All the debate, all the investigations, into Irish grievances, all the remedies proposed, and all the sures rejected, all the fuss and furore, ources rejected, all the fuss and furore, and declarations of, willingness to do what was right, if what was right could only be determinately fixed, have even-tuated in a flash in the pan, and no more. So it has been for years, and the present action of the House of Commons is very far from assuring the Irish people or the world, that it shall not be so for a long time to come. Wrongs are acknowledged, but they are unredressed, and between four and five millions of people are left to grown in poverty all of which they have not brought on themselves how thriftless soever many of them may be. 
Latest From Ottawa. Despatches from Ottawa state the discussion on Mr. Connell's motion for a committee to consider the expendi-ture of the House showed a bitter tone than has been before exhibited in this Parliament. The Government were fairly alarmed, and made all sorts of promises if the motion were only with drawn. The public Accounts Com-mittee has done nothing yet. The public expenditures for the past few years have undergone no examination at all for two or three years. There are several matters that this commit-tee ought to sift; but like the Con-tingencies Committee, is neglecting it duties.
