The Colonial Office

In the proposed re-organization of the British Colonial Office may be seen a significant indication of British statesmanship. That office was wholly inadequate during the earlier stages of Empire-building, and its machinery, more flexible and less wrought about with restrictions than that of most governmental departments, has been readjusted and extended from time to time in efforts to meet the steadily increasing strain upon it. But with the emergence of the Dominions from their purely colonial statute to that of self-government within the Empire, it became more and more clear that the Colonial Office administration was not flexible enough to permit of the continuous changes in

viewpoint and attitude towards purely Colonial and purely Dominion affairs and problems necessitated by the growth in enterprise and importance of the Dominions.

The Rt. Hon. Joseph Chamberlain was the first Colonial Secretary to realize the necessity of reorganization and the advisability of handling Dominion affairs separately from those of the colonies under direct Crown or partially elective systems of administration. He gave a great deal of time to the matter, and he did effect some important and useful reforms. But the Boer War interfered with his great scheme of reconstruction, and that of self-government within the Empire was left in abeyance, or at best merely tinkered with, for years, with a minor change here or a minor concession there. The result was a growing sense of irritation on the part of the Dominions that their status was not adequately recognized—an irritation not allayed by inefficient solutions and short-sighted sops to Caribbeans.

The proposal about to be implemented is one that should have been put into effect long ago. It will virtually divide the Colonial Office into two parts, one dealing exclusively with the Dominions and the other with the colonies. The proper perspective will thus be created and preserved. Business will be facilitated. There will be no confusion between the rights of the self-governing nations and those of the territories under Britain's elastic colonial administration. Canada, Australia, South Africa, New Zealand will all appreciate the change, for they will all realize the benefits derivable therefrom. This is wise legislation, worthy of the highest standards of that statesmanship which has made the British Empire the envy of all other great Powers in modern times.—Montreal Star.

Labor and Communism

Johannesburg Sunday Times: Communists are extremists—Bolsheviks disguised under another name—and it will be a bad day for the worker of South Africa if ever they allow Communism to dominate the Trade Un-

ions. The Communists in Great Britain were so fanatical and ignorant that they would not even give their own associates a chance to justify their doctrines in the eyes of the world. Their violence and prejudice did incalculable harm to Mr. Ramsay MacDonald's Labor Government, and if the accredited leaders of Labor grow

more and more inclined towards institutional methods it is largely because the ranting and raving of the "Left Wing" of the party fill them with a very natural disgust.

Nothing Heard of Amundsen's Polar Expedition Since Departure

Disastrous Earthquake Again Experienced in Japan—27 Lives Lost in a Gale on the French Coast—S. S. Fiona Ends Her Career in Bay of Fundy.

WRECK FOR QUAKE SUFFERERS.
TOKYO, May 24. Parties from warships sent to the Tajima District, northwest of Kobe, immediately following the earthquake on Saturday, in a report from the Navy Department estimate that the dead will probably number 300 and the injured one thousand. The warships were dispatched to the coast of Tajima with food, sanitary supplies and doctors, for Tokyo and Osaka, which suffered most severely where now they report relief work progressing rapidly.

EARTHQUAKE HORRORS.
OSAKA, Japan, May 25. The witnesses accounts from Tokyo and Kinoshiki, which are beginning to appear, agree that scenes of horror similar to those witnessed in Tokio and Yokohama, during the earthquake of September, 1923, were enacted there Saturday morning. The earthquake came very suddenly. The residents, panic-stricken, tried to escape to the open, but many were pinned down by falling debris and died in the process which quickly followed the shock. In Tokyo also a number of persons are reported to have been killed by hoppers falling from the hills. Fire, however, caused the worst suffering and casualties, the inflammable Japanese houses burning like tinder. In addition the water mains broke and the firemen were unable to get the flames. Drinking water is in short supply.

EARTHQUAKE DAMAGES.
LONDON, May 23. Despatches from Tokio to the Evening News said it is reported that the city of Kinoshiki was destroyed by earthquake, that a railroad train had been buried in the collapse of a tunnel near the Ashiya Han Silver Mines, which were reported to be greatly damaged by the collapsing tunnel.

OVER 200 DEAD IN QUAKE.
TOKYO, May 23. The Department of Communications announced to-day that more than 200 persons are believed to be dead in the earthquake this morning at Toyooka, and several hundred injured in an earthquake and fire at Kinoshiki, a famous resort visited by tourists. It is not believed any foreigners were victims.

MACMILLAN AND AMUNDSEN.
BOSTON, Mass., May 23. All the plans of Captain Donald D. Macmillan's Arctic expedition will be abandoned to the relief of Roald Amundsen, if Amundsen is not heard from before the Macmillan ships Bowdoin and Peary leave this country in June. Macmillan made this announcement this afternoon just prior to departure for his home in Maine.

NOTHING FROM AMUNDSEN.
NEW YORK, May 24. The North American newspaper Al-

liance was still without news from the Amundsen Ellsworth airplanes which left King's Bay, Spitzbergen, for a flight to the North Pole Thursday afternoon. The Alliance said it had received only meagre messages from Spitzbergen to the effect that weather conditions were still favorable.

ANOTHER TRAGEDY OF THE SEA.
QUIMPER, France, May 24. A great gale which is raging along the coast of Brittany took toll of at least 27 lives yesterday. Two small sailing vessels were in distress off Kerity and Penmarch, and the life-saving boats put out to rescue. An hour later both lifeboats were found dashed almost to pieces on the rocks off Penmarch with 15 or 16 livesavers dead, their bodies still strapped to the seats. They had perished in their attempt to rescue the men on the ships. The two vessels battled with the waves for a long time but eventually both were swept upon the great rocks guarding the coast and 12 men of the crews perished. Hundreds of the coast folk watched their struggles without power to aid them.

U. S. COLLECTING DEBTS.
WASHINGTON, May 23. The United States Government has taken steps to collect not only the debts owed by Europe but the reconstruction loans made after the armistice.

ANOTHER ATTEMPT TO ASSASSINATE JAP GENERAL.
TOKYO, May 25. The Vernacular Press printed an special despatches to-day that another attempt had been made to assassinate General Masatara Fukuda, Commander of the Tokio district during the martial law period, following the earthquake and fire of 1923. The new attempt, the despatches said, occurred last night. While the general was dining in a restaurant in Fukuya, a pistol bullet was fired through a window but went wild; the assailant escaped. It is believed the attempted assassination was retaliation for the slaying of the Socialist leader, Sakaye Ougui, shortly after the earthquake. Sakaye Ougui, a radical, and his wife and child were strangled to death by Captain Masahiko Amakazu, a Gendarmerie officer, on September 16th, 1923. He declared he committed the murders because Ougui's principles were a menace to peace.

BODY OF FIELD MARSHAL REMOVED TO LONDON.
DEAL, England, May 25. The body of the Earl of Ypres, formerly Field Marshal French, who died here Friday, was taken to London by motor hearse to-day. The removal of the coffin from the chapel in Deal Castle, where the Earl lived, was conducted with the utmost simplicity. There was no ceremony of any kind. Two nurses, who attended the Field

Marshal during his last illness were the only persons to accompany the body across the drawbridge of the castle. Outside the walls a great silent crowd, including many wives and mothers of men who fought under Field Marshal French's command in the World War, saluted as the coffin passed.

FORTY-FOUR DROWNED WHEN STEAMER FOUNDERS.
CONSTANTINOPLE, May 24. Forty-four passengers and members of the crew of a small Turkish coastal steamer were drowned when the vessel foundered yesterday at the entrance to the Bosphorus. A violent gale in the Angora section has done much damage and has cut off communication between Constantinople and Angora.

MISSING SINCE DECEMBER—FOUND IN THE THAMES.
LONDON, May 25. The body of a young woman, found in the River Thames, near Wapping, to-day was identified by relatives as that of the Hon. Gwyneth Elvira Morgan, daughter of Lord Tredegar. She disappeared about the middle of last December. Miss Morgan, who was under medical supervision at the time, slipped from her home during a dense fog, on the morning of Dec. 11. She wore only a suit of pajamas and a woolen dressing gown. Detectives from Scotland Yard conducted a most extensive but futile search through the British Isles and Continent. Her father is one of the wealthiest British peers and offered large sums for any news regarding her.

INCREASED TAXATION FOR FRANCE.
PARIS, May 25. Finance Minister Caillaux to-day introduced in the Chamber of Deputies a Bill proposing additional taxation for the remainder of the year, to bring in 1,600,000,000 francs. The Bill proposes to raise 3,500,000,000 francs by taxation next year.

PRESIDENT COOLIDGE UNWELL.
WASHINGTON, May 23. President Coolidge cancelled his engagements to-day because of illness. Officials said his indisposition was not serious.

FIONA'S CAREER ENDED.
YARMOUTH, N.S., May 24. The wooden Nfd. steamer Fiona, Capt. Llewellyn Blandford, struck on Trinity Ledges, at the entrance to the Bay of Fundy, yesterday, and became a total loss, catching fire soon after she was abandoned. The Fiona had a cargo of 3,000 sacks of potatoes for St. John's, Nfd., from Ormococt, N.B., and was proceeding down the Bay when she struck on the submerged ledges and started to settle down in the water. Captain Blandford and crew reached shore in a lifeboat, leaving the steamer half submerged aft. After reaching shore the crew noted that the steamer floated again but was low in the water. It was expected that the hulk would sink. The Fiona was built in Gosport, Eng., over 40 years ago, and had once been a yacht, later entering the Nfd. Government service at a revenue cutter.

A MINOR ACCIDENT.
WINNIPEG, May 24. An explosion at the assembling plant of the Ford Motor Company, on Portage Avenue, wrecked the entire fifth floor of the building this morning. Thirty men were on duty at the time but there were no serious casualties.

4 KILLED IN ACCIDENT IN FRONT OF TRAIN.
MOUNT CLEMENS, Mich., May 23. Four school boys were killed and three others seriously injured yesterday when an automobile, in which they were en route to Port Huron for a baseball game, went into a ditch, struck a telephone pole and turned over, spilling the occupants in the path of an interurban train.

AEROPLANE SERVICE TO OPERATE.
CHICAGO, May 23. The announcement that a \$10,000,000 corporation is expected to begin the operation of an express and freight airplane service between New York and Chicago, was followed yesterday with the announcement of further air transportation ventures, including a service between Chicago and New Orleans, and a proposed weekend service to the northern vacation resorts.

BRITISH STEAMER IN DISTRESS.
MARSEILLES, May 23. The British steamer, City of Valencia, is reported by wireless in distress in the Bay of Biscay, having lost her propeller, and asking for immediate assistance.

ANOTHER EARTHQUAKE IN JAPAN.
OSAKA, May 23. Two hundred houses were reported collapsed and numerous fires were raging to-day in the vicinity of Toyooka, a town of 7,000 people, eighty miles north west of Osaka as a result of an earthquake which sent the terrified citizens into the streets, fearing a

repetition of the Tokio 1923 disaster. The quake was continuous lasting several minutes. No detailed reports have been received here as to casualties, but it is believed they were comparatively few, as the Tajima Province in which the tremble was centered is thinly populated.

WEATHER FAVOURS AMUNDSEN.
OSLO, May 23. The Shipping Gazette reports weather conditions for Captain Amundsen's polar flight continue very favorable and that there is every hope of the expedition returning safely. The temperature is reported mild.

CHURCH CONFERENCE CONCLUDED.
BRUSSELS, May 23. The Conference at Malines for the discussion of the Union of Anglican and Roman Catholic Churches has ended but no conclusions were made public.

Food Perils

Poison Charges Against Cheese and Milk.

The fact that milk and cheese are answerable for a considerable proportion of food poisoning is established by a study of 100 recent cases made by Dr. William G. Savage and Dr. F.

Bruce White for the Medical Research Council. The report issued by the council Special Report Series, is a reminder of the danger from food at the present season, for 72 out of the 100 cases recorded occurred between May and October. The report shows that: Cheese was the cause in 8 outbreaks, one of the largest being in Warrington in 1922, when 140 people

were affected; there was no death. The cheeses at fault were 1 American cheddar, 1 Gorgonzola, 1 English, and 5 Canadian. Milk caused 5 outbreaks, but there was no death. Tinned salmon was answerable for 15; tinned beef for 15; sardines, crayfish, prawns, and fruit for 12 outbreaks.

Men Accept a Scheme of Joint Working.

To prevent the closing of Bedwas Navigation Colliery, Monmouthshire, the miners and management have devised a scheme of co-operation the basis of which is the pooling of the wages of three grades of men, riders, hauliers, and hitches.

Cuddihy's Boys' Club Closes
VARIETY MUSICAL AND ATHLETIC CLUB WINDS UP TWELVE YEAR EXISTENCE IN BLAZE OF GLORY.

Twelve years ago a boys' musical and athletic club was organized in connection with St. Andrew's Church by Professor R. J. Louis Cuddihy, an active member and an interested supporter of boys' work. The club became prominently known as the Variety Musical and Athletic Club, and to those who were in closer touch with its activities, the members were affectionately referred to as "Cuddihy's Boys." Last night in St. Anthony's Hall where the club was organized twelve years previously, and where its members have held many of their successful entertainments, the club at a final dinner and musical performance went actively out of existence. The final entertainment and banquet was tendered to the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Donnelly, pastor of St. Anthony's Church, and to the other esteemed patrons as a token of appreciation for the hearty co-operation given the club in its twelve years of success.

Clean Sport For Youngsters.
 When the club was organized by Mr. Cuddihy the main motive of it was to encourage clean sport amongst the young boys and the club sponsored Canada's national game, lacrosse, and many of the club members at the time in its inception have done well in senior leagues previous to the slump of the game in latter years. The musical section of the club have held many fine entertainments in aid of charitable institutions. Some of the parishes and societies which have benefited by the talent of "Cuddihy's Boys" are: St. Willibrod's-St. Thomas Aquinas, St. Michael's and St. Augustine's, the Little Sisters of The

Poor, The Alverna Catholic Association, The Salvus Regina Home for Working Boys, St. Bridget's Home, The Catholic Sailors' Club, The Sailors' Institute, The School for the Blind, St. Patrick's Orphanage, The Disabled Soldiers at the Military Hospital at St. Anne-de-Bellevue, The Gabriel's Sanitarium in the Adirondack Mountains and St. Anthony's Church.

The club in its years of existence has been made up of boys ranging in age from 6 to 16. The first year the membership totalled about 80 young boys, and the membership at the present time, with the club going out of existence, is about 40. During the twelve years Mr. Cuddihy has seen at least 500 boys grow into manhood while members of the club. Mr. Cuddihy is giving up the work of the club only through the fact that his health will not allow him to continue. That the boys all hold their "chief" in the highest esteem and affection was evidenced last night when the banquet came to an end, and each young member—some yet too young to attend school—came forward and shook hands heartily with him.

Although the organization went out of existence with the banquet, the boys intend to get together often and continue their performances.

The hall was beautifully decorated for the farewell banquet, and the club members table dined with boys from 6 to 10 years of age—and real manly little fellows they were. This, with the guests' table and the large table of patrons of the club, filled the large hall to capacity.

Previous to the actual festive part of the banquet a programme was put on by the boys and demonstrated the talent of the members. The programme included songs, recitations, "the Irish jig," cornet solo, zylphone solo, etc.

Farewell Address.
 The farewell address to Rt. Rev. Msgr. Donnelly and Rev. James J. Flood was read by Gerald O'Neill, one of the first members of the club who joined when 6 years old, and has been an active member for 13 years. The address thanked Rt. Rev. Msgr. Donnelly and Fr. Flood for their acts of kindness and encouragement given the club in the years of its existence, and as a token of appreciation the boys of the club presented Rt. Rev. Msgr. Donnelly with a beautiful pipe.

The address of thanks to the patrons and individuals who have helped the club along was also read by Gerald O'Neill.

Following the dinner a number of musical numbers were rendered and a recitation, "The Face On The Bar-room Floor," by Gerald O'Neill drew a tremendous applause from the hall. Songs were rendered by Gordon Patterson, "I Wonder What's Become of Sally"; and Paul Cadoux. The former is one of the youngest members of the club.

Home Office Ready for Action
AGAINST THE BOLSHEVICS.

The Home Secretary, Sir William Joynson-Hicks, who has been making a close study during the past few weeks of the spread of Bolshevist activity in this country, has now completed inquiries which will enable him, should the Government so decide, to take swift action against Bolshevist revolutionary plotters.

A number of conferences have just been held between the Home Office and the Special Branch of New Scotland Yard to consider means of frustrating the plotters.

The Home Secretary has powers to deport undesirable aliens, but the effectiveness of these is diminished by the diplomatic immunity granted by Mr. Ramsay MacDonald's Government to members of the Soviet diplomatic and trade delegations. Considerable headway in the spread of Bolshevist propaganda here has resulted from this immunity.

Meanwhile the Premier of New South Wales, Sir George Fuller proposes to set an example by deporting the Bolshevists in this country who are masquerading as Labor leaders.

Considerable anxiety was recently here by the bomb outrage in Sofia Cathedral, which was organized and financed by Moscow, and by the Communist riots in France and the discovery of murderous Bolshevist plots in Italy and elsewhere.

This anxiety was shown by the search by detectives of St. Margaret's, Westminster, before the funeral of the late Lord Rawlinson.

One of the results of the Home Office, New Scotland Yard conferences is that the police are closely watching all known Bolshevist propagandists in this country. The history of almost all the Bolshevists here is known, and it is because the authorities are daily informed of their actions and movements that there is a growing feeling in official circles that the whole gang should be cleared out at once.

There are about 700 Bolshevists plotting in England and Scotland to spread discontent and disorder.—Daily Mail.

Antarctic Whaling

Quebec Liquor Act

TO BE AMENDED, SO AS TO ALLOW ARRESTS WITHOUT WARRANTS.

MONTREAL, May 18.—According to the Montreal Gazette, amendments to the Quebec Liquor Act will be sought at the next session of the Legislature, as the result of a recent decision by Judge Moisset, of the Court of Special Sessions, who ruled that Liquor Commission Police cannot arrest without a warrant a customer who has bought liquor illegally.

The judgment has paralyzed the Commission Police in a campaign they had started to punish the client whose business induces others to transgress the law.

The Legislature will be asked to amend the law, so that the Agent of the Quebec Liquor Commission who has introduced himself into premises and witnessed a person buying liquor from one not authorized to sell it, may then and there arrest the client for being in possession of liquor irregularly acquired.

Tips in Liners

NEW SCALE PROMULGATED BY U.S. GOVERNMENT.

New York.—"What ought I to tip my steward?"

For Transatlantic travellers a highly official decision on this much-discussed question has been promulgated by the State Department. It was reached only after a sharp controversy between the Secretary of State, Mr. Kellogg, and the Comptroller-General in Washington.

Mr. Kellogg contended that attaches from the London and Rome Embassies were doing the correct thing when at the end of the voyage they disbursed gratuities of \$2 2s. each to the bedroom and dining-room stewards. He pointed out that before the war \$1 is a sufficient tip, but that now stewards expected double that amount.

The Comptroller, however, refused to endorse the expense accounts embodying these tips.

The controversy was carried to the Secretary of the Treasury, Mr. Mellon, who gave a decision adverse to that of the Secretary of State. The Comptroller, accordingly, has ruled that American diplomats' tips shall not exceed \$1 is. for cabin and dining-room stewards and 15c. for the bathroom steward, and that all tips to the smoking-room, library, lounge, and boot stewards shall henceforth be disallowed by the Government.

Many brokerage houses have constantly recommended switching into stocks like Frisco and Southern Railway, added to which has been the influence of a preponderance of favorable earnings, dividend actions and stock market sensations.

CUBA CANE SUGAR CORPORATION.
Passed Estimate of 4,200,000 Cane—Should Reach 4,500,000—Low Prices Cut Profits.

Boston—On Tuesday the production of the Cuba Cane Sugar Corporation crossed the 4,300,000-bag mark, thus exceeding the company's estimate for the season. Unless prevented by rains Cuba Cane should be able to boost its final out-turn to 4,500,000 bags. There is cane enough for an additional 200,000 bags. Only two of the 14 mills grinding this crop have so far shut down.

If realized, this crop of 4,500,000 bags would represent the largest yield of sugar since the company was organized late in 1915. The nearest approach to it is the crop of 1918-1919, amounting to 4,319,189 bags.

Of course the usual accompaniment of a large crop, viz. low prices, is bound to affect the financial exhibit for the fiscal year to end next Sept. 30. In the year 1922-1923 Cuba Cane earned \$15.92 a share on its 500,000 shares of preferred. This favorable result was accomplished on an out-turn of \$3,682,291 bags and a market of sugar ranging from a high of 5 1/2 cents c. & f. reached in February, to a low of three cents c. & f. in June, with a rally of 4 1/2 cents at the close of the company's fiscal year.

This year the production promises to be some 800,000 bags or 25% larger, but the market has been as low as 5 1/2 cents a pound, with the present price 1/2 higher. Costs have been unusually low this crop, which, combined with the larger yield, will to some extent compensate for the lower selling prices. However, it is obvious that the operating profits for the current fiscal year will look rather attenuated in comparison with the two previous years. The exact results will of course depend upon the price realized by the company for its uncolored sugar. All of the colored sugar has been sold, but the company retains a considerable part of its own sugar. It is estimated that on the sugar yet to be sold 1/2 cent per pound is equivalent to \$700,000. Thus if there is a rally of any consequence from the 2 1/2 level for raws Cuba Cane will have a welcome increment to its profits for the year.

The decline in sugar prices has naturally made preferred dividends for Cuba Cane a less live topic for discussion. However, the profits of the prosperous 1923 and 1924 years retained in the business greatly strengthened the balance sheet position. The date when consideration will be given to resumption of preferred dividends now rests with the economic forces which dictate the price of the company's product.

Decline in earnings the first quarter was less severe than in 1921, compared with 1920, but it appeared so because of steady improvement between 1921 and 1924. Yet gross of \$41,006,000 for first three months was greater than in 1921 or 1922, and net of \$5,842,000 was in contrast to \$2,979,000 in first quarter of 1921. Gross was down 11 per cent, and net 32 per cent this year from 1924, while in 1923 gross was off 16 per cent, and net off 79 per cent.

Gross in April continued behind a year ago during first half of the month, but improved later, and the month's gross is expected to show less decline than in March, when it fell 12 per cent, behind a year ago. Loadings for four weeks ended May 2, were 75,741, decrease of 2,656 or 3 per cent from a year ago, a small decrease, but one not shared with most other western roads.

Northern Pacific, Burlington and Western Pacific were the only other important roads in northwestern and central western districts to show decreases.

Effects of Crops Upon Traffic.
There is no close parallel between first quarter of 1924 and 1921, however, since in 1921 business the country over was depressed. Union Pacific's trouble this year has been a local one, the consequence of unfavorable weather and crops in 1924.

There was a decrease in agricultural products from states west of the Rockies throughout the winter, due to damage to crops from frosts and droughts in 1924. These uncertainties retarded building and buying. Shipments of automobiles decreased substantially, as the previous year too many cars were shipped into the territory and had to be absorbed.

Although it is too early this year to forecast size and quality of the crops, evidence available leads the management to expect more agricultural tonnage than last year. Extreme cold weather has been lacking and precipitation heavier.

Speculative Favor Shifting?
The 15-point decline from March high of 152 1/2-2 is by no means unusual with Union Pacific, especially in view of selling pressure on stocks of central western and northwestern carriers. Late last summer Union Pacific dropped 10 points within a month from 147, and in 1923 there were three separate weak periods. In April, 1923, it declined from 142 1/2 to 132, and in May from 138 to 128 3/4. In November it fell from 134 to 124. In October of 1922 it fell nearly 14, from 152 3/8 to 136 7/8.

Union Pacific is not a northwestern road, but to extent that its northern branch serves Idaho, Oregon and Washington, and main line connects at various points between Omaha and Ogden with northwestern roads, its earnings are affected by the same influences as the northwestern group.

If large individual holdings of Union Pacific stock have been liquidated the past year, they have not been distributed, since number of stockholders.



Cattle Inspection

In the last issue of the Nfld. Gazette appear the Rules and Regulations relating to the Inspection of Cattle...

The Rules and Regulations provide for the physical examination and the testing for tuberculosis by the Veterinary Inspector of Cattle and Meats of all animals kept for the production of milk and also of dairy bulls.

Sections 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14 and 15 of the Rules and Regulations dealt with the inspection of cattle imported from abroad...

Chapter 40 Section 2 of the Consolidated Statutes declares that such Regulations "should be notified by proclamation, or published in the Royal (now the Newfoundland) Gazette..."

Our attention having been called to the publication of the Regulations, a visit was paid to the premises of Messrs. Shea & Co. on Saturday where a large consignment of cattle, consisting of cows, bulls, and oxen, as well as horses, sheep and pigs had just been unloaded from the Hitherwood.

In order to remind the Inspector of his duty, if there be such an official, and for the information of the public, we quote Section 9 of the Regulations: "All dairy cattle and all cattle or animals intended for food imported into Newfoundland shall be subject to inspection on arrival by a Veterinary Inspector."

Rules and Regulations of themselves are of no more value than the paper on which they are printed until the authorities see that they are enforced. Last year we were informed that a Veterinary Inspector had been appointed, but whether there was any official notification of the fact or not, or whether the official was given full authority to carry out his duties, we are not in a position to say.

Miners Decide to Fight to a Finish

During Thursday and Friday of last week a convention of the Mine Workers of District 26 was held in Sydney, and it was hoped that some decision would be arrived at by which the strike might be concluded.

The President of the United Mine Workers of America, Mr. John R. Lewis, has informed the workers that it is impossible to increase the amount of \$10,000 a week, which they are at present receiving from headquarters, owing to the number of other strikes in the United States which have to be financed.

In this connection, the Prime Minister Hon. W. S. Monroe has received the following message from the Relief Committee:—

There have been no negative votes, but 200 districts are yet to be heard from.

Fire on Topsail Road FORGE DESTROYED.

The Central firemen were notified by telephone this morning that a fire was in progress on the premises of Mrs. M. J. Neville at the junction of Cockpit and Topsail Roads. General Manager of the Railway

RETURNS FROM ENGLAND. Mr. H. J. Russell, General Manager of the Railway, returned from England via the cross country express yesterday in company with Mrs. Russell. While on the other side Mr. Russell visited the Barrow Hematite Co. at Barrow-in-Furness, where the rails for the re-railing of the road are being made. During his visit he paid particular attention to railway affairs, and through the courtesy of the London, Midland and Scottish Railways was able to follow up the operations of their system. He visited the Newfoundland exhibit at Wembley in company with Capt. Victor Gordon, the Nfld. High Commissioner, and D. James Davies, and was very pleased with all he saw. He was particularly impressed with the fishery exhibit. The various species of fish are shown in glass cases as if swimming, and plaster casts have been made to show our dried cod. He also visited the plant where the two steam coaches are being built, as ordered by the Government some two months ago. These are already assembled, and the machinery is being put in place. They will be used to expedite the local service between St. John's and Kelligrews. It is the management's intention to operate them morning and evening between these two points, and between the depot and Bowring Park during the day. Good progress is being made on the new steamer Caribou under construction in Holland. Capt. Stevenson states that the ship will give every satisfaction, and will greatly improve the Gulf service. The Caribou is expected to arrive here about the end of July, and will be ready to take up the service early in August.

Believes Amundsen in Safe

PORTLAND Maine, May 25. "Because no word has been received from Roald Amundsen there is no reason yet for believing he is lost." Lieut. Commander Donald L. MacMillan, the Arctic explorer, said today. He expressed the opinion that Amundsen has a good chance to come through safely although it may take weeks or even months.

Two Men Swept Overboard

SOO, Mich., May 26. Joseph, first mate, and Leo C. Malone, wheelman, of the str. Penteco, St. Michael were washed overboard from the vessel in the north west storm which swept Lake Superior Sunday night.

Confidence Expressed in Amundsen

OSLO, May 26. While tentative plans for relief expeditions are discussed, experienced Arctic explorers are still confident in the ability of Capt. Amundsen and his five companions to return safely from the airplane flight to the North Pole. 

Adventist Church

"Obedience is the highest form of worship, nothing else will take its place." Thus spoke Elder Manuel Sunday evening in opening his discourse on "The Sin of Having Our Own Way." Continuing he said in part: "The conditions on which eternal life may be obtained to-day are exactly the same as they were before man sinned, namely—perfect obedience to God's requirements. Had man remained obedient sin and death would not have entered. It was disobedience that brought death. Obedience will bring life. We must win where Adam failed. We cannot do this in our own strength, but God will not take this as an excuse. He has provided a way whereby we may be obedient. If ye be willing and obedient, ye shall eat the good of the land." Isa. 1:9. "Blessed are they that do his commandments, that they may have a right to the tree of life, and may enter in through the gates into the city." Rev. 22:14.

"It does not do for us to offer God a substitute for obedience, neither can we blame someone else for our sin. King Saul offered sacrifice to God instead of obedience and tried to blame his sin on someone else (see 1 Sam. 15), but the message came to him, 'Hath the Lord as great delight in burnt offerings and sacrifices as in obeying the voice of the Lord? Behold to obey is better than sacrifice and to hearken than the fat of rams. For rebellion is as the sin of witchcraft, and stubbornness is as iniquity and idolatry.'

"There are thousands to-day who are offering as an excuse for not keeping God's Holy Sabbath, the fact that many others are breaking it, but their sin is no excuse for us. What difference to us what others do. What God has told us what we should do? Peter was much concerned about what John should do. Jesus answered, 'If I will that he tarry till I come, what is that to thee? Follow thou me.' (John 21:22). 'Christ is our pattern. He says follow me. He left us an example that we should follow his steps. 'The life of Christ was a life of obedience. He became 'obedient unto death, even the death of the Cross.' (Phil. 2:8). When we who have been disobedient accept by faith His life of obedience—we accept Him as our Saviour, God looks upon us as though we had never sinned. More than this, Christ changes the heart. He abides in the breast of every truly converted man, by faith. He keeps the law in us. As the law was written in the heart of Christ so when Christ lives in us the law will be written in our hearts, and we will delight to do God's will as He did."

The discourse closed with an earnest appeal, to which several responded in rising to their feet to Christ, accepting Him as their Saviour, pledging themselves by His grace to be obedient to all of God's Commandments. An earnest prayer season concluded the evening's service.

When Roman Empire Was Sold by Auction

In chapter 5, volume 1, of Gibbon's "Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire," one reads how the Praetorian Guard sold to the highest bidder the Roman Empire. This historic auction occurred on March 28, 193 A.D. They had just killed the Roman Emperor, Pertinax Sulpicianus. The father-in-law of the murdered emperor aspired to succeed his son-in-law on the throne. A number of the Praetorian Guard announced from the top of the Roman wall that the Roman Empire was for sale and asked for bids.

Didius Julianus, wealthy Roman senator, was the successful bidder and was crowned Emperor. The senate and nobles ratified the contract, but the common people, who had gloried in the reputation and prestige of Rome, rose. The armies in Britain, when they heard of the sale, revolted. So did the armies in Syria and Illyricum. They announced that Septimius Severus, commander of the Pannonian legions, was to be Emperor. The senate bowing to popular fury, condemned Didius Julianus to death and he was executed two months after he had bought the throne and Severus was made Emperor.



The Indestructible Redwood

Among the oldest living things in the world to-day are the California redwood trees. Such is the generally accepted verdict of naturalists, we are told by P. M. Schmoek, writing in American Forests (Washington); but the fact is by no means so well known, he declares, that the wood of fallen redwood trees may remain sound for hundreds of years. But how, it may be asked, can this be proved, since California has not been inhabited by record-keeping civilized man for more than three or four generations? The answer is found in observation of certain natural phenomena, which the writer thus describes:

"Recently there was discovered in the forests of Humboldt County, California, a fallen giant of some past age upon whose prone trunk there is growing a veritable small grove of living trees. The old redwood is 10 feet in diameter at the butt and 186 feet long from its upturned roots to the point where the top of the tree broke off when it crashed to the ground.

"Growing out of the dirt and debris collected on its top surface are eleven living trees—nine Western hemlocks and two Sitka spruces. The roots of these trees find their way to the ground on either side of the massive trunk of the redwood. The largest of the young trees is a Sitka spruce 61 inches in diameter and about 170 years old. A hemlock 25 inches in diameter was 130 years old.

"Borings into the old redwood at different points showed its wood to be as sound and durable as the day it fell to earth, two hundred or more years ago. A ring-count gave its age as about six hundred years when the fall occurred.

"Within a mile of this point were found several similar examples of living trees growing over old redwoods. In one case there were three hemlocks—235, 250, and 340 years old, respectively—growing directly over a redwood 78 inches in diameter. This old tree was also in a sound condition after resting on the ground possibly four hundred years."




The Resistance of the Rheostat
EDITED BY JOHN M. CLAYTON.

There still seems to be a great deal of confusion over the proper type of rheostat to be used when using a different number of tubes in parallel, and when using different tubes, too. In the figure above we show at A a single tube; at "B" two tubes in parallel and at "C" three tubes in parallel. In each case we are showing only one rheostat to control the group of tubes. Now what resistance shall this rheostat have?

If you are using UV-201-A (C-301-A) tubes and a 6-volt A battery, for one tube the rheostat should have a resistance of 20 ohms, and should be capable of safely carrying one-quarter of an ampere. For two tubes this resistance need not be greater than 15 ohms (capable of carrying one-half ampere) and for three tubes the correct total resistance is 6 ohms. In the latter case the rheostat must carry at least three-quarters of an ampere.

The UV-199 tubes require a resistance of 50 ohms for one tube, for two tubes in parallel twenty ohms for two tubes in parallel and ten ohms for three tubes in parallel. This is assuming that the A battery is three standard No. 6 Dry cells, or two cells of a storage battery of three cells of an Edison battery. If a 6-volt battery is used the rheostat for one tube should have a resistance of 50 ohms, for two tubes 40 ohms and for three tubes 30 ohms. The current consumed by three of the UV-199's is only 0.18 of an ampere.

Ordinarily such high resistance rheostats are not available at the average radio store. However it is generally possible to buy a fixed resistance unit which can be connected in series with a rheostat whose resistance is not high enough.

If each of your tubes are equipped with a filament rheostat you will require the rheostat necessary for the one tube of your type. If there are combinations whereby one tube is controlled by one rheostat and several other tubes by a different rheostat the values will be the same as given above, both for the single control rheostat and for the rheostat which controls a number of tubes.

How Clarence Dillon

OBTAINED CONTROL OF DODGE.

How Clarence Dillon, head of Dillon, Read & Company, succeeded in obtaining control of the famous Dodge Brothers automobile works in what is perhaps the greatest transaction in American industrial history is described in an interesting article by B. C. Forbes, in Forbes Magazine (N.Y.) Here are the facts:

Dillon's Dodge coup can be described briefly. During the early part of 1924 the Dillon firm was invited to study the balance sheets with a view to undertaking some financing. Shortly thereafter it was ascertained that certain members of the Dodge families were anxious to have the whole business sold. John Dodge, who died in January, 1920, and Horace E. Dodge, who died less than a year after, had each left 50 per cent. of the stock to their widows. Thus, neither could sell control. Negotiations dragged.

Towards the end of the year, however, the information was conveyed that the property probably could be purchased if a sufficiently attractive cash bid was made. J. P. Morgan & Company were also informed of this and were invited to submit a bid. The Morgan-General Motors interests made a thorough investigation and let it be known that they would present an offer.

The newspapers have published many columns of the dramatic events which preceded and attended the opening of the two bids. Imagination was freely mixed with fact by the newspaper writers. Stories of races from New York to Detroit between special trains and airships were played up under sensational headlines, as were midnight conferences, powerful wirepulling, etc., etc. The Morgan interests and the Dillon interests were luridly pictured as ready to tear each other's throats.

Most of this was either mythical or grossly exaggerated. Each party naturally was intensely interested in the opening of the bids. It is characteristic of Mr. Dillon's undemonstrative way of doing things that he stayed in his office in New York and did not journey to Detroit for the eventual presentation and opening of the bids. It is also characteristic of his simplicity and directness that his bid was compressed into about half-a-dozen lines written on ordinary letter-paper. The Morgan bid, which was opened first, consisted of two proposals, one offering \$124,650,000 cash, or, as an alternative, \$65,000,000 cash and \$90,000,000 in notes, to be paid off at the rate of \$10,000,000 a year, without interest. The Dillon bid was for \$152,000,000 minus dividends paid since January 1, all in cash.

The Dillon bid was accepted. Nobody was more astonished than Mr. Dillon at the hubbub the newspapers created, and it was peculiarly distasteful to him to be pictured as waging "farfare" against the House of Morgan. To Mr. Dillon there was nothing more than the rivalry which usually attends any important financial transaction. In other words, it was all in the day's work.

Wool Sales to be Cut Short

While experts cannot agree upon a definite cause for the slump in wool prices the position has become so serious that the authorities have decided to curtail the sales now proceeding at the Wool Exchange.

At a meeting of the Colonial wool importers, selling brokers and buyers recently, it was determined that the sales should cease on May 14. Ordinarily the sales would have continued until about May 20.

During the last three days about 36,000 bales have been catalogued for sale, but approximately 50 per cent. has been withdrawn.

It is estimated that the slump in wool prices has cost the trade as a whole more than £20,000,000, while several individual losses of £250,000 are reported. Market conditions are stated never to have been so bad in the memory of those with 30 and 40 years' experience of the trade. Some of the reasons advanced for this condition of affairs are:

Speculation in Colonial wool last year and a consequent boom in prices, resulting in what have proved to be prohibitive prices to the consumer.

Pressure by the banks, compelling holders to sell at any cost.

Inexpert advice founded on wrong influences control the market. "There is no section of the wool industry which is not affected," said a Yorkshire spinner. "Some manufacturers and spinners find themselves loaded with wool for which they had to pay top price and now have to sell very much cheaper." Daily Mail, May 8.

If I tell you that I have recently renewed my youth by making my muscles take the place of gasoline—in other words, riding a bicycle—perhaps you can guess I have been.

The little island whose inhabitants have so far been wise enough (I understand the vote is getting closer every year) to forbid automobiles to take away the charm of their lovely country.

The only thing I would like changed at that country is that I wish it a little more level ground instead of being somewhat the contour of a roller coaster.

Power Versus Gasoline Power.

Hills, since we have had automobiles, have rather lost their significance, but get on a bicycle and they suddenly become significant again, barely hangs my tale.

She is in the prime of life now, vigorous and well. She can, and does do all sorts of things. How perfectly futile to invite a problematical future to cast its shadow over to-day's joy.

There is an old Latin proverb: "Dum vivimus vivamus!"—While we live, let us live.

I recommend it to all with this unhappy turn of mind.





UNWISE CHARITY.

To Richard Roe I gave ten cents when he came to my door with plaintive sighs and loud lamentations; his heart and feet were sore; I always hand to busted cents some seven cents or more. And a l w a y's there is some one near to chide me for the gift; some statistician-dear and drear will to my portal drift, and from a rickel old and queer some printed forms he'll lift. He has the figures which will show such handouts never pay; the coin bestowed on Richard Roe is money thrown away; let him to Welfare Experts go, and for assistance pray. The charity that's organized will deal with every case; 'twill do its work as advertised, and feed the hobo's face; the statistician is surprised to note my methods base. The statistician, full of facts, discourages long and loud; he reads me documents and tracts which leave my spirit bowed; he roasts me for my thoughtless acts, which pauperize the crowd. But he has never been a tramp or trained with alms, or eaten in-a roadside camp from old tomato cans; he is a man of higher stamp, who rides in green sedans. But I have walked the railway ties and ridden on the rods, and bedded down with frowny guys where mattresses were sods; I've lived with hoboes and I'm wise to public welfare wads. And so I do not answer "No," when Richard comes along, and give me, in the evening glow, the same old dance and song; I hand him seven cents or so, although my course be wrong.

Salad Beauty

Few women appreciate the benefit to the complexion that can be obtained by the application of two ordinary salad vegetables.

Lettuce, used externally, is invaluable for the complexion and is splendid for removing sunburn, and the juice of the lettuce leaf is said to have healing properties. The vegetable is prepared in this way: Pour a quart of boiling water over half a peck of full-grown outside lettuce leaves. After about ten minutes draw off the water and chop the leaves finely.

Put them into a soft, clean cloth and wring out all the juice that can be extracted from them into a porcelain pan or dish and boil it for four minutes. There should be about four tablespoonfuls of green liquor, which should be set aside until wanted later.

Then take half an ounce each of white wax and spermaceti and four ounces of oil of almonds. Melt them together in a vessel placed in a saucepan of hot water. Stir the mixture occasionally, and when quite smooth add the lettuce juice and mix thoroughly. Pour it into small porcelain jars with screw tops ready for use.

There are few things which help better to retain and produce the clear, rosy complexion for which English women are famous throughout the world than cucumber. Cut into slices, it is excellent for rubbing over the skin to keep it soft and white. Cucumber soap is used by many women, and a cucumber wash applied to the skin after exposure to keen winds is extremely beneficial.

Peel one or two large cucumbers, cut them into slices, and place them in a double boiler, which should be closely covered. Cook them slowly until they are soft. Then put the pieces into a fine linen bag and squeeze them until all the juice has been extracted. Add to the extracted juice one-fourth of rectified spirits of wine (or whiskey) and one-third of elder-flower water. Shake the mixture well and pour into small bottles ready for use.

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

EARTHQUAKE DAMAGES.

NEW YORK, May 25.

A cablegram received to-day by the Japanese Toyooka Consulate General states that the probable number dead and wounded from the earthquake in Japan is 800. Toyooka with 2,000 families homeless, Kinosaki with 700, and Kumishama with 400 are the principal towns that suffered. The message says Toyooka and Kinosaki were said to have been destroyed mainly by fire. No further anxiety for the stricken region is felt according to the cablegram. Railway communications were established the day after the quake, it says, and relief work is progressing satisfactorily.

THOUSANDS PAY LAST TRIBUTE TO LATE FIELD MARSHAL.

LONDON, May 25.

The body of the Earl of Ypres, who as Field Marshal French was in supreme command of the British forces in France in the early part of the war, was brought to London to-day from his home in Deal where he died last week. The body was cremated and to-night the ashes rested in the chapel of the Irish Guards, Wellington Barracks, beneath a collection of tattered regimental banners. More than two thousand people reverently filed past the coffin to-night during the few hours the chapel was open. The coffin is covered with the Union Jack with the Field Marshal's sword, baton, and helmet and a single wreath from the widow laid upon it. Four Irish Guardsmen with reversed arms are keeping watch. Marshal Joffre arrived in London to-night from France with a detachment of Poilus for the funeral services at Westminster Abbey to-morrow. After the service the ashes will be taken to Ripple Vale, the Field Marshal's birthplace, where a private interment will be conducted.

DUKE OF NORTHUMBERLAND MADE K.G.

LONDON, May 25.

The King to-day appointed the Duke of Northumberland a Knight of the Garter. The appointment was for the purpose of filling the vacancy caused by the death of Marquis Curzon of Kedleston.

FINANCE BILL PASSES SECOND READING.

LONDON, May 25.

In the House of Commons to-night Winston Churchill, Chancellor of the Exchequer, secured the second reading of the Finance Bill embodying his Budget proposals. The bill passed its second reading after closure was applied and carried, and Phillip Snowden's motion to reject the bill was defeated by 331 to 149.

300 KILLED BY EXPLOSION IN MUKDEN.

PEKING, May 25.

Three hundred persons are reported to have been killed or injured in a great explosion in the Mukden Arsenal. The blast occurred in the middle of the night from some unknown cause, and buildings a thousand yards distant were demolished.

MANY ICEBERGS IN SHIPPING ROUTE.


HALIFAX, May 25.

Captain Wolf of the United States coastguard cutter Modoc in port to-day from the North Atlantic ice patrol, stated that there were sixty snow and shaved icebergs in the steamer lanes, and nineteen additional bergs not definitely identified. Bombardment of the bergs had not proved effective in breaking them up, he said, and a new type of mine has to be experimented with. The Modoc was relieved by the Tampa, and will remain in port until about June 4. Judging from the prevalence of large bergs, Capt. Wolf said, he judged the patrol would be kept up until July 1.

KING BORIS SIGNS DEATH WARRANTS.

SOFIA, May 25.

King Boris of Bulgaria, an enemy of capital punishment, to-day confirmed the death sentences of the three men who took part in the Sveti Kral Cathedral bombing, in which 160 people were killed. These are the first death sentences King Boris ever has approved. He declared the plot justified the court martial's extreme

TORONTO, Ont., May 25.—In one of the most spectacular finishes in history of the King's Plate, J. C. Fletcher's three-year-old filly, Fairbank, won the sixty-sixth renewal of the great Canadian turf classic here yesterday, before a crowd variously estimated at from 20 thousand to 25 thousand. Fairbank won in the last stride by a nose from Duchess, of the Sagran Stables. Jean Crest was third, four lengths away.

Junior Football League.

After the minutes of the preceding meeting were read and confirmed the annual reports of the Secretary and Treasurer were read and adopted. The annual election of officers took place and resulted as follows:— President—J. A. Clancy, re-elected. Vice-President—W. S. Sparks, elected. Treasurer—F. J. Kavanagh, re-elected.

Secretary—M. J. Power, re-elected. Auditors—R. J. Kent, T. J. Dalton.

The teams for the year then entered. Five of last year's teams are again in the field, viz., Holy Cross, Wesley, B.I.S., Gaelic, T.A. The Cadets and Boy Scouts are not playing this year. Applications were read from two new teams the, Cochrane Street Church Young Men's Club and the Mount Cashel Old Boys' Association. After due consideration it was decided to allow these teams to enter.

The President announced that Messrs. Higgins and Hunt had again offered to supply a cup in place of the one that had been won outright by the Holy Cross team last year. A hearty vote of thanks was passed to the gentlemen for this generous offer in the interest of sport.
