- The existence in our city of complete apparatus for quicksilvering looking - rlass plates is probably but little known to the public. Messrs. Giberton \& Co., a list of whose agencies will be found elsewhere, have for some time past carried on this industry to a considemble extent. The process is quite interesting, and may be seen at any time applied in the conversion of the largest English, Freneh and Belgian plate glass into elegant and costly mirrors.
- The President of the Georgian Bay and Wellington Branch Railway Oo. is reported to have declared that the scheme was never in better form than at present, adding the promises that the grading on the first section will be finished within six weeks, a preliminary survey of the second section rill be made this month, and a final survay and location in October. It is expected to give out the contract for the second section next spring, and to complete the entire line next year.
- The imports at the port of St. John, N.B., for August, 1879, were valued at $\$ 260,858$; for Allgust, 1868, $\$ 496,907$, a falling ofl of very nearly 50 per cent. The exports for August, 3870, were valued at $\$ 332,687$; for Augrust, 1878, S381,004, a falling on of nearly 40 per cont. This entire decrease in exports was more than represented by the figures relating to the products of forest, the valuntion of which for August, 1878, was $\$ 273,573$, against only $\$ 81,003$, for August, 1879.
- The Toronto Exhibition, one day with another, seems to have attracted a very fiif attendance, and from all nccounts the show may be regarded a gratifying success. It is described as " the largest, most complete, and best show that has yet been held in the Jominion," and although superlatives are commonly unsafe, it may well be that in this instance they are used advisedly. - The Peters' Combimation Lock Comprany, about starting a factory in Moncton, N.B., ab-
sorbs to company of the same mane formen $n$ year or two ago and having a factory at Westbury, Conts. 'the capital of the new Company is to be $\$ 200,000$, of which $\$ 2000$ is suid to be now subse ibed.
- We are informed that Messrs. T. James Claxton \& Co. have on hand the largest stock of robes held by any one establishment in the Dominion, not excluding the fudson's Bay Company. A speci:al eftort is making to dispose of this stock, as will be seen from the advertisement accominayong this puper.
- At a recent meeting of the creditors of Cushing \& Cu., fancy groods, the linbilities of the insolvents were ascertained to be $\$ 68,500$, :amt the assets, nominally worth $5: 3,000$, were valued at 827,000 . Lnspectors were appointed to report upon the estate at a subseguent meeting.
- Coolican \& Pichette, dealers in fincy goods, Quebec, fuiked hast year, and their estate passed into the hands of an assignee who now makes a linal meconting, showing the proeceds of all avaibable assets to e e $\$ 428.39$. - Duncan MeCormich; of this city, advocate, has commenced legal proceedings against the manarer and directors of the Meelanies' Bank for the recovery of S5S9 on deposit at the time of susjension but since exchnigel for bills. The plaintinalleges that the suatements nade by the defencants were false, and were uttered with tradulent intent, and supports his allegations with a good array of figures. The suit is one bound to attract great interest, since the prima facie eridence on whichit is bised is very strong, and, should it be suecessful, it wonl be the prectrsor of numberless similar proceedings not likely to be confined to those interested in the Mechmics' Bank alone.

of the estate consist almost entirely of stock, and are given a nominal valuation of $\$ 769534$. An offer has been submitted of 50 cents on the dollar in endorsed paper at three months, and 5 cents additional unsecured paper at six months, but with what probabilities of acceptance we do not learn. The insolvent's unisfortune is attributed to dull business and to eflorts to extend it by selling at cost. As a buyer lie is understood to have been careful, atid in all his dealings fair.

- Henry Beattie, insolvent, petitioned the Superior Court for the reconverance to his own possession of his estate in the hands of Riddel, assignce, pleading that a deed of composition. had been signed by a sutficient number and value of creditors of the estate. Judge Mackay denied the petition, stating that the deed must be submitted to $a$ meeting of ereditors in atecordance with the lnsolvent Act of 1875 . No such meeting having been held, the case was dismissed and the petitioner adjudged to my costs. Since these proceedings the recquisite meeting of the creditors has been held, and by a rote of 11 to $a$ the proposed settlement was refused. The estate of the insolvent therefore remnins in iusolvency.
- The mevehants of Ridgeway, Drummondsville and other frontier towns complain bitterly of the injury done them by smuggling. Our private adviees note the existence of such illicit trallic, and assign as the reason of its continuance the light punishment inflieted unon detected offenders, namely, con fiscation of the particular lot of goods seized. Many a daring and unscrupulous trader will take the risk of such a loss for the sake of the gain in case of successfui evasion of the customs officials, and so it comes that smuggled merchandise, in quantities sufficient to alfect the business of fair dealing, established hotses, is from time to time offering for sale in towns near the border. The authorities should make up. Whatever the merits or demerits of the present tariff; its rigid enforcement should be insisted uponalike by the ins and the outs.

The insolvontattributes his uresent misfortune to having undertatien too much on the occasion of his last settlement, and this through ignorance of the extent of the chaims against him, which, when all tiled, he found to be some $\$ 2,000$ more than he land calculated upon. Carclessness or incompetency in account keeping has ruined many a merchant, and while a bankrupt on every other ground may be entitied to the warmest sympathy in his misfortune and be yet worthy the highest esteem, were judgment based on his methods alone it would have to be " served him right."

## SIR ALEXANDER GATI AND TYE

 National policy.Sir Alexander Gali evinced no little courage in attending the meeting of the Associated Chambers of Commerce at Belfast, with the view of entering into an explanation in reference to the commercial legislation of Canada. It appears from his reported speech that the rules of the Chamber did not permit him to enter into this explanation, although he seems to have been allowed to make a speech and to enter into explanations to some extent. As might have been anticipated, he had an audience by no means inclined to sympathize with his views, or to receive any explanation in defence of the late fiscal policy of Canada. Those who intro. duced and carried out that policy could scarcely have imagined that it would give satisfaction to the English manufacturing and commercial interests. There is no use in deceiving ourselves as to the state of English public opinion on the subject of commercial legislation. There is not
the slightest reason to suppose that Ens. land will abundon her free-tade policy, and when Sir Alexander Galt expressed his belief that a change was coming over the opinions of people in that comatry, there were loud expressions of dissent, atthough mingled with cries of 'hear.' England cannot venture to increase by tines on food the cost of the necessaries of life to her working classes, and the great bulk of her imports consists of artictes of food and of raw material. The value of com and flow alone is more than doable that of any other article of import, except cotton wool, the rur material of her principal article of export.

It is mere delusion to imagine under the circumstances in which England is placed that there could be any understanding with the Canadians such ats would lead to "a common partnership between them," as suggested by Sir Alexander Galt. 'The fiseal policy of the United Kingdom may be regarded as unchangeable unless a resort should be lad to direct taxition, which seems improbatbe, especially as the principal aticles of customs protuce are articles of luxary, the consumption of which is quite voluntary. They are tobacco, whe and spirits, and teat. Oat of less than 90 millions of duties collected in 1877 over nineteen millions was obtaned from the four branches specified, and of those tea is the only one that is not strictly a luxary. There is, no doubt; considerable anoyance felt in England that other peoples, including the very colonists, who have emigrated from her own shores, refuse to adopt principles which are theoretically sound, and which it was at one time hoped would have been generally accepted. It is, however, vain for Sir Alexander Galt to endeavour to persuade the English poople that they are giving away their most valuable possession by "access to their mankets," when they refuse to tax the breadstulfs and the raw cotton of the United States. They are fully alive to the fact that taxes on those articies would merely cripple their great industries, aid render it more difficult for them to compete with foreigners in the markets of the world.

It seems to us rather inconsistent in Sir Alexander Gialt to have adrised those whom he was addressing to promote emigration to our wheat fields, so that they might ai the same time become growers of wheat for England and customers for the Euglish. The avowed policy of Canada at present is to stimulate the various industries of the country and to enable our own manufacturers to supply the growers of wheat with what they require: Even with our heavy pro
tective duties, the cheap money, cheap labor, large output in proportion to capital, of England, will probably onable her manufacturers to supply our markets to a great extent, but we shall endeavor in vain to convince them that our fiscal policy is sound; indeed all that Sir Alexander Galt urged on the subject of their giving tway the access to their markets without getting anything in return was as applicable to Canula as to the United States blough not in the same degree. England receives all our exports free of duty, while we tak all hers with the arowed object of encountring domestic matmuftetures.
The best point that Sir Alexander Galt could have made was the necessity of increasing the revenue, and we have so ligh an opinion of his ability that we do not allow ourselves to believe that the meagre report of his speech that has reached us does bim justice. His state. ment that there had been "a gontinual "decrease of the revenue pronduced by a "succession of bad seasons" was met by cries of "no, no." There is an obvious cause for the decrease of the Camadian revenue which is not alluded to in the report, but which we are convinced did not escape so able a financier as Sir Alexander Galt. A revenue which is raised largely by al ralorem duties must be materially allected by a shrinkage in the value of goods. As to the fact of a large shrinkage in values within the last few years there can be no doubt whatever, although there are wide differences of opinion as to its extent. It may be considered a fair illustration of its effect on the Camadian revenue to institute a comparison between the receipts in the two years 1874 and 1575 and in the two years 1877 and 1878 . In the years first mentioned the goods entered at the $17 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent. mate, were valued at nearly $\$ 111,000$, 000, yiehling about $\$ 19,400,000$. In the years 1877 and 1878 the valuation was about $880,600,000$, the duty on which was about $\$ 14,100,000$, or an average yearly deficiency of $\$ 2,650,000$. It is of course diflicult to estimate how much of the falling.oll in values is to be ascribed to shrinkage, and how much to the excessive importations of the years first named. If we were to assume that it could be accounted for by shrinkage in value, then the additional $6 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent. which it would be necessary to add in order to obtain the same revenue would not place the consumer in a worse position than he had been during the period of inflation. On the contrary, alter paying the increasod duty he would still get his goods cheaper than before: there can, however bo
little doubt that there was a reduction in quantity as well as in value. 'To us it has always appeared that the strong argument in defence of the national policy is that there was an absolute necessity to obtain increased revenue, and that this rendered an increase in the duties necessary. Of course the details are open to criticism, but this would be out of place when referring to Sir Alexander Galt's speech. The reference to the increased expenditure caused by the withdrawal of the British troops, and by the acquisition of the North West, which entailed a serious burthen on Canala, was fairly put by Sir Alexander Galt.
While on the subject ii may not be irrelevant to notice the effect of the new duties as far as we can ascertain it from the statement published in the official Gazette. In referring to that statoment we venture to point out that it would be much more valuable if it adhered strictly to the tariff, as the returns of the imports at the Port of Montreal do. There are a great variety of daties under the new tarift on manulactures of cotton, wool and iron, and yet in the Gazetle retum all are classed under one head. It woukd really look as if the return had been prepared with the object of preventing the possibility of any one obtaining the information which is required. We by no means imagine that such was the intention of the compiler, and we therefore think it desirable to call attention to the unsatisfactory character of the return in the hope that it will be improved. According to the return the average duty on cottons of all kinds was about $21 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent., on woollens $27 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent., on iron and steel manufactures about 2021 per cent., on silk nearly 30 per cent., and on earthen, stone and china ware, $2 \overline{0}$ per cent. It must be obvious that very little information can be gained from the returns when it is borne in mind that the combined duties on cottons and woollens vary very much according to the descriptions of goods. We are glad to learn that Sir Alexander Galt's speech has been printed under his own supervision, and that it will ere long be in our possession.

## DEFICLENGY OF GRAIN CHOIS IN EUROPE.

There is no longer room for doubt that, allowing for the chances of fine weather during the harvest, the grain crops of Great Britain must prove very much below the average; and, considering the position of the other countries from which she usually draws supplies, it may be reasonably conclucled that the bulk of this
extra demand will have to be supplied from this side of the Athantic. Other countries of furope have also experienced for the last two ycars a considerable deficit in their production; they also, in. stead of being exporters, have to draw their supplies from abroad, and it becomes an interesting question with us to know to what oxtent their requirements, added to those of Great Britain, may aflect our prices.

The London A!riculthrul Gazello collects every year reports of the prospects of the crops throughout the United Kingdom, and its returns, just received, are three weeks behind the customary date. The classification of the reports is by "over average," "average," "below average," and the following table shows what percentage of some three humdred reports comes under these respective headings for the lasi two years.


Thus it will be seen that 75 per cent. of the reports indicates a crop of wheat below the average, where last year only 18 per cent was "under arerage." The best authorities on the langlish grain trate seem to agree that the doficiency in the wheat yield will be one-thiod of an average. As to the duantity of wheat Great Britain will need to import, there is a general agreement of estimates, most of the authorities fixing the requirements at about $16,000,000$ quarters, or $128,000,000$ bushels. The importations during the two years, ending on the 33 rd of August last, which embrace both agricultural scasons, compare as follows:

Equivalent for last year, after deducting the exports, to an impartation in bushels of $95,000,000$. If the requirements this year are such as indicated above $4,000,000$ quarters more will be needed by Great Britain.
'The deficit on the continent is not so easily calculated, as very little reliance can be placed on telegrophic despatches, so often have they been found untrustworthy respecting the European crops. Yet from more disinterested sources, the prospect of the general yield in Europe is accounted better than has been hitherto estimated on this side of the Atlantic. The International grain maplet of Viema
publishes every year a report of the probable results of tho harvests in all the grain-producing countries, and the following is a summary of its results for this year, the figures denoting the percentages of an average yield, represented by 100 .


Svidently these averages exceed the representations that havo reached this country, and show a fir higher ratio than associatod press cables have led us to expect. Germany has a surplus that may compensate in a certain measure for the deficit of her neighbours; Russia has probibly been underestimated, as it is tho interest of the trade to give a coloring to the reports sent to Viennat ; and hais year's failures may be covered by reserved stocks of late yeu's crops, which are suspected to be much larger than Russia may care to admit. The crop in France is also deficient, and after poor returns from the fields for the last three years, the reserves of the country, usually very large are exhausted. As there exists abroad a wrong idea as to the fortility of the French soil, the following statement may modify the views of those who exaggemte the reguirements of that country :

The consumption for the last four decades, including the quantity required for seed ( 2.56 bushels per acre), is as follows. (In hectolitres of 2.75 bushels):

The disproportion in the increase for the last clecade is catised by the loss of the $1,500,000$ inhabitants of Alsace and Lormine. 'The erop of 1875 amounted to 98,690,000 hectolitres; that ol 1576 to 95,437,000; 1S77-7S reached havdly 90 , 000,000 , and with no reserves stored in the countey. The deticit lor this year is said to be about $7,000,000$ of hecto litres, or $19,250,000$ bushels of 60 lbs ench, including the obligatory requirements for a reserve.
'lhe prices current on the Paris market show that achat wants ate not so urgent as representeal. Flour of the best millers is oftered for delivery within the four first months of 1880 at tio fianes per 157 kilos, erpual at present rates of freight, exchange and winter insurance to st. 10 per bushel of No. 2 red winter wheat. The situation in France does not indicate the pressure of a serious deficiency in the food supplies of the nation. 'The amount of specie in the Pank of Plance on the 9 ast of last month excected the circulation by $113,000,000$ franes, a proportion of 105.36 per cent. of specie to circulation; the amount of indireet taxes for the first seven months of the present year exceeds the hudget estimates by $85,000,000$ firancs. This surplus is not a symptom of pressing wants tending to exhaust the resources of the comblry.

The total deficiency of wheat in Europe seems therefore to necessitate an inportation ol $150,000,000$ bushels, which in a slight measure may be reduced by exports from some other European countries, but the great bulk of the supplies must be drawn from the United States and Canada. 'lwo suceessive bountilul crops will allow the exportaidon of such a quantity without inflating priees, as the stocks in the country are too lauge to justify farmers or dealers in hombling for higher prices.

## TIIE OUTVOOR.

The timo seems farly to" have come when not only a sigh of relief but a strong word of encouragement may be uttered. No longer need sanguine expeetations be based solely upon questionable hypotheses. There is at last a good subistratum of facts whereon to build hopeful anticipations of the return of prosperity, and that at no indefinitely distant day. Whether or not prognostications of such kind be speedily realized may depend largely upon the turn of events yet to become known, one of the chief of which is the extent to which caution, curtailment and thrift have been taught by the experiences of the past few yenrs. The present, however, is assured; and the as.
surunce given is that the clond of despondency which has been so long hanging over our business commanity like a pall has been lifted and removed. A bomatiful harvest has been in great part seenred, and within the past few days the markets of the world have taken aturn indicating that grod prices may be obtained for it. Before yet any of our own erop has been ollered for sale, and in face of the ficht that it is now on the eve of forwarding to maket in rapially increasing quanitios, Wheat has taken a sudten rise in Chicngo of some 10 eents a bushel, and a good atvance in sympathy and conlormity therewith is recorded in our own market. This improvement in price while the crop is still in farmers' hands is most opportane, since it will serve to place money in hands whence it will surely filter through every chamel of business ocenpation, and so widely distribute its tonic effects. Butter and cheese have also taken a sulden leap upward, and though many factories and dairymen lave contricted at somewhat below ruling prices, more have refusod to do so, and first hands will; as a mule, find the inereased price a direct and ungualified boon.

The state of aftims abroad has furthermore opened up new outlets for our produce, and we are now witnessing the export from this city to the United Kingclom of potatoes, apples, eggs, hay and other commodities that have not heretofore fomm their way in any quantity to a transablantic market. The industry of shipping live stock has also grown apace, and is a sourec of much profit to the counthy. I Iartware interests, too, are looking up contidently. During the past three woeks advances and increasing activity have been constandy ativised from abromb, the improvement there being the rellec. Lion of returned prosperity to the United States, who are now again orlering iron mantufatures freely from over the sea, and althongh our own market was for a time slugrish in despite of such news, it is no longer so. Prices here have advanced, orders have increased, and the trate is well pleased with the situation.
'These are but a few of the most notable facts pointing to the release of Canadian trule from enptivity to depression. Jesides these there are the grocery trade, which has been doing a fair business thoughout the season; the hide business, which has been done at high and even still advincing puices; and the leather and boot and shoe trades, which are now experiencingrahealthy expansivemovement; the wool trade, in which growers this season certainly did well; the dealings in Hour, farly active at good prices; the pro-
vision trade, apart from, or in addition to, butter and cheese, now mending, and so on, and so on. The dry goods trade alone seems to be backward in feeling the intluences so manifestly ati work in general business, but this is only partly the case, for in several quatters we lind a bettier business doing than last year, and doubtless the exeeptional instances to the contrary are sliortly to disappear, as the poduct of the harvest tinds its way inevitably to the prodacers and handlets ol manufictaned groods.

On the stock exchanges of the world it is the custom to speak figuratively of a drop in prices, especially if it take the mature of apanic, as a storm, and hence lits arisen the expression, "litke down you umbrellis," which is shouted out whenever there is good appearance of a turn in the tendeney of the market! We find this to be a time when the expressive term may properly le put to a wider application, and we are glad to be able to ery out to the commercial community, "Thke down your umbrellas!" It wouk not be purdent, however, to thow them away entirely. Commereial showers will take place from time to time in the future as in the past, and those who do not povide againsd such contingency deserve to get caught in the rain.

## 'IUE SIMUAMON A'P QUEBDC.

It is extremely diflicult, in view of the events of the last few days, to discuss the situation at Quebec withont engraging in the impenting political contest. It masi be almiticel hiat the state of aflitirs is most peculitu. An unprecedented violation of constilutional usage las taken place in the stoppage of the supplies by the Legislative Comeil with the avowed object of procuring a change of ministry. There have been few dofemters of this atet, and the apologies for it lave been very lame. It has been argued that Mr. Tetel lier's dismissal of his ministers was an equally unconstitational act, and that, however unusual the stoppage of the supply bill may be, there are precerlents for it. It is useless to disenss further the constitutionality of the Lieutenamb Governor's proceeding, on which public opinion has been alrealy formed, and we shall therefore address the few ohservations that we have to ofler to the late action of the Tegishative Council. The precedents cited are wholly irelevant to the question at issue. 'There is not a single precedent; so fur as we are aware; and if there were, we cannot doubt that the apologists for the Legislative Council would have cited it, for the Upper ITouse of Parliament
stopping a supply bill with the dechared object of effecting a change of ministry. One of the latest precedents cited, as if it was in point, was the rejection by the House of Lords of a bill for the repeal of a special tax, and this, allhough it really caused no embarrassment whatever to the Government of the diay, was strongly con demmed by the highest constitutional authorities in Parlianent. The lords passed the bill the next session. The precedent of a Canadian Legislative Come cil stopping a supply bill on the ground of their objection to a particular item having reference to the removal of the seat of Government is not in point. The action of the Council was not taken with the object of changing the ministry, but was iutended merely to give eflect to their opinion on a particular question on which they liad a constitutional right to be consulted. Whatever opinion may be entertainech as to the action of the Legistative Comacil in the case referred to, there is no analogy between it and the recent stoppage of the supplies, with the declived olject of bringing about the removal of a Ministry supported by a masority of the representative branch of the Lespislature. It might have been expected that so daving a violation of the Constilution would have been denounced, if not by all the members of the House of Assembly, at least by a considerable portion of the Conservative party, and especially by those of them who profess to be moderate in their views. Had such ammilestation of opinion taken place, there would have been an opening for a coalition, which, to all appearance, does not exist at present. At this crisis, Mr. Chauvent, i member of the Joly Administration, has resigned, the cause, so far as can be inferred from the newspapers, having been his opinion that a coalition is desirable. On the assumption that this opinion is reasonable, and that Mr. Chauvenu can carry over with himsell a sufficient number of Liberals to the opposition ranks to restore the Conservative party to power, it is most unfortunate that he did not choose a different time to assert his conviction. At present the resignation has the appeatance of having been offered in deference to the opinion of the Legislative Council, and if successful it will establish a most dangerous precedent. We confess that we fail to comprehend how any justilication can be offered for the resignation of Mr. Chauveau at a time when it must be a cause of embarrassment to his Leader, and to the party with which he was comected. It would be difficult to cite a precedent for such a desertion. The course adopted by the Legislative

Council of Quebee is not only unconstitutional, but calculated to entail serious expense to the Province, which it can badly afford under existing circtustances.

## PRANSFER OF PANK STOCK.

We have been not a little surprised at the oljection mised by our contemporary the Toronto IVonctary Times to the recent transfers of the stock of the Consolidated Bank. The remarlis of our contemporary were based on the report of an interview between the President of the Bank and a reporter for one of our evening papers, where the President is said to have admitted that one of the directors had purchased stoek in the market. To the proprjety of such a transaction the Monctary Itimes demurs, but solely, so far as we can judge, on grounds that are untemble. It is assumed by the Toronto paper that the ohject of the seller was to escape the liability to further calls, but, ithe had studied the law, he would have ascertained that a holder of stock could not, by a transfer made after suspension, avoid his liability, except by thansferring his stock to ar responsible party. There is no illegality in translerring shares after suspension, but the owner of stock who desires to escape from the responsibility under which he lies is interested in securing a responsible party as transferee. If he should fail to do so the consequence would be that he would himself be liable for future calls. We have been unable to discover any reason whatever for the ery which has been raised against the purchases of stock at the low prices at which it has latterly ruled. The effect of such purchases was to prevent the stock falling to a still lower rate A panic had occurred, and many were disposed to sell out at any price. Under such circumstances, it must be obvious that prices were sustained by buyers going into the market, even at the prices which sellers were willing to accept.

## YISET OF MRR SECRETARY RVARTS.

One among the rany interesting circumstances comnected with the festivities at 'Yoronto was the visit paid by Mr. Evarts, Secretary of State of the United States, to the Governor General. Mr. Evarts, as is well known, is a distinguished momber of the legal profession in the United States, and was present on the oc casion of the visit paid to Osgoode Hall by the Vice regal party, where an address was presented by the Bar, the spokesman having been the Hon. Edward Blake. The distinguished gentleman who was selected as spokesman for the Bar on the occusion
referved in highly complimentary terms to Mr. Juarts, and to the great cases in which he had been employed. Nir. Evarts was very happy in his reply, and especially in his reference to the prudence and moderation which had guided the two great, nations, Great Britain and the United States, in the adjustment of their differences by arbitration. TVe should be pleased to think that Mr. Evarts had received some new light on the Eishery question, on which, judging by his despatches, written soon after the awawd, he was much in need of information. We of course armit that great allowance is to be made for a diplomatist who endeavours to make out the best possible case for his own Govermment; but the despateli to which we have referred seemed to be founcled altogether on incorrect information, derived doabtless from those interested in the fishery trade of the North Sastem States. Whatever may have been the impressions whiela Mr. Byarts has received, his visit, we can scarcely doubt. must have been a gratifying one, and must have been calculated to foster that friendly feeling between the people of the United States and Canada which it is so desirable to maintain.

- The following new postal regulations announced in the Comada Gazette of the $13 t_{1}$ inst will be found of importance to different interests:

1. "For ench parcel weighing not more thinn 4 o\%s, G cents; for each parcel exceeding 4 ozs and not exceding 8 ozs, 12 cents ; for each additional $40 \% \mathrm{~s}$, or fiaction of 4 ors, 6 cents.
2. The exclusion of grass from mails is so far modified that spectreles and eyo-glasses, if securely put up in cases not likuly to nllow the
contents to escape, if broiken, in colurse of conveyance, may be sent by post within the Dominion on prepayment of the abse parcel-post rates.

Tuursidy, September $18,1870$.
The comition of made for the week is commonly reported quiet, but sutisfactory, withexceptions leaning towatals activity. The business doing is not uniformly fitir ats would be the case at this senson moler a normal state of prosperity, lut it is so far groud that a failuful report of the general matkets must now take a positively encouraging tune. In almost every branch of occupation what is known in commercinl parlance as the undereurent is now more settled than at any prior time for an indelinite period. Whether it be in flour and graia, or in provisions, or groceries, or hardware, or even dry goods, there is no louger that dall, depressed state of feeling which colored all one market reports through the summer, white in some of these lines of business the old gloom has given way to lively and, it would seem, well-founded expectations of fortbeoming improvement. The shipment of apples, potatoes and hay is becoming a feature of the commerce of this port, and so freely is fruit going forward that the supply of barrels has run ont, and coopers throughout the city are fully ocenpied and camot kecp pace with their orders. In fimancial matters there is but little elange. Excinange is higher, and is quoted firm at 8 premium for co-day bills between banks, and 82 to $8 \frac{8}{6}$ over the counter. On the Stock Exchange business lins been light and the fluctuations unimportant,

Bank stocks stand on the avernge at ahout the same figures as last reported, and with the exception of the Richelien Navigation, which is again weak, misceilaneous shares are also without material change. Boots and Sunes.-The condition of business is unchanged since last report. A few buyers are in the market, but manufacturers are fully employed on back orders. The demand for men's heavy boots and staples generally is somewhat in excess of latstyear, and a healthy late trade is expected.
Dry Goods. - The variability of reports of this trade may be best shown by the simple statement of fict that, with one exception, the houses which last week gave discouraging accounts of business now certify to a compmort tively fair degree of activity, white those that spoke most encouragingly then, now tenper their reports with so many limitations that it is quite clear business with them is dull. A fair general report would be that business is quiet and not unsatisfactory, with here and there iustances of moce activity. For che first day or two of the week rery few country merchants appeared in town, but yesterday and to-day a goodly number have been visiting amongst ine wholesalers, and have bought in the careful, conservative way, characteristic of the season. This kind of buying has been througliont so marked a fenture that the trade counts with no little conlidence upon an uthusually good business later on. If the aetnal consumption of goods should run parallel with reasonable expectations, fonnded upon the abundant crop and the good prices it will briug, there can be no duabl that country dealers, who now think themselves fully stocked, will have to buy again this season, and in many cases not lightly at that. If anythang, over caution has obmined this year, and, therefore, a comparison with last year hardly gives a just conception of the actual relarive condition of business; yet, without any allowance for this unmistakenble finctor in the estimate, wholesale dealers mostly coneur in reportines larger sales. Should, then, later dealings be exceptionally large, the genemal comprijson will ultimately appear decidedly farorable to the present senson, and, it may be added, there seem to be not a few good reasons for anticipating such a resull. Payments are reported
slow, huir ind rery good, the middle term perhaps fairly deseribing the silmation. The sale of heavy goods, over-coatings, has been somewhat restricted thas fiac, and it is thought dealings in this line witl consinne limited, owing to an mansuat stock earied over tron last year.
Dhugs and Chemears.-business continues to improvestendily althongh slowly. There is no disposition to urge supplies where they are not wanted, and allogether we think that things are finding a more healthy basis to rest upon, and more eare is being exercised by both buyers and sellers. In the mitter of prices we have no martientar change to note except in castor oil, which continnes to leceline and is new quoting in lacge lots to arrive at from $10, \mathrm{e}$ to 11e, in smaller luts at $12 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{e}$ to 12 c . Quinine is also ensier, and may continte to fall to a limited extent now that the malarial season is abont over. Other articles unchanged.

Fhour and Gamin-There have been but fiw sales of wheat in this market as yet. Quotations have been maplly advanced in conformity with the movement in Clicago, and No. 2 Cmada Spring, which on Thurstay last Wat nominnlly $\$ 1.00$ to $\$ 1.03$, is now $\$ 1.0710$ S1.08; also, No, 2 Red Winter, fast week quoted Sl. 07 tu $\$ 1.05$, is now reported $\$ 1.13$ to 31.14 . The advance hece is not commensurate with that which has taken plate in the great mart for this cereat, but this is due to the fact that, there being no stock offering for at long time past, prices were never pul down in accomance with the very fow mage that obtaned in the Garden City a fortnight or more ago.
