

The Directress and Managers of the Boys' Home, in submitting their Annual Report, would, in the first place, express their deep sense of gratitude to Almighty God, for the many blessings vouchsafed to the Institution during the past year.

They meet for the first time, this day, under the Act of Incorporation, the provisions of which, will doubtless, greatly facilitate the management of the charity, and and place it on a firm and permanent basis. While gratefully acknowledging the liberal support heretofore extended to the Institution, they would earnestly peal to the public generally, for increasing encouragement and aid; and they trust that in this account of their stewardship for the past year, the benefactors of the Institution will see that their generous assistance has not been fruitlessly bestowed, that one of its principal objects,—to prevent the increase of juvenile crime—has been answered to a great extent, and that many friendless little creatures, some the children of drunkards, some orphans, and others deserted by their parents, have been rescued from want and misery, which in a few years would have rendered them almost irreclaimable, and sent them forth among us, vagabonds, thieves and burglars, the pests and curse of the city.

The house at present occupied as the Home, has been kindly granted by the Trustees of the Hospital, and the Directress and Managers cannot express too strongly the obligation they feel for the great advantage afforded them by such a building.

Since the opening of the Institution, one hundred and three boys have been admitted ;-during the first year, sixty-three and in the second, forty; the greater number of them very young and very small, almost incapable of doing any kind of work. But this ought not to be regretted while the funds of the Institution can meet the increased expenses; for admittance at an early age, may prevent an unfortunate acquaintance with crime and want, and produce earlier fruit, from the good seed Nine boys have had temporary lodging and food sown. supplied them, until provided with situations; two out of this number, were boys sent from the Bloomsbury School, they had been employed by farmers during the harvest; after the occupation ceased, they were left to not been fruitlessiy. bestowed. that one of its principal

shift for themselves; being found in the streets in a state of destitution, they were brought to the Home from which place they have been provided with situations. Of the 40 boys admitted into the Home during the year, 9 are total orphans, 20 have lost one parent; 6 put in by fathers on account of drunken mothers; 5 by mothers on account of drunken fathers; 8 have been admitted in the last month. Situations have been obtained for 15 boys. Nine have been taken out by their parents. Two colored boys have absconded.

The building now occupied for the Home, affording much more space than is required for the accommodation of the objects of the charity, the Committee would gladly carry out a design suggested to them, of using some of the rooms as a temporary refuge and lodging house for the homeless lads of the city, who are employed during the day, but who from want of homes, pass their evenings in low taverns, frequently spending the money they have earned in gaming, drinking or other debasing habits. Boys exposed to such influences must turn out vicious members of society; but if a better state of things were encouraged, if after working hard during the day, they had a clean and pleasant resort for the evening, where some amusement and social comforts -- for they need them as much as others,-were provided for them. a new order of things would soon prevail among the degraded classes of the city. Mr. Hamilton has kindly promised

his aid in this good work. A society with this object in view has been well organized and is in successful operation in New York, known by the name of "the Children's Aid Society."

As the anniversary of the institution drew near, the resources of the Home became exhausted, and much apprehension was felt for the future which becoming known, several musical friends volunteered a public concert in aid of the funds, under the able management of Mr. Carter, the Organist of the Cathedral. This proved eminently successful, and the handsome sum of three hundred and four dollars evinced the deep interest the public took in the charity. And here the Committee would make their sincere acknowl dgments to the Rev. Mr. Ellerby, for his kindness in delivering a public lecture in May 1861, for the benefit of the Institutionthe subject, " The City of the Czar, or life in Russia," was most graphically described. The lecture was well attended. and the sum realized was a hundred and fortyone dollars, fifty six cents.

The Committee feel much indebted to Prof. Wilson, who has generally visited the Home weekly and his kind manner and judicious advice and instruction. cannot fail to have a moral and religious influence on the minds of his young hearers.

To Mr. Hamilton. the Committee are sincerely grateful for the valuable services he has given to the Home every

Sabbath afternoon, for the very important moral and religious training. which the boys have received from his instruction and example. It has been suggested by this gentleman, and the committee would willingly carry out his suggestion should it be deemed advisable that a room in the basement of the building should be set apart for boys who are taken up for minor offences, such as stealing apples, getting into gardens, &c.. a temptation which many a boy yields to, who might never be guilty of a more heinous crime. By taking a temporary charge of these culprits, much good might possibly be effected. In many cases they might be restored to their parents, and the contamination and disgrace attendant on being sent to jail, would be avoided.

Mr. Bennett has most kindly devoted two evenings in the week, to teach the boys singing and notwithstanding the rough materials he had to work upon, considerable improvement has been made. and the Committee feel much indebted for the trouble he has taken with the boys.

The remarkable degree of health enjoyed by the inmates during the past year, is a matter of great congratulation, and to the unremitting kindness and attention of Dr. Thorburn, under Providence, is this mainly to be attributed. He has visited the Home daily, and for his untiring efforts in furtherance of the good cause, the warmest thanks of the Managers are due. His report is annexed. With Mrs. Stephens' superintendence and economical management of the establishment, the Committee have much pleasure in expressing their satisfaction; her duties as Matron and Instructress to the boys, have been ably fulfilled, and she has always carried out the directions of the attendant physician, with judgment and ability.

The third annual report of the Committee of Managers of the Boys' Home, Easton Road, London, England, has been received from the Honorary Secretary, George Bell Esq., and read with the greatest interest. The good and great work so successfully carried out in our Fatherland, cannot fail to encourage us to further and increased energy, to follow so noble an example.

The Committee feel convinced, that the establishment and maintenance of Homes for destitute boys, is the best and most promising mode of relieving our city of its juvenile destitution and crime, and they therefore earnestly entreat such pecuniary assistance, as may enable them to continue and extend their efforts for so desirable an object. ## Medical Beport of the Boys' Home, FOR 1860-61

Since my last report was rendered, the Boys' Home has been removed to the spacious Old Hospital building. The advantages which the boys enjoyed in their former residence have been perpetuated as well as increased by the change. The position of this place—surrounded as it is by open grounds—the free access of fresh air it enjoys from all sides, renders it, in a sanitary sense, eminently adapted for the healthy training of children.

It is my pleasing duty to state, that the health of those boys who were in the Home at the time of my last report, continues to be good. Those who were admitted since then, were invariably tainted with scrofula. Owing to the unremitting attention bestowed by the managing ladies to the wants of the boys, to the excellent care given them by the Matron, and to the tonic course of medical treatment to which they were subjected, they are rapidly gaining a strong healthy appearance.

It is a source of thankfulness and congratulation to all interested in the success of this progressing institution that hitherto it has been altogether free from epidemics of any description.

## OBJECT OF THE BOYS' HOME. Duties of the Board of Management and Officers.

This Institution is open to boys of the ages mentioned in 2nd Rule of the Regulations, the claims for admission being the utter friendliness of the applicant, or being a child of drunken or dissolute pavents; the object of the institution being the prevention of juvenile crime, by training these poor outcasts, in the nurture and admonition of the Lord.

The management is vested in a Committee of Ladies, chosen from the subscribers, at the Annual General Meeting in September of each year. Said Committee to consist of thirty members, from among whom eight shall be chosen as Directresses; among these there shall be a 1st and 2nd Directress, Treasurer and Secretary.

The 1st Directress, or in her absence, one other Directress shall preside at the monthly meetings, audit and sign the accounts presented for that purpose by the Treasurer, propose and declare the resolutions, and sign the minutes of each preceding meeting.

The Treasurer shall rec ive and keep an account of all moneys belonging to the Institution, as also, the earnings of the boys, a separate account of which must be k pt, with each. All the accounts must be presented each month, at the meeting of the Managers for the signature of the first Directress, or in her absence the lady presiding.

The Secretary shall conduct all the correpondence of the Society; keep a list of the names. ages, and peculiar circumstances, as far as practicable, of all the boys, in a book provided for the purpose; attend at each monthly meeting, take the names of those present, and minute the proceedings in a book, which must be read at each ensuing meeting, and be signed by the presiding lady.

Two members of the C mmittee, in rotation, shall visit "The Home" daily each week; inspect the house, ascertain from the Matron the conduct of the boys, and be present at least once in the week at the recitation of the clases.

The weekly or Finance Committee shall consist of the Directress, Treasurer, Secre ary, and two of the Committee who shall have been appointed to purchase or otherwise obtain the necessary clothing for the bys. Three shall form a quorum, and their order shall be sufficient authority to the Treasurer to advance the money r quisite for the above purpose, or such things as may be consid red necessary f r the Home.

The General Committee shall meet on the second Monday in the month at three o'cloch, P. M. Each meeting shall be opened with prayer. The minutes of

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the preceeding meeting having been read and signed, the vouchers of the Treasurer produced and signed, the Secretary shall inform the meeting of any correspondence that has taken place during the last month, and the First Directress shall place before the meeting such resolutions as may be put in her hands, take the votes and declare the decision. Seven shall form a quorum, and when a tie arises, the presiding lady gives the casting vote. All admissions that have taken place during the past month, shall either be ratified or disallowed at the discretion of the meeting.

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## Bules and Regulations of the Boys' Home

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Any Iby rouning away, or leaving the Institution

The Superintendent and Matron who are engaged to take charge of the Institution, shall be competent to give the Boys instruction in reading, spelling, writing and arithemetic which will qualify them for useful employment. The Matron may also admit applicants, subject to the approbation of the daily visitors.

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Boys, from the age of five to fourteen, are admitted as inmates. Those from seven to ten years of age, may be engaged to work out, at seven-pence half-penny per week for two hours a day. Those from ten to fourteen are to receive three-pence for the first two hours, and afterwards one penny an hour.

## III.

A third of the Boys' earnings to go towards the support of the Institution, the surplus to be placed in the hands of the Treasurer, to be deposited in the Savings, Bank.

Any Boy running away, or leaving the Institution without the consent of one or more of the ladies of the Committee, will forfeit his earnings, which shall be applied to the support of the Institution. And such Boy expressing a desire to return shall be received, but not allowed to have his past earnings.

The Superintendent and Matron who are encaged to ake observe of the Institution, shall be competent to

Boys hired out by the day or hour, will be furnished with a card, to show their employers what wages are to be paid for their services. No Boy shall be placed in a permanent situation until he has been one year in the Institution. This rule may be suspended under peculiar circumstances, at the discretion of the Managers, at full meeting, from the age of five to fourteen, gainers, as inmater. Those from seven to ten years of age, may

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School hours during the afternoon and evening. The Boys who are in the house to be usefully employed during the morning as the Matron may thing fit.

## VIT.

The Boys are to rise at 5 A. M., from the 1st of May to the 31st of October; and at 7 A. M., from the 1st of November to the 30th of April.

## VIII.

The Boys are permitted to go to their respective churches every Sunday morning. They receive religious instruction at the Home from the Bible, Watts' Cate\_ chism and Hymns. They are also taught the Lord's Prayer, the Creed, and the Tcn Commandments.

### IX.

The Matron shall satisfy herself every morning, as to the personal cleanliness and tidiness of each Boy; and shall conduct Family Worship every morning and evening.

## X.

Every Boy to be present at each meal, and the elder Boys to say Grace before and after meat. Breakfast at Seven; Dinner at Twelve; Supper at Six. Half an hour to be allowed at each meal.

### XI.

Prompt and implicit obedience must be given to the orders of the Superintendent and Matron.

## XII.

The Institution is supported by subscriptions of threepince per week.

The Boys are permitted to go to their respective churches every Sunday motning. They receive religious itest action at the Heme from the Bible, Watts' Gate, chism and Hynnis. They are also taught the Lord's Prayer, the Creed, and the Ten Commandments.
