The former Premier asked Germany to disown those zealots who are preaching the extension of Germany's boundaries in Europe, and the acquisition of Colonies at the expense of other nations. He requests her to show the world that armies are more iseful in peace than in war, and that territorial expansion is without the hase of patriotism.

The Government has renewed its subsidy to and agreement with the Furness Withy Line for the continuance of freight services between St. John, N.B., and Manchester, and from Halifax and St. John's to Liverpool. The Government has now 70 steamships under subsidy.

## **Bandit Died** by Own Hand.

Paris, May 16.-That Octave Garner, the leader of the auto bandits, died by his own hand, is the opinion of the police, who performed an auopsy. The death wound, according the medical expert, was caused by a bullet fired point blank at very close range, which entered the right temple and passed completely through the head. In addition to this, an ordnance revolver bullet had traversed

the lower part of the thorax. Vallett, who met his end with Garnier in an eight hour battle with the pelice and troops at the Nogent Sur Marnevilla, was killed by two ordinance revolver bullets in the head. A search of the ruined villa to-day in the hope of finding bank notes, stolen bonds, and other valuables, was unsuccessful. A heap of burnt paper showed that the bandits destroyed all compromising documents when they realized that the game was up.

Two notebooks, however, were found belonging to Garnier and Vallett respectively. Garnier appeared to be in the habit of making entries in his journal daily. Among other things he explains that he became an anarchist because he hated work, which he writes is "One of the forms of capitalistic exploitation."

Vallett's note book contained a complete collection of portraits of detectives and the officials of the prefecture. Seven automatic pistols were found in the ruins.

### Woman's End Reveals Strange Career.

Asbury Park, N. J., May 14 .- An examination to-day of the effects of Mrs. Della Fox, who died from heart diesease in the Long Branch Hospital on Saturday, disclosed that she was the widow of "Texas Charlie," a member of the gang of bandits once headed by Jesse James.

She was once a champion rifle shot, and after James had been killed by one of his gang, she assumed his name and appeared on the stage as "Mrs. Jesse James."

In recent years she had devoted herself to evangelism among the poor of this section, without her identity being known. She died penniless, though only a few years ago she was reputed to be well-to-do.

Mrs. Fox was born in Scotland, coming to this country at the age of fifteen, when she met and eloped with "Texas Charlie," and soon became companion of the notorious bandits. She was about 60 years old at the time of her death.
