THE LIBERAL CONVENTION

The Liberal Convention held recently in the Newcastle Opera House was one of the crudest examples of mis-management that the electors of Northumberland ever witnessed. The meeting was without a President and had to appoint one. The Secretary did not have his papers in order and delayed the meeting half an hour waiting for his arrival. After the meeting was opened it took one hour to arrive at a method of taking the ballot, and the method (when ultimately decided upon) was the most tedious and childish like one that could possibly have been adopted. A bunch of children from a Kindergarten could not have done worse, and the method necessitated the space of one hour and a half to receive and count the 176 ballots cast. If the same bunch of men were in charge on Election Day it would take about five years to conduct the election in the County of Northumberland, whereas it must be done in one day. If these men were ever to get control of parliament at Ottawa, pity help the business of Canada, as they never would be able to attend to it. Blackville and Hardwick Parishes each had two sets of delegates and another half hour was consumed before this tangle was straightened out. Some organizers and business men were those at the Liberal Convention? It was a fore-gone conclusion that Morrissy was to receive the nomination and the result was expected. Mr. W. B. Snowball told the meeting that the Chatham delegation was a packed one against him and his statement was not challenged. One of the Liberals in the meeting asked Mr. Snowball why he left the Liberal party in 1917, and Mr. Snowball told the meeting that if that was their challenge he was prepared to take it up and would make it the hottest fight for them that they ever had. He stated that he was prepared to back up his attitude in 1917 and defied any one of them to challenge him. The bomb was thrown and Hush-Hush could be heard all over the hall and the heckler was restrained from saying anything further. They did not want the question raised and did their utmost to prevent it, but enough had been said and Mr. Snowball took them to task about it.

Mr. Morrissy said in his speech that the 1917 election was not an election at all. That's where he makes the mistake of his life and the electors of this county have not forgotten the 1917 election. Cripps from Chatham wanted to know from Mr. Snowball if he was going to support Mr. Morrissy and Mr. Snowball's reply was "I have made my speech" and Mr. Elector don't forget that Mr. Snowball said in his speech that it was impossible, so far as he was concerned to make the nomination of Mr. Morrissy unanimous as he was entirely in his friend's hands and Mr. Snowball received 57 of the delegates votes and Mr. Morrissy obtained 119 others. So the electors will see that Mr. Morrissy did not receive a unanimous nomination from the convention. These Kindergarten children would like the electors of Northumberland to believe that Morrissy was the unanimous choice of the Convention and that every thing passed off harmoniously, but you can't fool old Northumberland that way. A large number of the delegates left in disgust long before the proceedings were over and alternates in some cases voted for them. The delegates were disgusted in more ways than one, among many reasons, the childlike methods adopted, the political history of some of the leaders, and the haggling and wrangling over so many matters irrelevant to the convention. Many disparaging remarks were heard throughout the building about one man in particular who was very prominent at the meeting and one who has been on all sides of politics, but who has at the present time, and for all time to come no more prestige or influence than the common house fly. Taken as a whole it was about the worst conducted and most humiliating political convention that ever Northumberland electors witnessed.

THE CLOVEN FOOT



How to make it

Use level measurements for all materials

- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- Grated rind of 1/2 orange
- 1 egg and 1 yolk
- 2 1/2 cups flour
- 4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
- 1 cup milk
- 1 1/2 squares (1 1/2 ozs.) of unsweetened chocolate (melted)
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

Cream shortening. Add sugar and grated orange rind. Add beaten egg yolks. Sift together flour, salt and Royal Baking Powder and add alternately with the milk, beating in one beaten egg white. Divide batter into two parts. To one part add the chocolate. Put by table-spoonfuls, alternating dark and light batter, into three greased layer cake pans. Bake in moderate oven 20 minutes.

FILLING AND ICING

- 3 tablespoons melted butter
- 2 tablespoons orange juice
- 3 cups confectioner's sugar
- 1 egg white
- 1/2 cup powdered sugar (may be used but does not make as smooth icing)
- 3 squares (3 ozs.) unsweetened chocolate
- Grated rind of 1/2 orange and pulp of 1 orange

Put butter, sugar, orange juice and rind into bowl. Cut pulp from orange, removing skin and seeds, and add. Beat all together until smooth. Fold in beaten egg white. Spread this icing on layer used for top of cake. While icing is soft, sprinkle with unsweetened chocolate shaved in fine pieces with sharp knife (use 1/2 square). To remaining icing add 2 1/2 squares unsweetened chocolate which has been melted. Spread this thickly between layers and on sides of cake.

LLOYD GEORGE WAS SUSTAINED

London, Nov. 7.—The Government obtained its expected mandate from the House of Commons to-night to proceed with the Irish negotiations. The Unionist motion, censuring the Government for initiating the Irish negotiations was voted down, 539 to 43. The Premier said the position of the Ulster Parliament was intolerable, and unless something happened in the next few days to put the position right under the Government of Ireland Act, a short bill would be introduced to remedy the position. As to the Irish negotiations, the Prime Minister assured the House that no agreement was possible without the sanction of the Imperial Parliament. Lloyd George said he had received guarantees that no arms would be imported into Ireland during the truce "I cannot conceal from the House", said the Premier, in alluding to the effort at an Irish settlement, the possibility that I may have to make the grim announcement that it is impossible to settle without danger and dishonor". He said that if the conference broke down the "first thing the Government would have to do would be to ask the House considerably to strengthen the force of the Crown".

"If the security of this country is menaced", said the Prime Minister, "If the throne is repudiated, if this Empire is to be mutilated and Ireland established as an alien country on most vulnerable flank, free to make any arrangements with the enemies of this country, free to make war on our commerce; if Ireland walks off with her freedom, leaving Britain staggering alone under the burdens thrown upon her for benefits which every Irishman in the world is sharing today, whether in this country, the dominions or the United States, if arrangements are insisted upon which will mean civil war between Catholic and Protestant, then Britain, I feel confident, will make the necessary sacrifices to face the necessary risk and avert such evils".

In moving the vote of censure, Col. John Grettton, Unionist, Rutland, addressed the House after the Speaker had ruled out of order an amendment by Lord Robert Cecil, deploring the policy of the Government in the last three years, but declaring that the severing of the negotiations at the present stage would add dangers and difficulties to the situation. Col. Grettton attacked Sinn Fein and criticized Lloyd George's course.

The motion was seconded by Rupert S. Gwynne. Arthur Henderson, in behalf of

the Laborites, explained that that party favored the negotiations, although opposing what he termed the previous policy of repression and retaliation.

Mr. Asquith supported the Government, but deprecated the suggestion that renewal of fighting was the only alternative if the conference failed.

NOVA SCOTIA WILL LOSE ANOTHER MEMBER

But Quebec's Growth Is Not as Large as Expected and West also is Disappointing.

Ottawa, Nov. 7.—Quebec's immoderate hopes as to total population are doomed to disappointment. Instead of the 2,500,000 confidently anticipated by Quebecers it appears almost certain now that the results of the Census will show that Province to have somewhere between 2,300,000 and 2,350,000 people.

This is of tremendous electoral significance to the rest of Canada. It means that the unit of representation in the House of Commons will be between 35,000 and 36,000 instead of the 38,461 which has been accepted hitherto on the basis of Quebec's expectations. The Province had 2,032,000 in 1911, and the unit of representation was about 30,000, which gave Ontario 82 seats. Nova Scotia 16, Prince Edward Island 4, New Brunswick 11, Manitoba 15, Saskatchewan 16, Alberta 12, British Columbia 13, Yukon 1, and Quebec, as always 65.

It was believed that 38,461 would be the basis, and that Ontario would lose eight seats. Now late though partial and unofficial information makes it apparent that Ontario will probably lose not more than four seats. On the new basis Nova Scotia will have 15 seats instead of 16. New Brunswick will probably retain the 11 seats she now has, and Prince Edward Island will continue to have four seats. That will mean a total of 173 seats for the Provinces east of Manitoba, a loss of five seats.

The West will gain proportionately, but not nearly to the extent expected by Westerners. British Columbia especially, which expects the census to show a population of 600,000 is doomed to disappointment. The population, so far as known, is as follows:

2,500,000 FOR THE WEST

The census Bureau will not give an estimate, or any indications of the population of the other Provinces, but a rough-and-ready estimate may be made up from various announcements already made or unofficial advices received from various parts of Canada of what has leaked out here and there of the local results attained.

One might make a fair guess for Ontario and Quebec as follows: Quebec, about 2,350,000 Ontario, about 2,709,000, or in all, 6,060,207 for Eastern Canada, leaving considerably less than 2,500,000 for the three Prairie Provinces, British Columbia and the Yukon.

At the most, there could be an increase of 13 seats only for Canada west of Ontario, which would give a House of Commons of 242 members, and it will probably be three or four less.

The first complete announcement for Canada, though not final, will come in November. Quebec's results will be known as soon as the bureau locates the results of one riding, which has gone astray.

As Cross is playing in the Davis Theatre, Pittsburg, this week, Ruth, author Gray and Harry Weber, Ruth's theatrical manager, boarded a train tonight for the Smoky City.

Other baseball stars, though of a different variety, have been added to the Keith string. Nick Altrock and Al Schacht, noted as comedians of the diamond, will open at Keith's Prospect Theatre, Brooklyn, Monday, with dialogue on the national sport, also written by Thomas J. Gray.

THE ELECTION AND CANADA'S FATE

If ever there was a time in the history of Canada, when the Electors—both men and women of the Dominion, should pause, think, and reason together, before casting their votes, at the approaching election; that time is NOW. 



But let us bow down to him; he is the great leader of the (once) great Liberal Party, refuses to stand on its platform, solemnly and ever so seriously planked has adopted it only as a CHART; something or other to indicate whatever way he may face about, or be compelled to face about just as certain advisers may think; or shuffle. But why keep the agony up Today, right in Northumberland Co. are men known as staunch and respectable Liberals, men who love Canada, more than Party, and will support the Meighen Government, not merely because it is a Liberal Conservative government, but because, it stands immeasurably the best of any name before the people, at the present time. NEW BRUNSWICK has the assurance from Premier Meighen and his ministers that Moncton is to be the "Headquarters for a Grand Division of the Canadian National Railways, thus assuring prompt and intelligent attention to local railway needs and the further building up of one of the largest of our provincial centres. The Mackenzie King party has no Railway Policy with the most powerful wing of the party committed to the turning over of the National Lines to Corporation control.

NEW BRUNSWICK is fortunate in having in the Meighen cabinet the ablest man of the province in many respects and our interests will be safe in his hands.

STARVES TO DEATH; \$1,400 IN BANK

HUNTINGTON, N. Y. Oct. 27.—With \$1,400 in a savings bank in Belfast, Me., Herman Tamm, whose brother resides at 823 Quincy Street, Brooklyn, died from starvation and exposure, according to the decision of Dr. William B. Gibson, coroner of Suffolk County.

Tamm's body was found in a building in a bottling building on the Colonial Springs farm, a short distance from Wyndanch, L. I., by John J. Hauger who notified Coroner Amasa Biggs, of Suffolk. On the man's body was found a bank book showing \$1,400 in the bank at Belfast, a receipt for \$100 on contract to purchase a farm and a card giving his brother's address.

W. J. Hein, of Bayard street Brooklyn, identified the body of Tamm but neither he nor the brother of the dead man could account for him being on Long Island. The last heard of him was by letter from Maine. Hauger saw Tamm walking about the farm about a month ago.

Memramcook is not seriously affected by the unemployment situation, he said. With the building of the new round house, and enlarging of the C.N.R. yards at Moncton employment has been provided for many Memramcook laborers, who, had it not been for these doings, would have had a slack season.

Mr. Sherry is one of the many business men who heard Premier Meighen when he spoke at Moncton and was impressed by the Prime Minister's reference to a railway unit for the Maritime Provinces with headquarters at Moncton. He says that thinking men can see in the Premier's railway policy a great boost to the industrial and agricultural interests of the sea provinces. In travelling through Nova Scotia last week he said he found the business, industrial and financial leaders of the same opinion, and all are working for the Government on December 6th, as it means a greater, busier industrial and agricultural life in the Maritimes.



AN INTERESTING WAR RECORD

The latest addition to the great fleet of C.P.O.S. Steamships which ply between Canada and practically all the important ports of call in the world is the "Empress of France," before the war popularly known as the SS. "Alsatian" and one of the ocean grey hounds between Canada and Liverpool. The vessel has been reconitioned since the war ceased and recently completed her maiden trip to Quebec under her new name. The photographs here reproduced give an adequate description of her interior arrangements and fittings, and will compare favorably with the great Leviathans in this respect. The "Empress of France" has a length of 600 ft.; beam 72 ft.; depth (to D deck) 54 ft. 6 in.; and a tonnage of 13,000 gross. A striking peculiarity is the cruiser's stern, which imparts a warlike appearance to the vessel. Her war record is one to be proud of.

The "Empress of France" as the SS. "Alsatian" was requisitioned for war purposes under Royal Proclamation immediately on her arrival at the port of Liverpool, midnight on the 6th August, 1914. After completion of discharge, the entire removal of all passenger accommodation and other woodwork, she was armed with 8-6 in. guns, commissioned and manned by a naval crew under the command of Captain V. Phillimore, D.S.O., and was attached to the 10th Cruiser Squadron on northern patrol duty, sailing from Liverpool on August 15th, at which port she has been based during the entire period of her commission.

From August to December, 1914, she remained as above stated, but in December she was made Flag Ship of the Squadron to which she was attached, and Vice-Admiral Sir Dudley R. S. De Chair, K.C.B., M.V.O., hoisted his flag, which flew up to March, 1916, when he was succeeded by Admiral Sir Reginald G. Tupper, K.C.B., C.V.O., who was succeeded in November, 1918, by Rear-Admiral C. W. Keighley Peach, under whose flag she terminated her commission as an Armed Cruiser.

The Squadron to which she was attached, and later became Flagship of, consisted of 24 vessels, the majority of which were Armed Mercantile Cruisers. The duties of the Squadron consisted of the stopping of vessels, boarding them and examining their papers, and should on examination they prove to be at all of a suspicious nature, a Naval Officer was placed in charge and they were taken into a United Kingdom port for closer examination. This similarly applied to any members of the passengers or crew, as each and everyone had to give a satisfactory explanation as to their nationality and business. Available records show that in all the Squadron intercepted some 16,000 vessels, but it is impossible to state how many of these proved to be engaged in work hostile to the Allies' interests.

In the early part of 1918, circumstances permitted of the 10th Cruiser Squadron being considerably reduced in numbers, and vessels so engaged being allocated to Convoy Protection Duty, the "Alsatian" figuring amongst the number and being stationed on the North Atlantic route in such capacity. While so engaged she escorted nine convoys of about 20 vessels each, carrying an estimated number of troops per convoy of 88,000, principally Americans.

While engaged on Convoy Escort duties the "Alsatian" also carried troops and cargo, the number of former per voyage being about 600, and the weight of cargo per voyage between 2,000 and 3,000 tons. She made her last voyage on Government Service in November, 1918, sailing from Liverpool on the 14th, and re-docked at that port on December 11th, 1918, having steamed a total distance on Government Service of 266,741 miles and consumed 170,571 tons of coal.

On January 17th, 1919, she left for Glasgow, having been placed in the hands of her Builders—Messrs. Beardmore & Co.—by the Admiralty, for reconitioning, being redelivered to the C.P.O.S. at the Port of Liverpool on Thursday, September 25th, and sailed for Quebec on Friday, September 26th.

Captain Outram, her captain when war broke out, was given the rank of Commander R.N.R., and acted in that capacity, which was of an advisory nature, under both Vice-Admiral Sir Dudley R. S. De Chair, K.C.B., M.V.O., and Admiral Sir Reginald G. Tupper, K.C.B., C.V.O., and was granted the D.S.O. for services rendered, being succeeded by Captain Cook at the same time as Admiral Tupper was succeeded by Rear-Admiral C. W. Keighley Peach. Captain Cook was appointed Flag Captain, and granted a commission as Captain R.N.R., and now commands the vessel.

THIRD IN CLASS




