OUTLINES PORTIONS OF THE OVERNMENT'S POLICY.

London, Oct. 27.—In a speech at Leeds last night Lord Randolph—Churchill said: "Official accounts reaching the Government of the social condition and prospects of Ireland are of an encouraging character. There is a good harvest and a marked recovery in pices, and from all we can learn rents are being fairly paid throughout the country. Landlords have helped greatly to lessen the difficulties of the crisis. The Irish tenants have also co-operated in a signal manner toward restoration of order. 
