With modern methods the Red Plague is now deflitely curable.



Canada's Trade With Newfoundland

At the recent meeting of the North Sydney Board of Trade, some facts and figures were presented in connec tion with trade with Newfoundland, showing it to be much more important locally than is perhaps generally understood, and it is a business which steadily developing. In 1909 Canadian exports to Newfoundland stood at \$3,937,009. In 1915, \$4,-509,827. In 1919 they had risen to \$11,469,657. Exports in 1902 from Sydney harbor were \$3.280.317; imports, \$1,955,840. In 1917 exports were \$7,838,693; imports \$2,898,936. The great bulk of this business went through North Sydney. Freights collected in 1915 were \$120,867, rising in 1919 to \$544,200. Besides the Newfoundland trade about 15,000 tons of freight were carried annually to St.

United States export business to Newfoundland had risen from \$5, 841,677 in 1915 to \$15,189,805 in 1919. Four millions per annum more than Canadian trade, despite the fact that the U.S. is 200 miles farther south. A reference to the figures given above shows the large volume of business between this port and Newfoundland and the adverse way in which it is affected by unfair discrimination in freight rates. Freight rates which advance from 1 cent to 2 cents per hundredweight between St. John and Halifax, go up 6 cents to 8 cents between St. John and the Sydneys. These rates naturally affect in a very adverse way local prices, as well as militate against export trade. For instance, freight rates per hundred pound, on Grain and grain products (local) from Toronto-to St. John, 46; to Halifax, 47 1-2. Sugar (local) -To St. John, 70 1-2; to Halifax, 73; to Sydney or North Sydney, 80 1-2; and so on through the list of com-

Concerning France in particular, whose losses stand next in order after Austria, Hungary, Poland, the Balkans and Russia, the total population, according to Doring, diminished seven per cent. Frenchmen between the ages of twenty and forty-four decreased at the rate of twenty per cent., which contributed to the present day ratio of one hundred and twenty-six women to every hundred

While the losses in Eastern Europe were proportionately greater than in France they were not all military deaths, but the great majority were due to famine, epidemics, and especially typhus, which still is ravaging

However cold-blooded his marriage may have been, it at least served the purpose of "putting him on his mettle," and he set to work to keep his domestic cupboard supplied by painting portraits of the local gentry at "two and small full-lengths six guineas." And such was his success that he was not only able to provide a comfortable home for his wife and the two babtes that came to them, but to save money.

It was not long, however, before Romney wearled of his prosaic homelife and his restricted field of work. He yearned to go out into the world and try his wings at loftier flights; and in 1762 we see him handing seventy pounds of his little nest-egg of a hundred pounds to his wife and, with the remaining thirty pounds in his pocket. faring south to London and, as he hoped, to fame and fortune-little dream ing under what changed and pathetic conditions he would return, nearly forty years later, to the wife on whom he so-lightly turned his back.

"How touching," says Edward Fitzgearald, "is the close of Romney's life. He married at twenty-one and, because Sir Joshua and others had said that marriage spoiled an artist, left We love old friends the very best, his wife in the north, and saw her but twice till the end of his life, when, old, nearly mad, and quite desolate he went back to her, and she received him and nursed him till he died."

Whatever may have been the precise notive of this cowardly desertion, which will always sully Romney's nemory, we know that he settled down quite happily to his battle with fortune in London, with little thought of the deserted wife and the children he had left so far away; and it was not OTHER TABLETS NOT long before Fortune began to smile sweetly on the runaway.

So successful was he with his portrait-painting that he had soon saved enough money to pay an artistic visit to Paris in 1764; and on his return to London his studio in Great Newport Street was so besieged by sitters that even the great Sir Joshua Reynolds had at last a really formidable rival.

Thousands a Year.

His income was now soaring into thousands a year-in one year his portraits brought him 3,500 guineas, an enormous revenue from art in those days; and during these long years of rich harvesting we are told "he almost entirely neglected his wife and children, and only twice did he visit them." He was now the second most successful portrait-painter in London, with five, and occasionally six, sitters a day; a favourite in society circles, and an intimate friend of many of the greatest in England. And it was at this time of triumph that romance came to him for the first and last time in

his life. One day in 1782 the Honourable Charles Greville, a younger son of the Earl of Warwick, introduced Romney to his protegee, the beautiful Emma Hart, who in the years to come was to blossom into My Lady Hamilton, as wife of our Ambassador at the Court of Naples, and to live in history as Nelson's "beloved Emma."

Feathered Frauds.

Apart from the natural camouflage which speckled feathers and patches of colour, like dazzle painting on ships, afford birds for their protection, there is no doubt that birds have little tricks which, consciously or instinctively, they employ to frighten away intruders. 

Gloucester Schooner May Race.


