A Hundred Miners in Deadly Peril.

The Old Hands Take Warning, Seven Men Were Entombed for Many Hours—A Narrow Escape.

Centralia, Pa., Nov. 20.—The seven men entonied in the Hazeldell colliery here yesterday morning were rescued last nightalive. At 10 o'clock in the morning, 100 workinen were engaged at their daily occupation of mining coal in the Hazeldell colliery, which is an old one and has been worked almost to exhaustion. The roof was known to be dangerous and the officials have tried to prevent a diaster. Yesterday the symptoms which precede a heavy fall were noticed, and the old miners did not wait for the second warning. The alarm was spread and the men rushed for safety.

Nino mon tarried too long, however. Ira Rothmel and his son John were caught in the concussion and carried through the opening like chaff. The other seven were inside at the point at which the cave-in occurred and were entombed. The rescuing party, which was immediately formed, worked amid the greatest dangers.

At 7 o'clock last evening the tube pipe on the surface was called. The message which reached one of the rescuers almost dumbfounded him, "Sate, safe?" he cried, as the glad tidings were spread throughout the town. Soon after the signal to hoist was given and as it reached the safe surface bearing the lately entombed miners, a mighty shout went up.

At a meeting of the Amaigamated Association at Homertead, Pa., on Sunday aitemon, the great atrike at Carnegie's works was efficially declared off.

Atter a five months' struggle which for bitterness has probably never been equaled in America, the army of strikers finally decided on Sunday to give up the fight, the vote standing 101 in favor of declaring the strike off and 91 against it. The officials addressed the members, and in plain words told them to strike was lost, and advised them to take steps to better their condition. Those who cannot get their places back are in a bad fix, as the reinef funds will be stopped and many hundreds of them have not a thing to live on. Many business houses have fallen into the hands of the sheriff since the strike has been on.

News of today's action was received with dismay by the strikers of the two Lawrenceville mills of the company. These men were sympathy strikers and were out for no cause of their own. The Luvence weeks, and the Beaver Falls men decided to go back on Saturday. The Lawrenceville men stood out, however. The strike at one time involved nearly 10,000 men, and the last in wages will reach, it is said, in the neighborhood of \$2,000,000. Then there is an immense loss to the firm which conservative people put at double the amount lost—by the men in wages. To this can be added nearly \$500,000 paid to the State troops and the cost to the county of Alleghany for cases of treason and others growing out of the strike. LIFE AND TIMES OF HON, ALEX.

After a perusal of the handsome volume now before us, we are not surprised to learn that, though published but the other day, the public demand has been so great that already several editions have been called for. A sketch of the life of Alexander Mackenzie is really a history of Canada during the 40 years that preceded his death. The consideration of every great question brought before the people from the time of his reaching manhood down to his lamented death was to a greater or less

degree affected by his views and acts.

Many of our statesmen have been what
is known as self-made, but none of them possessing resources so limited at the start as those enjoyed by Mr. Mackenzie achieved so deserved distinction or have left behind them a reputation so enviable. The third son of a miller who had a large family and had been unfortunate in business because of the duliness following the French war, Alexander Mackenzie was early called upon Alexander Mackenzie was early called upon to leave the parish school and learn the art of making a living. His father died when he was but 9 years of age, and when he was but 16 he was apprenticed to the building trade, in his native shire of Perth. When he was 20 years of age he same to Cantrade, in his native shire of Perth. When he was 20 years of age he came to Canda as a journeyman mason; in less than 40 years afterwards he returned to the home of his early childhood the Prime Minister of Canada. Such prestige was not achieved without hard work and earnest study in the school of experience, that best of all educational institutions. When the future Premier arrived at Ouebec, responsible government arrived at Quebec, responsible government and the independence of the judiciary, for which the early Liberals so long contended, had been won for Canada, but the clergy reserves and rectories question and the inequalities in Parliamentary representation remained bones of contention, and in their settlement, in the interests of the populace, Mr. Mackenzie very speedily took a promi-nent part. After he went to Sarnia, Mr. Mackenzie took a front rank in the management of public affairs. He not only continued active in his business as a contractor, but found time to edit a paper tractor, but found time to edit a paper and take a prominent part in promoting those principles of progressive legislation and democratic Government that remained dear to him during his whole life.

time in the minds of American citizens, though he protests against their perpetuation by ignorant or selfish people.

Mr. Mackenzie was an earnest exponent of the principle that office-holders should not have seats in Parliament; he led in the movement to nevert man having seats in

able that a party leader should be chosen to preside over all. Writing to his brother, Mr. Mackenzie tell show he called the members together and informed them that he was resolved to retire from the position, and urged them to select a successor. He continued:

This incident proves two things—Mr. Mackenzie's unselfishness in wishing to give up a post that he had proved himself well able to occupy (he had successfully combatted every prominent Conservative in the Huses) and Han Edward Blake's in the House) and Hon. Edward Blake's loyalty to his friend. The corroboration comes late, but it shows the baselessness of the slander that Mr. Blake was always intriguing to oust Mr. Mackenzie from the

leadership. When in 1878, Mr. Mackenzie finally resolved to return to the position of a private member, his Liberal colleagues in the House unanimously passed a resolution of confidence in him and thanked him for his reat services to Liberalism. It was Mr. Mackenzie's ill luck to take

office as First Minister at a time of severe depression in trade the world over. No nation was an exception to the experience. Countries enjoying protective suffered alike with nations having more or less freedom of trade. Mr. Mackenzie's opponents took no note of this fact. They were not so fair in their political tactics as were the Liberal leader in the years from 1857 to 1860. At that time a great depression in trade prevailed, but Hon. George Brown, Mr. Dorion and their ssociates did not blame the Government to which they were opposed for the dullness. which they were opposed for the dullness.

They were fair enough to concede that as long as a government kept the taxes low —imposed no class burdens upon the people —they could not be held responsible for duliness in trade, or financial embarrass-ments. But Sir John Macdonald and his allies maintained that trade was bad, that the exodus to the United States was caused by the lack of a system of high taxation. by the lack of a system of high taxation. Sir John propounded a policy that would make everybody rich by taxing everybody eise. Mr. Mackenzie pointed out that while this kind of protectionism was preached in Ontario, his opponents insisted n the Maritime Provinces that what was in the Maritime Provinces that wherease of taxation. Mr. Mackenzie emphasized the absurdity of the trade restriction policy by telling the people-"Protection must make you pay more for the goods you use than you pay more for else it is no protection." But the craze for a change had set in, and the seductive promises to increase the price of wheat, of barley, of beans and of cattle influenced Liberal farmers to vote for the hightax nostrum, while the promises to hightax nostrum, while the promises to grant opportunity to manufacturers to assess their fellow countrymen at their sweet wills, and to workingmen that their wages wou... be enormously increased, carried many of the cities. Mr. Mackenzie summed up his creed at the end of the conflict which ended in his defeat, when writing to friend in Nova Scotia. when, writing to friend in Nova Scotia,

more years it will all come right. I have endeavored to sow good seed which will bear good fruit in good time. The enemy has sown the wind, and will reap the whirlwind." How prophetic a declaration this was recent experience in Canada has proved. Unfortunately the evils of high taxation have born heavily, not only on those who favored it as an agency to get into office or to line their pockets at the expense of their fellows, but upon the inde-

movement to prevent men having seats in the Local Legislatures from being returned as members of Parilament, and he was the pioneer advocate of the view that Canada should have the right to negotiate her own commercial treaties. In his speech on the reciprocity question, he said he knew that whatever bargain Canada made with the United States as a neighbor would be ratified by Great Britain. His view was that trade between the two countries, instead of being something to be discouraged.

In a letter written in 1873 to his brother Charles proof is given of Mr. Mackensie's unselfshues. When he was requested to run first for Lambton, then for West Middlesex and again for West Lambton, the demand for his services earm from the populace. He was no self-seeker; indeed, a predominant characteristic in his makeup was his absolute devotion to daty, even at personal inconvenience. He took life seriously, and now that he is dead and gone his sterling honesty of purpose and of action, from the beginning to the end of

Young, on 1st June, 1885, he said:

"The measure is of such a nature as to warrant the exhaustion of every constitutional means to secure its defeat. Only imagine a dominant party coolly legislating to secure themselves in power! Not content with the advantages over their opponents that they already possess, they deliberately resolve to take the making of the electoral lists into their own hands, and they name their own officials with the most complete power and authority to cook them! Nothing like it has ever been tried in any constitutionally governed country in the world; even the Stuarts and the Napoleons left the voting free."

Mr. Mackenzie denounced the Franchise Act as "a villainous measure," and told the

Act as "a villainous measure," and told the House of Commons that it should bring the blush of shame to its author's face.

How admirably the rascally expedient is here portrayed. What words could Mr. Mackenzie have used to depict the enormity of the London seat steal if he had lived to review that crime against the people on the flour of Parliament? floor of Parliament?

Mr. Mackenzie thrice received the offer of a knighthood, but firmly declined it. He was a strong believer in the democratic principle that the best honor which a Can-adian can obtain should come from his fellow countrymen, and not from a source which can know but little of the merits or demerits of our public men. He was well pleased when Mr. George Brown refused a knighthood—a title "which some men are anxious to obtain and honor so little." Many other illustrations might be given of Mr. Mackenzie's manly independence

and sturdy honesty. Indeed, the more one is able to peer into his private life and the better his character is understood, the higher becomes the esteem entertained for him. No politician could have been more traduced or misrepresented than he was while he held the reins of power, and no public man who has died in recent years public man who has died in recent years has been so thoroughly exouerated, by post-mortem testimony at the hands of former enemies, from every accusation of wrongdoing made against him while he lived. Alexander Mackenzie had his faults, but while he ruled Canada honesty was as forced in every department. had his faults, but while he ruled canada honesty was enforced in every department of Government, and the welfare of the people was, as it ought always to be, the first consideration of those in authority. There are many who think that it would have been better for Mr. Mackenzie to have have been better for Mr. Mackenzie to have yielded to the importunities of those led astray by the idea that it was possible, by levying higher taxes on the people, to remove a duliness in trade that was worldmove a dullness in trade that was world-wide. Indeed judging by the course of events a country honestly ruled, even if taxed 10 per cent. higher than in 1878, would have been in better shape than a land bedevilled by monopolies, by infamous gerrymander and franchise acts, by the surrender of Ministers to the boodling element, by sacrifice of the country's resources to the wiles of land and lumber speculators. Mr. Mackenzie's view, lowever, was that a statesman had no right 10 ever, was that a statesman had no right of do wrong under any consideration, an those who read the narrative of his life wil see that he was consistent throughout, and that the evils he prophesied as likely to come from a departure from right principle have for years afflicted this fair country.

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

Later in the day after he had got the gun I heard my little boy crying, but before I could get there my mother reached him and was shot. Then I was shot myself, and ran for the children and took them away. That's all I know about it."

Late to-night Zigler talked of the shooting. "I only did what the spirits told me, and when I get out of here there is going to be another great big fight."
