THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL'S SPEECH.

The speech from the Throne has gradually come in course of time to be, in constitutionally governed countries, the necessarily guarded and carefully worded expression of Ministerial policy.

At least for half a century, with an exceptional case or two, the speech has been of a Ministerial rather than an Executive character; and one has generally had to look closely for the meanings of the announcement.

Nevertheless it will readily be admitted that the speech of the Governor-General, delivered on Friday, affords room for congratulation to the different sources from which it springs.

From a general point of view, the speech is a masterpiece of statesmanship, and its history is a record of the political vicissitudes of the country.

The paragraph which deals with the payment of the debt of honor, suggests the history of that great fishery question which began with the declaration of independence in 1776 and which has since that time been a source of constant trouble.

The speech from the Throne has been a source of much interest to the public mind, and it has been a source of much satisfaction to the people.

The central topic of the speech is, of course, that which deals with the finances and fiscal policy of the Government. It would have been impossible to be more definite or precise in regard to the greatest public question of the day than the Minister has done.

AGRICULTURAL.

MAPLE SUGAR MAKING. The half-inch bit is best for tapping. Rows of the rough bark with sharp hatchets, but do not cut to the quick, more than you would on your own finger nails. It injures the tree. Bore about two and a half feet from the ground. This inch deep—no more. The sap comes mostly from the pores, near the bark. The bore should stop about two inches. Deep boring does no good, and injures the tree. In re-tapping, if the season is very long, so as to make it necessary, use a 9-16 inch bit; bore with steady hand, at the same slant as the first tapping, and hold the bit back, and you can trim the hole perfectly. Bore half an inch deeper, it runs nearly as well as a new hole and injures the tree far less. Avoid deep spots caused by a previous tapping. Use a small tap and drive the spouts myself, so as to select the best place to bore, and let a man follow with a line of buckets and covers, and hang and cover as fast as I tap. This buckets and covers need never touch the ground. If the buckets (tin) were properly sealed at the close of last season, and stored bottom side up in a clean sugar house, they will be ready for use. The covers should be kept in the same place, and pressed firmly against the tree to steady both buckets and cover in case of a storm.

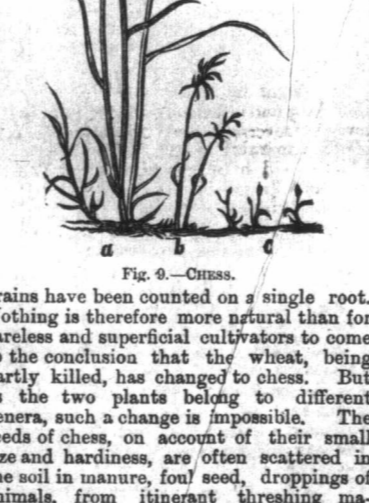

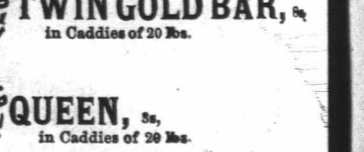
