#### WATER QUESTION.

From every section of the mining prevailing dry weather has decreased the supply in several of the creeks to such an extent that operations are seriously hampered and the output will, in consequence, fall short of expectations unless frequent rains set

The situation brings the people face to face once more with the proposition that a permanent water supply

is the greatest need of the camp. With plenty of water at the com mand of the miners on the different creeks the aspect of affairs would undergo an immediate and complete revolution. Three times the number of claims now working would be in operation and employment would be offered to at least double the number of men now engaged.

There appears to be no immediate relief in sight, simply by reason of the fact that the Treadgold conces sion still hangs as a blight over the district.

The government will not appropriate the money necessary for the installation of a public water system and Treadgold is under no obligation to begin work on his system for a matter of several years to come and if his grant is not cancelled he has it within his power to keep the miners from a water supply for that length

Obviously, therefore, the people problem and first secure the cancellation of Treadgold's grant. There after; the problem would be greatly simplified. With Treadgold out of the way, it would be a matter of small difficulty to secure capital for the establishment of a water system upon a legitimate basis.

It is within the knowledge of this paper that such an enterprise was directly in the way.

New York, June 3 .- On his way back to England from "Farthest South," Lieut E. H. Shackelton of the British navy is here awaiting the Shackelton has come up from New Zealand, after leaving the antarctic exploration ship, the Discovery, at the foot of Mount Erebus, an active volcano far within the antarctic belt Speaking of the inland journey made by Commander Scott and others including himself, he said - Our material discoveries were not of great value, and were negative rather than positive. We found animal and bird life in plenty on the shore, but mland there 'is not a vestige of life of any kind. We carried a captive alloon, which was raised 750 feet on February 4 of last year.
