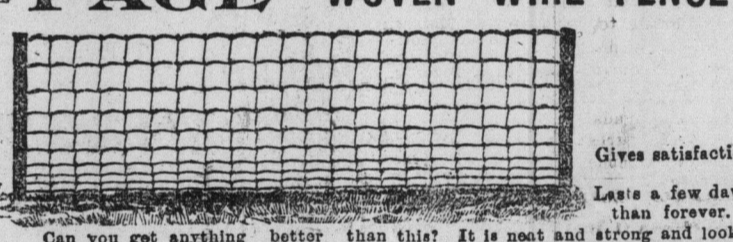

TWENTY YEARS' SIEGE

THE STORY OF A WELL-KNOWN GREENVILLE COUNTY MAN.

Our Free Libraries. The total number of books issued to the public in 1894 from the Central and branch libraries was 538,727, divided as follows: Central 353,337 Western 87,773 Southern 45,830 Dundas-street 39,860 Eastern 38,943

Of this great number of books borrowed, 246,417 were works of fiction, apportioned thus: Central 143,390 Western 34,299 Southern 28,523 Dundas-street 21,920 Eastern 18,943

The proportion is exactly 46 per cent. on the total of volumes lent. Books for juvenile readers come next, and here some inexplicable cause the Eastern branch is far and away ahead of all the others. The numbers and order read thus: Central 44,148 Eastern 12,445 Western 10,543 Dundas-street 8,544 Northern 9,027

The proportion in this last class is 35 per cent. on the total of books lent. Magazines make a very bad thing, their ratio being but 12.00; then come reference books, 6.1; periodicals, which were lent in 1894 from the Central and branch libraries, 3.92 to be accounted for. LOAN COMPANIES.

The loan companies of this province have been handicapped the past year, owing to the extremely low rates ruling for money. In consequence of the general distress in trade and commerce, deposits with these companies have greatly increased, so that it has become necessary to reduce the rates on these accounts.

Prices of loan company issues have been unusually quiet for months past, and the majority of them have maintained their value. Central Canada Loan is one that shows an advance, its shares being 2 per cent higher at the present time than they were a year ago. The reserve of this company amounts to \$315,000, and its paid-up capital consists of \$875,000 in old stock and \$250,000 in new. It pays quarterly dividends of 1 1/2 per cent.

Western Canada Loan is one of the companies that pays its shareholders a high rate—10 per cent. per annum. It presents a good statement for 1894 and its stock is at 161. The reserve of this company is \$770,000, and its paid-up capital \$1,000,000 in old and \$500,000 in new stock.

A QUESTION OF PATENT. Arising Out of the Fibreware Made by the Eddy Company of Hall.

A case of interest, to manufacturers particularly, is pending before the courts at this moment. It is, in its amended form, that of the Queen v. Thomas A. Eddy. Originally it was the Queen v. E. B. Eddy.

The information in the original case was laid by one Allan Austin, residing in the directory as a traveler for Taylor, Scott & Co., and residing at 157 Gerrard-street east, Toronto. The charge read: "That he (E. B. Eddy) did unlawfully offer for sale and sell a certain fibre wash basin as a patented article, the same not being patented in Canada, with intent to deceive the public."

Mr. W. R. Hiddell, of Beatty, Blackstock, Nesbitt & Goodrich, Toronto, who was retained for the defence, appeared before the public court and put in the patents which were granted by the Dominion of Canada for the machinery and process by which these basins were made.

It was contended on behalf of the prosecutor that the patent of the machinery and the process did not justify stamping the product as patented, but the English and American cases showed, conclusively, it was argued by the defence, that a patent covering the machine or process likewise covers the product.

The case against E. B. Eddy was dismissed, but subsequently a charge of a similar nature was made against Mr. Eddy. When this case came before the police magistrate, Mr. Hiddell, counsel for the defendant, asked, as it was purely a matter of law, and the Eddy company wanted it settled by the High Court, that the matter be referred at once, without asking any evidence, to the Court of Appeal, opening on April 30. This was done.

The situation is a peculiar one. The machines are patented, and to have placed any of their product on the market without bearing any stamp to indicate such would have been an infringement of the law, and yet now, because this was done, it is asserted to be illegal.

Independent Order Foresters. This month's Forester gives full particulars of the arrangements made for the carrying of the delegates to the Supreme Court which is to be held in August in London, Eng. The 88 Kensington has been chartered of the American line. The excursionists will start from Philadelphia on the 20th of July. The fare will be \$83 from Philadelphia to London and return, which is a very low rate and includes the railway fares from Liverpool to London and return with stop-over privileges at many points of interest; there also will be side trips arranged for at special rates to Germany, France, Switzerland, Scotland and Ireland. All Foresters and their friends may share in this special arrangement and those who wish to get all information by writing or calling on the Supreme Chief Ranger.

Arrest of a Lottery King. Willebarre, March 14.—A sensation was created in this city to-day when Chief of Police Briggs and a squad of officers raided the "Commodore" Broker's office of John Wursburger and the inmates. Wursburger is known all over northeastern Pennsylvania as the "Lottery King of Luzerne County," his brokerage business being merely a blind. For the past 10 years he has been selling tickets openly and it is estimated he did a business of over \$120,000 a year. The police found several thousand dollars' worth of tickets of all the lotteries doing business, and also lists of his regular customers, showing that bankers, doctors, lawyers and prominent business men were spending large sums monthly through Wursburger's agency.

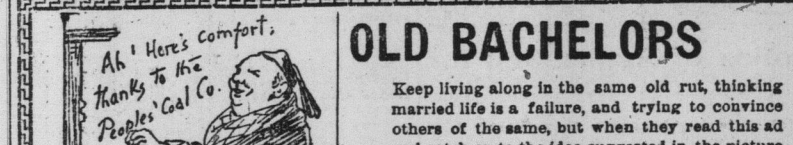

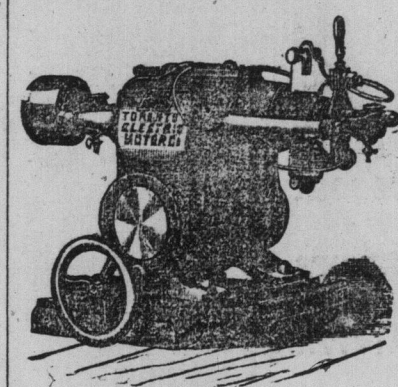
