THAT WHISKEY ORDINANCE

A Revenue Measure but Not for the Town of Dawson.

Yukon Council Fixes License Rates and Retains the Lion's Share of the Proceeds-Women Deburred from Handling Liquor.

The whiskey license ordinance has been passed by the Yukon council and governor and contains some mighty interesting provisions. There are three kinds of licenses, hotels, saloons and bottling works.

A hotel will pay \$2000 per annum, will mainand sufactiont appliances for serving meals, for travelers.

Saloons will pay \$2500 per annum and will close at midnight Saturday and remain closed Wills, Capt. Burstall, Col. Davis, until 6 o'elock Monday morning.

Theatres will take out saloon diecuses where they maintain a bar.

Wholesalers will take out a saloon license. Bottling works will pay a half. Saloons will pay \$2100 whether in Encorpor-

Young men nor women are allowed to dispose of liquors. Exceptions are made in cases where the woman is either a licensee or the wife of one. THE STATE OF

Saloun or hotel keepers are financially responsible if through the dispensing of their liquors a man gets hurt. An intoxicated individual wandering out into the cold and getting frozen to death can coilect damages to the full amount-or friends cau do it for him.

An inspector or inspectors will be appointed and their reports on people and places will determine the board of commissioners whether or not licenses shall be granted or cancelled. If an inspector shall be proved to be accepting a bribe or bribes he is subject to a fine of \$100 for the first offense. Anyone-trying to influence him in the performance of his duties will receive a similar fine.

THE "NIGGER ON THE WOODPILE." The feature of the ordinance, which is most noticeable is that the Yukon Council, through its licen commission, retains to itself the

proceeds of licensing Dawson's saloons. An article of the ordinance allows incorporated towns to obtain a revenue by the imposition of an additional license of "not to exreed one fifth of the amount charged hereby." Not satisfied with that it is again particularly specified that the said incorporated town cannot collect their small license until after the big one has been paid into the coffers of the Yukon Council. It intended as a revenue measure for replenishing the depleted coffers of the Yukon Territory exchequer it is nothing less than a humbug. The parties who participate in the division of the wretched spoil exacted in most cases from those upon whom it comes especially hard, are the street gamin who has been dignined with the title of special constable, the keeper of the pound, the officer who serves the papers, and the magistrate who pronounces sentence.

In order that all the above named parties may be compensated for their expenditure of time, energy, etc., it becomes necessary that the unfortunate dog owner who may for the time being have lost sight of his property, contribute the sum of \$8 or \$9 and by so

doing recover his dog.

We ask of our legislative body, the Yukon Council, how long this farce is going to continue No censure can attach to those who execute the law provided they do not exceed their instructions. It is the wisdom of the law itself in this instance that we call into question and we have yet to hear an argament advanced which can approach any justification of the harshness of this measure. We are quite willing to admit and every reasonable citizen will agree with us, that the public should be protected from vicious dogs. But in their zeal to bring about this very desirable end, we submit, that a rank injustice has been worked. In a country such as this, with but one resource upon which to depend, and the development of that resource depending to a large extent upon the use of dozs, it would appear that any legislation regarding their keeping should impose as few burdens as possible upon their owners.

WATER FRONT SITUATION

A Reprint of Morrison & McDonald's Much-Wanted Lease.

Bighty - Thousand Collected - Ten Thousand Pald Back-Subscribing to the Resistance Pard-Distraint Served and not Estonced.

With only one or two exceptions the occupants of the block between the barracks and First street refused to pay their ground rent last month.

The following figures may be accepted as ap preximately correct! In four menths, under their so-called lease, Morrison & McDonald have paid the government \$9,600 on the waterfront, which is about \$1 per front foot each month. In the same period of time they have collected from the occupants some \$80,000.

They have charged # per front foot, the minimum rental being \$4 and the maximum \$12 per front foot Some ten days ago a distraint was served

upon Dr. McWm. Bourke, at the instance of Grotschier & Miell, attorneys for Morrison & McDonald. A constable notified the renter that he had elezed the firewood outside and the building which the doctor occupied. Eight days clapsed but the slezed property was not sold. On Wednesday afternoon the wood and the building were again slezed.

A fund has been raised by the tenants with which to make a test case. On Wednesday night the committee on collections had nearly reached First street. Tenants occupying 12 feet front, or less, were assessed \$4; tennits occupying a greater frontal were accessed \$5. Up to that time the committee had been cofused by only one in seven.

The strip of ground occupied, feathers out to nothing at the upper end, and several of the buildings, beside being on supports from the river har underneath, are fully a foot from the bank in front. Owners contend that even had the government power to lease the water-front, and supposing Morrison & McDonald to be in possession of a lawful lease, these gentlemen could not possibly collect rental from buildings resting entirely upon the bed of the river.

Circumstances have conspired to bring about this determination of the "water-dronters" to pay ne more rent. One store keeper, in paying his assessment of \$4 remarked: "That is one dollar more than I have taken in today."

In at least one case the tenant occupied the water-front long before the arrival in Dawson of Mr. Wade, who wegotiated the so-called lease with Morrison & McDonald.

The presumption of the supposed lossees from Wade in deman ling and securing a rental from these people is staggering.

The particulars of the first distraint upon Dr. McWm. Bourke are amusing. The Landlord's Act of England, under which common law distraints are made, provides that a landlord may authorize a bailiff to seize chattels in payment of rent at any time of the day between sunrise and sunset. This first distraint was served at 8 p. m., and by a constable under the authority of the sheriff. In answer to the first question the doctor replied that he could pay rent but wendard. The second distraint was served at 3 p. m.

The water-front controversy reminds us that the Nugger published on August 10th the correspondence between Crown Land Agent Fred Wade and Messrs, Morrison & McDonald, which is all the lease there is in existence. For the benefit of our renders who desire to be "post-ed" on the situation, we reproduce the last let-ter from Wade which the lesses accepted:
