Mr. Lloyd Harris, the former member for the riding, was again nominated, but after having at one stage of the proceedings practically admitted that he was considering the question of running, he came out, unexpectedly, with a straight refusal.

Not Wanted. His reason was clear enough. As was expected, Lloyd Harris' action in opposing reciprocity found absolutely no indorsement among his constituents.

But the farmers were not satisfied. Reciprocity has displaced every other issue in the minds of the men from the townships and they refused to get behind any man who was not fully in sympathy with them.

Lloyd Harris had opposed reciprocity, and they demanded an assurance that if he was sent to Ottawa he would support the agreement. The assurance was not given, and when the nomination was offered to the former member, the farmers stood aloof. They went farther and declared that if he came out in support of reciprocity he could never carry the rural part of the riding.

To Reduce the Hips. Dear Miss Grey—Will you kindly tell me how I may reduce my hips? I would not look so large if my hips were smaller. FANNY. Here is an exercise which, if persisted in, reduces the hips rapidly. Lie extended upon the floor, supporting yourself by one hand, while the other is placed upon the hip. While holding this position raise the body gradually from the floor until the whole weight is supported by the hand and feet. It is comparatively easy to get the body from the floor as far as the knees, but to bring it up to the full extent is not easy at first. It should be tried first on one side and then on the other. When beginning this exercise you should be careful to get used to it gradually. Peroxide on Hair. Dear Miss Grey—Please tell me how to use peroxide to bleach the hair. Is it used when the hair is washed or is it applied with a brush? JIMMY. I never advise the amateur to use peroxide, for the result is never satisfactory. If you desire blonde hair, why not go to a thoroughly reliable hair-dressing establishment and have your hair bleached? The Henna Stain. Dear Miss Grey—Will you kindly give me the recipe for the henna hair stain and let me know if it will injure the scalp? Must it be applied every time the hair is washed? A. M. R. The constant use of any hair dye will injure the hair in time. The henna stain is not a fast color, so that it will be necessary to apply it after the hair has been washed. Benzoin on the Face. Dear Miss Grey—Would you please tell me if tincture of benzoin will cure the skin if it is put on every night? As I have large pores, pimples and blackheads, I use the compound benzoin every night, and then I put the benzoin on my face. Now, will you let me know how many drops to put in the water and if I should use any other? Will the brush hurt my skin? M. M. (CONSTANT READER). The constant use of any compound is not well for the skin, but if benzoin is used occasionally it will do no harm. About half a teaspoonful may be added to a basin of water. If your skin is not of a very tender nature, it will do no harm to use it every night. If you find that it irritates the skin, use it less often.

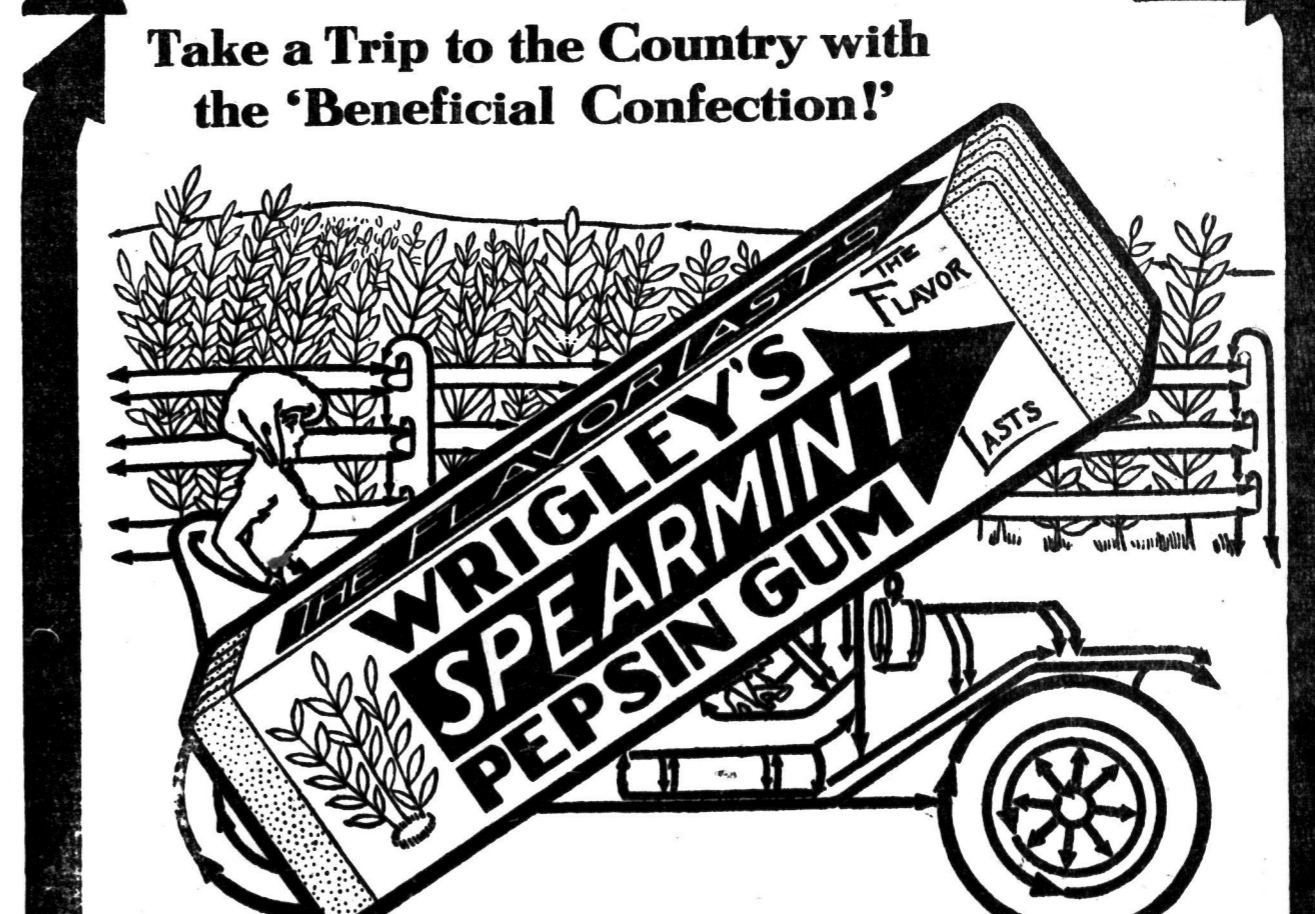

ALL AROUND THE HOUSE. Consult a physician. Beat yolks 3 eggs until frothy, add 1 cup sugar and 1 cup sour milk. Stir in 1 tablespoon soft butter. Add 2 cups flour which has been sifted twice with 1-2 teaspoon salt and a scant teaspoon soda. Add a teaspoon lemon extract and mix thoroughly. Bake in a greased pan for 30 minutes. The Daily Menu. BREAKFAST: Fruit, Cereal, Sugar, Cream, Potatoes with Eggs, Graham Bread, Cocoa Shells. LUNCHEON: Peach Grilled, Bread and Butter, Hot Chocolate. DINNER: Cream of Asparagus Soup, Baked Blue Fish, Tomato Sauce, Potato Puff, Strawberry Whip, Swedish Waters, Iced Coffee. JUST HINTS. Squawking doors may be quieted by brushing the hinges with a feather that has been dipped in oil. All cooking utensils should be washed with soda immediately after they have been used, which will remove every trace of grease. Keep the well-oiled boxes in which crackers are packed, for they make excellent polishers for irons. Keep white paper on each shelf of the refrigerator. It gives a clean appearance and keeps things from dropping on the shelf below. Leather can be cleaned very well with milk. Dust the leather thoroughly with soft cloth, then use another cloth dipped in sweet milk, and the spots will be easily removed. SWEET WATERMELON PICKLES. Pare watermelon rinds to the amount of seven pounds, leaving a good trace of the pink. Cut in desired shape. To four pounds of sugar add a pint of vinegar and bring to boil. Mix half an ounce of ginger root, two teaspoons each of cinnamon and allspice, and a teaspoonful ground cloves. Tie the spices in a small square of muslin, put into the vinegar and sugar, and after it is very hot add the watermelon. Bring to a boiling point, then turn into a stone jar to stand over night. Next day drain the vinegar syrup from the fruit into a pan, allow to come to the boiling point and pour back over the fruit. Repeat for twelve mornings, boiling the syrup down until it will just cover the fruit on the last morning. Add the fruit, bring all to a boil and put away in jars or glasses. The delicacy of the pickle will more than repay for the trouble of reboiling. FROZEN COFFEE. Take four heaping tablespoons of coffee ground very fine and put in a farina boiler with quart of freshly boiled water. Stir slowly 20 minutes, strain through a fine cloth to rid the liquid of all traces of the grounds, add a half pound of sugar, stir until dissolved, turn into a freezer with the white of an egg, and freeze until the consistency of a punch. Serve in goblets or glasses.

STRIKE FEVER EPIDEMIC

Liverpool, Aug. 13.—Serious rioting growing out of the strike which is in progress occurred this afternoon. One policeman was killed by being struck on the head by a brick, and many persons were injured. An altercation between a policeman and strikers during a transport workers' demonstration at St. George's Hall, Liverpool, which culminated in a general melee. When after this disorder had been put down, and the strikers scattered, they gathered again in the building quarters and resumed the strike.

After the light St. George's Hall was converted into a temporary hospital, and the wounded strikers were attended to by physicians. Driven from the centre of the city the crowd sullenly repaired to the Islington Quarter, one of the lowest and roughest in Liverpool. Here the police were baffled in the narrow streets, for the desperate rioters barricaded themselves in the houses. Down bricks, slates and chimney pots from the roofs upon their heads.

While the details as to casualties are incomplete, Constable Cook was killed by a blow on the head, and Superintendent, of Police Bolton was taken to a hospital in a precarious condition. It is rumored that the riotous mob set on fire during the disturbances. The outbreak, it is alleged, was largely due to the strikers' resentment of the police force which has been members of the police force brought here from Birmingham to assist in maintaining order. Tom Mann, who was one of the leaders of the demonstration, has lodged a formal protest with the chief constable against what he describes as a brutal attack by a Birmingham constable on one of the strikers.

Fierce Fighting. Fierce fighting continued in the Islington quarter until nearly midnight. In Charlton street the rioters erected barricades and started fire to impede the mounted police. The riot act was read for a second time, but the rioting continued with the situation, a military officer was injured and much property was wrecked. During the course of the rioting, a constable was injured, many of them seriously.

Disorders at Glasgow. London, Aug. 13.—While the strike rages in the provinces, rapidly growing worse. In addition to rioting today at Liverpool, there were serious disorders in Glasgow, where the street service had to be completely closed down. Thirty thousand workmen met in Glasgow green and the strike leaders threatened a general strike of the city if the men continued to take the place of strikers. Scuffles with the police led to wild scenes. The most serious assaults on surgeons and the firemen who were called out to extinguish incendiary fires.

P., who was the only one before the meeting who was not a member of the Liberal party.

A Paper Bag Cooking Coupon will be found in every issue of The London Advertiser as long as the bags are on sale.

Directions—How to Use Cooking Bags:
1. Select one that "fits" the food intended to be cooked.
2. Grease slightly the inside of the bag, except in the case of vegetables, or when water is to be added.
3. When the food has been prepared for the bag, place the same on the table, and lift the uppermost edge of the bag while you insert the contents.
4. Fold the mouth of the bag two or three times and fasten with a clip, or pins, or in any other way that will secure as nearly as possible a hermetical closing.
5. Should it ever happen that a bag leaks, simply transfer it with contents undisturbed to another bag.
6. The oven, any kind of which will do, should be kept clean, and if properly heated, as with the old style of cooking, results should satisfactorily follow. Average oven heat should be about 200 degrees, Fahr., and when the bag is put into the oven this heat should be reduced by about 30 degrees. In the case of ovens with solid shelves, a wire grid should be placed on the shelf with a space between and the bag with contents on the grid. Experience will soon teach the cook when the oven is hot enough without the use of a thermometer.
7. The oven door will not require to be opened every now and then "to see how the roast is doing." The whole force of the heat is playing upon the bag and from within it cannot escape.
8. Exercise care in taking the bag out of the oven, and if gas is used the bag should be kept out of danger of contact with the flame.
A plate inserted under the bag will best remove it from the oven.
9. When taken out for use the bag should be ripped open from the top and the fragments thrown away.
