The annual Spring Show of the Guelph Horticultural Society took place in the Drill Shed on Tuesday. The display in the several classes was not so large nor as good as we have seen at previous Exhibitions.partly on account of the season, and partly because there were not so many exhibitors as in former years. There was; however, a very excellent assortment of flowers, though it was not so rich as regards variety. Mr. Horsman was almost the only exhibitor of green house plants. In the class of ordinary window plants, Messrs, Tansley, Sunley and Mann were the most prominent exhibitors, and showed some beautiful plants. There was a very good show of roses and sweetwilliams. There was a very small show of cut flowers, and far behind what we have seen in Guelph. Mrs. Hogge and Mrs. Sporby were the first prize takers for their pactty bouquets, and Mr. Wm. Thompson, of Puslinch, got the first for his nice collection of native flowers.
