............ WAR NEWS PARAGRAPHED.

A prominent Spanish General says that before Don Carlos could cut any figure in Spanish politics, the present Government and the Monarchy would have to be swept away, and that there would be a Provisional and probably a Republican form of Government, headed by Castelar. This would be followed by a long and bloody civil war. A report by way of London says that Manila has been occupied by parts of crews of foreign warships. The report lacks confirmation. A month ago, it is said, Admiral Dewey proposed to bombard Manila, but the German consul, acting on instructions from his Government, opposed the bombardment. It was then that Dewey asked for reinforcements and supplied Aguinaldo with arms. It was an indirect capitulation to Dewey while sparing Spanish pride.






