Pacific Ocean Home of Quakes.

ATE IN THAT SEA—TROUGHS IN WATERS.

anst be reckoned as one of the world's greatest earthquakes, writes Charles Davison, Sc. D., author of "The Origin of Earthquakes," in

To be felt along the coast for more than 1100 miles ,to be strong enough to stop clocks in Buenos Ayres, about 900 miles across the continent, the have far exceeded 2,500,000 square miles and have closely approached that affected by the destructive Chinese earthquake of nearly two years ago, probably the most extensiv

In the study of an earthquake, great or small, the main point to be etermined, is the position of its origin. This will be definitely known as soon as the records from several distant observatories can be measu ed and compared.

In the meantime, we have to rely on somewhat scanty data, on our knowledge of the area of greatest damage, on the fact that the shock, as in so many other Peruvian and Chilean earthquakes, was followed soon after by a series of destructive

sea waves. The existence of such waves shows that not only was the origin submarine but also that the earthquake was accompanied by a marked change of level in the ocean bed-not by such change as that first reported of 16,-800 to 516 feet, but by one of some few feet only, the greatest known uplift in any earthquake being nearly 48 feet.

The next point of significance is that the damage caused by the earthquake was most serious along a portion of the coast about 200 miles in length, reaching from Coquimbo northward to Copiapo, the town that suffered most of all being Vallenar, about half way between these places. It is therefore probable that the origin lay some distance out at ses and in the neighborhood of a place directly opposite to Vallenar.

Along the margins of the Pacific Ocean are some of the most potent arthquake regions in the world. Ineed, viewed on a large scale, the ean seems to be almost engirdled by these regions.

There is one-a large one-to the east of Japan, and, farther south, another which includes the Philippine islands and the Malay archipelago On the other side of the ocean lies a third zone beginning in Alaska and ex-

A fourth reaches from a little north of San Francisco, covers Central ombia; while the fifth clings to the western coast of South America, and to it belong the many earthquakes which in times past have ravaged the coast of Chile and Peru.

Out of every 10 world-shaking earthquakes seven originate in the Pacific regions, which are exactly 10 times as productive in great shocks as the corresponding regions of the Atlantic ocean.

The Pacific ocean, unlike the Atlantic, is also remarkable in possessing narrow troughs of immense depth. Off the east coast of Japan lies the Tuscaroora Deep. Its greatest depth is 51/4 miles, and below its western slope originate many of the greatest of Japanese earthquakes.

The deepest of all, off the Island of Guam, is the Challenger Deep, which sinks nearly six miles below the sea

The coasts of Chile and Peru are bordered by a series of these troughs -the Krummel Deep (41/4 miles) off Arequipa, the Bartholomew Deep (four miles) off Arica, the Richards Deep (4% miles) off Copiapo and the Haeckel Deep (31/2 miles) off Valparaiso and Santiago. It is along the sloping sides of these troughs that the most destructive Peruvian and Chilean earthquakes originate, and the centre of the recent shock will probably be found not far distant from the southern end of the Richards Deep.

What the connection between the occurrence of earthquakes and a steeply sloping surface may be is less clear than the fact that such a connection does exist. Most of our great earthquake regions are partly or entirely submarine. But there is one that lies on land, extending from Italy across the Balkan peninsula to the Himalayas, in which two out of every 10 world-shaking earthquakes

The central ranges of the Himala yas consist of ancient rocks which have been slevated into the loftiest peaks upon the globe. Bordering them on the south are the sub-Himalayan chains, composed for the most part of recent tertiary beds, and sloping rapidly into the plains of India. The rapidly into the plains of India. The occurrence of great earthquakes, like that which ruined Gangra and Dharmsaia in 1905, shows that the growth of the Himalayas is not yet at an end and that the central masses are still, as of old, pressing forward toward the touth, crushing and grinding over the toward guard of tertiary mountains.







Premier Poincare once again told the Chamber of Deputies yesterday, that France would not reduce her share of reparations due from Germany, except in so far as the inter-Allied war debts were concerned, and repeated the determination of the Government to remain in the Ruhr until Frances' share is paid. A pre-cedent was furnished by the Germans themselves, who remained in France after the war of 1871, until the last centime of her indemnity was paid, he said.

Germs in the Soil.

FORTY MILLION IN A TEASPOON.

What Sir John Russell claims to be the the most remarkable census ever taken has been carried out at Rothamsted experimental station. It was a soil

The number of organisms in one single gramme of soil, no more than a easpoonful, often exceeds 40,000,000. "If each unit in the whole array could be magnified to the size of man, and the whole caused to march past in single file, they would go in a steady stream every hour of the day and night for a year, a month, and a day, before all had passed," reports 'Nature."

A Mystery of Science. It was discovered how to count these organisms, and the census was made every day for 365 consecutive days. No fewer than seventeen different organisms were enumerated.

One of the most interesting results was the proof that the soil population is not steady in number, as had always been assumed, but is in a violent state of flux. Daily variations were shown independent of external condi-

The whole soil population is depressed in winter and in summer, and is uplifted in spring and autumn. How this comes about we do not know. We must think of the apparently lifeless soil as really throbbing with life, changing daily and hourly in obedience to some great laws which we have not yet discovered.

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

Such gossip is rife now to an unusual extent because of the fact that William G. McAdoo, former secretary of the Treasury, and a leading candidate for the democratic nomination, is now making a trip in the east, and including Washington in the cities he visits. The McAdoo men are extremely active. So are the friends of Senator Underwood of Alabama. It might be supposed Senator Underwood would get the southern vote in the democratic national convention. But McAdoo's friends assert McAdoo will get twice as many southern delegates as Underwood. This would seem to make Underwood's nominaion impossible. On the other hand McAdoo cannot get the New York delegation and this is likely sooner or later to force him out of the run-Underwood nor McAdoo can be nominated, many democratic leaders are casting about for some compromise. 



THAT DATE OF LIQUOR REGULA-TIONS MAY BE CHANGED.

WASHINGTON, May 16,-Possibility of President Harding being fe-quested to seek an understanding quested to seek an understanding with nations which compel their ships to carry liquor as crew rations, loomed to-night in reports that officials had struck a snag in drafting regulations to carry out the Supreme Court decision banning liquor within United States territorial waters.

At the same time, there were hints that the date now fixed on June 10, for the new regulations to become effective might be postponed unless some way is found to "write around" the rigidity of the court's ruling.




