# IS COMING ALONG TODAY

Head of Halley's Astral Vagrant Was On Schedule Time Last Night But the Front End Was Travelling Too Fast for Caudal Appendage -But It's There All Right and Will Sweep Over Globe Within Few Hours.

Williams' Bay, Wis., May 19.-Shattering all scientific calculations, and completely puzzling astronomers, the glowing tail of Halley's Comet appeared in the eastern sky today at a time when the world's comet authorities had

agreed it would be in the west Such eminent astronomers as Prof. S. A. Mitchell, of Columbia University, New York; Prof. Edwin B. Frost, of the Yerkes Observatory staff here, and Prof. Edward Barnard, of the University of Chicago, agree that the glow of light they saw in the east was the comet's tail.

New York, May 19.-The most careful computations of the world's greatest mathematical astronomers have gone wrong over the caudal appendage of Halley's astral vagrant, and the cataclysm variously predicted for last night, was not due to strike the earth until some time today. Dispatches from the various trained observers throughout the world indicate that the comet passed between the sun and the earth on schedule time last night, but that the tail, which might be compared to the shadow of a planet or the moon eclipsing the sun, did not brush the earth. Bulletins from observatorles say that the tail, before daylight, was sighted in the east, indicating that the speed of the comet's head was so great that its tail swished out behind it in an elliptic, much like the curve in a stream of water played from a horizontally moving nozzle.

Therefore, the tail did not hit the earth last night, at least, not as it was expected, and the phenomenon was expected today. All predictions as to results apply the same, the public being given rain check to a postponed exhibition. Cor .nued on Page Eight.





### SQUADRON OF ROYALTY TO FOLLOW CASKET

Edward's Funeral Friday Will Furnish a Magnificent Spectacle.

London, May 19 .- The official programme of Friday's ceremonial has been issued. It is exceedingly detailed, and would fill five or six columns of a newspaper. In brief, it is as follows:

"The coffin will be transferred from the catafalque at Westminster Hall to a gun carriage at 9:45 a.m. The royal regalia will be placed on the coffin, and the procession will then be formed. It will be headed by a multitude of men prominent in the British and foreign military and naval services. The flames and ranks being fully set forth in the programme, and massed bands and royal suites. Immediately behind the gun carriage will come Prince Louis of Battenberg. King Edward's charger will come next, led, and then the royal standard. Behind will come a cavalcade of royal personages, King George leading. The Kaiser will ride on his right and the Duke of Conrear.

"In ranks of three there will ride the kings of Norway, Greece, Spain, Bulgaria, Denmark, Portugal and Belgium, the Austrian heir apparent, the Ottoman heir apparent. 





## AND NIAGARA POWER

Two Offers Made Them But They Counter With Another Proposition.

They Ask That They Be Given a Special Rate on Such Days by the Commission.

The schedule of power prices have not been made public, as the rate of discount has not yet been determined The basic rates have but the net price depends altogether on the matter of discount. For instance, the basic rate for domestic lighting is placed at 10 cents a kilowatt hour, when as a matter of fact it will probably be 41/2 cents kilowatt hour, or perhaps 4 cents. The only definite price for power is that given some weeks ago to the

London Street Railway Company by the hydro-electric commission.

This price is well under \$35 per horsepower. Negotiations have been under way for some weeks, and it is likely that they will be closed within a short time.
It was stated on apparently good

authority today that the company had ordered some of their equipment some weeks ago, but the officials would not King Edward. admit that such was the case. Two Propositions.

It is understood that three propositions were offered the company. One was to pay for their power on the peak load basis.

This was objected to an account of the fact that on certain occasions the day, be laid off. peak load is much greater than their average load, and they would be compelled to pay for the larger amount of power for the whole month, when, as matter of fact, they used not half that amount as a rule.

For this the storage batteries would be of great assistance. The second proposition is to purchase power on the meter basis with a maximum load. This would be in the nature of a grand average for the month. The commission would fix the minimum of power to be used by the company. 


