Special C.P.R. Meeting.

Montreal, March 27.—There was a special general meeting of C.P.R. shareholders to-day to ratify the new issue of \$20,000,000, and it was ratified by the greatest unanimity. In moving the adoption of the resolution authorizing an increase in the ordinary capital stock of the company, Sir Thomas Shaughnessy said: “It is probably unnecessary” for me to enlarge on the explanation given in the president's circular of Feb. 10 last. You will have noticed that our gross revenue from traffic has continued to show satisfactory increases, and that the results are also very gratifying. Notwithstanding the necessity for a substantial increase in the working expense of the road, the various directors to provide such increased facilities and make such improvements as will ensure greater convenience for the public and a marked reduction in the cost of operating the road. The outlook for immigration to the northwest territory is brighter than ever, and the demand for land for the purpose of increasing the acreage that will be prepared for crops this season will be the largest in the history of the road. It is mentioned that our land sales during the past eight months were by far the largest in the history of the road, being 778,800 acres for \$2,482,702. During the same period \$1,504,000 of 20-year bonds were sold, and the charge on the road was \$1,504,000. Eighty-Five Companies Hold \$174,364,551 in Fire Risks.

In the abstract report of the Provincial Inspector of Insurance for 1901, issued yesterday, it is stated that the 85 fire insurance mutual companies held \$174,364,551 at risk, while \$63,433,124 in new business was done. The 1901 and 1900 figures were \$129,784, and \$78,848 for expenses of management, while they have a net amount of \$3,530,210 at risk.

BOOKSELLERS TAKE ACTION

Call for Amendments in the Copyright Act to Redress Their Grievances.

SHOULD PRINT WHOLE BOOK HERE

In Order to Secure Copyright-Deposition Will See Dominion Government.

Definite action was taken at the meeting of the Wholesale Booksellers' and Stationers' Section of the Board of Trade yesterday afternoon, called for the purpose of receiving the report of the Special Committee appointed to deal with the copyright question. There was a large turnout of members, and a number of representatives of the Master Printers and Bookbinders were also present.

The question of copyright has many times been discussed by the Wholesale Booksellers and Stationers, and at a recent meeting they appointed a committee to consider the matter and report on it. The section met last Monday afternoon and received a report from the committee, but it was referred back again to the committee to discuss two clauses which were not favorably looked upon. At the meeting yesterday the committee brought in a report which was adopted.

The committee recommended that the government be requested to give attention to the proposals and to embody them in such a bill as will, if possible, settle the vexed question in a manner satisfactory to Canada and Canadian interests. Under the present Copyright Act, the committee, continuing the retaining of the copyright in the author in Canada, that is to say, it is possible for the owner of a copyright to print one small edition here, secure his copyright, and then import his books or sheets at will, by reason of the printing of the small edition he can prevent every other person from so importing, and that it is possible to print in Canada a chapter or small section of a book, secure copyright on it and by securing copyright on this small section obtain a monopoly of this market for the whole book, and having done so, the owner of such copyright need not print a single copy in Canada, can import all his books and sheets, and by doing so, thus doing defects in the existing measures, and the committee recommended that the government pass such legislation as will make printed in its entirety in this country in order to secure Canadian copyright, that continuous printing of the whole book shall be necessary in order to keep such copyright alive. Further, the committee urged upon the government that in the event of a copyright, manufacture in Canada shall be essential. The committee suggested that in the event of a copyright failing to take out of Canada within 30 days after its original publication in the country of origin, then a license shall be granted to the government to publish the book, and to make such safeguards as will secure to the owner of such book a reasonable royalty upon his work; that during these 30 days the importation shall be limited to three copies at a time and the said copies so imported to only those published for circulation in the country of origin, and to apply in the event of a book not being copyrighted, nor a license granted, then a restriction shall be placed on importation, and that provision shall be made for the expeditious securing of copyright by the expeditious securing of copyright, and articles, Nothing in the proposed bill shall be considered retroactive. In considering the question, the committee realized "that the existing state of affairs is satisfactory to the English and United States publishers, and to some of our Canadian publishers, and that the defects just referred to as highly unsatisfactory to the manufacturing interests of Canada. Existing rights under the British North America Act, which Sir John Thompson, Sir James Edgars and the Hon. David Mills so long contended. Under existing arrangements, at any time an understanding or agreement may be arrived at between English authors or publishers and American publishers, which would prove disastrous to important industries in Canada. Indeed, at the present moment, English authors in many cases include Canada in an arrangement with their American publishers. In conclusion, the committee urged that the government be appointed to wait upon the government, and submit the proposals. A committee of 10 were selected to see the government early next week.


