that the sacred union of the Holy Spirit, was more sensibly felt. Such a watering from on high, I have not witnessed for many days. My regret was that so few were present.—But among this few, was the irrefragable evidence, God has not yet forsaken his people here. To his name be all the glory.
The 22d ult. the Rev. I. Sutcliffe, from Mill Town, preached a good Missionary sermon, in the evening, at St. Andrews, preparatory to our Missionary meeting. On the close of the sermon, David W. Jack, Esq., was called to the chair. This gentleman who belongs to another Church, taking the chair, kindly directed the attention of the meeting to its great object, the glorious missionary enterprise, in which we are engaged; and subsequently the assembled congregation was addressed by the Rev. Geo. Barrett and the Rev. I. Sutcliffe, &c. &c. Notwithstanding the great scarcity of money in the place, the collection was much better, than was anticipated; and at the time, a public subscription was opened, as a new thing here, which at a future period we hope, will gain in popularity.

Arrival of the Steamship



America.

The Royal Mail Steamship America, arrived at Halifax on Thursday night last in 114 days from Liverpool, having left on the 6th inst.

We are indebted to the New Brunswick for the following summary of the news.

The news by this steamer is of a more interesting character than we have received for several months past.

The Canada from New York and Halifax, arrived here on the morning of the 24 inst.

The Flour market has advanced about one shilling per barrel. The quotations are Baltimore 23s per bbl., Philadelphia 22s 6d, and Western Canal 18s to 21s 6d.

Liverpool Timber Market, April 6. Pine Timber.—Of St. John, one cargo of 20 inches or more was sold from the yard at 194 1/2; and by private, 62 logs at 17 1/2 to 20 1/2, according to diameter. Birch.—The demand is brisk for good quality fresh. A parcel of St. John in the yard, was sold at 17 1/2 to 17 3/4, and some by private sale at 20 1/2 per foot. Deal.—St. John Spruce, on the quay, was sold by auction at an average of 28 3/4; standard. By private, a cargo at 27 2 1/2; one at 27 7 1/2; and a parcel at 27 12 1/2 6d per standard.

Freights still continue high; Shipping scarce. The money market during the fortnight has been fluctuating. Consols closed yesterday at 95 1/2 for money and 95 1/2 a 3 for ac. There is now 17 1/2 millions in the Bank.

From the manufacturing districts we have but little to report. Trade seems rather steady than for some time past. In political circles there is nothing to write. Our home and foreign news although not of unusual importance, is nevertheless interesting.

Parliament has been employed almost exclusively in voting the supplies, and with other matters of a local character. During the Easter recess the great proportion of ministers had left town for their estates. The news from Rome is wholly uninteresting. It is now said that the departure of the Pope is fixed for the 7th April.

The alarm in Spain respecting Cuba is on the increase.

The news from Greece is not encouraging. A large party devoted to Russia. It is said, are seeking every opportunity to blow the coals of discord.

The Tuscan Government has flatly refused to acknowledge the claims for indemnity set up by England, alleging that as their own subjects will not be indemnified, foreigners must not expect redress.

The German Parliament has assembled at Erfurt. The proceedings have been without interest.

The Turkish Cabinet have remonstrated against the occupation of the Danubian principalities by a Russian army. Relations have not been resumed between Turkey and Austria.

Wreck of the Steamer Royal Adelaide, and great loss of life!

On the 30th ult. the English coast suffered severely from a violent hurricane, in which numbers of vessels were lost. The steamer Royal Adelaide, from Dublin to London, was wrecked at the mouth of the Thames, and all on board, numbering 200 persons, have perished not a soul has been saved! The catastrophe occasioned a painful degree of excitement.

IRELAND.

From Ireland we learn that Emigration is again on the increase.

The Primate has already endowed a Chair of Ecclesiastical History in Trinity College, Dublin.

A partial revival of the Repeal agitation in Ireland under the auspices of John O'Connell, is said to have taken place.

At a recent meeting in Dublin, to protest against the extinction of the Irish Court, some stormy speeches were delivered. Mr. H. Grattan was particularly fierce; he concluded his address by a declaration that, when he had at his back 400,000 armed men and 400 pieces of artillery, he would then look for justice from England, and might God defend the right.

A whimsical difficulty stands in the way of the abolition of the viceroyalty. The Queen in council indicate into office, and the Lord-lieutenant, once in possession, is viceroy for life, unless a successor be appointed. The official must be put out by the same prerogative which put him in, and the crown, under the act, has no power of dismissal, except by naming a successor.

FRANCE.

France continues quiet—but such is the unsettled and uncertain state of affairs, that the funds have materially declined. The Socialists are secretly organizing and obtaining strength—the Monarchists are anything but die. M. D. Larochefoucauld proposes that in June next the people throughout France shall declare by ballot and universal suffrage, whether they prefer a Republic or a Monarchy! On the 4th ult. the President of the Republic was insulted on his way to Vincennes. A Regiment in the Paris Garrison had revolted against its officers.

THREATENED COLLISION BETWEEN AUSTRIA AND PRUSSIA. The French Government is said to have

received despatches from Germany, which lead to the belief that a collision between Austria and Prussia is almost unavoidable; the language used by both powers partaking more and more of a hostile character.

INDIA.

The Intelligence from India is, that the Sikhs still carry on their warfare against the British by private assassinations. A party of the Affghade Tribe had attacked an Outpost and killed several Sappers. Col. Bradshaw, to avenge this massacre, destroyed six villages and a great number of the enemy. There appears to have been a great deal of skirmishing in the passes of the hills near Peshawar, and our troops have somewhat suffered. At Umritsir, and Vizerabad there appear also to have been disturbances; a gunpowder plot has been discovered at Lahore, and two collectors have been wounded in attempts by the Sikhs to assassinate them. Sir Charles Napier was to leave Peshawar on the 17th Feb. and what with controlling the Sikhs, and pushing matters in the native regiments, he seems to have quite enough to keep his ardent temperament at work. We have annexed part of the Sikkein territory as a punishment for the Rajah's late folly, and his annual revenue will be cut off by more than £2000. The governor general has proceeded to Singapore.

NEWS OF SIR JOHN FRANKLIN.

From the St. Louis Intelligence, April 5. We are indebted to James Sinclair, Esq., for the following extract from a letter to him from A. McDermot, dated Selkirk's Colony, Feb. 13, 1850.

"A packet has just arrived from McKenzie's river, which brings news that the ship that went in search of Captain Franklin is wintering in McKenzie's river. This packet is sent post haste by the States. It is thought the Captain is still alive."

"Sir John Richardson and Mr. Bell are to leave this in a few days taking with them all the men, except eight, two of whom are to remain here during the summer, whilst the other six are to accompany me down the Coppermine to the Polar Sea, when, I hope, if the season proves favourable to add a little to the chart of these regions."

Mr. Sinclair has also kindly favored us with an extract of a letter from John Ross, dated at Fort Confidence, 30th April, 1849. The writer is attached to the expedition of Sir John Richardson, and his account of the very favourable weather during the winter of 1848-9, leaves reason to hope that the search for Sir John Franklin was prosecuted under the most favorable circumstances, and as we have reason to hope, with success.

Mr. Rae says: "The weather here has been very fine compared with the experience of Dease and Simpson; there have not been eight days during the last six months so stormy as to prevent travelling. We have had an excellent house to live in, with an abundance of wood and venison, and very fine fish, as much as we could consume, with a large stock on hand, in the store at present."

"When the Packet arrived here I was absent, at the Kendall River, with the first portion of stores and provisions for the summer's consumption, but returned two days after. Great number of deer were seen, all migrating northward."

THE HALIFAX AND WINDSOR RAILROAD. We learn from the Acadia Recorder that a large and respectable meeting, numbering about two thousand persons, took place at Halifax on Friday last, to promote this undertaking. Among the speakers were the Hon. Provincial Secretary, the Attorney General, Crofton Unacke, Esq., and the Hon. Mr. Johnston. The Provincial Secretary proposed that Halifax should subscribe for £100,000 of stock. The following resolutions were passed unanimously:

"Whereas the following Resolution has been adopted by both branches of the Legislature of this Province:—**Whereas**, the construction of a Railroad between Halifax and Windsor would stimulate the industry, develop the resources, and elevate the character of the Province;—**therefore**,
Resolved, That whenever a Company shall be formed for the construction of such Railroad the Executive Government shall be, and is, authorized to subscribe for one half the necessary stock, under such guards and restrictions as may appear to the Governor in Council judicious or as may be hereafter prescribed by the Legislature." Now therefore Resolved, that it is expedient that a Company be formed for the purpose of raising one half of the stock necessary for the construction of such Railroad.

Resolved, That a provisional Committee be appointed to open subscription lists for the stock in the Railway—that the shares be five pounds currency each—and that subscribers shall not be required to make any payments on account of their subscriptions until all the necessary arrangements for such Company are made agreeably to the Resolution of the Legislature.

The Freshet at Toronto.—The Toronto Globe of 6th inst. gives the particulars of the freshet at that place and the river Don and its branches, and the river Humber. It was the most disastrous freshet ever known in the vicinity. A heavy rain fell on Wednesday and Thursday, which, with the warmth, dissolved the ice and snow in the creeks, and the streams became swollen to an immense extent overflowed their banks, and carried away mill dams, bridges, houses, fences, lumber, trees, cattle—almost everything that opposed their progress. The loss is enormous, so far as known, but no estimate of the total damage could be made, as no accounts from distant places had been received, so many of the bridges having been carried away.

The California Steamers.—The Georgia and Cherokee steamers left New York for Chagres, on Saturday. The Georgia had over 500 passengers, and the Cherokee more than 300. The Empire City, with nearly 500 passengers, and the Philadelphia, with a large number of passengers, are to leave on Monday afternoon. Thus we have an emigration of some fifteen hundred or more persons, chiefly for California, in one week, from New-York alone.—[Ev. Traveller.

St. John, April 20.

A ROBBER APPREHENDED.—For some weeks past an advertisement has been published in our columns, offering a reward of \$100 for the recovery of a quantity of clothing, stolen on the 5th ult. from the dwelling house of Mr. Aaron Hastings, in Garden street, and the conviction of the thieves.—Suspicion having rested on Lavinia Tierney, a servant girl who had been living with the family for some weeks, a short time before the robbery took place, Mr. H. kept a watch upon the passengers who have lately been leaving in the Steamboats for the United States, and on Monday morning last he met the suspected one going on board the *Fairy Queen*, with a bundle. High Constable Stockford being called, the bundle was found to contain a part of the articles stolen, which consisted of a satin cloak, and several silk, satin, and other valuable dresses, &c., valued at from £30 to £35. One of the dresses was found fastened loosely around her, and others were contained in a pillow-case, which she had tied around her waist. She stated that a girl whose name she gave as Jane Daly, and afterwards as McAfee, and a man with his face blackened, whom she pretends not to know, were with her when the robbery was committed. It was effected about one o'clock at night, by the man removing a sash from an end window in the house, which opened into a bedroom where the clothes were hanging. He brought the articles out to her and Daly. The latter, she says, had them in possession for a week, and then gave them to her on being paid \$10 as her share. Daly went to Eastport, in the *Maid of Erin*, two weeks ago, where Tierney was to meet her on the day she was arrested. She underwent an examination at the Police Office, and has been committed to take her trial at the Supreme Court in August next. While in the Watch House for a short time, before being taken to the Police Office, she made an attempt to strangle herself by twisting her apron around her neck, and had so far succeeded in the attempt as to be black in the face and senseless when she was discovered. Since her commitment, we understand she made another attempt upon her life, by endeavoring to cut her throat with a piece of glass.

It gives us much pleasure to learn that a part of the Gas apparatus for this City is now on its way per *Jonny Kane*, from Glasgow, having been shipped at that Port in the space of one month from the time when the order was sent from Fredericton. The remainder we learn, would be ready for shipment about this time; and it may be anticipated that as soon as the spring opens, the preparatory works will be commenced, in order to have the light in operation next autumn.

We cannot help congratulating our fellow citizens upon the promptness with which the managers have transacted this business; and with the prospect of the cheap and radiant light which is so shortly to take place of the primal darkness of Fredericton.—*Reporter*

For Surinam.—The Brig *Carlew*, Moore, Master, bound for Surinam, in South America, cleared on Tuesday last with an assorted cargo, consisting of 748 cwt dry fish, a quantity of pickled Shad, Mackerel, Cod, Haddock, Herring, Salmon, and smoked Herring, 42 barrels and 25 half barrels of Beef, 50 barrels Pork, 60 firkins Butter, Tea, Salt, lard, and box Shooks, Oars, Poles, Boards, Planks, Scantling, Palings, and Shingles, valued in all at about £2686 sterling, and shipped by Messrs. Allison & Spurr, of this City. As this is a new trade from our Port, and the enterprising shippers seem determined to try all different markets where they may be an opening for the produce of the country, we sincerely trust they may be amply remunerated for their exertions, and be able to establish a trade with foreign countries which is so much wanted at present.

On Wednesday the House went in committee on a bill for granting facilities to the St. John and Shediac Railway, with the view of building portions of either end of line. The part relative to the St. John and Hampton line was thrown out—17 to 14. The other, from the Bend to Shediac, would probably be carried.

CIRCUIT COURT

The Court of Oyer and Terminer and General Jail Delivery and Nisi Prius, was opened here on Tuesday last.

Hon. Mr. Justice PARKER, presiding. In his honor's charge to the Grand Jury, he paid a high compliment to the inhabitants of this County, whom he said were the most peaceable and best conducted people in the Province. He also remarked that there was not a single cause on the Criminal Calendar.

Only 8 causes were entered on the docket for trial. What a falling off; two years ago there were 34 causes entered for trial, and now just a fourth of that number.

LEGISLATIVE SUMMARY.—On the 17th the House went into consideration of a Bill to facilitate the building a Railway between

Shediac and the Bend of Petitcodiac. The Attorney General, (who brought in the Bill) asked for Script to the amount of £60,000, on a like amount being subscribed and paid by the St. John and Shediac Railway Company. After a lengthy discussion, the principle of the Bill was sustained, interest on £60,000 being guaranteed, on the same terms, and for a like period, as was given to our Railroad. Mr. Ritchie's motion for providing facilities for an additional Section on the St. John end of the line was lost—11 to 21.

A Bill to facilitate the erection of a Railway or Canal between Lake Temiscouia and the river St. Lawrence, was lost, yeas, 13 nays 12.

On Saturday the House were in Supply, and £1,000 was granted for the expenses of Professor Johnston and his Colleagues.

A Bill to continue and amend the acts relating to Parish Schools, was thrown out with the exception of the 1st Section which continues the old law for 2 years longer.

RAILROADS IN INDIANA.—In looking over the American Railroad Journal for November, 1849, we were forcibly struck with the enterprise of the inhabitants of the State of Indiana, who have now 18 Railroads. Two of 102 miles are in operation, two nearly finished of 87 miles—three under construction of 226 miles—four under contract of 207 miles—three located of 155 miles—two of 132 miles, the stock subscribed—and one of 70 miles for which a charter has been obtained, making a total of 979 miles! not above 40 of which were in existence five years ago. These roads are being made by the people without any connection with the Government, or foreign assistance. Indiana is one of the Western States, bounded on the east by Ohio, on the south by the river Ohio, on the west by Illinois, and on the north by Michigan. It contains about 34,600 square miles, being nearly a fourth larger than this Province. What has been done in Indiana, may be accomplished in New Brunswick, and no doubt would be, had the inhabitants of other sections of the Province, the energy and indomitable perseverance of the people of St. Andrews. Any line that may be projected having a prospect of paying a fair per centage, and has honorable men connected with its management, need not require any extraordinary circumstances to bring it into public notice, nor extraordinary efforts to bolster it up.

The steam ship Europa, from New York for Liverpool, arrived at Halifax on Friday, in 54 hours. She carries home 150 passengers.

Free Ports.—The last Royal Gazette contains a Proclamation, constituting Campo Bello, St. Stephen, and St. George, Free Ports for the admission of Foreign goods well as

British and Colonial Shipping and Goods.

The Fredericton Reporter says:—Be it for good or evil, there is little doubt that the fiat is soon to go forth, which will render the Legislative Council of this Province, dependent upon the suffrages of the people.

We have received from John Simpson, Esquire, a Report of the Survey of the River St. John, by Capt. Bent and Mr. Grant; also a copy of Dr. Robb's Eucenia Oration in King's College, Fredericton, in June last, published by request of the College Council. These works reflect much credit to the Press of the Province. We trust that in a future number, we will be able to give some extracts from these favors. Our thanks are due to Mr. Simpson for his attention.
