The coal consumption per capita is nearly 30 per cent. less in Canada than in the U.S.A., due mainly to the greater use of water lower in industries.

But for the water power developed, Ontario and Quebec (the acute fuel area) would now require about twice their coal supply.

The real fuel problem of Canada is the supply of coal to Ontario and Quebec. It has been shown that but for water power development these provinces would now be using nearly twice the present amount of coal, and to this great extent the difficulty is already diminished. The more water power is developed the less coal will be required, but no matter how much fuel required will tend to increase.

As a substitute for fuel power, water possesses no uncertain factors- it is inexhaustible, it is universally acceptable wherever available and as a financial investment its soundness has been proved beyond question.





#### Admiral Scheer

on Jutland

Admiral Scheer, who commanded the German fleet at the Battle of Jutland, has given a very frank expression of his views on the battle to a correspondent of the Daily Express:-

He was completely surprised, he says, by the appearance of the British fleet. This surprise was brought about by the successful screening work of Beatty, of whom he peaks in terms of warmest praise

Admiral Scheer described how he suddenly saw the entire British Feet before him. Visibility was poor, and the enemy ships could be seen, but as the merest silhouettes, stabbing the sea haze with flashes of fire as they

Scheer, "was very good, and the position of the German Fleet was desperate. As a result of Beatty's skilful manoeuvres the British Fleet extended in a kind of semi-circle round us. interposing between us and our base.

It was a position in which only the tmost promptitude and energy on the part of the Germans could save them om annihilation. In these circumnal for the "turn all together" of the German Fleet, a manoeuvre unprecedented in war, which was magnificently executed.

"This manoeuvre, which saved the German Fleet," said Admiral Scheer very distinctly, "would not have been ossible but for the hesitating (zagshaft) fashion in which Lord Jellicoe rought h's fleet into action, and the nanner in which the British Fleet turned away before the fierce offenwe by torpedo craft by which we

Admiral Scheer, describing the furer progress of the action. claimed hat having extricated his fleet from ts desperate position by the "turn all together," and formed a new line, he nade a second offiensive stroke against the British van. This phase of the action, he claimed, is slurred over n the British official reports, and al though hinted at in the Blue-book ippressed in the diagrams

The results of the second offensive the German battle-cruisers and rpedo-craft were, however, imporsquadron was pressing on, a gap opened between him and Jellicoe. A sim'lar gap had opened between Jelcoe and Evan Thomas, who had fall en behind with the Fifth Battle Squadron. Thus at the close of the action the British Fleet had fallen into three

Speaking of the failure to renew the action on the following day ,Admiral Scheer said very emphatically that if Jellicoe had wished to bring the German Fleet to action he could have done so.

At 5 a.m. the German ships were off Horns Riff when part of the British Fleet were sighted by a Zeppelin in a position from which they could still have interposed between the Germans and their base

Admiral Scheer made interesting and valuable comments on the manner in which Jellicoe handled the Grand Fleet.

A fundamental initial fault on ure to make an early deployment. After making all due allowance for errors in calculation from the Lion, and contradictory reports, Jellicoe must have known that the German Fleet was to be found within a certain quadrant. He should have pre-

"The second blunder," continued the admiral, "was the deployment to port instead of to starboard. Had Jellicoe deployed to starboard he would have brought his fleet at once into decisive action, and the "turn all together" which saved the German

away from the German torpedo attack instead of towards it. This turn away enabled the German Fleet to accomplish its intricate and dangerous manoeuvre almost unmolested. It slipped out by the skin of its teeth, but almost scathless, from the very jaws of the steel trap that were clos-

"Had Jellicoe turned 'towards' in stead of "away' the risks to his own fleet would not have been greater, while the German withdrawal would have been infinitely more dangerous,

It was brought out on the witness stand that the four alienists were to receive a fee of \$250 a day. The attorneys' fees would be stipulated by a committee composed of the officers of the bar association of Chicago.
