## The 'Floriz'

CANADIAN CAPTAINS GIVE EVIDENCE.

Bernard John Murphy, sworn and examined by Mr. Dunfield, said: I am 24 years of age. I was born at Liverpool. I now reside in New York. I have resided there for 4 years. I am not a naturalized American. I was not an operator on the Floriz. I took my watch at 2 o'clock on Sunday morning. I had not been on before that night. I was on watch when she struck. We received a press report from Mount Pearl at 4 a.m. There was no other message during the night. The apparatus was in the best of order. It was all cleaned up and tested before we left port. I noticed the ship was on shore by her striking. It was a little rough before striking but nothing out of the ordinary. When she struck I came out of the cabin. One of the sailors came up to me and said, "The captain says to send out the S. O. S." That was all he said. I went to the operating room and called the chief engineer, Mr. Carter, by the private key, sending the signals S. O. S. I just got the apparatus in working order when Mr. Carter arrived from his stateroom. Mr. Carter told me to get the position from the captain. I phoned the bridge but could not get any answer. I found the captain in his room putting on a life belt. I asked him for the position. There was no light in the chart room. There was some one in the room with the captain. I do not know who they were. The captain said we were near Cape Race. He was cool as all cabin and told Mr. Carter that the position was near Cape Race. Mr. Carter was sending at the time. The room was dark at the time. He had a flashlight in his left hand and sending with his right; he added the position to the message he was sending. Leaving the Marconi room we held on to the rail to save ourselves from being washed over. There is nothing that I can add to the story of survivors that has not already been told. Cross-examined by Mr. Gibbs.—The captain's stateroom is in the room above the bridge. The sailor told me to send the S. O. S. I went to the bridge to get the position from the captain. There was no light when I went on the bridge. I recognized the captain in his stateroom. I am sure it was not Major Sullivan or anyone else. I recognized him by his voice. I did not notice any uniform. About ten people were standing between the Marconi house and the captain's cabin. The captain was in the room. I did not see anyone else in the room with a life belt. The other person there was taller than the captain. I wear glasses all the time. I had them on at that time.

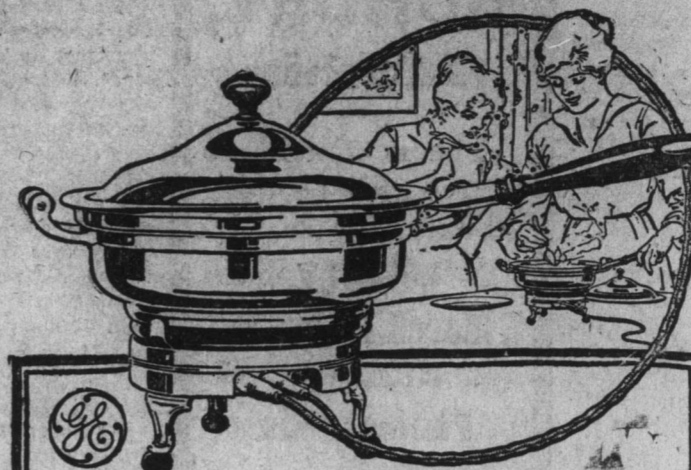
