## LIGHT HOUSES.

Board of Commissionars for the several Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy.-Rokert W Cronkshank, John Ward, Isaac Woodward, Hon. W. F. W. Owen, John Wilson, Licut. Charles Hare, R. N. and John James Robinson, R. N., Esquires.
Isaac Woodwari, Fiequire, Surveyer of those Light Housen in the Bay of Fundy helonging to New Bransitich, and also of those belonging to Nova Seotia which are partly supported by this Province.

Cape Sable Seal İsland Light.-The first Light in approaching the Eay of Fundy, is on the South Point of the Seal Island. 'This in a plain white Light, elevated ahout 80 feet above high water mark, and may be seen in approaching the Island from any point of the compass. A very dangerons rock, nuder water, but upon which the sea always threaks, called Blonide Rock, lies about $3!$ miles S. by W. by compass, from the Light House Between this rock and the Ialand, there are anme dangers-the ground is rocky thronghout, and large vessels, therefore, ought unt to nttempt passing between them.

Brier Island Light.-In advaneing up the Bav. the next Light is sithated ou Brier Insand, abont hall 2 milo N. E. trom the N. W. point thereof. A plain white light

Dighy Gul Light.-The next light on the coast of Nova Seotin is placed on the west side of Digby Gut-from Brier Island North Eastward: The conast ia very nold and uot indented; the Light ia therefore eliefly intended as a guide into. Dighy Basin -A white Light.

Gannet Rock Light. -This Light is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extenll from the Old Proprietor to the Senl Islands off Machias, a dislance of nliout twenty miles. It is a fiesh light-white-twenty reeonds dark and forly light in each minute The Light Houne is painted in stripes, vertical. black and white
Bcarizgs axd Distance ly Compass from the: Gannel Rock Light House. This Light Lears from the Light house on Brier Island, N.N.W. $\mathbf{i}$ W. 22 miles.
From the Ganiliet Rack to the Old Proprintor E. $1 \mathbf{S}$. distanee 7 miles. From the Gannet Rock to the Black Rock, off White Head Island, N. E. \& E. 7 iniles.

From the Gannet Rock to the South West Head of Grand Manan, N. N. W. Git miles.

From the Gannei Rork to the Northernmost of the Murr Ledges. N. W , $A$ N. 21 miles.

To the 'Sonthernmost of ditto, called Saint Mary's Ledge; W S. W. 2 milen.
From the Gannet Rock to Machias Seal Island. W and by $\mathbf{N}$ d $\mathbf{N}$. 12 miles.
Nota.-Between the Northernmost and Bouthernmoat of the Murr Ledges. there is a range of daugerous rocks and ahoals, many of the on nlways above water, and which extouds Weatvard from the Light Houne about four milen: from this rauge, farther Wenterly. abont six miles frou thy Gannet Light, lies a dangeroun breaker called the Bull. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable hemadande near the 8 S. W. end of -ịrand Manan, opea.

From Brier Island Liglit to the Old Proprietor, N. and by W. 4 .W . 10.$\}$ miles

The Blonile Rock from the Sonthernmost point of the Cape Sable Sent Islands S. and by W. 31 miles distant.
Muchias Sial Island Lights.-There are two fixed tohite lights upon the Machins Seal Islands, elevated hboint forty-five feet above high water, and bear from each other E.S. E. and W.N. W. distant abont 200 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses it the saine station. they will be immediately distingnished from all other lights npon the coast, (British or Ainerican) Both the Buildings are painted white. The following are the bearings from them, viz:

To the Southernmost Murr Ledge; (St. Mary's) E. S. E. easterly. " Gannet Rock Light E. by S. $\frac{1}{4} \mathbf{S} 13$ miles.
" Sonthern Head of Grind Manan, E. by N. 2 N.
" North ern Head of Grand Manan. N. J.. E.
" N E. Rock, distant 2 uiles, N. E. by N.
" Litte River Head, N. by W.

Libhy Island Light Honse, (American;) N. W. by W.

Vessels statuling to the Northward, between these Lights and the Gnnnet liock, shonld tack or hanl of the moment they bring these Lights' in one, as they will not then lie more than three fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, il more than five miles to the Eust of the lights.
It in recommended that the Ship's Compasses ahoild be well compined and adjusted (particularly in new shipis; hetiore they leave Iramrilge Island, as serioms errors have frequently occurred from want of attention om this ponat and as the variation In the Buy of Fumly is seventeen degrees Westerly, or ( $1 \frac{1}{2}$ points) it will be folnd by the latest published Admiralty Charts, that the conire from Partridge Islana deent the Bay (South Uhannel) between the Old Priprietor and N. W. Leike, is s, W a S., but the romrse to he steered must depend on the dilection of the wind on leaving Partridge Island.]

Hend Harbour Light.-Next in order after passing Firund Manan and the plain white Light, (American) on West Guoddy Point, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of; Campo Bello, aud is a gnide of vessels entering the main Channel to Weat Isles, Mnose Island, and the inner Bny af Passimaquody; it enables vessels niso at all times to enter Heal Harbour-it is a fixed chite lirht. The building is painted White, with it red cross on it.

- Point Le Prcau Lights.-Upon this projecting head Iand wolights are placed, one above the other, ii lie same honse, and distant 28 feet-Both lights can be seenfromevery puint of the comphss, where they may be useful-both are fixed and white. The Light llonse is painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad each. horizontnlly

Partridgn Tstand Light.- T'his light nt the entrance of the River ind Harbour of saint John, having, heen established upwaids of forty years, requires no particular notice, firrther than that it is n fixed uhite light, and that the light Honse is red and white, in vertical stripes.

Bcacon Light.-Within Pariridye Island, mud noon a Spit or har which extends nbout half a mile S.S.E nff Sand Point, and which drien at two thirds abb, stands the Bencon' rower. Upein this Towef - light is emtablished, whioh is eminently insefinl to the comsting trude of Saint John, and io all other vessels having pilots on boterd, us it enahlen them to enter the harbour at all hoirs of the night: A fixed white light. The Honse is white and Dilaek, in stripen vertically.?

## Lnti

Qunco.-A revolving white light is placed on n small rock off Quacn Head, showing twice fill and twice dark in a minute. This light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can apprach. The Light House is painted white and red in horizontal stripes.

Cape Enrage Light.- On the point of that name, in Westmorland, nearly opposite Apple River Harboinr, N. S. A plain welite light. The Honse is paiuted white, and is abont 120 feet above tide mark.

West Qujddy Light. -This is an American Light, nud is placed on the West side of the entrance into the Saint Croix by Lubec and Eastport.

Cape Forchu Light-On Cape Forehu, on the wastern side of the entrance to Yarmouth (Nova-Scotia), in lat. 43,39, N. long, 66, 6. . W. It exhibits a plain revolving liglit-visible ene minute and a quarter, and invisible half a minute. The building is painted white, and is elevated 135 fent above the level of the sea.

Latitude, Longitude, and Variation of the Compass, at the following Light Stations in the Bay of Fundy, belotiging to New Brunswick:


AnIronliell Buny (painted red) was laid down off this Harbour on the 28 th September, 1852, similar in all respects to the Boll Buoy of the Port of Liverpool, G. B. It bears from Partridge Island Light House S. S. W. by compass $1 \frac{1}{2}$ miles. Bearlingt.

## AGRICUITURAL.

Cultivation of Corn.-I shall learn to be more explicitin my inquiries hereafier. The method of planting corn, pursued here, is this: The ground after being plowed and harrowed, is marked into four feet squares by two men crossing tie field, lengthwise, and then at right' angles to that, with a ling pole to which are attached four heavy ox-chains, four feet apart. Meti then pioceed with hoes and hole it where these lines crass each other. They are followed by a load of munure, whith ia thrown by the handful into each hole; boys then drop five kernels of corn in each hill, which is then covered by the hoes of those who follow them. This method is so slow that last season the corn on one side of a 19 acre lot was up and ready to plow when they had finished planting the other side.

Decomposirion of Soils.-Query, Do green crops when buried in the soil, undergo such a fermentation (acetous?) as to decompose certain portions of the soil, and thereby render them available for the food of crops?

In my native country (England,) a poot man once had all the mould of his garden cerried off for the purpose of manuring pocrer land, and had nothing left in it but the strong elay subsoil. He tried an experiment, which was to thoroughly dig through his garden every week to the depth of about fifteen inches, during several weeks. He afterwards sowed his garden seeds without manure, and never had a finer crop.

Again-near to where I lived was a small tract of country, about the poorest that I ever saw; the subsoil was sparry, pebbles and sand of the same nature. This was used to a considerable extent for macadamizing roads, garden walks, \&c. It was reekoned to be no better than poison to be laid on fertile lands, yet i person having carried some to a considerable distance to lay a parden walk on a soil of a very different nature, soft slate mi with clay, obtained the finest grass where the gravel was luid that $h$ erer had on his farm.

Sotnd ADtres:-A word in the ear of the young farmer, especially on sandy soil. Keep as nutch stock of cattle, sheep, hogs, and poultry, as you can; and convert as much as possible of the crops into animal substance-save all the manure and offal, feed the land with it, and you will soon find that the more stock you keep the more you may keep.

Thene are few things in which farmers in general exbibit such gross waste and want of forethought, as in their treatment of their woodlands. Dependent as the grent mujority must always be for fuel; dimilinishing rapidly as they must be in our climate annually; a large proportion timbered with trues that do not readily shoot up, end will not grow again williout some protection; we atill see the nopla trees of our original forests as carelessly and uselessly felled as though they were not the growth of centuries. Have you not scime vacant spot in your orchurd, or gardetl, some unplanted
road side, sume place in your yard where a few trees might be planted to advantage? Look around and see if there is not room for some, or perhaps many, of the kinds useful for timber, or their fruit, or ornamental purposes. You may have attended to this matter last spring, but the chances are that you will on examination, find room for more trees. If so, November is a very good time to supply the deficiency; nut so good, pethaps, as the spring would have beell, but too good to be allowed to pass without improvement. Trees may be trausplanted at any time after the growth of the season is over, with perfect safety, and they may be removed at any time if the fine roots are undisturbed, and during removal retain their hold on the earth.

To Kgep Bugs from Vines.-Take the feathers from a hen's wing, and dip them in spirits of turpentine, and stick one or two in a hill, and after every shower they will want to be dipped over again.

Care of Horsba, \&c.-Is not the practice of going to supper and leaving a team meanwhile in the field, without any refreshment, both cruel and injurious? Should a horse or ox ever be worked more than five hours at a stretch? Does not colic very frequently take place from loug finsting and the greedy stuffing whreh is apt to follow it? Has not the death of some animals been owing to long fasting and its usual concomitants?

The Use of Leaves.-I'he office and utility of leaves ave becoming better understood by cultivators than formerly; yet we find a good many still adhering to the old belief that the sun's rays, directly shining on forming fruit, are what perfect it, independently of other influences.

On this subject, theory and practice have been invariably found in perfect accordance with each other. The prineiples of physiology teach us that the sap of a tree, when it passes in at the roots, semdins nearly unchanged in its upwaid progress through stem ind branches, until it reaches the leaves, where, being spread out in those thin organs, to light and air, it undergoes a complete change, and thus becomes suited to the formation of new wood and new fruit. Strip a rapidly growing tree of its leaves at midsummer, und from that moment the supply of new wood ceases, and it'will grow no more till new leaves are formed; and if it have young truit, the growth and maturity of the latter will cease in the same way. A few years since, a Yellow Gage plum tree lost all its foliage from leaf blight, when the plums were not fully grown, and while yet destitute of flavor. The fruit remained stationary and unaltered, until, in a few weeks, a second crop of leaves eame out. 'I'hey then swelled to full size, received their crimson dots, and assumed their honied sweetness of flavour.

Culitvating Fuulr.-Why is not fruit cultivated more extensively? If a person will take this question, and in travelling through the country, put it to every man he meets, he will receive a different answer from almost every one. Some will eay they have
not room, time or means; others, that they are too old to' receive any benefit from it, or that the market for fruit will soon be glutted, and with a wise look they will tell you "that they don't mean to get their fingers burnt in that way." All these various answers serve only as mere shadows, to screen men's indolence and utter thoughtlessness upon this subject; for were they to give it a candid investigation they would be ashamed to utter them.

It is a fact that cannot be denied, that the cultivation of fruit is one of the most profitable, sure, healthy, and noble employments in which mankind can engage. It is pionitable, because its returns are large, when compared with most other agricultural pursuits, considering the land occupied and the labor employed; and the profits are sure, because the demand increases faster thun the supply. It is healthy, because it gives exercise to the muscles and mind, without over-taxing either, and because good ripe fruit is the healthiest food human beings can eat. It is noble, because it is the employment, the first employment, ordained by God for man, and therefore the most congenial to his nature.

But let us look at the subject in a practical light for a moment. There are thousnuds of farms that are well adapted to the raising of fruit, and many of them have been cultivated by two or three generations, without there ever having been one dollar expended or one day's work employed for the improvement of fruit ; and the wild grape vine that grows by the side of the brook or river, or climbs to some tree or stone pile and covers their unsightliness with its beautiful verdure, is only tolerated because it is out of the way. The berry bushes that spring up here and there in out-of-the-way places, are hunted and destroyed as if they were so many wolves. Even the apple tree that springs up by chance in the field, is trimmed to mere poles. to prevent its shading the ground. Indeed I have seen large orchards trimmed to mere poles, with a little tuft of twigs on the end, perhaps twenty feet from the ground, for this avowed purpose. This is all the result of ignorance. Be assured these men do not read the Country Gentle-: man-in fact they seldom read anything. Many people because they are not posted up in all the details of fruit-raising, think that the whole subject is entirely beyond their comprehension. Now this is a mistake; and any man that knows enough to raise a good crop of corn, can raise good fruit ; in fact the most that is wanted, is to know enough to follow or imitate nature.

Plant trees or shrubs as nearly as possible as they grew; give them good rich soil, and keep down the weeds, and depend upon it they will grow.

How to Mine a Kicina Cow.-It is merely to place the patient in a stall with a beam over head, and fixing a running noose over her horns, throw the end of the rope over the beam, and pull away, so as to raise her head pretty high in the air, but not so as to lift her legs from the ground; in this position she will uot only be disabled from kicking, but will give down her milk without the least hesitation.

## MISCEILANEOUS.

Matters in the Moun.-What a curious almanack these good people in the moon would have! There, days nre as long as years, and day nad year are equal to our monthe, twenty-nine days, twelve hours and forty-five minutes. The seasons differ but very litto from each other. On the equator there reigns eternal summer, for the sun is ever in the zenith; the poles are buried in eternal winter. The days are of equal length throughout the year, all days equally light, all nights equally dark. The absence of an atmosphere deprives the moon of the swett charms of a $\mathbf{t w i}$ light, and glaring day would follow gloomy night with the rapidity of lightning, if the slow rising and setting of the sun did not slighty break the suddenness of the transition. Human eyes, however, could not bear the fierce contrasts of light and shadow; they would long in vain fer the soft intervals between the two extremes, the other colors, which beautily our world with their joyous variety and soft haımony. The sky there is not blue, but even in daytime black, and by the side of the dazzling sun the stars clain their place and liglit in the heavens. Near the poles the mountain tops sline in unbroken splendour year after year, but the valleys know neither day or night, scantily lighted as they ever are by the faint glimmer refected from the surrounding walls.

The side of the moon which is turned from us, has a night of nearly fifteen days; the stars only, and planeta, shine on its ever dark sky. The side we see, on the contrary, knows no night; the earth lighte it up with never ceasing earth shine, a light fourteen times stronger than that which we receive from the moon. We recognize our own light, lent to our friend, in the fuint, grayish gliminer of that portion of the moon which before and after the new moon receives no light from the sun, but only from the earth, and reflects it burk again upon us. Mornings in fall show it more brilliant than evenings in spring, because in autumn the continents of the earth with their stronger light illumine the moon, while in spring she only recesves a fainter light from our oceans. Our orb appears to the Man in the Moon as changeable as his linme to us , and he might speak of the first or last quarter of the earth, of new earth and full earth. The whole heaven moves before him onca in 29 days around its axis; the sun and stars ries and set regularly once in the long day; but the vast orb of our earth is nearly innmovable. All around is in slow, unceasing motion ; the mild face of the earth alone, a gorgeoun moon of immense magnitude, never sets nor rises, but remains ever fixed in the zenith. It there "ppears sixteen times larger than the moon to us, and daily exhibits its vast panornma of oceans, continente and isInds. Bright lights and dark shadows are seen in, ever varied change, as land or water, clearings or forests appear, new with every cloud or fog; and different at different season. Tha Man in the Monn has thus not only his watch and hin almanack daily beforr him in the ever-changing face of the earth, but he may, for all that we know, have mapa of our globe which many a geographer would envy on account of their fullnoss and accuracy. Long before Columbur discovernd America, and Cook Now Holland, our,
lunar neighbour know mont corrcatly the firmand the outlines of the new continents. There was no new world for him, and there is none left. He could tell us the secrets of the interior of Arrica, and reveal to us the fearful mysteries of the Polar Sieas. But how he on his side must marvel at our vast fields of snow, our volcanoes and, tropical storms and tempeste-he who knows neither fire, nor snow, nor clouds! What strange fables he may have invented to explain the shadows of our clouds as they chase each other over sea and land, and hide from him in an instant the sunlit landscape! And stranger still, on the side of the moon which is turned from the earth, he knows nothing at all about us, unless news reach him from the happier side. Or he may undertakethe great event in his life-a Ingg and painful journey to the bright half of the globe, to stare at the wondrously brilliant earth star, with its unread mysteries and marvellous changes of fitting lights and shadows. Who knows what earnest prayers may rise from the moon, full of thanks for the floods of light and heat we pour upon them, or of ardent wishes that their souls might hereafter be allowed to dwell in the bright homes of the beauteous earth star.

Tae Secrer of Good Writing.-The grand secret of good writing seems to be in this very simple maxim: Be sure you have an idea before you attempt to express it. If you clearly comprehend in your own mind whit you wish to communicate, nature and reason, together with a little practice, will most ccrtainly teach you how to say it in an appropriate manner.

A single idea is fully sufficient for one mind to manage at one time, And it may be added that if the idea is of much importance, it would be the most dignificd by being honored with a private carriage.

Divide and conquer is as valuable a rule in literary as in military tactics. The more extensive the theme which the writer proposes to himself to discuss, the less, usually, he has to say upon it. Some subjects can be mastered with ease only by descending from generals to particulars, and treating of the subjects in their individual parts.

There is nothing more popular, especially with young writers, than brilliancy of style. This manner of writing is certainly excellent in its proper place, but there are many topics which do not require this quality, and many are much injured by it. The language of every dissertation should be that which is best calculated to express the thoughts in the happiest manner.

As the ray of the sun will not enkindle a blaze unless brought to a focus, so the thoughts of the writer will riot set the hearts of his readers on fire, unless all are made to converge to a single point.

Some uriters seem unable to express themselves in a cool tational manner on any subject.' With them every virtue is Godlike, every fault villainy; every breeze a tempest, every molehill a mountnin. They appear to think their manner of writing is sublimity ; but their judicious readers (if they have any such)' call it tragidity and absurdity:

The design of language gives expression to thought-that style of writing, therefore, must necessarily be the best which most perfectly conveys to the reader's mind what the writer intended he should understand. - Gocthe.

How many seatter, in idleness, or indifference to their value, the little minute particles af time, till golden hours, and days and years are wasted, the treasures of life all scattered, and death finds nothing but a poor naked and useless thing at the last.
