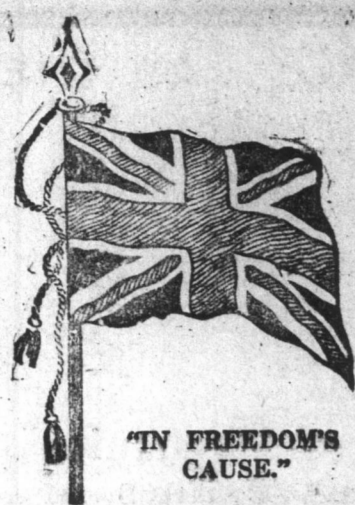

The Humber and the Governor.

The letter of Right Hon. Sir Robert Bond, published in the Daily News of yesterday, and upon which we offered a very brief comment, opens up another avenue of possibility with regard to the proposition known as the Humber Project, which is at present occupying the close attention of the Cabinet.

The significance of this proposal is too great to be discussed without having the text of the agreement at hand. Anything that may be said for or against it—and we believe that public opinion generally is hostile—must necessarily be based on the individual hypothesis of the various antagonists and protagonists of and to the measure. That each and all of these are apt to err in their assumptions is a statement which few perhaps will care to challenge.

Without the form of agreement, no person, be he ever so highly placed in the political scale outside the precincts of the Executive Council Chamber, can say with any degree of assurance what is or what is not involved in this agreement or "deal." Executive members themselves will not drop a word or a syllable of the verbiage of the document which they are at present so sedulously studying.

Whatever mysteries are in its contents they are keeping strictly to themselves. If there is a division of opinion amongst them on the merits or demerits of the Humber Valley, or if the Government is divided against itself, there is but the one reasonable course for them, to adopt, and that is to resign. If on the other hand, five of the nine members of the Executive are going to permit themselves to be bulldozed into voting for the agreement without such protective modification as will safeguard the future of Newfoundland in respect to annual payments that might be demanded, by the man who is alleged to be the dominating factor of the Government, then the sooner His Excellency the Governor dismisses the whole of them the better will it be for the country.

Yesterday's meeting of the Cabinet—so we understand—did not do much toward elucidating the problem, and the conflict of members continues. The Governor can exercise a given prerogative in such constitutional crises and should do so now without hesitation.

Destructive Fire at Botwood.

PROPERTY LOSS \$14,000.

News of a destructive fire at Botwood involving a property loss of \$14,000 conveyed in the following message received yesterday by the Assistant Collector of Customs from Sub-Collector Thomas Antle of Botwood:

"A refrigerating plant, shop and ice house, owned by the Botwood Meat and Produce Company, with all its contents, were destroyed by fire to-day. The origin of the blaze is unknown."
A somewhat similar message was received by Mr. Thos. Soper. It is understood that the Company's books were sent to St. John's by the last express to be audited. The loss is estimated at \$14,000, on which about \$10,000 insurance was carried by the Companies for whom Messrs. Bishop & Sons, A. E. Hickman & Co., and Percie Johnson are agents. It is not known if the plant will be rebuilt.

Memorial Committee Meets.

PADRE NANGLE STATES PLAN OF CAMPAIGN—EFFORTS TO AUGMENT MEMORIAL FUNDS.

Padre Nangle's campaign instituted for the purpose of augmenting the funds of the War Memorial Committee was given a great impetus last night, when a number of friends of the Padre, including members of the Memorial Executive and representatives of sporting bodies, met at a dinner given by Mr. W. H. Jackman.

After full justice had been done to an excellent repast, Padre Nangle explained the reason for the gathering. As will be remembered, he had been authorized by the War Memorial Committee to employ whatever means he thought fit in his efforts to raise the funds of the Committee to \$50,000, an amount which was the least that the country should provide for the erection of a National Memorial. The Padre outlined some of the projects he had in view and asked for suggestions from those present. Mr. W. J. Higgins, K.C., was appointed Chairman. Mr. Higgins first promised the support of all the many organizations represented by him, and said that anything that could be done to help Padre Nangle gain his objective, would be done. Those who had paid the Shrine Sufferage would be behind the Padre to-day if they could but speak, and now, there was a moral obligation on every patriotic Newfoundland to speak for those who had no voice.

Mr. G. W. B. Ayre, representing the Amateur Athletic Association, promised his unqualified support to Padre Nangle, who, he said, had put an entirely different spirit into the work on behalf of the Memorial. He was absolutely behind the War Memorial, but it must be an appropriate one. Mr. R. Stick for the Hockey League, Mr. H. Phelan and Mr. P. Grace for the National Sports Committee, also spoke briefly, promising their support. Mr. C. E. Outerbridge, on behalf of the Prince's Rink, made some very generous offers, subject to the approval of the directors of the Rink. It was on the initiative of Mr. Outerbridge that the War Memorial Committee was organized, and in helping Padre Nangle, he is contributing to a campaign which will bring the work he began to a successful conclusion.

Mr. C. E. Hunt made a very witty address, but was serious enough when he promised his wholehearted support to Padre Nangle. The support of the G.W.V.A. represented by its organizer, Mr. H. Mitchell, and by the Dominion Secretary, Capt. G. Whitty, also promised its assistance. Both these gentlemen offered valuable suggestions. Mr. T. V. Hartnett, U.S. Vice-Consul, made a happy address. He felt certain that such an organization was bound to achieve success. He promised the co-operation of the Baseball League. Messrs. Frost, Murphy, W. J. Carew and J. A. MacKenzie spoke in various capacities, the last named making a practical offer of assistance. The support of the C.C.C. Band was promised by Capt. A. Bulley and of the Methodist Guards Company by Mr. H. J. Russell. Mr. H. Mitchell spoke on behalf of the Nfld. Highlanders, and Mr. A. B. Perlin for the C.L.B. Cadets and Evening Telegram.

The various suggestions put forward were then considered and will be published later. During the evening songs were rendered by Mr. C. E. Hunt, Mr. G. W. B. Ayre, and Misses Krentz and Eagan. Before the meeting adjourned Mr. Higgins paid a well merited tribute to Mr. Jackman, and her lady helps. This was ably responded to by Mr. Jackman. It was announced by Mr. Jackman during the evening, that the Municipal Council had in his term of office, voted \$5000 to the War Memorial if it were to be erected on the King's Beach. The whole country is undoubtedly behind Padre Nangle in his efforts to successfully conclude the work begun by the War Memorial Committee.

Speech From Throne.

British Parliament Re-Assembled-- House of Lords May Be Reformed--Stern Measures to Be Taken in India -- Washington Conference Epochal in World's History

THE KING'S SPEECH.
LONDON, Feb. 7.

In his speech at the opening of Parliament to-day the King said: During the last three months the Washington Conference on questions of disarmament and the Far East situation continued its sessions. A treaty signed to maintain peace in the Pacific has been signed by representatives of the British Empire, United States, France, Japan and Russia. These are the six treaties which during twelve weeks of negotiation have been brought to final completion.

1. The Naval Limitation Treaty by which the United States, Great Britain and Japan, France and Italy agree to scrap or convert sixty-eight capital ships and so limit future construction that after a ten years building holiday, their first line of naval strength will remain at 535,000 tons, 535,000 tons, 375,000 tons, and 175,000 tons respectively. The respective tonnage of airplane carriers is limited to 135,000 tons each for the United States and Great Britain, 81,000 tons for Japan, and 60,000 tons each for France and Italy. Individual capital ships are to be no larger than 35,000 tons and to carry no guns in excess of 16 inch. Aircraft carriers are limited similarly to 22,000 tons and auxiliary craft to 10,000 tons and neither can carry a gun larger than eight inches. A fortification (status quo) is set up in the Pacific under which the United States agrees not to further fortify the Philippines and Guam, and Japan agrees to observe the same restriction in Formosa, Bonins and Pescadores.

2. The Submarine and Poison Gas Treaty by which the same five Powers are signatories. By its terms the Powers agree as among themselves not to use submarine "as commerce destroyers." In all cases to observe the rules of visit and search, and to regard as a pirate any submarine commander who violates existing laws. As among themselves they outlaw the use of poison gas altogether.

3. The Four Power Pacific Treaty by which the United States, Great Britain and France agree to respect one another's right in relation to their insular possessions in the Pacific, and to meet in consultation whenever these rights are threatened. The Anglo-Japanese Alliance is automatically abrogated when the new treaty finally is ratified.

4. The general Far Eastern Treaty between the United States, Great Britain, Japan, France, Italy, China, Belgium, Portugal and the Netherlands binding each of them to respect China's integrity. The open door policy is to be applied in detail and every opportunity is to be given the Chinese people to develop a stable government. It is agreed that no treaty infringing these principles is to be concluded that no contracts violating them are to be upheld, that discriminatory practices in Chinese railways to end, and that China's rights as a neutral are to be respected in future wars.

5. The Chinese Tariff Treaty adhered to by the nine nations, providing international machinery for an immediate revision of Chinese customs duties on the basis of five per cent. effective and periodical revisions thereafter together with changes which will permit the imposition of surtaxes.

6. The Shantung Treaty between Japan and China by which Shantung is restored to Chinese control. By one of the uncompleted treaties, agreed to in substance during the Conference, Japan gives the United States, long sought cable and wireless privileges on the island of Yap, and by another one of the principal powers and the Netherlands allocate the former German owned cables in the Pacific, so that one goes to the United States, one to Japan and one to the Netherlands.

Some Glove Terms.

Reading glove advertisements we become familiar with certain words applied to gloves without being certain of their meaning. "Cape" for instance, as applied to a glove does not explain itself. It was originally used to designate the leather made from skins coming from the Cape district of South Africa. Strong, heavy, rather tight-grained leather, the soft, pliable, widely-worn glove in various weights now commercially known as "Cape," is made from sheep and goat skins of many lands and tanned and glazed finished.

The chamois glove was once made from the skins of the chamois goat, of Switzerland, which is now almost extinct. Such a glove is now made from sheep and lamb skins, usually dressed with fish-oil.

Doeskin is a rare and beautiful antelope skin, but the genuine doeskin is so limited in supply that sheepskin in colored chamois finish is used as a substitute in glove manufacture.

Pique sewn gloves have lapped seams. In the sewing of the glove one portion of the leather is "lapped" over the other and sewn through, leaving only one raw edge.

Debtless in 20 Years.

PROSPECT PREMIER TASCHERAU HOLDS UP TO QUEBEC.

The hint that the Province of Quebec may proceed to wipe out its debt by profits on liquor sales was contained in an address of Premier Tascherau in the provincial house.

Quebec was making a profit of \$4,000,000 a year on liquor sales under government control. He proposed that \$1,000,000 of this should be used by the provincial treasurer to extinguish existing debt. As the total gross debt was \$51,000,000 or \$25,000,000, if good roads debt were excluded the net debt could be wiped out in about twenty years by this method.

Bus Transportation Becomes Popular.

High steam and electric railroad passenger rates are proving a boon to operators of interurban bus lines around Detroit. Investment required is so small and profits so large that scarcely a day passes without announcement of a new bus line enterprise.

One company having an investment of \$30,000, operating four motor buses, is earning 70 per cent. for its stockholders after allowing for repairs, and replacements based on a four year use of equipment. A bus seating 20 passengers costs \$4,000 to \$5,000 and experience of this company shows costs including all charges are slightly less than 15 cents a mile. Three round trips of 50 miles each are made daily by each bus and with an average of 60 per cent. capacity load and 2 1/2 cents a mile rate per passenger, the daily net per bus has been \$18.

Response of travelers has been so generous that bus companies have advanced rates to 3 1/2 cents a mile in steam railroad territory and 2 1/2 cents a mile in electric line districts. Increases have extinguished any differential under rail rates without affecting volume of bus business.

A Bottomless Pit.

Away on a lonely hillside in the Derbyshire moors, lies a dreadful chasm in the rocks, of no great width, but with a sheer descent to a tremendous depth.

This is the bottomless pit of "EMOTI Hole," regarded for centuries as unfathomable.

The gap is surrounded by a low stone wall, and a projecting ledge at one end enables the adventurous investigator to peer down into the gloomy depths.

For ages the chasm was regarded as a terrible place, popularly supposed to lead directly to the infernal regions.

A gruesome story relates that three hundred years ago a man was lowered into the cleft to a depth of eight hundred feet. When the unfortunate fellow was hauled up again he was a raving maniac, and died eight days later.

For centuries the place was regarded with superstitious awe and no real attempt was made to find the bottom until about 1700, when one writer stated that half a mile of rope had failed to reach it.

As the whole of this district is honeycombed with holes and crevices, it is probable that the chasm of "EMOTI Hole" leads to a mass of underground passages.



Co-Operative Marketing vs. Nationalization.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir—In the verbose first of a promised series of articles on "Nationalization," the Advocate, on Monday, explained how to pronounce the word, though most people already pronounce it "nonsense," and then assured its readers that "railroads are railroads, and fish is fish; and publicly operating fish." Indeed there would be a similarity in this Colony, for a publicly owned railway is costing the Colony millions of dollars to operate, and publicly operating the sale of fish would have the same unhappy result. The Advocate says that "of course it would not be logical to describe what the plan of Nationalization proposed by President Coaker would be like," but (a) "fishermen would catch and cure as usual, (b) and the merchants would continue to supply as usual, (c) but the merchants would buy fish from the fishermen at a price named by a National Board of Marketing, and (d) all the selling abroad would be done by that Board. This National Board "would be appointed by a committee of exporters and the Government, and be removable only by two thirds vote of such committee."

COAKER'S BOARD.

It does not seem to me necessary that Mr. Coaker's latest harebrained scheme should be explained by him any more fully than above to secure its unqualified condemnation by every person outside the Lunatic Asylum or the Advocate's office. It is a proposal to hand over the fisheries of the Colony to a Board appointed by Coaker and a committee of Water Street exporters, a Board of the calibre of the recently deceased Codfish Exportation Board. The "Government" in relation to fishery boards means "Coaker," and a committee of exporters means the ring which bedevilled the country into the arrangement with Hawes, and the adoption of the Fishery Regulations. Just fancy the enormity of the proposal. Under the Fishery Regulations, had as they were, the fisherman could sell for such prices as he could get by open competition, and he often got more than the fish was worth, but here is a proposal that the fishermen shall be compelled to sell for the price his merchant masters shall dictate, for Coaker is a fish buyer, and a committee representing him and his partners in fish buying would be absolute masters of the poor fishermen if the latter could be forced to sell at a price fixed by the exporters. Under the Fishery Regulations, infamously wrong in principle and effect, buyers from outside the Colony did at least help to keep up local prices, and local competition helped also, but Coaker now wants to fix prices by law, and so

reduce all the fishermen of the Colony to a condition of slavery.

FISHERMEN WOULD HAVE NO SAY

The fish, taken from the fishermen at a fixed price they would have no part in fixing, would be purchased from the merchants by the Board at a price named by the latter but controlled by the merchants, for the Board would be their representative. Nominally, the profit the merchants could charge the Board for the fish would be named by the latter, but nominally only, for the Board, representing the merchants, not the fishermen, could make the "spread" as large as it wished between the price to fishermen and the price to merchants. The Advocate said, a few weeks ago, that the "spread" would be twenty-five cents per quintal, but it says it might be fifty cents, and ultimately it would certainly be large enough to make this one thing sure, that Coaker and other exporters would not lose one dollar on even their worst bargains, but that the loss would be saddled on the fishermen, by cut prices to them, or on the general taxpayers of the country, by levies to pay the losses of the Board on shipments.

WOULD CONTROL PRICES.

It is obvious that Coaker's proposed Marketing Board, as it would fix prices to be paid fishermen and merchants, would necessarily fix "cull" prices as well. If the Board said, "so much for Merchantable," for instance, it would have to define what Merchantable was, and so with every grade. To standardize grades and enforce cull, the Board would appoint cullers and inspectors all over the Colony. The salaries of these would have to be paid out of Board profits on fish, would, in fact, have to be paid by reduced prices paid to the fishermen, and thus this Nationalization scheme would result in a great flock of cullers and inspectors, appointed by an irresponsible Board, and feeding on the hardworking fishermen. The prices paid by the foreign consumer cannot appreciably be increased by the fixing of prices here, and so all the terrible cost of Nationalization would ultimately constitute a huge burden corruptly expended upon Coakerites. The more this "Nationalization" scheme is examined the more clearly it will be seen that it is a conspiracy for the purpose of prostituting the trade of the Colony to base political purposes. What a "snap" a National Board would have in foreign markets, with the aid of "friend" Araujo, or other agents in our markets. Every member of the Board could have secret partners in our foreign markets, to whom to sell our fish at prices fixed by the Board, and who could resell at a profit for the advantage of the partners, secret and otherwise. Has the public forgotten the violations of the Fishery Regulations, or the irregularities of shippers, that it should be asked to place implicit faith in a Marketing Board, appointed by politicians and gangsters, and given authority over life and death, almost, but certainly over the livelihood of the people.

NATIONALIZATION A MENACE TO LIBERTY.

Co-operation is democracy. Nationalization is autocracy. Under a co-operative, profit-sharing marketing system such as I advocate, such as Sapiro and Powell have been quoted in favor of, the producers would govern their own affairs, free from politics, and equitably share in the net profits of trade. Under Nationalization as a system, the affairs of producers would be governed by an autocratic board, having endless opportunities for corruption and graft, and the profits would go into the pockets of everybody connected with the business other than the producers. The very liberties of the people are menaced by the proposal of this thing called

Dear Sir—Mr. Oke, Mortician, has drawn our attention to an item headed "A Hurried Funeral" which appeared in your daily on Monday, and has asked us to give the necessary explanation. Owing to an unforeseen emergency it was found necessary to start the funeral at 10.40 a.m. instead of 11 a.m. as advertised. The Newfoundland Express Company advised Mr. Oke that it would be necessary to have the body at the Railway Station at 11 a.m. sharp. This was necessitated by the large amount of express awaiting shipment and as St. George's was the destination of the body it would be necessary to place same in the end of the Baggage car. Mr. Oke then got in touch with us by phone and under the circumstances we thought it best to follow out the instructions given by the Express Company.

We had notices posted as soon as possible in our Club Rooms and at Mr. Oke's to the effect that the funeral would leave at 10.30 a.m. but owing to the fact that we did not receive notice from the Express Company until Saturday afternoon at 5 p.m., it was impossible to amend the advertisement sent to the Press. It is not critically correct that the body was not placed on the Baggage car until 11.30 a.m. as immediately after the arrival of the funeral which was about 11 a.m., the body was transferred to the Baggage Car.

When Palms Grew in Alaska.

Millions of years ago ferns and palms such as now thrive in lands far to the south, flourished in Alaska. Deep down in the coal beds have been found fossils of plants, which indicate that Alaska was ages ago a land of luxuriant loveliness. Dusky savages of a remote past, or perhaps members of that enlightened race of cliff dwellers, once looked across the waters of a huge lake in what is now northwestern Nevada. Geologists have given the great body of water, which was present in "comparatively recent geologic time" the name of Lake Lahontan, in honor of Baron La Hontan, one of the early explorers of the head waters of the Mississippi River. The deepest part of Lake Lahontan 880 feet, was the site of the present Pyramid Lake, a small remnant, so that its surface stood about 500 feet above the surface of Pyramid Lake. A field of sand dunes, formed since the inland sea disappeared, now cover a large area, a few miles north of Winnemucca, Nevada. The dunes are gradually moving eastward, and their steady march has necessitated a number of changes in the roads in recent years. In some places telegraph poles have been buried so deep that they had to be replaced in order to keep the wires above the crests of the sand dunes.
