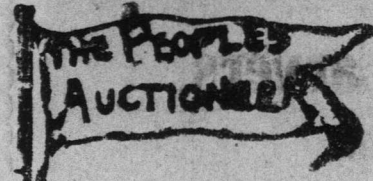

Any person convicted of a violation of this Regulation before a Stipendiary Magistrate or a Justice of the Peace shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding two hundred dollars, or in default of payment to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months, or to both fine and imprisonment.

The League of Peace.

Responsible Americans do well to make it clear that they are not leaguizing themselves together in these tragic days to man another and more national Ford ship of fools to try to jolly or intrigue the Allies into granting Germany a premature and temporary peace. This is most emphatically a case in which the nations that are not fighting should stand aside. The Allies have not undertaken this war because they like it, or through any idle indulgence in bellicose passion. They are an alliance of peace-loving peoples who are seeking to chain, once and all, the tigers of Central Europe, who have long prepared to raid and ravish the domains of their unprepared and pacific neighbors. It is as if a commercial community lay near a mountain, infested with robbers. They would gladly leave the robbers alone, if the robbers would leave them unmolested. But when finally they did lay aside their ordinary vocations to set out, armed, to clear the mountain of its human beasts of prey, they would not relish a suggestion from another town that they stop their work when it was only half done. They would not be willing to leave the robber band strong enough to recruit new outlaws and compel them to take the task in hand all over again.—Montreal Daily Star.

'APPAM' CASE REVIVED.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4. The request of the British claimants of the steamer Appam, now a German prize at Newport News, to expedite the hearing of the case of testing the vessel's possession, was granted to-day by the Supreme Court which set Jan. 8 for an argument.

DYKE'S RESIGNATION.

THE HAGUE, Dec. 4. Dr. Henry Van Dyke, American Minister to the Netherlands, has resigned.

THE U. S. NAVY.

NEW YORK, Dec. 4. An Associated Press despatch from Washington says Canadian and American munition manufacturers are writing personal letters to enlisted men in the navy, offering big pay. Rear-Admiral Palmer, chief navigation officer, told the House Naval Committee to-day, and to keep trained men on the ships the navy practically has to bid against them. Only one-third of 6,180 men recruited in July and November were re-enlistments, he said.

MORE STEAMERS SUNK.

LONDON, Dec. 4. The Danish steamer Yrsa, 441 tons gross, and the British schrs. Grace and Secker, both small vessels, have been sunk.
The British steamer King Bleddyn has been sunk. She was 4,387 tons and sailed from New York on Nov. 16 for Havre.

GREEK SAILING PROHIBITED.

LONDON, Dec. 4. The British Government has prohibited the sailing of Greek steamers from British to Greek ports.

RAILWAY ACCIDENT.

BUDAPEST, Dec. 4. Sixty-four persons were killed and 120 injured, many seriously, in a railway accident at Herchalen last night. It has not been definitely established as to the cause of the accident.

AMERICAN MARINES AND NATIVES AT MACERIS, CLASH.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4. In an encounter between American marines and natives at Maceris, San Domingo, on Nov. 29, a number were wounded on both sides. The affair was reported to the Navy Department to-day by Capt. Knapp, commanding the forces at Hah and San Domingo. The despatch said no Americans were killed and that only a few marines were injured. It did not indicate the number of native losses. The fight occurred while the American forces were investing Maceris, disarming the natives and establishing themselves in accordance with the military rule recently proclaimed.

WILL TAKE IMMEDIATE STEPS.

LONDON, Dec. 4. In the House of Commons to-day Lord Robert Cecil said the British Government considered King Constantine and his Government to have been involved in the event at Athens and that the British Government in conjunction with its Allies, would take immediate steps to bring about a radical solution of the question which had arisen.

THE KING'S APPROVAL.

LONDON, Dec. 4. Premier Asquith announced in the House of Commons this afternoon that King George had approved of reconstruction of the Government. Mr. Asquith suggested that after to-day's business had been concluded the House would adjourn until Thursday. Premier Asquith stated the reconstruction of the Government involved no departure in any shape or form

Pretty teeth, or, at least, white teeth are essential to being when beauty smiles. But teeth, whether pretty or ugly should be kept immaculate in appearance at all times.

The teeth of most folks are sufficiently far apart for small particles of food to lodge between them, and if these particles are not quickly removed their decomposition begins, injurious acids are formed, and a decay of first the enamel and then the teeth proper begins.

Besides such decaying particles give rise to poisonous and offensive gases which retard digestion, aggravate the nervous system and poison the blood, making, as you see, radiant health impossible.

It is advisable to retire to one's room or the bathroom as soon after a meal as possible and there use both toothpick and dental floss to remove any particles of food adhering to the teeth, first having brushed them with hot water. One must take care, too, that the brush is the right size. If it is too large it will not reach far back into the mouth and well up to the gums.

A good tooth paste or powder should be used twice a day. Sometimes there are spots of tartar on the teeth that do not yield readily to the brush. These can be removed by wrapping a small pointed stick with absorbent cotton moistened and dipped in powdered pumice stone. This treatment should be practised with caution and only once a week.

MORE SINKINGS.

PARIS, To-day. Reports received from Bordeaux, Toulon and Brest, say the following vessels were sunk by submarines: the Norwegian steamer Boss, the British steamer Moeraki; the French schooner Robinson; all the crews were saved. The British steamer Moeraki was 4,392 tons and owned by the Union S. S. Co. of New Zealand. The Robinson was 186 tons.

ANOTHER BRILLIANT VICTORY BY SERBIANS.

SALONIKI, To-day. A Serbian official issued to-day tells of the capture of heavily fortified Bulgarian positions north of Grunishite and Budimirtsa, east of the Cerna River, in Serbia, after fighting lasting over several days, in which the Bulgars suffered heavy casualties and lost prisoners, guns, machine guns and ammunition. After sanguinary fighting lasting several days in which the Bulgars suffered heavy losses, without interruption, despite bad weather, difficult terrain and desperate resistance by the enemy, our troops by a brilliant attack yesterday captured an entire series of powerfully fortified Bulgarian positions in the region north of Grunishite and Budimirtsa. The ruins of the ancient fortress above Grunishite are in our hands. The Bulgars are flying northward leaving a large number of dead on the field. By this brilliant victory we captured numerous trophies, including 5 field guns, 5 caissons, many machine guns, a quantity of ammunition and other material and many prisoners who have not yet been counted. The number of guns captured up to now totals 79.

NO CHANGE IN POLICY, SAYS ASQUITH.

LONDON, To-day. When the members of the House suggested a longer adjournment than Thursday on the ground that it was not certain that the Premier would make a definite announcement on that day that the House should be given an opportunity to discuss the new situation, Asquith said, "I desire to make it perfectly plain to the House and to the country that, whatever reconstruction of Cabinet takes place, it involves no departure in any shape from the policy already announced and pursued since the beginning of the war. If any one encourages or entertains the idea that there is any question of a change in policy, I can assure them they are entirely mistaken." "Ministers," added the Premier, "will continue to perform their duties." A motion to adjourn till Thursday was carried, the Nationalists alone protesting. Before the adjournment the Premier said the first business of the House Thursday would be to vote a credit which would give members an opportunity to discuss any topic they might raise.

BOMBARDMENT OF BUCHAREST.

COPENHAGEN, To-day. According to the Berlin correspondent of the National Tidende, the German artillery, which was emplaced only eleven miles from Bucharest, began yesterday to bombard the city.

EAST VERSUS WEST.

LONDON, To-day. The real basis of the political crisis, according to the Parliamentary correspondent of the Star, is a conflict between eastern and western strategy. The westerners, the correspondent says, are concentrating the whole man power on the west front and forcing

the Germans to fight our war in France and Flanders. They argue that the lines of communication to the western front are short and secure; they devour less ships, while the deviation of forces to the eastern theatre would place an intolerable strain on our depleted shipping. The east school are in favor of standing on the defensive on the western front and taking the offensive from Salonika, whither they propose to send a huge army of between half a million and a million men. The westerners regard this as lunacy which is only likely to lead to disaster by playing the Germans' game, Field Marshal Von Hindenburg's aim being to shift the centre of gravity from France to the Balkans. The Somme offensive is the one thing he dreads. After suggesting that the people choose a new ruler through a general election, the Manchester Guardian, commenting on the Cabinet situation, sounds this note of warning: "There are in fact two crises, for a crisis in the ministry is but a reflection of a crisis in the war. Criticism of the war amounts to this, that the progress of events and a succession of bitter experiences have at last brought home to the minds of most men the fact that we are not winning the war and the further conviction that with the present methods of waging the war we should never win it."

ATHENS CALM.

PARIS, To-day. A despatch to the Temps from Athens on Monday says the city has become calm, but armed bands of reservists are still moving about the streets. King Constantine and the members of the Royal family are at the Palace.

RUSSIANS TO THE RESCUE.

PETROGRAD, To-day. The timely arrival of Russian troops before Bucharest at a critical moment when the loss of the capital seemed almost certain, has somewhat changed the routine of the German situation here. The Rumanians have at last a fighting chance to retain their capital with the aid of the Russians, who have rendered their first valuable assistance to the Rumanian defence by an offensive in the Carpathians begun five days ago, will now attempt to include Bucharest in its zone, which they are able to defend by establishing a permanent line north and west of the capital. According to information received here from Bucharest the German plan of encircling Bucharest was seriously near accomplishment when it struck an unexpected obstacle in the form of a Russian force between Bucharest and the Danube. Strong cavalry columns of the Teutonic Allies had been sent forward on both wings of a united front, forcing the Rumanian tanks backward both north and south of the capital. The flanking movement was partially successful when the Teutonic forces advancing from Lake Greuc encountered a sudden stiffening resistance from the Rumanians, due to the arrival of Russian troops, and were compelled to retire in disorder. Emplacements had already been completed for the big guns which were to bombard the Bucharest forts. Executing a hasty retreat, the Germans and Bulgars had to abandon guns of all calibres and a large quantity of war material. The north Teutonic Allied group, which is attempting to flank Bucharest from the side of Ploesti, has proceeded with greater success but the Rumanians have managed to retreat without losing connection with the forces defending the western fortifications of the capital.

WAR REVIEW.

The armies of the Teutonic Allies fighting in southwestern Roumania with Bucharest as their main objective, have joined hands from the Danube in the south to northwest of Bucharest, where coming through the mountainous region they have reached the town of Tergovistea. Berlin announces that the battle of the Argesu River has come to a final conclusion with the Teutons victors, and that all along the front they are drawing closer their net towards Bucharest. With the capture of Tergovistea and further south the driving of the Rumanians beyond the railway junction to the town of Titu the forces of the Central Powers now hold intact all the railway lines running into Bucharest from the west of the Prudal Pass. A line running north from the Capital into Transylvania is the sole remaining railway connection in western Wallachia partly in Rumanian hands. With the Teutons nearly astride this line at Breza and rapidly advancing this route is likely to be taken from them. South and southwest of Bucharest the forces of Field Marshal Von Mackensen, which crossed the Danube, have inflicted a heavy defeat on the Rumanians and captured the town of Gradicea, 12 miles from the Capital. In this fighting, according to Berlin, the Rumanian army suffered sanguinary casualties on Sunday, with a loss of more than 8,000 men made prisoners, and cannon to the number of 35 were captured near Ritu; 13 locomotives and much rolling stock fell into the hands

Australian Method Keeps Down Prices.

WHY NOT IN CANADA!

New York, Nov. 28.—Patrick E. Quinn, Government Commissioner for New South Wales, who is on a visit to the States, is busy explaining the Australian system of Food Control to housewives leagues.

"The storing of eggs, butter, meat, poultry and like foods to boost the prices, is only less criminal than the destruction of food to keep the market up," he says. "In New South Wales every morning the prevailing prices for staples are announced by the Government. If the announced price is 36 cents for butter, the housewife knows she will pay 36 cents and no more. Thanks to our system, housewives in Sydney and other large cities pay about 25 cents a dozen for the best eggs. There is no legitimate reason why they should be dearer here. Your American egg barons would like to hit me with some of their storage goods for saying it no doubt, but the reason eggs are not 25 cents here is that the speculators are holding a pistol to the consumers' head."

"At home we provide a reasonable profit for the producer, one for the wholesaler and one for the retailer and yet sell many articles of food at half and less than half what you pay here. There is plenty of food of all kinds in the United States. The speculators have got dealers and consumers by the throat. They have raised the false cry of 'heavy exports on account of the war' and then have boosted prices on that artificial theory. This is a situation that could not exist in New South Wales."

"Can you imagine a two pound loaf of bread selling in the United States for seven cents? I think not, yet that is what the Australian state bakeries do."

"Take a spool of common thread. In Australia the housewife gets 3,000 yards for a nickel. The American housewife gets 1,000. This is all the more remarkable when you consider that all our cotton must be shipped from England or America, as we grow none."

Boycott of Eggs on in New York.

Thousands of Housewives Identified With the Movement—Turkeys Drop in Price.

New York, Nov. 30.—New York city's fight to reduce the high cost of living began in earnest to-day with a boycott on eggs by thousands of housewives. This was followed by a direct appeal by the National Housewives' League to President Wilson for the regulation of the country's food supply, and meetings of Federal, state and city officials and investigating committees, as well as various civic organizations, at which resolutions were adopted looking to a speedy readjustment of conditions. Coincidental with the eggs boycott there was a break in the poultry market, the price on turkeys dropping from four to five cents a pound.

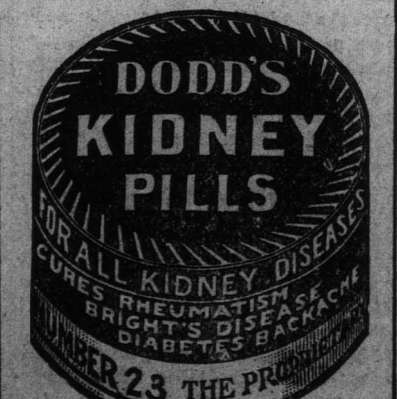
Virtually every branch of the municipal government was at work to-day in an effort to find a solution to the food problem. A statement issued by Israel Feinberg, President of the Board of Coroners, declared that "the present high cost of living is directly reflective in an increase in the number of suicides, deaths from lack of proper nourishment and birth control."

Four Million for Housewives School.

New York, Nov. 30.—More than \$4,000,000 is left to start a home for girls over the age of ten years, where they can be educated to take up the cares of motherhood and wifehood, the management of homes and the direction of housework, in the will of Lizzie M. Palmer, formerly of Great Neck, L.I., who died there recently. The home is to be founded in Detroit.

Three Smuggled Prizes

There was a time when the Turkish government imposed the death penalty on persons caught trying to smuggle out of the empire the best breeds of Angora goats. In 1881 a Californian, Dr. Riley, bought four goats in Turkey, carried them on mules, camels and in closed carriages for some hundreds of miles, sheared off their luxuriant wool, rolled them in coal dust to make them look common and disreputable and escaped with the Sultan's goats and a whole skin. The descendants of these goats are found on ranches in the west and southwest, crossed with Angoras from South Africa and other parts of the world.

Once the government of China and Japan guarded with similar jealousy the exportation of the tea plant. Some one escaped with some seed or cuttings, however, some forty years ago, and the original plantation of smuggled tea plants is still flourishing in South Carolina.

Fifty years ago Brazil was engaged in an effort to keep the rubber tree in confinement in that empire. The seed was smuggled to Ceylon, however, and for half a century East Indian planters have been perfecting the rubber tree until now the best plantations are there rather than in Brazil, and the Brazilians who want the best varieties send to Ceylon, Java and other Asiatic countries for their trees for planting.

The sultan lost his goat, the mandarins their tea and the dons their rubber trees—and in return Brazil has given the Asiatics the plague of the water hyacinth and the Mongolians have sent us the San Jose scale, the gypsy moth and several other pests. —Farm and Fireside.

'Evolution in Thought.'

The New York woman suffragists, in State Convention assembled, do

Resolve, To announce a Thanksgiving of our own for the support of the half million votes at the polls November, 1915, and for that evolution in thought, in which we firmly trust to make us citizens equals with the men of our State in 1917.

That evolution in thought evolves and is memorably attested by this resolution:—

The New York State Woman Suffrage Party, believing that unfranchised persons are at a great disadvantage, whether producers or consumers, does affirm that until we vote we cannot expect to arrest the present deplorable distress known as "the high cost of living."

It may strike the ancient Hittites, Sumerians, and other hunkers who have remained blind to "that evolution in thought" that the notion of reducing the cost of living by doubling the number of voters, by voting down that cost, is adorably nice. Meanwhile, might not the devotion of old-fashioned housewifely thought to the market basket, to making bread instead of speeches, to struggling with the butcher and the grocer, do more "to arrest the present deplorable distress" than the most arresting resolution of the unfranchised?

It is the misfortune of the suffragists, whose inexhaustible zeal and thankfulness for small favors are to be praised, that the State and the country have more instant and more important things to think of than votes for women.—N. Y. Times.

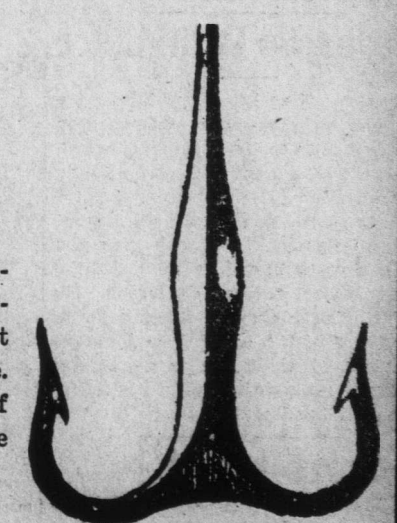



Air Raid on London

Has Awakened Reprisal Cry—Premier Asquith is to be Urged to Notify the Enemy that any Occurrence will be Followed by Reprisals in the Bombing of German Towns.

London, Nov. 29.—Notwithstanding the insignificance of the air raid yesterday there is a common disposition here to regard it as a warning. The editorials in the London morning papers suggest that it is a prelude to further similar visits on the same, or a greater scale. It is pointed out that now that the destruction of Zeppelins in the North Sea has shown the Germans that the measures which proved dangerous to airships invading the London area, has been extended to other parts of the country, they are likely to inaugurate daylight airplane raids on a large scale, and it behoves the British to be prepared to meet them.

"I," says one commentator, "German airplanes may, as we believe, attack London in thousands, we must be prepared to defend by building machines in tens of thousands, and by creating an air service which will be as great a weapon as the navy already is."

It is further argued that Great Britain's refusal to imitate the Zeppelins on such a scale as the Germans have built them has been further justified by the latest events. Zeppelins, it is said are beaten out of the field for military purposes being vulnerable beyond all parallel in the history of war weapons. On the other hand, raiding by airplanes which are relatively cheap and elusive has far more dangerous possibilities than raids by huge and costly airships.

The London raid has reawakened the reprisal cry, and Premier Asquith is to be urged in the House of Commons to notify the enemy that any recurrence will be followed by reprisals in the bombing of German towns.
