Suppose some of those people who have been reading the STAR for nearly two years without paying for it were to bring us a load of wood!

There is nothing so important in a public man, especially if he be the leader of a party, as backbone.

POOR FATHER POWERS!

It is now a pretty long while ago—perhaps twenty-one or twenty-two years—since a poor boy named Frederick Powers came from the North Shore, where he had been badly beaten for reading the bible. At that time there were several good christian men in the Province who would not tolerate this kind of nonsense. Foremost among these good men was the Judge L. A. Wilmot, who on hearing the story began to burn with a holy zeal in the cause of the lad. He thundered at the Sunday school meetings, and launched invectives in furious fashion through the press. The terrors of the inquisition, the rack and the thumb-screw were painted in glowing colors by the Judge, and in his holy zeal he saw kindled another *auto da fe*. At least this is what the people tell us, for at that time we were hidden in the fogs of our native country.

Of course as soon as a man begins to trail his coat through the streets, he immediately runs the risk of some body stepping on it: and in this case, Archbishop Connolly came forward and, to say the least, accommodated the Judge. Then a furious newspaper war arose that made all those who obeyed the Pope on one side, and who thought John Wesley better than the Pope on the other, stretch their necks to see what the end would be. The "faithful of Rome" never doubted but Holy Church, which they liken to Peter's indestructible barque, would come out triumphant, as she did in the days when Constantine unfurled the banner of the Cross. The other side did not go so far back into history for examples to inspire confidence in their cause, but in the Judge they saw a man who combined a Peter and a Paul and a Constantine. However when the smoke of the conflict cleared away, the papal arms were seen untarnished and the Judge was badly and sadly *hors de combat*. It was said then that many of the vanquished side quoted, "God often permits the good to suffer and the wicked to prosper, that they may appear just before all men." We believe the Judge consoled himself with this text during the remainder of his life: but he never courted another tilt with an Arch-bishop all the same.

But, meantime where is our hero? the poor boy who was whipped for listening to the voice of conscience, and reading his bible? Shortly afterwards he became a Baptist preacher; and he also became a drunk. Then he went away to New York and preached and drank—left the Baptists and joined the Independent Catholics, did this poor fellow whom Judge Wilmot stepped in to save from the violence of a set of modern inquisitors! He ran his race for many years, and had almost been forgotten about, till lo! he turns up within a fortnight in New York, and the *Herald* publishes his confession, or what in the words of Newman he would call *Apologia pro vita sua*.

A more scandalous career it would be difficult to conceive of anyone leading who was hypocrite enough to call himself a spiritual teacher. Time is a great healer of wrongs, and "rectifier" of wrongs, and one can't help thinking the Judge, if alive, would as lief be were dead as see such a sequel to a scallawag whose cause he had so rabidly and so impetuously championed.

GOVERNMENT BILLS.

The most important Bill the Government have yet brought in is the Agricultural Bill. It divides the Province into six districts as follows:

District number one shall include the counties of Kent, Westmorland and Albert.

District number two shall include the County of Kings and also the County of the City and County of St. John.

District number three shall include the Counties of Charlotte and York.

District number four shall include the Counties of Sunbury and Queens.

District number five shall include the Counties of Carleton, Victoria and Madawaska.

District number six shall include the Counties of Northumberland, Gloucester and Restigouche.

The Agricultural Societies will nominate one or more persons for each district and the Government will appoint one, making the number of the board so appointed six, with the chairman who will be a member of the Government, holding a portfolio. There will be one meeting held in each year, and the first meeting will be held at such time and place as the Governor in Council may direct.

This is a capital step so far by the Government, because it closely connects the interests of the farmer with the Government, and places responsibility on responsible shoulders. We shall hope after this bill is passed to hear of no more corruption, no more of this advertising the interests of the stranger to the exclusion of provincial interests. The matter of Who will be Secretary, will develop itself and we shall not anticipate. We can only say however, we should like to see the present incumbent Mr. Inches, turned out, and a better man put in his place. Should Mr. Inches be retained however, he will no longer be potent to do harm. The public funds will be entirely safe from his grasp.

"RINGS" THAT OUR GOVERNMENT SHOULD BE ON THE LOOKOUT FOR.

Our readers will remember that on the tenders for new Parliament buildings being opened, it was found that Lawler's tender, Chat-ham, was the lowest, being in the neighborhood of \$68,000. These figures were regarded as reasonable by some, and far too low by others: and while it struck us at the time that they did seem low, yet it occurred to us also, that Mr. Lawlor should be the best to judge of his own business, and that he would not have set his tender down at these figures, unless he was prepared to go on it.

Now it seems he has declined the contract, giving as a reason that his tender was too low. We have not the slightest doubt but that he has associated himself with other contractors into a ring, for the purpose of extracting a few extra thousands out of the Government. This kind of game is largely played throughout Canada, and the Dominion Government has found itself compelled to insist on a deposit to be made by every tenderer. He who draws back then, forfeits his deposit and the result is a sufficient protection of the Government against building rings.

If we have been informed correctly this kind of practice has also prevailed to a great extent even in New Brunswick; that time and again Mr. Killam and other unscrupulous bridge contractors, have banded together not to take a contract below a certain price: then to divide the spoils over and above a certain figure at which a certain one in the ring takes the job. The Government therefore in our opinion should do two things. One is to invite new tenders for the Parliament Buildings, the other to bring in a bill providing for forfeit money and thus protect itself against unscrupulous men like Mr. Killam.

We regret to learn that the Provincial Secretary was taken ill yesterday, and has since been confined to his bed. It looks much as if the House should have to try to get through with supply and the supplementary estimates without the Secretary, though there is room to hope that in a day or two he will be round again.

Pleasing intelligence comes today over the wires from San Francisco. Dennis Kearney, the workmen's friend, has been tried, found guilty and sentenced to the House of Correction. He ought to be compelled to break stones and make mats for the remainder of his pernicious days.

THE PROVINCIAL PRINTER.

We see in some of our exchanges that the "Queen's Printer" gets \$1.00 a year for every copy of the *Gazette* he mails; and that a very large number of the J. P.'s to whom said paper is addressed are not in the land of the living.

We have not the slightest doubt but this statement is true: therefore we think revision of that list would be in order. There is no reason why the Province should pay for *Gazette* addressed to magistrates who are located on the other side of the river of Styx, where a copy of the *Gazette* could be of no possible use to them.

We believe the Queen's Printer has two subscription rates for the *Gazette*, \$1.00 to a Justice of the Peace, and \$2.50 to any one else who subscribes. As this paper is owned by the Government, the Queen's Printer should not be allowed to make two rates, but he should be obliged to supply all who want copies with the same at \$1.00 a year. If the leading weekly papers of New Brunswick can be supplied by publishers for one dollar a year, we can see no reason why the *Gazette* should not, when it will be borne in mind how well its publisher is paid for the notices he inserts.

In the *Gazette* rates we have the figures that belonged to the age of Caxton, when everything was done the slow way, and consequently cost three or four times as much as it does now. We claim to have great economists in our Legislature: if we have, here is an object upon which they can exercise their economical ability. We have heard it said, for example, the Queen's Printer makes from \$6,000 to \$8,000 a year clear gain out of his office: if he make that, he makes about three times too much, and is a happy man. At any rate let us pitch the dead J. P.'s overboard.

THE ICE AND ITS DEPARTURE.

The vigor of the ice seems well nigh spent, like the old woman in the up stairs museum, and may be expected to take a start about Sunday if nothing extraordinary happens in the meantime. We have noticed for the few years we have been in New Brunswick, the ice generally selects Sunday on which to "be moving," but we have failed in asking "Why?" to have a satisfactory reason given. We have heard an ingenious reason and we may also say that before hearing it, the same occurred to ourselves, and that is, that owing to the vibration of the air by the bells on Sunday, the ice is loosened. If any one can give a better reason, we shall be glad to hear it.

To-day we stand, on the threshold of a new era and of a fresh departure; old things are passing away, and all things are becoming new. We stand upon the brink of a new revelation, upon the shore of an unexplored sea, on the confines of a new world.

Hon. Receiver General is instructed to raise on the credit of the colony a sum not exceeding \$5,000,000, in amounts not to exceed \$300,000 per annum, the money thus raised to be applied to the construction of a line from St. John's to the head of Notre Dame Bay.

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The Railroads of the Dominion.

Extracts from the Dominion Reports.

NEW BRUNSWICK NOT SO OVERLADEN AS THE "OLD WOMEN" SEEM TO THINK.

A COMPARISON OF FACTS, Miles, the Gauges, the Death Rates, etc.

WE HAVE RECEIVED A REPORT OF THE RAILWAYS OF THE DOMINION, and the matter is so conveniently arranged that we make a few extracts from it.

RAILWAYS ACTUALLY UNDER OPERATION, 6,485 Miles; RAILWAYS UNDER CONSTRUCTION, 1,837 Miles. Total, 8,322 Miles.

THIS SHOWS AN INCREASE OF 341 MILES MORE UNDER OPERATION FOR 1879 THAN FOR THE PRECEDING YEAR. The gauges of the Railways under operation, and the length of such gauge of road are as follows:

Table with 2 columns: GAUGE and MILES. 5 feet 6 inches, 392; 6 feet, 60,049.357; 7 feet 6 inches, 81,151.627. Total, 6,474 Miles.

TO BUILD, EQUIP, AND RUN THESE roads costs immense sums of money; but this we need not tell our readers. The choice is between undertaking these works, and doing as the Indians did here before the time of Jacques Cartier.

THE NOMINAL CAPITAL RAISED FOR THE RAILWAYS OF THE DOMINION ON THE 30th of June 1879, was as follows: Ordinary share Capital, \$123,615,325; Preference do., 60,049,357; Bonded Debt, 81,151,627.

THE AID FROM GOVERNMENTS AND CORPORATIONS amounted to \$88,259,957. Of this there was contributed: By the Dominion Government, \$66,106,589; Quebec, \$4,449,612; Municipalities, 7,450,978; New Brunswick Government, 2,735,000.

IT WILL BE SEEN THAT DID OUR NEW BRUNSWICK GOVERNMENT spend on Railways in proportion to the Quebec Government, Mr. Murray Kay and the old women who seem to hold the destinies of this Province in their nightcaps, would actually abolish the Provincial Legislature altogether.

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Local Legislature.

Hanington's bill giving those who sustained land damages along railroad a first lien upon the road was before the House, and Killam prayed the Legislature might not pass it.

HANINGTON GAVE NOTICE OF RESOLUTION TO suspend 29th rule, to introduce a bill to authorize the examination of Richard R. Adams as Attorney-at-Law.

THE HOUSE WENT INTO SUPPLY on motion of the Provincial Secretary, and \$16,749 were voted for Vice-Rex expenditures.

MR. RITCHIE STOOD UP AND TO prove that the Bill is right, I might say, sir, that debentures are piling up all over the Province.

MR. BARBARIE—What, do I understand the hon. gentleman to say? Berches are piling up all over the Province? (Great laughter.)

MR. MARSHALL (in great wrath)—I did not say that "benches were piling up." I said "debentures," and I can prove it, and will read the bill.

MR. MARSHALL—Hold your tongue, Sir, till I read it. "Whereas &c., &c. Be it therefore resolved." (The reading of the bill was the members' greatest feat since he asked the clerk to read off 113 names from a petition.)

MR. DAVIDSON—Now I have been abused in the Hon. gen'lman's cheap way, but will not stand any more of it. It that hon. gentleman in his small way will try to take me down, I can assure him with all his egotism and vanity that he is mistaken.

MR. MARSHALL stood up and began again to quote certain figures. Blair, What's the floating debt of the city any way?

MR. MARSHALL in reply went into statistics. Then at the suggestion of Mr. Elder, per a small slip of paper, Marshall moved a committee of three be appointed to report upon the bill. Marshall, Blair and Sayre were appointed.

THE HOUSE ADJOURNED. To the Editor of the STAR. Sir,—To relieve the monotony, I turn with grateful eye to Hanington, the pride of the Legislative Council.

MR. LYNOTT said he had been waiting an opportunity to say a word on the Educational problem. He pointed out the enormous cost of books, and that a boy could not study sixteen branches satisfactorily at the same time.

MR. WEDDERBURN explained the Government had already taken this matter under their consideration; and would do the best that could be done under the circumstances.
