Bank of England Forgeries. Arrest of Austin Bidwell.

Havana, March 21.—On the strength of cable despatches from London, the police here have arrested Austin Byron Bidwell, alias Warren, his wife, and Harry Van, servant. Bidwell is supposed to be the principal operator on the recently discovered frauds on the Bank of England, and answers to the description telegraphed by the London police. Travelling with an American passport he went through France into Spain, and reached Santander, where he embarked on. a French steamer for Havana. The steamer arrived here on Saturday, when the whole party were taken into custody. Bidwell and his servant Van are in gaol, and forbidden to hold conversation with anyone or each other. The lady was permitted to remain at the hotel, where she is under the surveillance of the police. Although there is no extradition treaty between Spain and Great Britain, the authorities will send the whole party back to London, if the proper proofs are furnished. A detective is expected here from England soon to identify and take charge of the prisoners. It is stated that the confessions of Noyes, the confederate now under arrest in London, firmly implicates Eidwell in the forgeries.





Failure of the Windsor and Detroit Tunnel.

From the Essex Record.

The Detroit River Tunnel Bubble has been pricked, much his immense nothing has passed into the things that were. The Canada Sonthern has obtained all the legal privileges it desired, despite every subterfuse and stratagem of its opponents, and in a month or two will be fully competent to successfully compete for the carrying trade of the great west; and finding all their little plans, including the much vanuted international underground highway humburg, successfully circumvented, Mr. Joy and his friends at last have come to realize that their folly is not only very oppressing to them, but admirably calculated to keep them in the distant rear in the race for patronage for many a year. Now, the policy that should have been adopted by the Michigan Central monarch, (who also sways the destinies of the Great Western) at the outset—we might doubtless say would have actuated him had he been moved by a desire simply to benefit shippers, and not to block all opposition and hold at any cost the monopoly of transportation—is being pursued. The only feasible, and therefore the only correct way of overcoming the difficulties of winter navigation of the River, is to bridge the great stream; and premission to construct a bridge is now being applied for on both sides of the line. This year will in all probability be consumed in obtaining charters, and not till 74 need we expect to see the work really commenced. Two years more will be essential for the building, and hence, while the Central and Western will for all that time be in no better position than in the past so far as this matter is concerned, the Southren will enjoy at Amherstburg and possibly also at St Clair, facilities ample for transferring all the cars their road can accommodate.
