London, Jan. 4 .- It was a very dis borderly audience to which Mr. Cham-berlain preached his fiscal doctrine at Derby to-night. He finally cut his remarks short. Mr. Polford, the candidate, re-ferred to the interruptors as cowards, and told them to go nd die of star-vation in a ditch. "Mr. Chamberlain will be prime minister of England before you are dead, and I will be mem-ber for Derby to support him." Mr. Chamberlain presented the col-



Ottawa, Jan. 4 .- Towards the end of his month or the beginning of next, tenders will be invited for the construction of 244 miles of the National Trans-

tenders will be livited for the construc-tion of 244 miles of the National Trans-continental Railway from Winnipeg to the point of meeting with the Lake Su-perior branch of the Grand Trunk Par-cific running up from Fort William, the latter being 220 miles in length. The first seventy miles from Winnipeg will pass thru good prairie country; iuter-spersed thru balanje are Fock and muskeg. This portion, with perhaps one or two stretches in Northern Que-bec, will be the most expensive of the whole line to construct. No decision has yet been reached by the transcontinental railway commis-sioners regarding the proposition for joint terminals in Winnipeg. The Casa-dian Northern have placed a valuation upon the property proposed to be used, and the commissioners have an inde-pendent valuation made. Owing to the absence of William Mackenzie, there has been no opportunity of getting to-sether and agreeing upon the rental to be paid. It is expected however, that negotiations will be resumed at a very early date. negotiation early date.
