Yesterday morning a Chinaman named Duck Ling summoned Mr. Brown, caretaker of the Outer Wharf, for assaulting him on the wharf on the occasion of the arrival of the last China steamer. Mr. Walker, who appeared on behalf of the complainant, and stated the case to the magistrate as being one not brought forward against the defen-dant so much on account of iojnries inflicted on his client, for there had not been any, but simply in order to vindicate the equal rights of Chinamen and white men os pub-lio property, and to show officious people that Chinese were men just as much as those of any other nationality.
