





What we deplore is the fact that, coincident with such relief, the churches have not attempted to get at the root-cause of all the evil and distress. If they would display the same amount of energy in seeking to eradicate from our

they would display the same amount of emergy in seeking to eradicate from our collective life the evil it contains, that they have shown in seeking to deliver the individual life from sin, there would have been less call for their relief work.
