HONOUR ROLL WAS UNVEILED
Interesting and Impressive Service at St. Andrew's Church.

Both services on Sunday last, in St. Andrew's Church, were conducted by the Reverend Principal Mackinnon of Dalhousie University, who delivered two sermons of unusual high order. The evening service was made the occasion of unveiling the Honour Roll of the congregation. So great was the desire to be present on this occasion that all were unable to gain admittance. The service opened with "The Hallelujah" by the choir, rendered in a most pleasing manner. Mrs. Hugh Miller had sang "Shadows"—Rev. Mr. Miller asked Mr. Archibald McKenzie to unveil the tablet, which was followed by the dedicatory prayer by Principal Mackinnon and the National Anthem by the choir and congregation. In his address the Principal pointed out the fitness and necessity for such a memorial and the lessons that the service and sacrifice of those whose names are engraved on it impress on our country today. The tablet is of bronze, weighing almost two hundred pounds, of beautiful workmanship and design, containing one hundred and twenty-six names in raised, burnished letters. Twenty-three of the above were either killed in action or died of wounds, the former marked by a cross, the latter by a dash. At the head of the tablet are the flags of the allies in which the tablet is placed by the insignia of the Presbyterian Church, the burning bush. Many of the members of the congregation attended in a body and occupied seats in the centre of the church. After the benediction, the congregation remained standing while The Dead March in Saul was played by Miss McIntosh.

It was fitting that Principal Mackinnon was present on this occasion as he spent several years overseas as Chaplain, rendering conspicuous services to the men at the front and also by addressing audiences in England, Scotland and on the continent, both in the pulpits and on the platform. The service was of an impressive and solemn nature leaving a deep impression on the worshippers. The congregation are to be congratulated on erecting this tablet to commemorate the service and sacrifice of its boys. It hangs on the right wall in easy view of the entire congregation, where it will remain calling the worshippers to the heroic and sacrificial life, and reminding them of the price of freedom.

This Committee is actually composed of the following gentlemen:—Hon. Sir Alex. Lacoste, K. C., ex-Chief Justice, Province of Quebec; Vice-President: Hon. N. Perceval, N. P. Minister without Portfolio, the Quebec Government; Mr. S. J. B. Rolland, President Rolland Paper Co. An experience of this sort has been experienced for years in Europe and especially in large French banking institutions and also in Scotland. The good results obtained have served to strengthen the confidence of the public in such methods. An evident proof of this confidence was recently given by the Directors when The Provincial Bank of Canada, in January, 1919 and May, 1920, offered to the public two stock issues of ONE MILLION DOLLARS each. These stock issues in a very short time were over-subscribed, and a great number of demands for new shares of the Bank had to be received on account of those available having been disposed of so quickly. Although it is only 20 years since the Provincial Bank of Canada has been in operation, its total assets amount to \$40,000,000; its capital and reserve fund are now \$1,300,000. Its organization is completed by a chain of 110 branches of which 15 are situated in Montreal.

INLAND DEPT. IS NOW ACTIVE
Charges Laid Against Five Offenders for Making Moonshine.

For a considerable time it has been suspected that much moonshine whiskey and strong beer was being distilled in the lower end of the county, but it was not until special officers of the Inland Revenue Department investigated that results were shown.

Mr. D. J. Kearny, Inland Revenue Officer, of Montreal, arrived in Jacquet River on Dec. 16th, and lost no time in picking up four men, Albert Pitre, John Roy, Duncan Roy and Albert P. Dempsey, whom he fringed with illicit distilling. The four pleaded guilty to the charges before Police Magistrate McAllister, who imposed upon each of them a fine of \$200 and costs, or two months in jail. On the 18th the Inland Revenue Officer had John Newel before the Police Magistrate charged with a similar offence. He was also fined \$200 and costs or two months in jail.

AGRICULTURE IS FORGING AHEAD
Great Progress Being Made In View of Experts.

St. John, Dec. 21—H. G. Sears, sales manager for the Albert Dickson Seed Co., Chicago, and son of Postmaster Sears, leaves for his home in Chicago this evening via Ottawa. He reports that while business is generally quiet it is improving daily, and on a much more cheerful note, while, he says, "don't cry hard times, we all should preach optimism, economy and thrift and keep smiling."

While in the province this trip, Mr. Sears met and discussed agriculture and successful farming methods with Hon. D. W. Morseau, Minister of Agriculture; Wilfred Boulter, Secretary of Agriculture; P. E. S. J. Moore, Government Seed Expert at Truro; O. C. Hicks, N. B. Department of Agriculture; and W. W. Hubbard, Superintendent of the N. B. Experimental Farms at Fredericton, and J. D. McKenna, of the Maritime Farmer, Sussex. It is their general opinion that agriculture is forging ahead very rapidly in the right direction in the provinces, and all look forward to much greater development in the near future, which spells success.

Last year farm seeds reached the highest prices on record. This resulted in curtailment of seeding operations. However, seeds are now back to a pre war basis, so that present indications point to a large acreage of clover and timothy being sown this coming spring.

CANADA NOW HAS A NAVY
Gift Ships Received Tuesday From Great Britain.

HALIFAX, N. S., Dec. 21—E. M. G. S. Aurora, Patrol and Patriotic, the cruiser and two destroyers presented to Canada by Great Britain, arrived off the harbor at dawn this morning and anchored off the dock yard shortly after eight o'clock. On the stroke of eight the ships were "dressed" and the opening gun of a salute of twenty-one guns boomed out from the citadel.

ACT TO REGULATE CIVIL SERVICE IN NEW BRUNSWICK BEING PREPARED

Fredericton, Dec. 22—An act to regulate the civil service of the province of New Brunswick is being prepared for submission to the legislature at its next session.

For some time the Civil Servants' Association have been negotiating with the provincial government on the question, and have urged that this province should have an act regulating the civil the same as other provinces.

Recently the Association was advised by the government to have a bill prepared for submission to the Legislature and this is now being done by the executive of the Association. It is understood that provisions will be made for classification of all the civil servants and a plan for reorganized promotion in such a manner as to improve the efficiency of the service.

CHRISTMAS.
Another Christmas is with us, bringing with it all the time-honored customs associated with the celebration of the greatest of all festivals with its also new joys, new hopes and aspirations and a more abiding faith in that Christianity which had its birth in the Bethlehem manger-bed and which has stood the test beneath the searchlight of the ages. Impressive indeed is the thought, and one not to be passed over lightly, that after nineteen hundred years have rolled away, hundreds of millions of the best human beings inhabiting this old world, will on Saturday—as on no other day—cease from toil, lay aside their business cares, enter into the spirit of this festival and all, consciously or unconsciously, pay homage to Him whose birth the day commemorates.

George Eliot expressed the Christmas spirit well in these words:

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



RAISED PRINCE RUPERT'S FLAG.

(Canadian Press.)
 Victoria, B. C., Dec. 10.—The British flag has been raised under most unusual circumstances in the past, but probably the conditions were never stranger than those of a recent ceremony held at Swanson Bay, when two divers, nearly 100 feet below the surface of the sea, hoisted the ship's ensign on the flagstaff of the sunken Prince Rupert, which is now in process of being salvaged. One diver bent the colors to the halyards and slowly hoisted them, while his mate stood at the salute near by and sent to the surface through the telephone connected with his helmet the strains of the National Anthem.
 Two divers of the Pacific Salvage Company had gone down into the stern of the wreck to a depth of nearly 100 feet. The diver's tender suddenly announced that he could hear "God Save the King" coming up through the telephone which connected him with the man below. Wonder was expressed at the occurrence, but the mystery was cleared up when the divers rose to the surface again.
 While going around the stern one diver had found in a box at the foot of the flagstaff the ship's ensign. Signalling to his partner he took the emblem from the repository, bent it on to the halyards, and slowly hoisted it. Standing at attention, his hand raised to the salute, his mate sang the National Anthem, and it was this that the men at the surface had heard.
 Many a fine ship has gone down with colors flying, but to the Pacific Salvage Company will accrue the unique honor of raising a vessel with the British flag mastheaded.

12,000,000 TREE SEEDS SHIPPED FROM U. S. TO WAR DEVASTATED AREA IN EUROPE

Washington, Dec. 22.—A Christmas gift of twelve million tree seeds to be used in reforesting the war devastated areas of France and Belgium and also certain sections of Great Britain was shipped to those countries today through their embassies here by the American Foreign Association. The seed were of the Douglas Fir collected from the west coast, a species which grows rapidly.

HYDRO POWER FOR FARMERS

During the recent provincial elections some speakers on farmer platforms denounced the Foster Government's hydro-electric policy on the

ground that it was an adventure in extravagance. What the farmer's Government in Ontario think of the Hydro-Electric policy of that province, which is practically the same as that of New Brunswick, may be judged from a speech of Hon. Manning Doherty, Minister of Agriculture in the Ontario Farmers' Government. Addressing a convention of the Reel County U.F.O. Mr. Doherty said that every farmer in Ontario should have hydro-electric light and power on his farm. "We are absolutely behind Sir Adam Beck in any development of Hydro," added Mr. Doherty. "And as to radical railways under the Hydro-Electric Commission, wherever they are justified, they will be built."
