The following extraordinary story is told in a letter from Ystad, in Sweden, dated the 20th ult., and published in the *Daily Netos* :---"This morning having been fixed for the exe-cution of a journeyman butcher, named Marcus-son, and a woman named Botilla-Nisdotter, for having murdered the husband of the latter, a vast number of persons, of all ages and both sexes, and especially of peasants in their national cos-tumes, arrived last evening and bivouacked in the town all night.
