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





Armies in France (by Associated Press), To-day .- The most daring june14,8i,th,tu air raid yet carried out against the great Krupp munition works at Essen, was recounted to a staff correspendent of the Associated Press toclay by Sergt. Maximo Gallois. He tleffed all the German anti-aircraft defences, bombarded part of the German armament producing factories with high explosives, crossed the German front line twice, flew over many Rhenish cities and reached home scathless. The whole flight lasted seven hours, during which the daring French aviator was guided only by the moon and stars and compass, as the voyage was made in the darkest hours of the night, the destination being reached exactly accord ing to plan. Sergt. Gallois narrated his story in the simplest manner. He said: "Four of us left our base at nightfall on Friday with the intention of reaching Essen soon afterwards. We ran into foggy weather and lost sight of each other. I flew at an altitude of 1,200 metres and passed over Metz and Thianville, following the course of the River Moselle, which, however, rapidly disappeared in the mist. 
