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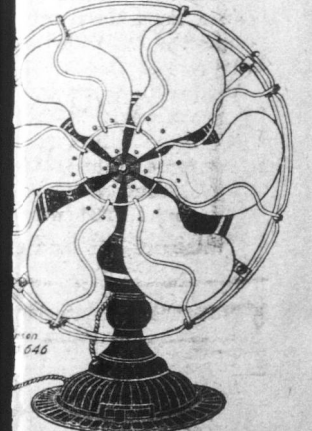

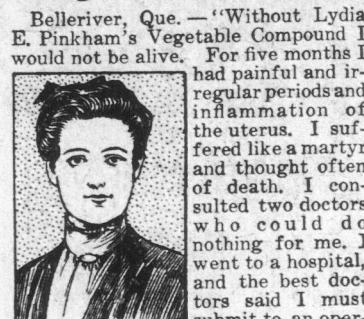

The Session Opens.

Although the speech with which the Ministry inaugurated the session yesterday was most voluminous, there was little in it that was not known before. The expression of condolence to the Royal Family on the passing of the Peacemaker, and the expression of loyalty to King George, was proper, appropriate, self-respecting and expected. The story of the ministerial doings of the past year was a many times told story. We knew of the new agreement for reference without appeal of the American objections to our fishery regulations. We knew the shortage of the Labrador catch and the state of the fish market. We knew about the loan, and the branch lines, and the fact that the branch line contract called for a daily service led us to infer that the Government contemplated a daily cross-country service. Otherwise what would be the use of putting passengers off at the junctions or starting trains from the junctions if there was no daily train on the main line? That was the reason we asked in the fall of 1909 if the Government contemplated a railway scheme which was more extensive than the building and operating of branch lines. Furthermore, there have been sundry announcements in the press that such a service was contemplated which took from it any possible novelty in the proposal.

The Old Age Pension Scheme was sent forth as Xmas tidings, and so had lost much of its freshness yesterday.

We have heard before about the Cold Storage Scheme. We have had the pest cutters here. We know of the visit of Professors Robertson and McPhail, and had even heard of the activities of our local agricultural experts, Messrs. Downey, Seymour and Devereaux. We have no doubt that their merits will receive adequate attention during the session.

The Exhibition we had seen and appreciated, and the tidings that the Government intended to ask for money, as usual, was not altogether novel, nor were we much enlightened by the formal announcement that the Government would ask the House to adopt their plan of distributing what comes into the coffers.

It was no doubt proper and patriotic to make reference to the forthcoming Festival of Empire, the Imperial Conference and the Coronation of our beloved King and Queen, but the reference was not in any way novel.

In short, the Speech, although lengthy, told a stale story, which had been told before in instalments and under scarce headlines.

There was, therefore, nothing in the Speech to create a stir or start a sensation.

The interest of the proceedings in the Legislature yesterday did not centre around the Speech, but it did centre around the Leader of the Opposition. There was a widespread desire to know if Sir Robert Bond would be able to take an active and strenuous part in the proceedings of the session.

It was soon seen that Sir Robert was in the form and good voice, and his announcement that he intended to take that active part this session which his health had prevented last session, created a feeling of satisfaction which is being widely voiced today.

Like a giant refreshed, Sir Robert entered upon his task yesterday. He joined heartily in expressing the concurrence of the Opposition in the Address to His Majesty, and paid a graceful tribute to the late King, and expressed patriotically the loyalty and homage of the people to King George.

Later on he rose again and made a speech on the Hague Awards and its effects, and the Washington Agreement, and put in a plea for a national policy on matters of international import which was not only statesmanlike and wise, but was received with earnest attention not only by the spectators but by the occupants of the Government benches.

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## Sir Robert's Speech.

Sir Robert Bond's Speech yesterday dealing with the North American Fishery Question and The Hague Award will appear in this paper to-morrow, and we commend a consideration of the same to our readers.
