TIE PASS NO REFUGE FOR RUSSIANS JAPS PRESS ONWARD TO OUST THEM

By Another Movement They Will Force the Battered Enemy Into Plains and Take it Into Camp.

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The Russian general staff reports that "the main body has already com pleted its retreat and the rearguard southward are falling slowly back." The men who escaped are strengthening the fortifications in Tie Pass, but it is hardly possible that the pass can be held in the face of overwhelming forces opposed to the Russians, and it is not likely that Oyama will rest satisfied with his victory at Mukden as he did after Liasyang.

General Kuropatkin now admits that 50,000 wounded were carried off the field. This, with the 28,500 dead left on the field, the 40,000 prisoners, and the wounded left in the hospitals comes somewhat nearer the latest Japanese estimate that the total Russian losses were 155,000. Tokio, March 13.—The following report was received to-day from the headquarters of the Japanese armies in the field:

"It is estimated that the spoils which fell into our hands in the direction of Sinking (Yenden), since the occupation by us of Tsinkhetchen on Feb. 24. have been as follows:

"Rifles, 22.000; machine guns, 6; small ammunition, 320,000 rounds; shells, 119-500; entrenching tools, 6000; wire, 1200 bundles; materials for a light railway of 33 miles; wagons for the latter, 450; garments, 10 cartloads; coal mining machinery for 8 pits; timber, 4009 pieces.

"Besides these we took large quantities of cattle, fodder, tents, stoves titles of cattle, large as well as it. and maps and telephones, as well as a great number of bullocks and horses. "The enemy left about 1200 dead on the field. We took 80 prisoners. It is

the field. We took 80 prisoners. It is estimated that the enemy's casualties were about 20,000. Fifteen prisoners say that the 71st division was almost annihilated.

"Altho the enemy set fire to the stores at Machantan and Mialupao, we captured thousands of bushels of provisions and enormous quantities of ammunition and other war supplies at these places."

These, it is said, include the retention by Japan of Port Arthur, a Japanese protectorate over Korea and an indemnity. From a high-official the Associated Press hears that Russia has recalled her second Pacific squadron. An attache of a Russian embassy in Europe is quoted as expressing the belief that Kuropatkin's recent defeat will force Russia to ask for peace.

Briefly, these were reports current in diplomatic corps to-day, and as a result of this important official information, Washington believes to-night that Russia and Japan are on the verge of peace. If it be true that the second Pacific squadron has been recalled, even the most optimistic of Russia's friends admit that this is a strong indication that Oyama's mighty blow has made for peace.



OLD TOMBS RICH IN SPOILS

Glimpses of Mummies of 18th Century Egyptian Dynasty Thru Prot. Davis.

London, March 13 .- Prof. Davis' reent discoveries in Egypt are deemed surpass those of any other scientist. A further account narrates the discovery of steps between the tombs of Rameses IV and XII at the foot of the door cut in rock and blocked with general stones. Davis, entering, found another flight of twenty steps cut in rock at the end of which was a second door and block of stones, the outer facing of which still was plastered with puri whereon were impressions of the royal

on the steps were a superb pectoral scarab and a broken writing tablet of alabaster. It was evident the tomb had been entered by robbers shortly after its construction who were surpresed and fied hastily, leaving some of the plunder in the vestibule. Since that day the tomb never again has been visited by

The tomb itself is not large. The walls are rough and undecorated, but filled from end to end with the richest spoils of ancient Egypt. Chairs and boxes, brilliant with paint and gilding, were piled in bewildering confusion in the sepulchral chamber. At the left entrance were two great wooden sarcophasi painted in black and gold. Within the mummy cases were a man and woman. The outer case was plated outside with silver, and inside with gold.


