THE OPPOSITION CONFERENCE.

The Opposition press has much to say regarding the conference of Provincial Premiers recently held in Quebec. Of those papers which seem to be deeply interested in the matter, the Montreal Herald occupies a most prominent place.

OTTAWA, Nov. 8.-The case of the condemned anarchists was searched to-day in Ling's cell six dynamite bombs were found. Most of the men were removed to new cells, and all privileges denied.
