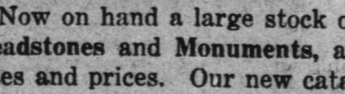

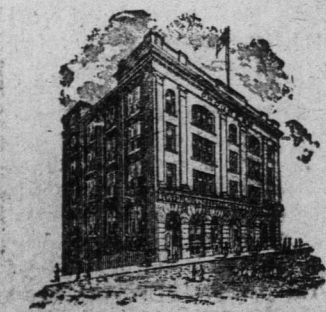

**Mr. John Brown Writes**

Editor The Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—In Saturday's issue of the Fishermen's Advocate is a letter from our local bard, Mr. James Murphy, which begins with the following words: "In a production (save the mark) published conjointly by Messrs. Dooley and Brown called the Bell Island Special Industrial Number your humble and inoffensive servant comes in for a share of ridicule." Let me say at once that I am not responsible for one line of the written matter in the publication; but for more serious reasons, which I shall presently state, I am compelled to make public my connection with Dooley and the paper referred to.

One evening near the end of June, I met Dooley on New Gower Street—after some desultory conversation he said he was getting out an Industrial Record of Bell Island, about the 15th of July, and asked me if I cared to get the business advertising on a commission basis. He gave me to understand positively that the literary matter would be first-class; that the leading articles on the industrial development of the Island would be written by practical men—officials of the D. I. S. Co. and Nova Scotia Co. Other well known writers would also be contributors. It was also well understood that no political matter of any kind was to appear in the number. In a day or two I again saw Dooley and agreed to get the business advertising on a 50 per cent commission, he (Dooley) undertaking to get enough Government advertisements to pay the costs of publication. In two weeks I had canvassed the city and handed over the "copy" to Dooley. The promised date of publication arrived, but he was not ready; he had some puerile excuse for delay from time to time. Eventually in August month a third party was interested by Mr. Dooley to get the Government ads, which he had failed to get, and also to make arrangements for the publication of the number at the Evening Herald Office. I may say that I was informed by the Editor of the Herald on Saturday last that before printing the number the Government ads and a Reid Newfoundland Co. ad, which I had secured were placed in payment of the job. The number "came out" on the afternoon of Saturday, August 23rd. I at once began collecting on the business I had done, which meant all the commercial advertisements but two. I met Dooley on Sunday, a.m., bound for Boston by the evening express. A later cable postponed the trip. We went together to the Anglo Office where Mr. Dooley displayed a considerable roll. I then realized that he had been collecting without acquainting me. On Monday morning went to the Herald Office and made out bills. I then started to collect, and objected to Dooley's doing so, as I considered it my business to get paid for the work I had done immediately and get rid of Dooley and his publication. It appears he next telephoned the advertisers not to pay anybody but him. I continued to make what collections I could. In all I collected \$55.00. I had secured business amounting to \$267.00 and was entitled to a per centage of half or \$133.50.

On Friday Dooley advertised in the Daily News that the "Advertising solicitor for the Bell Island Special Number had been discharged. The inference from this is very clear and Mr. Dooley will have to answer. Seeing that I had done virtually all the work and had been coaxed and fooled by this man for two months on a proposition which he assured me would not exceed three weeks, I think it was up to me to do any discharging that might be necessary. I shall see to it that he makes good to the discharged solicitor to whom there is due a substantial balance.

In conclusion I want to assure the advertising public, who so generously gave me their business, that had I known the paper would not be a first class number, I never would have solicited their patronage.

EL PASO, Sept. 1.

Official despatches by messengers to-day report that the constitutional General Villa defeated the Terraja federalists in Chihuahua, and executed 200 volunteers in the federal forces.

PITTSBURG, Sept. 1.

Nine persons lost their lives and six were injured when the boilers of the tow-boat Alice exploded. Two of the dead have been found. Efforts are being made to recover the bodies of the other victims. The tow-boat was proceeding up the Ohio river with a tow of six flats loaded with sand and gravel, when the explosion occurred.

LONDON, Sept. 1.

The Tokio correspondent of the Daily Telegraph regarding what has gone on behind the scenes before the present Chinese revolt says that there is little known about the whole matter, but that sentiment favoring the South is due to the belief that the Southern leaders have a just cause. He says he finds it necessary for the sake of common justice to publish a jealously guarded secret, known to only very few, as to the reasons for massing northern troops on the Yang-tse-Kiang. The fact is that Yuan Shih Kai was poisoned by arsenic and that only the most violent methods saved his life, leaving him in a state of collapse for many days. The Southern agents are suspected of having attempted to poison him. The Japanese press complains of the inadequacy of Japanese diplomacy in failing to secure a termination of the struggle in China. There is, however, no chance of the Tokio Government embarking on an adventure of advising, unless the other Powers lead the way.

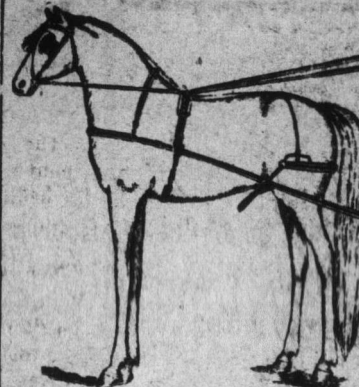

Attempt to Beat Transatlantic Record.

Liverpool, August 26.—With her cabins filled with many prominent persons, the Cunard liner Mauretania left on Saturday bound for a record trip to New York.

It is expected that the big steamer will break all records for a quick passage. She is expected to maintain the tremendous speed of 28 knots, or 32.24 miles an hour, one knot faster than the record now held by the Mauretania. The Lusitania's business were recently rebuilt at a cost of more than \$1,000,000. The Mauretania recently made 27.04 knots for a day's run. Recently the Mauretania left Liverpool on a Saturday morning bound for New York. The French liner France, bound also for New York, left Havre that same night.

The Mauretania stood by at Queens-town for more than two hours to take on passengers and mail, and in that way lost much of her lead. Soon after she had cleared Queenstown she picked up the France by wireless, and when it was learned that the two steamers were very close a transatlantic race started.

On Wednesday morning the two vessels came within sight of each other, and many big bets were made by wireless as to the outcome of the contest. The Mauretania arrived off Sandy Hook just twelve minutes ahead of the France. The two steamers do not differ thirty minutes apart.

The Mauretania's time was: From Dunant's Rock to New York, 5 days, 2 hours, 39 minutes. The France's time was: From Havre to New York, 5 days, 23 hours and 1 minute.

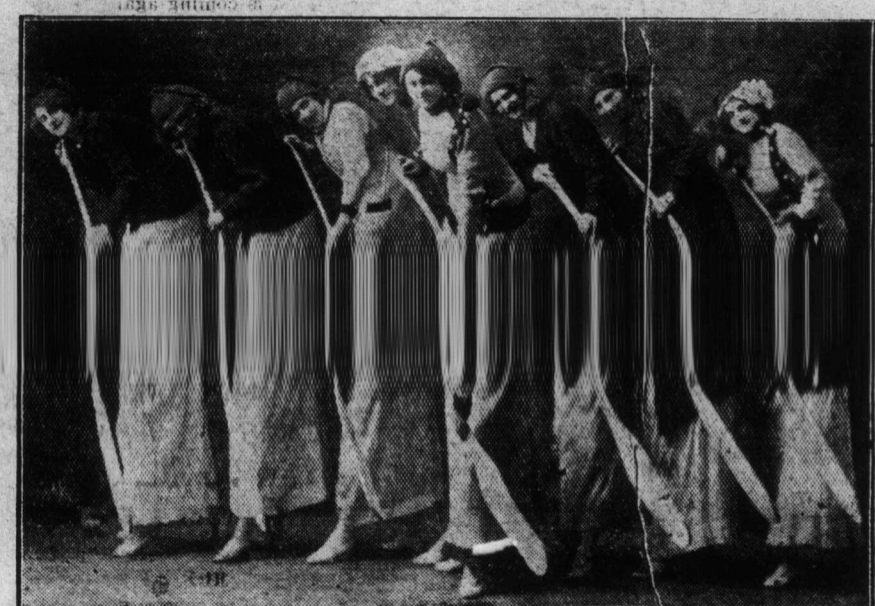

## Cable News.

Special to The Evening Telegram. NASHVILLE, Tenn., To-day. Death claimed a heavy toll on Labor Day in the Automobile Speed races at the State Fair grounds, when four of the six high powered cars entered for the twenty-five mile races. All were wrecked and ended in a mass of twisted steel and splintered wood on the far side of the mile track opposite the big grand stand wherein were packed five thousand people. Four racers were killed, two received injuries and four escaped without injury of any sort. Two car drivers and mechanics flung through the tangled wreckage and broken cars and maimed bodies at a speed of sixty miles an hour, escaping injury.

SHERBROOKE, To-day. Unless Superior Judge Hutchinson changes his mind over night, the habeas corpus proceedings to-day in the case of Harry K. Thaw, will be held in private; not even Wm. Travers Jerome, Chief of the New York State interests in seeking Thaw's return to Mattewan will be allowed in the Chambers. Judge Hutchinson announced his decision last night, he had weighed the matter carefully all day, noting meantime the overwelling crowd pouring into Sherbrooke for the fair. Taking cognizance of this and of the outbreak last Wednesday the Judge decided that the wisest course would be to exclude spectators. Reporters also are to be barred, while Thaw's lawyers may be present in a body if they so desire. Only two representing New York, are to take part in the proceedings which will be brief. There are three courses open to the Judge; he can adjourn the hearing until a later date and ask both sides to submit briefs; he can sustain the writ which will instantly make Thaw a free man and place him within the grasp of the immigration officers or he can deny the writ and remain the prisoner back to jail to await the disposition of his case by the King's Bench.

## Buckingham Palace.

The reconstruction in White Portland stone of the dingy front of Buckingham Palace, a work which it is estimated will take three months and cost £60,000, has now begun. The cost will be defrayed by the Queen Victoria Memorial Committee. Recently workmen were preparing for the erection of hoardings in front of the Palace and in laying mains for electric light, by the aid of which work will proceed by night as well as by day. Some parts of the old front are to be pulled down, but in other portions the new front will be built over the old. From to-day the work, which is being carried out under the direction of Sir Aston Webb, the architect, and the personal supervision of Mr. Frederick Leslie, managing director of the contracting firm Messrs. Leslie & Co., will proceed without a break until the last stone is placed in position. At present about 100 men are engaged, but later the number will be increased five-fold to permit of eight-hour shifts day and night. £3,500,000 in the Palace. During the renovation the palace police have made special arrangements for guarding the treasures stored in the three "magazine" vaults. The vaults contain gold, jewels, furniture, and art treasures, which form a very considerable proportion of the £3,500,000 which is stated to be the amount arrived at in a recent valuation of the contents of the palace.

## Mr. Kent on the Doing-Nothing Government.

The following extract from Mr. Kent's Speech in criticism of the last Budget of Mr. Cahin, will be read again with interest:  
"Since the installation of the Harmsworths at Grand Falls, and the Albert Reid Co., at Bishop's Falls, no large constructive undertakings outside the railway construction, which is being paid out of the borrowings of the Colony itself, has taken place. I believe we have here great resources; but unfortunately the proper steps are not being taken to develop them. Take our coal. During and preceding the last General Election the present Government proclaimed throughout the country what they were going to do, when they got into power towards the development of our soil. The coal areas were to be developed, the local market supplied and the price to come down. The attainment of these ends was to be assisted by utilizing our peat areas. But beyond entering into a contract with a company, has failed to accomplish anything.  
NOTHING WHATEVER HAS BEEN DONE  
towards these developments and both coal and peat are in the same fix not a worse condition than they were four years ago. That we have coal here and that it is here in paying and commercial quantities, and quality, I firmly believe, and I base that belief upon reports from time to time furnished by our Geological Surveyor, Mr. Howley. No man in this country who knows more about our coal and other resources, or no man who has attempted to investigate our coal areas, who has a better opportunity of knowing and informing us what our possibilities are in this direction than he (Mr. Howley). He tells us that the prospects up in the Grand Lake area are very encouraging, that if that area was properly stripped of its overlying debris we would have coal in workable and commercial quantity and quality. If that is the case, when Mr. Howley, a man of great experience and knowledge in this direction, can say this in his reports year after year, surely it is the duty of the Government to make every effort to verify this statement. He made them with all the responsibility of years of work in the Government, and the Government took power until to-day, beyond entering into a contract with an English syndicate and debating the matter here in the House in 1910, NOTHING FURTHER HAS BEEN DONE.  
The coal is there; the people are still bearing the infamous weight of the cost and the industries which have discovered coal in paying quantities would mean, are still laying in the womb of the future. If you are ever to develop these latent resources of the country, they must be undertaken in a more business-like way. The present Government has, during its term of office, taken the mistaken course to my mind, of entering into contracts with people for doing its work. The result of this is, that if you examine the Statute Book, during the term of the present Government you will find the stream of legislation strewn with quite a number of legis-

### A Protest.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—When I took up an alarm on Saturday evening, I was astounded to see a faring advertisement from the Reid Nfld. Co., announcing a "Sunday Excursion to Petty Harbor by way of the Trepassay Railway." Is that the use to which this Government Branch Railway is to be put? Very few have been able to understand the purpose to be served by the building of the Trepassay Branch railway. Now our eyes have been opened to the purpose of the Trepassay branch. It is to be an excursion line for Sunday desecrators, and to put money into the pocket of the Reids at the expense of the morality of the community. The Reids have not added to the social or political morality of the community since their advent among us, and however deeply we may deplore the fact there is difficulty in dealing with it. But here is a railway just built at the expense of the taxpayers, to the tune of about Two Million Dollars and handed over by the Morris Government to the Reids for operation that is at once converted into a menace to the happiness of one of the most God-fearing and peaceful little hamlets in the island. I know Petty Harbor and its people well, and I can imagine with what disgust they find their sanctity and peace invaded. We were ever regarded by the stranger who came within our gates, at any rate until very recently, as a model community

in respect to the keeping holy of the Christian Sabbath. I have heard strangers comment in laudatory terms when witnessing on Sunday thousands of our citizens on their way to the city cathedrals and other Churches for their devotion. Your paper stopped the Sunday paper by its exposure of the patronage given to the starting of it by the Government. Here is a railway for which the people have been muled in Two Million Dollars that is a greater menace than the Sunday paper. Stop it in the name of all that is holy, should be the demand of Catholic and Protestant. Moral principle is the axis of civilization. Abraham Lincoln, in his last inaugural address, declared:

"A becoming deference to the best sentiments of Christian people, and a due regard for the Divine will, demand that Sunday labor be reduced to the measure of strict necessity." The American people have lived up to that ideal. There are no Sunday railway excursions in the United States or Canada. Railway employees are permitted to rest on that day and deference is paid to the best sentiments of Christian people. Are we to be the only Anglo-Saxons to profane the Day of the Most High?

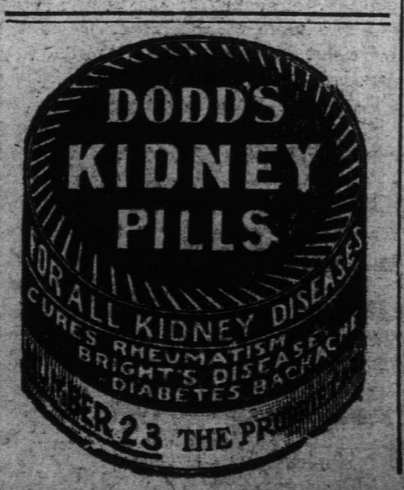

One of fashion's sensations is the dress made of hand-painted gauze veiled in shadow lace, combined with pleated charmeuse and long jet fringes.

About the skirts of the new fall suits - they have many innovations. The line from the waist to the hem is rarely left unbroken. There is drapery at all points, the folds around the top of the skirt being the newest.

Features that mark the new suits (this fall are the slightly longer coats (especially at the back), with the cut-away line at the waist, which gives a note of color. They are of satin, all corded silks, suede, chamois, cloth, moire and washable pique.

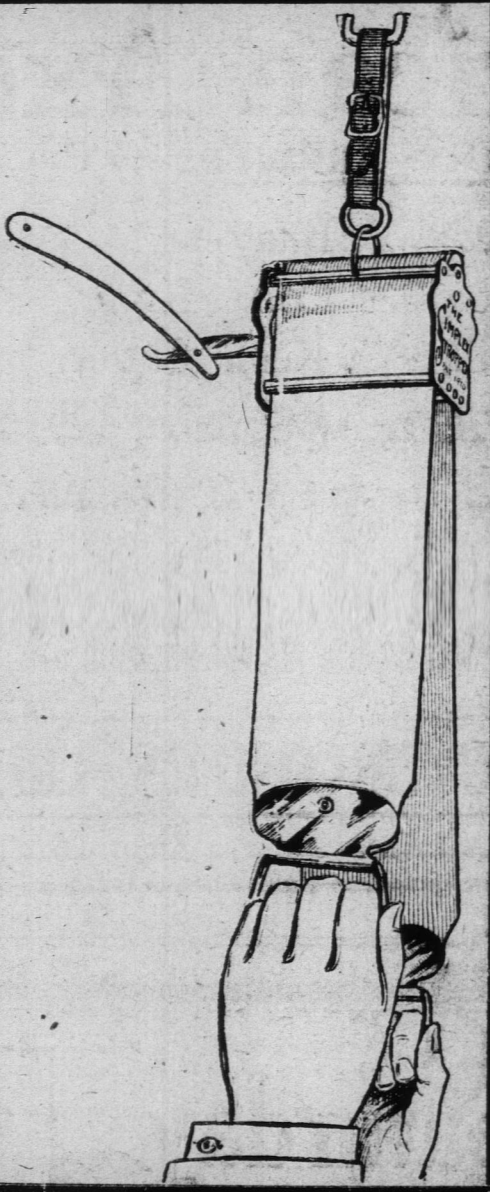
