THREE CHURCHES IN ONE

Plan Which Congregationalists May Try to Carry Out.

Three Congregational churches in the city are closing. Northern Church having been sold and Parkdale and Zion churches closed because they did not seem to be thriving.

"The plan on foot," said Dr. Eby, former pastor of Zion Church, "is to have a large new church erected in the northwestern part of the city, using the funds received from the closing of the three churches. I sincerely doubt whether it would flourish. There are too many Congregationalists in this city of the old school, and they are far too conservative in their ways."

Rev. Edward E. Brathwaite, pastor of Northern Church, said he did not consider the plan feasible as Parkdale was so far distant from the other two churches.

DIES FROM INJURIES

Result of Chemical Explosion—How It Occurred.

ORILLIA, July 7.—John McAuley, who was injured in the explosion of the Standard Chemical works at Longford Mills, died this morning. He was too severely hurt to be taken to the hospital here.

A. G. Feuchen, president of the Standard Chemical Co., writes The World:

"The fire at Longford Mills yesterday, we wish to state that there was no terrible explosion, and that the loss has been only \$500 on the building, \$750 on machinery and one small tank of material, valued at less than \$500. There was only one man seriously injured, and the rest are getting along nicely.

"We would also like to correct a particular item, viz., that we had not sufficient fire fighting apparatus. We have there a very large water tank of 50,000 gallons capacity, a large fire pump and our factories are equipped with the best fire fighting appliances, which were immediately brought to bear on the fire and confined same to one small tank of material.

"From investigation, we find that our workmen were charging a still with crude acetone and as it remained in the still, unknown to the workmen, a portion of a former charge, which remained hot, the contact of the cold and hot acetone formed a gas, causing the blowing off of the manhole. The gases escaped and came in contact with a portable blacksmith's forge, which was being used for some repairs just outside this building, and ignited, thus causing the fire, which returned to the building."

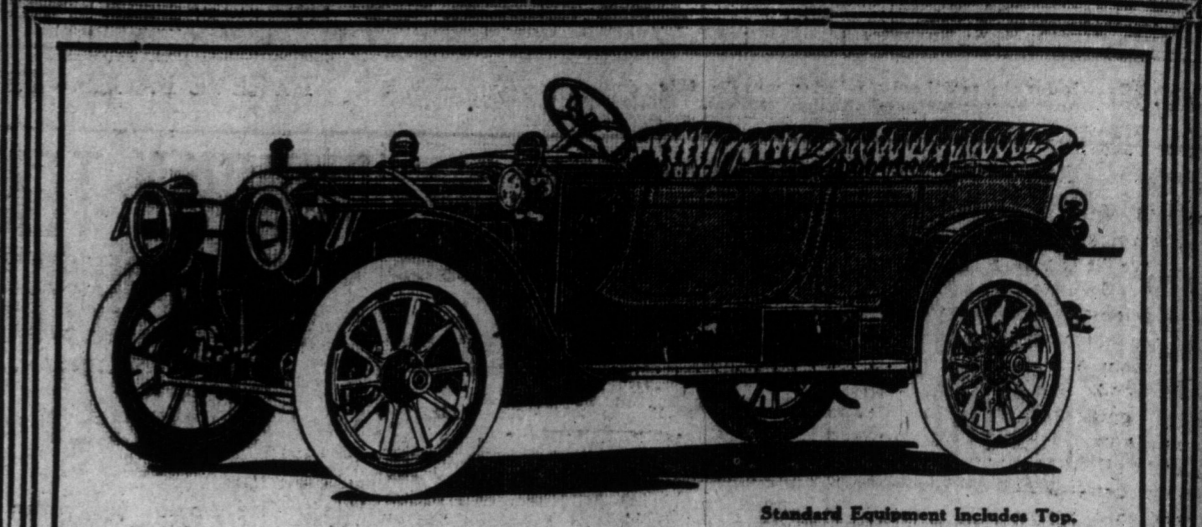
UNIVERSITY GOVERNORS

Six Reappointed—R. W. Leonard to Fill Vacancy.

An order in council was passed by the Ontario Cabinet yesterday reappointing the present university governors for six years. They are: Sir Edmund Walker, G. E. Cockburn, Chester D. Massey, Rev. D. Bruce Macdonald, W. T. White and E. C. Whitney. Sir Edmund Walker was reappointed chairman.

The vacancy caused by the death of Goldwin Smith has been filled by the appointment of Reuben Wells Leonard, St. Catharines, a graduate of the Royal Military College, a mining engineer, and president of the Ontario Mining Co. and of the Cobalt reduction works at St. Catharines.



TWO FAMOUS VICTORIES.

Yesterday in the motherland was and will be a red letter day in the annals of Canadian sport. The Dominion team captured the McKinnon Cup at Biele by the comfortable margin of 41 over Scotland, the runner up, and being ahead at all the ranges, while the Winnipeg four also distinguished themselves by annexing the Stewards' Cup at Henley, winning easily from their German competitors. This latter, too, was a decided setback to British expert opinion, which roundly condemned the Winnipeg oarsmanship. But as the old Scottish proverb says, "the proof of the pudding is in the eating," and success always justifies itself irrespective of theories. And may not the prairie crew's victory over their German opponents be taken as of wider significance and symbolic of the value of the imperial union? The World heartily congratulates our representative marksmen on their brilliant achievements.

CLEAN THE RESERVOIR.

If the city engineer and the acting medical health officer are of any value at all to the city, why does the city council keep on agitating for the pumping out of the bay tunnel? This is an example of the ineptitude of the rulers chosen under the present system of government, which its defenders might well consider. What is needed is to clean out the reservoir, and the sooner the better before the hot weather conditions develop disease in its heated water. The water is purer at the city end of the tunnel than at the lake end, and to pump it out and use the foul pipe which has been full of stagnant water for months, all of which would be turned into the city mains, would be a criminal act of folly.

A DESERVED INCREASE.

Fortunately the members of the court of revision do not have to depend upon what the city pays them for

their living. In days when everybody is supposed to get what he is worth it is almost remarkable to find three shrewd, experienced and admittedly capable men giving their services to the city for the comparatively small amount they get. The frequent meetings of the court are by no means all the duties these gentlemen have to attend to, as they are expected to know all about real estate conditions in every part of the city, an accomplishment which the average man can only feebly appreciate. The board of control made no deadly onslaught upon the taxpayers when they raised the honorarium of the members of the court from \$1000 to \$1100 a year. There should be an annual increase up to a stated limit.

WHY SUPPORT A BAD SYSTEM?

The Telegram is still strong in defence of a system which it admits gives "party line howlers at the city hall" the opportunity to dictate to the city men it should employ or discharge. The Telegram is unable yet to face the real issue, but allows itself in its feminine way to drag after anything but the main principle. Neither the Telegram nor any other public-spirited agent can effect anything against what The Telegram calls the "lack of size and sense in the heads of the men who administered the system," and, we say, will continue to administer the system while the system remains what it is. The Telegram, having now told us why the present system is bad and gets bad results, will perhaps also explain why it supports it.

The 41st annual report of the Fruit Growers' Association of Ontario, issued by the provincial department of agriculture, and containing the proceedings of the annual meeting held in November last year, is just out. Public libraries will doubtless catalog it under ancient history.

Another Cancer Cure. ROME, July 7.—Prof. Fichera has announced to the Institute of Experimental Hygiene the discovery of a cure for cancer. The cure consists of injections of serum from a human embryo.

DISASTER IN THE TRAIL OF BUSH FIRES IN NORTH

Camps Destroyed, Horses Suffocated and Supplies Burned.

PORT ARTHUR, July 7.—In spite of improved weather conditions, reports are still coming in that bush fires are burning. The total damage will run into hundreds of thousands for this district alone. A substitute for the destroyed Deutschland will be constructed as quickly as possible.

Controllers Church and Ward Willing to Make Him M.H.O.—Municipal Fruit Market.

Unless a majority of the board of control agree upon Dr. J. C. O. Hastings for appointment as medical health officer, it is extremely unlikely that any recommendation whatever will come to the city council next Monday and then the issue will be fought out on conditions that will require a two-thirds vote for a candidate. To carry thru a recommendation by the board, a simply majority of the board would be needed and Controller Church announces he will press for a sitting of the board Saturday or Monday morning, in the hope of breaking the deadlock.

Higher Wages for Linemen. The board of control approved an increase in wages of linemen employed in the construction of the electrical distribution plant. K. L. Aitken, head of the city's electrical department, objected to the increases, which would amount to between \$1000 and \$2000 yearly, as it was necessary to keep down wages owing to the keen competition with the Electric Light Co. and the necessity of supplying power as cheaply as possible.

First Blood for Strikers. MONTREAL, July 7.—(Special)—The striking masons and bricklayers were first blood to-day, fifty small contractors here, a two years' contract for the men, some 500 thus going back to work. The larger contractors declare their intention of holding out.

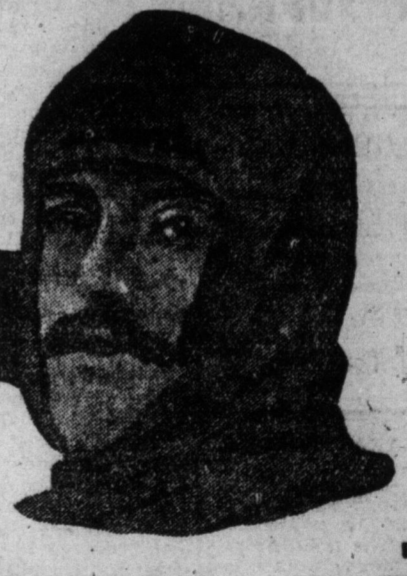
