SUSPENSION OF THE HABEAS CORPUS ACT

Hill information in the possession of Government with regard to the movements of the Fenians in the United States, has led them to obtain an Act, suspending, till the end of 1870, if necessary, the action of the Habe is Corpus Act. We do not know the pre cise nature of this information, but we know with sufficient definiteness to be able to state that if it come from reliable sources it is quite enough to justify Government in taking what might otherwise be considered an unnecessary step. We fancy the reports which have been made to Government have been somewhat exag gerated, but they have come from a number of midependent sources, and could not be disregarded without the greates culpability

One thing is certain, unless the the United States Government takes some step to put an end to movements of their citizens, for the avowed purpose of making an attack on a friendly and peaceable neighbour, they will put themselves in an exceedingly false position.

WHICH, CAPITAL OR REVENUE!

IR Francis Hincks, by including, under the head of ordinary revenue, two items of a special character, has given rise to a good deal of verbal and newspaper discussion. Practically, the matter is now of slight importance, but it may not be useless to state in a few words the nature of the case, and what seems to us to be the correct view to take of it.

The items referred to are the sum repaid by the Great Western Railway Company, and the premium obtained on the International Railway Loan. The former can in no sense be considered as derived from revenue, being merely the repayment of a loan previously made. The debt was an asset of the old Province of Canada, and has since been realized. No business man would for a moment think of trea ing money so obtained as revenue. It he could only balance his loss account in this way he would be pretty certain to come to the conclusion that he would have to economize somewhere. If the debt had been pre-viously written off as bad, and sufficient savings from revenue been made to make up for it, then the ca e would be different, and the payment of the debt might very rightly be considered as so much clear gain.

The amount obtained as premium on the Railway Loan is of quite a different nature. It is an item of profit, over and above what has to be repaid to the holders of the Bonds when they mature, and as such may undoubtedly be classed in ordinary revenue. It is true, it was not calculated upon, nor perhaps ever

hoped for, and only helped to make up for what would otherwise have been a serious deficit. But expected or unexpected, it must be considered as an item of profit on the particular year's business in which it was obtained. It may be compared to a speculation entered into by a man engaged in trade; an adventure, of which he keeps a separate account. He makes, let us say, a profit of \$10,000 in this adventure Would it not be rediculous for him to treat that profit as other than ordinary revenue?

As we have already said, we do not look upon the matter as of any great practical importance now. No similar windfalls are expected or counted upon by Sir Francis in his estimates. He acknowledges that more money must be raised annually, and makes such afterations in the tariff as he fancies will give him the de. sired addition to his income. It is doubtless a matter of congratulation that Canadians are so lightly taxed, but it is of much greater consequence that the credit of the Dominion should be maintained; and even a slight annual deficit should be viewed with the greatest disfavour. It is much better to face the music fairly, and to put on a sufficient amount of taxation to provide funds for the ordinary yearly expenditure. Of course, expenditure for costly works which are exnected to last a great number of years, and which are of a nature to increase the producing power of the country, may and should be provided for by loans, with a yearly charge for interest and sinking fund is, therefore, well that Finance Ministers should be closely watched, and their statements of revolue and expenditure severely criticised when open to fault finding, and, although we can only be thankful for the opportune receipt of the sums we referred to above, we are not sorry the discussion has been raised, nor even that ministers should be called pretty charply to account.

PETROLIA.

(From our own Correspondent.)

REPORT FOR THE WEEK TO APRIL 19.

fPHE production of Crude has increased since my last owing to the resuscitation of the Old Shoemakerand Keith wells. The former now pumps between 80 and 100 barrels and the latter about 50 barrels of oil per day. I can therefore sately say that 3,000 to 3,500 barrels were produced this last week. The Export Firms are running their full capacity, and the demand for Crude being in excess of the supply, prices have gone up some 10c or 15c per barrel

There are no new wells completed, but many in various stages of progress. A Titusville centleman has just made arrangements to sink a well 11 miles north west of the far west McDougal one

The shipments of oil still continues about the same. (viz , 21 car loads a day) Most of the insurances on buildings here, effected some 2 menths ago, have been of f cancelled since the late fires. This is simply ridiculous as we are not situated close enough to be in any danger from any oil operations or Keff teries of Petroha

AVING heretofore noted how that strong thief known as "protection" does not disdain to go down among the pots and pans and stew-kettle of ours household and clap ten prices on them let us take a look at the parlour, and see what robbery is done upon us there. In England you can buy a very good Brussels carpet at four shillings and twopeners a yard, equal to \$1.01 gold, or, with gold at 13. \$1.11 currency. Here you must pay \$2.25. To "protect" the American article therefore—that is, to here you it thuy the dear article from Massachusetts rather than the cheap from England—the tariff imposes a specific duty of \$4 cents per square yard on imported Brussels, and in addition thereto, as ad valor midney of \$5 cents gold, or 74; cents currency, which runs the cost at once up to \$1.874. But these carpets are quite bulky, cost heavily, of course for treight and then there is the profit to come in, all of which makes the \$474 cents difference between the duty-paid British and protected American; but a slim margin—too slim, in fact, to give us the foreign at the same price as homemade. But, says soms one, down with foreign luxuries tax 'cm; those who dance must pay the paper—all whereof are handsome observations, but Brussels carpets are not what might be termed unmixed luxuries and yet the duty on them is 5 per cent higher than on silk, 30 per cent higher than on the threat lace, and \$5 per cent higher than the duty on diamonds. us there. 
