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### NECK BROKEN.

Giant Butcher Snaps Chain to Hang Himself.

Charged With Wife Murder Commits Suicide in Cell.

New York, Aug. 10.—After snapping a heavy steel chain in order to make a noose with which to hang himself, James Ahern, a truckman, of No. 110 Washington avenue, Laurel Hill, Queens, was arrested last Friday after the body of his wife had been found hacked to death with a meat cleaver, committed suicide yesterday in his cell in Queens County Court House, at Hunter's Point.

A special watch had been kept over Ahern by order of District Attorney De Witt, who feared, after an unsuccessful effort to get the man to talk Saturday, that the prisoner would try to kill himself.

The broken chain which he used to kill himself, was removed from the cell. There were left only his bed, which he had only one thin blanket.

That he broke the chain at the moment when he was not being directly observed, is considered a remarkable evidence of strength, even for a man of Ahern's gigantic stature.

The prisoner fastened it around his neck and hid his time until noon, when a Harry Evans, a keeper, was replaced by Gillfoi, the two keepers went aside for a moment to discuss something out of hearing of their prisoners.




