Their enormity was represented to Sir John Macdonald many months before last general election. But he and his associates refused to investigate the chargesindeed, laughed at the man who made them, though up to that time he had been a Conservative M. P. And now because they did so, and the course of the Conservative leader and his friends is con-demned, we are told that this is a "reviling of the dead." Surely partisan defense of unrighteous methods of government has gone to great lengths when such a defense is made to an indictment so clearly proved.




