Keep the Eyes Clear.

The eyes have a very important part in making a face good to look upon, or the opposite. While nothing can safely be done to alter the shape or color, a most attractive clearness will be the result of proper attention to hygiene, exercise in the fresh air, and of a healthful tone of mind, for it must be remembered that the eyes are "windows," through which the spirit looks out.

Abuse of the eyes in childhood is responsible for many unattractive and diseased eyes. It is well to remember at all ages that, when reading, the light should always be steady—not the flickering flame of a candle—and from the side. This last point is important, and much better than having the light at the back. A great mistake is to have an unslated lamp on the table by which to read, and a still greater mistake is to keep on using the eyes after they are tired.

Bathing weak eyes in boracic water at night is good; but never should eye be beguiled into using lotions or drugs that are manufactured for the purpose of making the eyes seem bright through dilation of the pupil.

Massage by circular movements at the side of the eyes, and as the beauty of any eye is spoiled by puffiness, place the fingers against the nose, and draw them lightly toward the temples, passing under and above—but not over—the puffy places. As to clipping the eyelashes, in some cases the growth will be encouraged in this way, but in all cases the delicate point of the lash, which, in itself so small, is so effective, is sacrificed, and, moreover, the clipping must not be attempted by any but a specialist in such "beauty" operations.

The eyebrows should be brushed daily, in the shape of an arch, tapering to a point at the end over the outer corner of the eye.

Always sleep in a fairly dark room; no direct light should strike the eyes while sleeping.



## ALCOHOL GIVES NO STRENGTH.

In a discussion of the physiological bearing of the use of alcohol, G. Bunge, of Leipzig, after showing how this poison affects the system, calls attention to the fact that thousands of experiments in the case of soldiers show that in war, in peace, in all climates, all hardships of the most wearisome marches are best endured when the soldier abstains wholly from all alcoholic drinks.

These facts were verified in the English armies in Caffra, West Africa, Canada, and India. And additional verification is the fact that thousands of sailors are not allowed to touch a drop of alcohol on board, and this in tropical, temperate, and especially in polar regions. Most who fall sick are total abstainers. That which is true of bodily exertion is true of mental. Alcohol strengthens no one; it simply numb the feelings of fatigue. The error of poor people in this regard is especially unfortunate, as they spend much for alcoholic drinks to strength

## The Cash Value of Sobriety.

Of interest in connection with the action of Emperor William regarding his chauffeur, is this editorial from a late issue of the Cincinnati Post:

The Chicago and Alton Railway Company, its rules recently issued for its employees, forbids men in its employ to visit saloons, race tracks, dance halls or any other place where liquor is sold or gambled permitted. The company makes no pretense of carrying on a moral crusade. It simply strives to live up to business principles, which depend upon the competency and reliability of its men. Good service, it holds, depends upon steady habits, and both help to insure public safety.

"All the things which are prohibited," says General Passenger Agent Charlton, "either tend or might tend permanently or temporarily to impair a man's mental or physical powers." This puts the question of temperance and steady habits upon a basis which even the most bigoted morally can clearly understand it and see that there is but one practical side to it.

The man who will not hearken to moral appeal is apt to lay great stress upon his regard for the practical. He doesn't care for sentiment just because he calls it; he must have hard facts.

Well, here he gets just what he wants. The hard fact is that he must be sober and steady or give up a job where sobriety and steadiness are essential qualities.

And wherever he turns nowadays he finds the same hard fact staring him in the face. In all lines of paying employment sobriety and steadiness are becoming more and more rigidly required.

Time was in this country when its boundless natural resources offered unlimited employment to unskilled and irresponsible men. Then men might disable themselves by drink and unsteady habits, and still get on in a way. But times and conditions have changed marvellously.

The fittest get to the front and the unfit fall to the rear. Big employers are forced to exercise great care in the selection of men for all grades of work above that of common labor. Success requires able and reliable employees.

It is not a matter of sentiment. It is not a question of abstract morality. It is a matter of business.

## Youth and Alcoholism.

Our neighbors across the Channel have had the felicity of being early in the field in the serious work of training youths of both sexes in the science of eating and drinking. It was only in November last that the Minister of Education issued his famous letter imposing upon masters and mistresses in the schools the work of teaching children the real value of teaching popular drinks. This letter has now been followed by a most instructive little volume for use in schools in which all the commonly consumed drinks are analysed, and their unfitness as foods demonstrated. The charm of the volume is its directness and simplicity, the profoundest science being so popularized as to become a positive recreation to young people. This is just what we need in England. Even earnest appeals to young people to avoid drink are not merely so impressive as scientific demonstrations. If to these we add the moral and religious duty, the argument for all young people becomes perfect. It is to this work of 'prevention' that all serious workers feel they must chiefly address themselves. It is much easier to guard a healthy appetite from becoming depraved than it is to cure a depraved one.—'Christian World.'
