OFFICIAL.

PASS LIST, 1904.

PROVINCIAL HIGH SCHOOL EXAMINATION.

[The valuation of Candidates' examination papers is made by the Provincial Examiners according to the Regulations of the Council of Public Instruction.]

REG. 91. To make a "High School Pass" on Grades IX, X, and XI, the candidate must make, at least, the *minimum aggregate* (400 or more) of the grade on any eight papers with no subject below 25.

REG. 92. To make a "High School Pass" on Grade XII, the candidate must make, at least, the *minimum aggregate* (1000 or more) on the subjects prescribed, with no subject below 25.

A candidate who makes an aggregate of 600 on any ten papers of Grade XII, and an aggregate of 500 on a set of ten different papers of the Syllabus at a subsequent examination, or who makes an aggregate of 1000 on twenty papers of the Syllabus, or who has already taken a XII (cl), a XII (sc), or an "A" License, may thereafter present himself for examination on any of the subjects on which he may not have made, at least, 50 per cent. at a previous examination; and so long as the Council of Public Instruction deems the character of the examinations on the subjects not materially changed, all the valuation marks 50 per cent. or above made on each subject at the said and following examinations may be incorporated into a single Certificate, provided, at least, 50 per cent. be made on each of the (twenty) subjects required for the Grades XII (cl), or XII (sc), or on each of the (thirty) subjects in the full course for XII (cl and sc).

REG. 93. Candidates failing to make a pass in the grade applied for may be ranked as making a pass in the next grade below, provided 75 per cent. of the *minima* be made; and as making a pass on the grade second below, provided 50 per cent. of the *minima* be made.

PUBLIC SCHOOL COURSE OF STUDY.

152. The public school course of study may be considered under its sub-divisions of the common and high school courses. They furnish a basis for the classification of pupils by the teachers and for the examination of schools by the inspectors, while they also secure a definite co-ordination of all the work attempted in the public schools of all grades, thus fostering the harmonious interaction of all the educational forces of the province.

These courses are to be followed in all schools, particularly with reference to (1) the order of succession of the subjects, and (2) the simultaneity of their study. The fulness of detail with which they can be carried out in each school must depend upon local conditions, such as the size of the school, the number of grades assigned to the teacher, etc. As suggestive to teachers with little experience, contracted forms of the detailed common school course for miscellaneous and partially graded schools are appended.

The public school course of study is the result of the observation and experience of representative leading teachers of the province, under the suggestion of the experiments of other countries and the criticism of our teachers in provincial conventions assembled for many years in succession. A system developed in such a manner must necessarily in some points be a compromise, and presumably therefore at least a little behind what we might expect from the few most advanced teachers. But it is also very likely to be a better guide than the practice of a majority, without any mutual consultation for improvement. The successive progression of studies is intended to be adapted to the order of development of the powers of the child's mind, while their simultaneous progression is designed to prevent monotony and one-sidedness, and to produce a harmonious and healthy development of the physical, mental and moral powers of the pupil. The apparent multiplicity of the subjects is due to their sub-division for the purpose of emphasizing leading features of the main subjects which otherwise might be overlooked by inexperienced teachers. The courses have been demonstrated to be adapted to the average pupil under a teacher of average skill. The teacher is, however, cautioned to take special care that pupils (more especially any prematurely promoted or in feeble health) should not run any risk of "over-pressure" in attempting to follow the average class-work.

Changes in these courses of study must always be expected from year to year, but to a very small extent it is hoped, except in the prescription of certain texts in the high school course. These will be published from time to time in the bulletin of the Department, the JOURNAL OF EDUCATION, published in April and October of each year.

GENERAL PRESCRIPTIONS.

The general regulations, on account of their paramount importance and their unchangeable character, are printed on page 10 of the School Register, so that they may be always before the eyes of the teacher. To save space they are not republished here; but attention is called to the fact that they are even of more importance than the special prescriptions which follow below as supplementary.

The Special Prescriptions for common school grades are as in the *April Journal*, from pages 42 to 52.

SPECIAL PRESCRIPTIONS FOR HIGH SCHOOLS.

(Year ending [July, 1905.]

An examination intended for those who require certificates of High School scholarship is given annually on this course; but teachers and school boards are required by law to grade their schools according to local conditions. The subjects of any six papers will be a minimum "full course" to constitute a regular pupil or student under Regulation 59 in County Academies or any other High Schools. The course to be taught in any school shall be determined by the joint agreement of the principal and the school board, with an appeal to the Inspector, and from him to the Council in the case of disagreement or dissatisfaction.

For High School certificates of Grades IX, X and XI, the examination for which is entirely optional on the part of pupils, a group of eight papers is imperative for a "High School Pass," with a minimum aggregate of 400, and no paper below 25.

For a "Teachers Pass" an aggregate of 400 is imperative, with at least 40 on every paper of the grade except Latin, Greek, French and German, which are optional.

[For 1906 it is contemplated to make *Bookkeeping* and *Drawing* count as full papers instead of half papers, in which case the 400 minimum will become 450].

The subjects, number and value of the papers for the different grades of examination, and the general scope of examination questions, are indicated in the curriculum which follows. The text books named indicate in a general manner the character of work expected on each subject. Examination papers are assumed to be on the subjects, not on the text books, and may demand description by drawing as well as by writing in all grades. In any subject, also, a question may be put on work indicated under the head of "general prescriptions."

As it is practically impossible to obtain text books covering the subjects to the exact extent desirable by a majority; and as it would be pedagogically unsound to require even pupils in the same class—the one who may have a special ability and liking for the subject, as well as the one who has no ability or taste for it—to do the same amount of work; and as it is generally desirable that a text should contain more exercises and matter for students who may have the power and the wish to do more than the average, the text books recommended are selected with the view of containing more rather than less of what would suit the average student.

The excess of the text recommended is, however, equalized by the device of *optional* questions at examination. Examination questions are distributed as regularly as possible over the field prescribed. When only *five* questions are required for a full paper, *six* questions are equivalent to the reduction of the text by one-sixth, *seven* questions by two-sevenths (nearly one-third), and so forth. History and Geography in IX and X will have ten questions equally distributed, of which *five* will make a full paper, two of which must be on one subject and three on the other. This is virtually easier than halving the whole prescription, for then these questions can be selected from the favorite subject. It will be practicable for a teacher under these circumstances to reduce the prescription to one-half of each, if he thinks he can do better work; but the memorization of details is never good except for those who can do it naturally and without effort.

GRADE XII.

The examination on this syllabus may be known as the senior Leaving Examination of the High School. This portion of the course of study may be profitably undertaken on the lines best adapted to the staff of instructors or demands of students in the larger High Schools or County Academies. There is in this grade a bifurcation of the course into a classical side and a scientific side, with minor options leading to the certificates of grades XII (classical) and XII (scientific) respectively. This grade is not only *not* compulsory on any school section, but it should not be attempted in any school with less than four High School teachers.

To pass Grade XII (scientific) a minimum aggregate of 1000 must be made on twenty papers, including all in groups (A) and (C) and any other *five* papers.

To pass Grade XII (classical) a minimum aggregate of 1000 must be made on twenty papers, including all in groups (A) and (B) and any other *four* papers.

No paper to fall below 25.

For Grade XII (classical and scientific), all the subjects in group (D) must have been taken as well as those in (A), (B) and (C). No paper to fall below 50.

For "Teacher's pass," no paper to fall below 50.

UNIVERSITY MATRICULATION.

The leading universities and colleges of the Provinces have agreed to accept the Grade XI or Junior Leaving High School certificates in lieu of their matriculation examination, when the certificate indicates a pass on each subject required by the particular matriculation standard concerned. For example a university may fix 50 or 60 per cent., more or less, in Latin, Greek or any other subject as *its* standard. Again, a candidate may fail to take a "pass" High School Certificate through a low mark in a subject not required for matriculation, yet make sufficiently high marks, as shown by his "examination record," on the subjects required to admit him to the university. This constitutes a practical affiliation of the Public High Schools with the Universities, which will save division of energy in many high schools, while it will place each of the Universities in the same relation to the public schools.

TEXT BOOKS.

In performing the duty of selecting and prescribing text books for the Public Schools, the Council of Public Instruction has availed itself as fully as possible of the knowledge and experience of those who are engaged in the practical work of education. The sole aim of recent modifications has been to secure at a reasonable cost, a series of texts *adapted for use in schools*. Change in authorized books is *in itself* a very undesirable thing.

The prescribing of new books is one of such importance to the country that the most extraordinary care has to be taken to make sure that the ultimate advantage of a change will more than compensate the people for the temporary loss or annoyance always involved in making a change. But change there must be. It is the essential condition of all growth; and we ought under such circumstances to be always prepared for it.

Instructors and teachers are reminded:

(1) That the course of study for common schools encourages an economical expenditure for the text books by providing a system of oral instruction for junior classes. Too many teachers try to satisfy themselves in respect to their more youthful pupils by placing in their hands text books not needed in any case, and worse than useless when unaccompanied by proper oral exposition. A text book should not be required for a child until he is prepared to use it intelligently.

(2) That the regulation which makes it illegal and improper for a teacher to introduce unauthorized texts, by no means hinders him from giving his pupils the benefit of other treatises to whose explanations he may attach importance. The progressive teacher will always have such aids within reach, and will so use them as to impart variety and interest to his instructions.

MARCH ANNUAL SCHOOL MEETING.

In some fishing districts it may be found desirable to take advantage of that provision of the law under which the Council of Public Instruction may fix for a given section an earlier date for its annual school meeting than the last Monday of June. If any such cases exist, it is very desirable that these early annual meetings be held on the same day. The first Monday in March is selected as likely to be the most generally convenient day.

Sections feeling the necessity of an early date for the annual school meeting should through their trustees, make an application to the Council through their Inspectors *before the end of January*, so that the Inspector may be able to transmit all such applications with recommendations or comments thereon, to the Council of Public Instruction on the 1st day of *February*, when it is probable action can be taken and due notice given in time for the holding of the meetings on the first Monday of March.

The suggestion, it is hoped, will enable cases of this kind to be arranged easily and without the delay otherwise necessary.

NEW ORDERS AND REGULATIONS OF C. P. I.

The following Regulations of the Council of Public Instruction passed between the issuing of the April and October Journal were published in the Educational Review for the prompt information of the public concerned.

(30th July, 1904.)

"Ordered, that the high school departments of county academies and other high schools which took the regular County Academy Entrance Examination (which this year fell within the first week of the midsummer vacation) be allowed to take an additional week of vacation in lieu of the week lost in conducting the said examination, provided it was regularly reported to the Education Department as indicated in Regulations 61 to 71."

“*Ordered*, that rural schools which under the general regulations should open on the 15th of August, be granted the week beginning on that date as an extension of the mid-summer vacation—provided the teacher be engaged for the time in attendance at the Provincial Educational Association which then meets in Truro.”

(20th August, 1904.)

“*Ordered*, that Regulation 23 (b) be amended by the addition of the following sentence :

“ ‘ In an emergency and on the special recommendation of the Inspector, a University graduate in Arts or Science, who holds a teacher’s license of a class lower than *First* (Class B), may be provisionally employed as a principal of any graded school for a period not exceeding one year, after which he will cease to be eligible for any such position without an advance in class of license, until he is regularly qualified.’ ”

“*Ordered*, that Regulation 136 (April Journal of Education, page 39) be construed to include for the present school year, the attendance of teachers at the Provincial Educational Association, whose legal teaching term should otherwise begin on the 22nd of August, provided that under no circumstances, more than eight weeks of vacation during the school year shall be allowed to any school.”

“*Ordered*, that Inspectorial Division No. 7, comprise henceforward the County of Richmond and the District of South Inverness, under the charge of Inspector M. J. T. Macneil, B. A., River Bourgeois.”

“*Ordered*, that Inspectorial Division No. 8 comprise henceforward the County of Victoria and the District of North Inverness, under the charge of Inspector John MacKinnon, Whycommagh.”

“*Ordered*, that the County of Cape Breton constitute Inspectorial Division No. 11, under the charge of Inspector T. M. Phelan, B. A., LL. B., North Sydney.”

SUMMARY OF REPORT ON SCHOOL SUPPORT AND SALARIES, OF COMMITTEE APPOINTED BY THE PROVINCIAL EDUCATIONAL ASSOCIATION, AUG., 1903.

By the Chairman of the Committee—H. H. MacIntosh, Esq.

SCHOOL SUPPORT.

In order to avail ourselves of reliable statistics, we divided the schools of the province into two groups which we have termed Municipal Schools and Incorporated Town Schools. By Municipal Schools is meant the schools within the various municipalities of the province, embracing all the miscellaneous or rural schools and many of the smaller graded schools. Incorporated Town Schools, as the name suggests, includes the schools of all the incorporated towns.

MUNICIPAL SCHOOLS.

From the assessment rolls of the different municipalities, we secured the amount of assessable property available for school support. The

annual school returns give the amount rated at the annual school meeting for ordinary school purposes, *i. e.*, for salaries and current expenses. From these data, we find the rate paid on \$100 of property for the support of schools for the school year ended July 31st, 1903, to be as follows:—

While the foregoing table is of much value so far as it relates to individual counties, yet your committee deemed it unsatisfactory for purposes of comparison inasmuch as the values fixed on property by the local assessors differ greatly in different counties. This necessitated the finding of the cost per capita which you will see, on a moment's consideration, to be a most accurate test. In case the cost of school support as shown by the rate on \$100 of property or on the population per head should not convey a sufficiently clear impression, your committee endeavoured, as far as was possible under the circumstances, to reach the exact cost in dollars and cents to the individual ratepayer; and with this end in view secured some twenty sectional rate rolls from each inspectorate. These rate rolls were copies of those from which the school taxes for the year in question were collected by the secretaries and were from representative sections of each inspectorate, *i. e.*, six or seven each from good, average and poor sections, and distributed as evenly as possible over shore and inland.

From these 200 rate rolls, gathered from all parts of the province, we see the valuation of property in each of the sections, the number of ratepayers and poll-tax payers, the amount assessed for support of school and the rate per \$100; but what is of still greater importance, we get down to the very cent paid by each one of some 7,000 ratepayers.

The following arrangement shows the cost per capita, and the average property tax paid by the ratepayer:—

For the Province the per capita costs is 68.1c. and the average property tax \$2.67.

Your committee considers that the information secured by them shows the rate of taxation for the supports of schools in the municipal portion of the Province to be extremely low. A careful examination of the rate rolls shows that in a considerable number of cases the property tax is merely nominal, the poll tax being sufficient for all purposes, or perhaps a rate of a few cents on \$100. The wealthy sections, ranging in valuation from \$50,000 to \$100,000, and paying the best salaries, support their schools with a rate of from 10c. to 20c., and many of the average sections run from 30c. to 45c. on the \$100.

The cost to ratepayers in Poor Sections is not nearly so great as we expected to find.

INCORPORATED TOWN SCHOOLS.

The assessable property for the support of schools in the 28 incorporated towns of the Province is \$29,050,495, the cost of schools \$138,876, the population 88,551, the average rate on \$100 is 48c. and the cost per capita \$1.57.

While the cost per capita in municipalities is only 68c., in incorporated towns it is \$1.57. This gives us a pretty good idea of the comparative cost of rural and town schools.

SALARIES.

On the matter of salaries, your committee has to report as follows :

We have arranged the schools in three groups.

Miscellaneous or Rural Schools.

Graded Schools (outside of incorporated towns).

Incorporated Town Schools.

We have tabulated the salaries paid in each of these groups according to county, sex and license of teacher. This made it necessary to consider every salary paid in the Province—hence, every section and every salary came before your committee for review. For the purpose of comparison we have arranged the average salaries, by counties, in the following table.

In tracing the salary of any particular class of teacher from the rural school, through the smaller graded school and up to the incorporated town school, it is interesting to note the upward sliding scale.

HEALTH OF THE SCHOOL AND COUNTRY.

Every teacher should create in the school and the section a sound and intelligent sentiment with respect to coöperation with the public health authorities. Epidemics of diphtheria, small-pox, and other contagious or infectious diseases have seriously interfered with the school attendance last year in many sections. The unsanitary conditions of school rooms in some parts of the province—the lack of care to prevent spitting, dust-raising, etc., and the too seldom thorough cleansings of school rooms and outhouses—are suspected also of aiding the spread of disease.

On some occasions the health officers have made complaint. The Education Department will withhold public grants in part or altogether from schools, the sanitary conditions of which are unconditionally condemned by the local or any public health officers. The law requires it; and inspectors must perform their duty, however unpleasant, should any school board or teacher through carelessness allow the health of pupils to be endangered.

The following quotations from the last report of the Provincial Medical Health Officer should be carefully read by teachers in order to stimulate them to utilize their knowledge not only for the benefit of their pupils, but for the benefit of the health of the school section :—

SMALL POX.

This disease got an entrance in several places, but it was promptly met and confined to the restricted localities. We are still threatened owing to its prevalence in the other provinces and New England States, so much so that the city of Halifax feels called on to take extra precautionary measures, the necessity of which requires no argument. What is true of the city is equally so of every port in the Province.

Many are apt to think that there is too much fuss made about disinfection, etc., because they know not the persistent virulence of this disease. As an illustration I give the following extract from the Monthly Bulletin of the State Board of Health of Indiana, U. S. A.

PERSISTENCE OF SMALLPOX INFECTION.

Miss Minnie Peterson, 39 years of age, died last Monday, April 6, 1903, near Scipio, of smallpox. Her remains were brought to Brookville for interment, the funeral taking place yesterday.

The manner in which Miss Peterson contracted the disease is curious and shows that people can not be too careful in destroying contagion. We are told that her father died of smallpox twenty-seven years ago at Yung, this county, where the family then resided. The clothes he wore while ill were put into a trunk, which was locked and kept among the household effects all these years. After her mother died, not long since, Miss Peterson set to work to clean up, and in overhauling the things about the house, opened this trunk and handled the contents. In this way, it is asserted, she contracted the dreaded smallpox and lost her life.—Brookville American.

The two chief invasions were at the mines, Thorburn, Pictou Co., and at Sydney Mines. The history of each was about the same. At Sydney Mines a stranger from Newfoundland got sick, and then this sickness passed from one to another and from house to house. They did not want to believe that it was smallpox, and gave it other names, and, as well as ignoring the opinion of those that differed with them, they were uncomplimentary in their criticisms.

At Thorburn it was much the same. The Provincial Board of Health sent representatives to each place and had things straightened out, and with proper management the disease was soon under control.

Amherst being on the border, and on the main line of communication, was specially open to attack, but the health officer deserves credit for the promptness with which every case that presented itself was handled, so that practically Amherst was free of the disease, its business and travel uninterrupted, and yet smallpox lingered there for a long time, but it was under thorough control.

DIPHTHERIA.

There have been small epidemic seizures in various parts of the Province, but prompt action on the part of the health authorities has restricted its spread.

TUBERCULOSIS.

This malady still claims its customary and abundant harvest of sickness and death, because well known means of prevention are not carried out—as much due to ignorance and lassitude on the part of the people as to want of energy of the boards of health. The same may be said of all the Exanthemata, that claim their usual quotas of victims. This is undoubtedly due to their insidious persistence, and a kind of feeling that they have always been with us, and we may expect them to remain. Some years ago this might have held as an argument, but it has lost its force with our present knowledge and means of prevention.

THE RESPIRATORY PASSAGES.

The same may be said of diseases of these passages—for, though largely present and very fatal, if the people were conversant with our present knowledge of their cause and prevention, these maladies could be greatly restricted.

PNEUMONIA.

This disease, now classed with those of microbic origin, and preventable, is very prevalent and very fatal, assuming at times an epidemic type. Of late years its death rate is increasing.

BRONCHITIS.

This disease, so productive of sickness and death at the extremes of life—infancy and old age—will never be controlled until the people become familiar with its cause and prevention. The medical attendant rarely sees a case until the question of prevention does not obtain.

TYPHOID OR ENTERIC FEVER

Has threatened to appear epidemically in several places, but its ravages were restrained by prompt action of the medical attendants and health officials. This disease should be readily stamped out, but it is a necessity first that all communities should have a pure water supply and proper drainage; a point towards which we are steadily though slowly progressing.

The above considerations in the most marked manner emphasize this fact, “that the government, the school authorities, and the people should insist that an adequate system be adopted to the end that the coming generation may be so educated that they may avoid the many pitfalls that the present one is floundering through.”

The public school is the only means available that presents itself to me, and regular and definite sanitary instruction should not only be given to every pupil but so instilled into his mind that he will not forget it, but also that he will feel an individual interest in it; that it is for his own private use, neglect of which brings condign punishment.

We now have health readers, very good in their way, but they do not reach down to this practical point.

HOW TO AVOID DISEASE.

It is of a certain value to know something about the heart, muscles, bones, nerves, brain, etc., that in life enables us to perform our varied duties. But of much more value:—

To know what causes tuberculosis (the great white plague, so-called), and the tubercle bacillus, its mode of propagation and tenacity of life.

To know how vaccination protects from smallpox. The press of the future may thus be spared many inanities that now appear from time to time.

To know that the pneumococcus pneumoniae is always with us, and in us, and is harmless until some imprudence enables it to get in its lethal work.

To know that a common fly can carry the poisons of typhoid, cholera, erysipelas, and different kinds of sepsis on its hairy padded foot, and implant on our food active germs of disease.

To know that certain families of mosquitoes can not only rob us of our blood, and give most pointed annoyance, but as well inject into our tissues the germs which produce malaria, or the more lethal yellow fever.

To know that a rag of clothing lying in a garret for years may be able to convey most virulent types of smallpox, scarlet fever, etc.

To know that simple cleanliness is the most valuable element in the surgeon's armamentarium, and surgical cleanliness is the synonym for the nearest attainable perfection, as well as an essential part in the wonderful success of the surgical science of to-day.

To know that there can not be too much care used in disinfection in the presence of infectious disease—that by so doing a sanitary officer is not airing a hobby—but strictly attending to business.

And so I might go on, but I think enough reasons are given to substantiate the claim made for special sanitary instruction in schools. This would not be a novelty, as it is being carried out at present in several states of the U. S., as in Michigan and Indiana. Germane to this, and a practical means of carrying it out, is the idea which is elaborated in the resolution of the Canadian Medical Association, and correspondence connected therewith. (which can be seen in the Report referred to.—Ed.)

HEALTH IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

The following passage is taken from the opening address of the Right Rev. the Lord Bishop of Hereford, D.D., LL.D., President of the Educational Science section of the British Association for the Advancement of Science, at its Annual Convention, Cambridge, England, 17th to 23rd of August, 1904.

Shortly before, a petition signed by 14,718 members of the medical profession of Great Britain, including the heads of the profession, was presented to the Education Department, asking for the enforcement of instruction in Health in all the schools of the United Kingdom, and referring to the definite attempts made in other English speaking countries.

Some months previously, at the request of Lord Strathcona, High Commissioner for Canada in London, a full statement of the Nova Scotia law, and copies of the Health Readers, as well as those of other provinces, were sent to a committee containing some of the most eminent medical authorities in England. The action of the medical profession of Great Britain is a high compliment to the ladies and others who pressed this subject on the attention of the Legislature of Nova Scotia, and to our Legislature itself which was unanimous in its action.

In our insular disregard or depreciation of intellectual and scientific forces actually working in other countries, we have, undoubtedly, wasted some of that time and tide in human affairs which do not either wait for men or nations.

But, putting regrets aside, and turning to some of the practical problems that seem to confront us to-day, I venture to put before you for consideration such cursory and unsystematic observations or suggestions as my personal experience has led to believe to be of practical importance. For more than this I have no qualification.

In the first place the growth of crowded city populations and the conditions under which multitudes have for at least two generations been growing up and passing their lives in our great cities, have set us face to face with the various problem of physical health.

If our physical manhood decays all else is endangered, so that the first business of the educator is to look well to the conditions of a healthy life from infancy upwards.

Hence the great educational importance of the petition presented by 14,718 medical practitioners including the heads of the profession, to the central educational authorities of the United Kingdom.

The petition opens with these impressive words:—

“Having constantly before us the serious physical and moral conditions of degeneracy and disease resulting from the neglect and infraction of the elementary laws of hygiene, we venture to urge the Central Educational Authorities of the United Kingdom (The Board of Education of England and Wales, the Scotch Education Department, the Commissioners of National Education in Ireland, and the International Education Board of Ireland), to consider whether it would not be possible to include in the curricula of the Public Elementary Schools, and to encourage in the Secondary Schools such teaching as may without develop-

ing any tendency to dwell on what is unwholesome, lead all the children to appreciate at their true value, healthful bodily conditions as regards cleanliness, pure air, food, drink, etc. In making this request we are well aware that at the present time pupils may receive teaching on the laws of health by means of subjects almost invariably placed upon the Optional Code. By this method effective instruction is given to a small proportion of the pupils only. This does not appear to us to be adequate. We believe that it should be compulsory and be given at a much earlier age than at present."

And it concludes as follows:—

"In many English-speaking countries, definite attempts are being made to train the rising generation to appreciate from childhood the nature of those influences which injure physical and mental health. Having regard to the fact that much of the degeneracy, disease, and accident with which medical men are called upon to deal is directly or indirectly due to the use of alcohol, and that a wide-spread ignorance prevails concerning not only the nature and properties of this substance but also its effects on the body and the mind, we would urge the Board of Education of England and Wales, the Scotch Education Department, and the Irish Education Authorities to include in the simple hygienic teaching which we desire, elementary instruction at an early age on the nature and effects of alcohol. We gladly recognize, (1), the value of the teaching on this subject given in some schools in Ireland and in a proportion of the schools of Great Britain, by means of reading primers, moral-instruction talks, etc., and (2), the excellence of the occasional temperance lessons provided in certain schools by voluntary organizations; but until the four Central Educational Authorities of the United Kingdom include this subject as part of the system of National Education, it appears to us that the mass of the pupils must fail as at present to receive that systematic teaching of hygiene and of the nature and effects of alcohol, which alone we consider adequate to meet that national need. Finally we would venture to urge the necessity of ensuring that the training of all teachers shall include adequate instruction in these subjects."

This petition coming as it does with all the weight of the medical profession as the expression of their experience and convictions is to my mind one of the most important educational documents which have been published in our time, and it can hardly be disregarded without incurring the charge of folly.

COMMENTS.

PHENOLOGICAL OBSERVATIONS.—The usual number of correctly filled Phenological Schedules were received for the school year ended July last. Owing to the extraordinary pressure on the Education Department, it was found only when going to press with the JOURNAL for October, that all the schedules were not sent in from some of the Inspectors. It was considered more advisable to postpone the list of deserving observers than delay the issue. It is hoped that the criticisms of the staff of phenologists published, may have a due effect on the accuracy of the observations last year; and especially on those of the present year which are expected to show more scientific accuracy than any preceding observations. Special attention will be given these observations in the April JOURNAL.

REPORTS ON EARTHQUAKE SHOCKS, &c.—A few observations of earthquake shocks were sent to the Superintendent who duly transferred them to Professor Woodman, as specified in the April JOURNAL of 1904, which see for full instructions.

THE PROVINCIAL EDUCATIONAL ASSOCIATION met in Truro from the 16th to the 18th of August, and was well attended by representatives of all interested in education.

THE EASTERN NORMAL INSTITUTE met for a whole week, from the 26th September to the 30th, in Hawkesbury, Inverness County, which proved to be a capital centre for the four counties of Cape Breton Island and Antigonish and Guysboro of the mainland. The main object was the professional instruction of second and third class teachers who had never any Normal School training. There were four centres of instruction where model lessons were given to pupils of the town from 9 to 12 each day; so arranged that those of the 250 present attending at any one class room had the same course which covered all subjects of the common schools. In the afternoons the usual Institute papers, addresses and discussions were had in the Town Hall. The evenings were utilised for other exercises, among which were the larger public meetings. It was a week of hard work for the teachers, and especially so for the Inspectors and the presiding officer responsible for the elaborate arrangements.

ACCURATE RETURNS.—Inspectors have expressed themselves pleased with the great improvement in accurate and prompt returns from teachers during the last few years. Occasionally, however, a new teacher or an old but careless teacher, sends in a return with some item blank, or not correct, thus necessitating sometimes considerable correspondence, if not endangering the promptness of the general payment of the teachers, or the grant of the teacher concerned.

Some of our County Academy principals, apparently, also forgot that the Library returns of "superior" schools had to be summed up, item by item, for each county, and for the province; and that the work of the Education Department in summing them would be spoiled by the omission of any of the facts

itemized and called for. This was, of course, accidental, due to the fact that such statistics were not called for before.

No principal should send in the returns for his schools until he finds that he can make up an accurate summary of the statistics of the school section from the returns of his teachers. If a teacher cannot obtain the facts required under any specified head, it is useless to send the returns further from the locality to have the item entered. The papers must be returned for correction or completion; and the Inspector has to report to the Education Department the several parties responsible for sending a defective or inaccurate return, as well as to correspond with the delinquents until the exact facts are obtained.

INSURANCE OF SCHOOL HOUSES.—The Board of District School Commissioners for East Halifax, passed the following resolution at its last meeting. As the subject is one of vital concern to all schools throughout the province, it is here brought to the attention of all.

"Resolved, That as the people of some sections are rather careless about the insurance of property against fire, and that as such carelessness may extend also to school houses in said sections, and that as in the case of fire, such sections suffering therefrom would be handicapped in erection of new school buildings, this board urges that some way should be devised of impressing upon trustees the strong advisability of insuring school houses."

WHEN SHOULD SCHOOL TAXES BE COLLECTED?

All taxes voted at the annual meeting should be rated on the assessment roll then in existence, and should be collected as far as possible before the end of the first half of the school year. This is law.

Some sections have in the past delayed levying the school rates until the new assessment roll was completed; and now object to the proposed change that they are afraid it may be illegal to levy the present vote on the same old roll. This idea is nonsense, probably originating from a mis-reading of the law which prevents a man's being compelled to pay two poll taxes for the same year or paying his taxes for any year twice over.

The law sets no limit to the number of times a man may be rated on the same assessment roll. After the regular vote has been collected, a special meeting properly called, may vote an additional sum to be levied and collected, for instance,—all in the same school year, to be rated according to the roll then in existence, whether the new or the old one.

SALARIES OF TEACHERS.

It is a good sign of the times to have so many school boards support the efforts made for educational progress by raising the salaries of teachers. Thanks are due to the public spirited men on the public press and on the school boards, who see that it will be impossible to retain or obtain good teachers in the profession, no matter how abundantly and thoroughly they may be prepared, if their wage is likely to be very much lower than that obtainable in other occupations calling for laborers.

But very much has yet to be done, for our trained teachers are still leaving us for the West, or worse still, for the South. In calling attention to this point the superintendent is acting in the interests of parents, ratepayers and school trustees, not in the interests of the teacher specially, whose condition is being improved by leaving the profession in his own province, or entering another profession.

The conspicuous weak point in our school system is the giving of self-government to small school sections, where the inhabitants are not sufficiently intelligent to understand the advantages of co-operation between sufficient numbers with sufficient means to sustain an efficient school. It may be necessary for the legislature eventually to give the power of bounding school sections, levying taxes and administering schools in communities which fail to do their duty, to representative officers of a larger and more intelligent community. The summary of the report commencing on page 141 preceding, proves that our rural sections generally are not yet doing their duty fairly to the teaching profession.

We have as good native material for the making of teachers as there can be found in the world. We have a better equipped Normal School for their training than exists in many larger and more wealthy countries. Could we assure all our efficient teachers a remuneration somewhat near what our people give for other kinds of labor requiring an equal expense for preparation, our schools would be everywhere satisfactory to reasonable people, and would be the most profitable of public if not of private investments. This is why the educational authorities are beseeching the ratepayer to consider what a good teacher is worth—and then take the necessary course in a country where every one is free, to get him—or her.

SPELLING.

Several of the provincial examiners reported an improvement in both spelling and writing this year. There are always some extreme cases, however. One candidate making a mark of about fifty on a subject had the value reduced to zero according to the examination regulations, on account of mis-spelling.

English spelling is the worst in the world, and is already commencing to be rapidly affected by phonetic and philological reform, as orthography in other languages has been improved. But the duty of the education department, although advocating spelling reform, is to remorselessly enforce at least the simplest authorised standard.

Bad spelling, if indulged in through the common school grades, cannot be corrected in the high school course under ordinary circumstances or with any ordinary efforts. Principals of schools are therefore cautioned to see that the general prescription published in every register is carried out effectively in every grade of the school work from the first. When bad spelling becomes a habit for a few years it is not likely to be ever fully corrected.

It is contemplated to try the effect of a regulation preventing any imperfect speller's admission to a high school or academy as a regular student. The spelling tests should be, therefore, stringently applied to each of the common school grades in advance.

WRITING.

Complaint has been made to the Education Department that unprescribed copy books are being introduced into some schools. Such public schools will not be eligible for the public grants should the charges be sustained. This also applies to all other unprescribed books.

MACDONALD INSTITUTE FOR NATURE-STUDY.

Sir Wm. C. Macdonald on the advice of Dr. James W. Robertson, has erected and equipped at Guelph, in affiliation with the Ontario School of Agriculture, at a cost of over \$200,000, a Normal Institute for the special training of teachers in Nature-Study and the cognate educational manual arts. He is attempting to do there on an effective scale for all Canada, such work as we have been attempting to do on a humbler scale in connection with our Normal School in Truro.

Further, he has proposed to make tuition free for the present and to pay the travelling of three sets of teachers each year for three years from each of the Provinces, for a three months course. The Council of Public Instruction of Nova Scotia decided to co-operate to the extent of granting a scholarship of \$50.00 to each of the six female teachers selected, and \$75.00 to each of the two male teachers selected, to aid in paying the expenses of board; allowing them also to obtain leave of absence from their respective schools on their supplying for the time a substitute satisfactory to their trustees.

The first term of the Institute opened about the middle of September. Eligible male teachers have not yet been found for the present term; but the following female teachers were selected from a large number of applicants, on the special recommendation of Sir Wm. C. Macdonald's representative, and the Principal of the Provincial Normal School. One of the conditions to be fulfilled, was that the teacher should be employed in a section having a school garden up to the standard set by the Macdonald school gardens developed under the charge of Mr. Percy J. Shaw. Teachers after graduating at Guelph are expected to be able to take full charge of such gardens, allowing Mr. Shaw, the travelling instructor; to select new centres of work.

It has just been officially intimated that in future all candidates must have been vaccinated before admission.

THE MACDONALD CONSOLIDATED SCHOOL.

The Macdonald consolidated school buildings have been completed; and the second year opened with both Mechanic and Domestic Science departments in operation. Only one of these departments was in operation during the first year, and only for the latter portion of the year, earning a grant of \$221.25. This year the maximum grant of \$600 is likely to be earned. The contracts for van driving are about \$600 less than last year. But they are still far above the contracts in P. E. I., and even more than in the North West Territories in the case referred to in another paragraph, where they can afford to draw away one of the good teachers of Nova Scotia. The rate of sectional taxation in the consolidated section at Middleton is at the extremely low figure of 35 cents per \$100; while many school sections elsewhere pay a rate five times higher for comparatively very poor schools.

SCHOOL CONVEYANCE AT MIDDLETON.

The school vans have been described and figured in previous Journals. Drivers and horses had to be provided for eleven routes to carry in all the pupils from the sections outside of the old section of Middleton, the boundaries of which extended about two miles from the central school. The agreement required the conveyance of many pupils who were not over two miles away, and in other respects more than an equitable consideration was given to some communities for the sake of harmonious co-operation at the beginning.

When the tenders were being called for in 1903 the following conditions were specified as governing the contracts:—

“(A) The vans must reach the Middleton school house not earlier than 8.30 a. m., nor later than 8.50 a. m. ; and be ready to leave the school not more than five minutes after the time for the school to close each day.

(B) Each van must be provided with a driver satisfactory to the school board, horses and harness, and rugs or robes

(C) Each van must carry all children over five years of age within the districts assigned, and any others who within the year may become entitled to the use of the vans by becoming permanent residents.

(D) The driver, while the children are in the vans, must have the same care for their physical and moral welfare as the teacher has while they are in the school room.

(E) The vans must be free from dampness and be comfortable when in use, and not be exposed to the weather when not in use, nor must they suffer damage beyond the ordinary wear and tear, except at the cost of the contractor, who shall be responsible for any such damage.

(F) Each contractor shall be bound to the amount of \$500 by two approved sureties whose names shall be mentioned in the tender."

The following table is an abstract of the essential elements of the eleven routes and the approximate cost per day (assuming 200 days to the year) according to the contracts made in August, 1903 and 1904, respectively :—

This shows a saving of over \$600 for the second year on the item of conveyance. As there may be 215 days in the school year the actual cost per day may be about 7 per cent. less.

IN PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

Vans for the carrying of 25 children are being constructed for about \$100, and contracts have been made for the present year, to carry the pupils of two adjacent schools to the central (consolidated) school at Tryon as follows :—

Route No. 1, Lady Fane school, 4.5 miles, \$1.00 per day.

Route No. 2, West Tryon school, 3 miles, \$0.50 per day.

The ordinary funds of the three school sections pay one good teacher in a well equipped school and the cost of conveyance, leaving a small balance to the good.

IN ASSINIBOIA

Miss Sarah E. Cox, a Nova Scotian teacher, who taught this present year at Wallace, near York, in Assiniboia, states that two school vans were used in her school last winter, one of them carrying herself with the pupils to school each day during the winter. The school van is called there the "caboose" which instead of running on good roads has to follow trails through the prairie. The larger caboose conveying sixteen children was drawn by two horses, except in bad weather when four had been used. The smaller caboose carried eight including the teacher, and was drawn by two mules. The drivers unlike those of Middleton and Tryon above referred to, provided caboose and every thing else necessary. The distance, load, and cost of the whole per day are shown below for comparison with the figures already tabulated :

Large Caboose, route five miles, carrying 16 pupils.....\$1.46 per day.

Smaller Caboose, four and a half miles, 8 persons75 "

These figures seem to predict that within another year we shall find the cost of conveyance, wherever it is deemed desirable, reduced much below the cost of the first attempt made in Nova Scotia.

LATEST LEGISLATION IN NOVA SCOTIA.

In this view, the Legislature of Nova Scotia and the Council of Public Instruction last spring made provision for the stimulation of the union of a small number of school sections wherever it can be accomplished. When two school sections have no more children than can be taught by one good teacher, it may be assured there will be a saving of about \$55.00 to the Provincial Aid Fund, and of \$25.00 to the Municipal Fund. The Inspector is authorized to arrange with parties in order to induce the union of such section and offer a sum less than that saved, to subsidize the conveyance of pupils who may be much beyond two miles from the school at least a portion of the way to school; or all the way in the morning, allowing them to return in the evening on foot; or in any other manner which may be found most convenient under the circumstances of the community. It is expected that this principle may be applied successfully to the union of two, three or even more sections.

A grant of \$36,000 has been authorized by the Legislature, averaging \$2,000 to each county, to stimulate consolidation with conveyance. It is suggested that \$200 or \$250 should be given to a consolidated group of sections for building or equipment for every school section absorbed into the central one, up to a maximum of \$1000 for the first groups in each county, until \$2000 for each county is appropriated. It is not considered good policy to offer any large inducements for the first consolidations, for if they are expected to pay without any outside aid, a large inducement should be unnecessary. But there is no haste in taking up this offer, although the success of consolidation in Australian provinces, and in the United States, has been brought to the attention of the province since the annual education report for 1898. This inertia on the part of the public is evidence of the necessity of some such act as the magnificent philanthropic donation of Sir William C. Macdonald, and the effective demonstration backed by it which is now being conducted by Dr. James W. Robertson.

EAST BAY CONSOLIDATION.

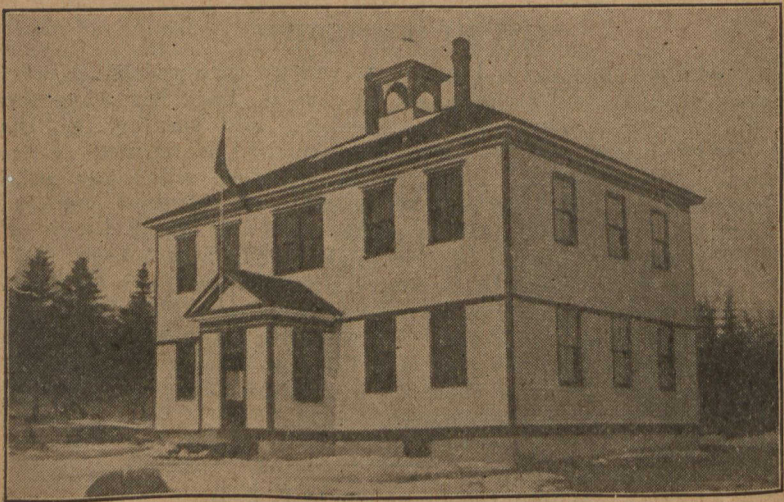
The first community in the Province to venture on consolidation involving conveyance without philanthropic aid is that of East Bay, Cape Breton. Four school sections have been consolidated into one by the District School Commissioners, and the new school building is reported as nearing completion. When the C. P. I. is satisfied that satisfactory provision has been made and will continue to be made to aid those beyond two miles from the school to attend regularly, \$600 can be paid out of the special \$2,000 grant per county to be expended among the schools first consolidated. The school can also obtain annually, it is expected, an extra Provincial aid grant equal to that of two class D teachers, and an extra Municipal fund grant for two teachers. These two extras will be approximately \$110 and \$50 per annum—a total of about \$160 a year, in addition to the regular grants to the teacher and the school board. Then the sectional taxation of the four original sections will also be given to the one school.

SCHOOL CONSOLIDATION IN P. E. I.

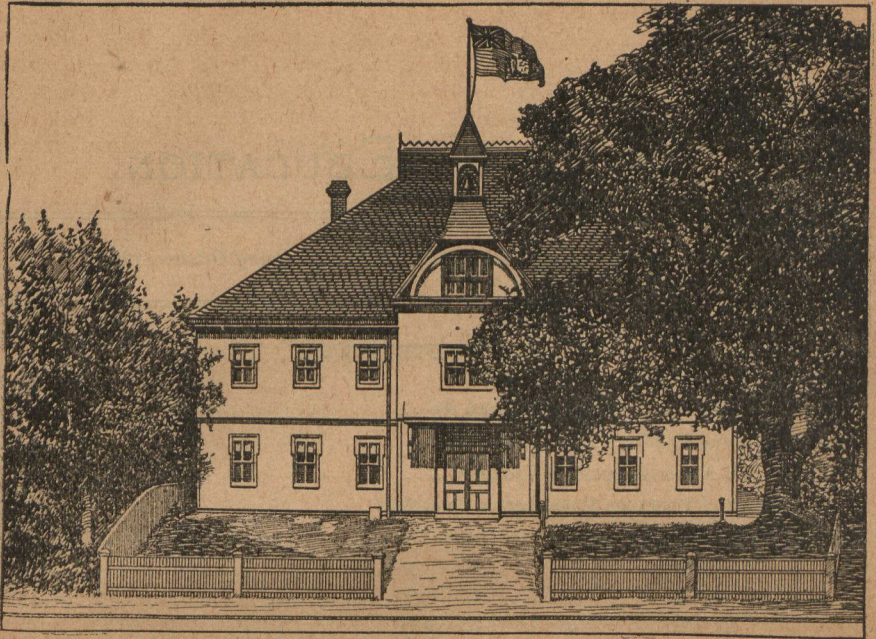
The following paragraph is quoted from one of the speeches given at a public meeting at Tryon, Prince Edward Island, as reported in the *Agriculturist* of the 24th September. Sir Wm. C. Macdonald's representative referred to is Mr. Theodore Ross, B. A., (Dal.), who is the Nature-study instructor for the Island,

having charge of five central schools and school gardens. Mr. Percy J. Shaw, B. A., (Dal.), has similarly charge of five central schools in the neighborhood of Truro, each of which was selected with the expectation of its becoming a centre of a small consolidation. It will be seen from the statements quoted, that this small consolidation has from the start been more successful from an economical point of view than the large Middleton consolidation. It is being aided on the general lines laid down in the regulations of the C. P. I., published in the April Journal of Nova Scotia and referred to above.

"The people of Tryon, Lady Fane, and West Tryon, must pass into history as the people who established the first consolidated school not only in Prince Edward Island but in the Dominion of Canada. When about a year ago, the matter of consolidation was proposed for Tryon it was clearly seen that the location of the school was in such a place as to defeat all attempts at consolidation. The proposition was made to the district of securing suitable grounds and the district cheerfully and promptly took action. Through the coöperation of the trustees and the representative of Sir William Macdonald, the necessary grounds were secured and other requisites obtained. Too much praise cannot be given to the people of these districts for the valuable assistance that they rendered in carrying into successful operation the working of the scheme. They showed that they were in earnest and meant business. *Consolidation has given in every respect better results than could be obtained by individual schools. Statistics show that apart from any assistance from Sir William Macdonald the cost of operating the consolidated school was less to the taxpayer than was involved in the running of three individual schools.* In fact the figures demonstrate that by the three districts and the government paying the same amount to the consolidated school as was paid to the individual school, a surplus of \$10 would be left. Then the results obtained must be considered. In the Lady Fane, district where in August and September only an average of 17 was secured, this year in the same months an average of 24 was maintained. A similar improvement took place in West Tryon. In the aggregate of the three districts for August and September in 1903, there was an average attendance of 68 pupils, each costing \$11.84 to the tax payer; while for the same months in 1904 the average attendance was 79, each pupil costing \$10.19. Hence there is a balance in favor of consolidation of \$1.65 per pupil. All other statistics adduced go to show that consolidation is the cheaper."

BEAR RIVER PUBLIC SCHOOL.

(The result of the Consolidation of two School Sections.)

The present Bear River School Section was formed by the union of the two border sections, Bridgeport and Hillsburg, in 1893. For one year the more advanced classes met in the former school house, and the lower classes in the latter. In November, 1894, the consolidated school met in the present large and commodious building, a cut of which appears above. The school opened with five departments, but it was found after two years that another department was necessary, and in 1896 the second primary department was organized. The school has had six departments ever since. The average enrolment for the past ten years has been 275, and the average grand total day's attendance for the same time has been something over 36,000. By comparing these figures with statistics of other schools, as given in the Journal of Education, it will be seen that the Bear River school is one of the largest in Western Nova Scotia.

The advanced department consisting of Grades 9, 10 and 11, has had an average enrolment of 37 since 1904. In the four years ending 1904 this school had obtained 24 D certificates, 22 C's and 22 B's. Of those who obtained these certificates 18 passed the Minimum Professional Qualification Examination and received teachers' licenses.

There are eight large well lighted class rooms in the present school house with commodious cloak-rooms, large halls, good water in the first and second storeys, large public hall (with a piano, stage and scenery), excellent books of reference, apparatus for elementary chemistry, and much other necessary apparatus. The situation of the school from a sanitary point of view is all that could be desired, and the natural scenery, viewed from the school or its surroundings, is charmingly beautiful.

The course of study in the advanced department is the same as in the County Academies.

This term the High School enrolls 13 B's, 13 C's and 21 D's, 47 in all, with average of 42 to date, 1st October.

JOURNAL OF EDUCATION.

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
