





In the Council hambers, in addition to the members the Upper Chamber, were the idges of the Supreme Court, the Consuls, officers of the brigades, clergymen and many ladies and gentlemen. After His Excellency had tak-en his seat on the Throne, and the Speaker and members of the House of Assembly had presented them-selves. His Excellency read the Speech, a most voluminous document, the salient features of which are as follows:-
