

CITY COUNCIL SHOULD ACT

There are several important matters which should engage the immediate attention of the city council.

Some time ago the board of trade felt it necessary to call a meeting to deal with the question of nationalizing this port. A joint committee of the board and city council, it was then stated, would deal with the question.

Another important matter is the second steamship berth on the west side. If another berth is to be constructed at the end of the one Mr. Clark is building, tenders should be called for so that the timber could be put out this winter.

FARM LANDS AND FARMING.

The department of agriculture in the United States has discovered that there has been of late a marked advance in the value of farm lands in the middle and western states. The average advance, the whole country over, in six years is estimated to have been 38 per cent.

It is to be noted that in the United States as in Canada the east shows less advance than the west. This is not because western lands are not profitable when farmed in the right way.

THE NORMAL SCHOOL

A despatch from Fredericton to the Telegraph says: "In view of the desirability of increasing the accommodation at the Normal school it has been suggested that possibly arrangements may be made whereby a temporary up-to-date building may be erected for teachers and pupils of the school.

It has been suggested to the Times, and the suggestion is a good one, that a kindergarten department might be added as part of the enlarged work, to enable student teachers to see the work of an experienced kindergartner, and to receive training themselves in this branch of work.

The important announcement is made that the provincial government will confer with the government of the State of Maine relative to the provision of better facilities for log-driving on St. John

headwaters in the dry season of summer. If the two governments can agree on a plan of water storage that will not be too expensive for the purpose desired, it will be a boon to lumber operators on both sides of the border.

Mr. W. Richmond Smith, the well-known Canadian journalist and war correspondent, has caused a mild sensation in London by the first of a series of articles in the Standard, in which he describes the "Americanization of Canada" as dangerously likely to lead to the absorption of this country by the United States.

The announcement was made at Campbellton on Saturday evening that the object of the campaign inaugurated there by Mr. E. Tenneyson Smith, the English orator, who comes to St. John this week, is provincial prohibition.

The stranding of the steamer Kensington in the lower St. Lawrence so near the close of navigation on the river is most unfortunate. This accident, however, cannot fairly be charged against the river, since it occurred many miles outside the pilot station, and during a snowstorm.

The impression prevails that the Empress steamers will come direct to St. John. Their doing so would set at rest for all any doubts expressed in Halifax or elsewhere relative to the adaptability of St. John as a mail port. The test should certainly be made.

The reply of Mr. W. Frank Hatheway to the statements made by the street railway company makes very interesting reading. The questions Mr. Hatheway asks are timely and pertinent. His letter appears in today's Times.

He left three brothers, John, Patrick and Frederick, of this city, and two sisters, Mrs. P. Cleary, of Chesley street, and Mrs. E. Fitzgerald, of Boston. The body will be brought here for burial.

Wm. W. Wetmore died at his home, 40 Exmouth street, on Saturday, aged 89 years. The deceased is survived by his wife, one daughter, Mrs. Chas. J. Smith, of Jersey City (N. J.), and one son, J. V. Wetmore, at home. He also leaves two brothers and two sisters. The brothers are Richard, of Clifton, and Julian V., of Massachusetts, and the sisters, Mrs. Eliza Merritt, of this city, and Mrs. Agnes Flewelling, of Sussex. As the Christmas season is now approaching, when Trinity will lose its popular rector, would it not be advisable to suggest that some extra music be selected from the old masters to be rendered on this occasion, in which all the voices could be heard to advantage collectively as well as individually and the full effects of the organ brought out by the master hands of Mr. Ford.

**A FEW QUERIES FOR THE STREET RAILWAY CO. TO ANSWER PLAINLY**

**Mr. Hatheway Wants to Know More About Coal, Capital Really Invested, and the Rest Against Accident--He Makes Some Comparisons.**

St. John, N. B., Nov. 12, '06.  
To the Editor of the Times:—In reply to Mr. Hopper's courteous and argumentative letter of the 7th, I am glad to again say what I said ten days ago, that we get our low fares from city points to Fairville and the Park. Mr. Hopper contends that the company's record since 1893 is not good, and that both these fares at noon hours, and at the same time pay dividends, interest, etc.

Certainly, his array of figures will make stockholders feel more anxious than the straphangers. His figures are:

Year	Gross Working Earnings	Expenses
1903	\$102,314	\$85,901
1904	106,880	89,949
1905	117,823	89,488
1906	120,243	84,572

The condition shown in 1905-06 is so disastrous that I am amazed.  
In order to increase their gross income \$10,000, the company paid out in working expenses, \$20,400. I hope for the sake of the business ability of its management, that it will be able to show that \$15,000 or \$20,000 is improperly charged to working expenses and should have been debited to capital.

The year 1906 is nearly as bad. Gross earnings increased \$2,900, but working expenses again increased \$110, increase cost \$2 to make it. The reasons given for above are:

- 1st. Branch lines to bridge and to the park, and we therefore have to inter the park line did not pay.
- 2nd. Increased employees and higher wages paid.
- 3rd. More repairs to cars and tracks.

The question of the existence of the line until June, 1906. As the above returns are up to June 30, 1906, these two branches will not be considered until June, 1907.

Seaside Park line opened July 1, 1904, and the cash to run indicated an enormous gain.

Since the company has furnished the public with the working cost for 1904-05, could they not give us the same for each year? I notice a discrepancy in the auditor's report, it says the total operating cost for 1904-05 was \$1,193,800.21, yet the figures above are \$91,752 to June 30, 1905, \$89,488 year to June 30, 1905.

Why cannot the company try the idea of reducing fares during meal hours? It has worked well in other cities, and these larger fares per electric may be due to that.

Would it not reduce the working cost materially if the company used our own coal instead of Sydney coal. I notice that the secretary claims that the "stock of the company is principally held" by citizens of St. John.

Why not, then, use Grand Lake, Joggins, St. John traders that we use Springhill coal, because St. John city should supply all that section with goods in every way possible? Why not use Cape Breton, but we can't to Parrsboro and Springhill.

The railway company used to buy Springhill coal, why not now? It is \$1 to \$1.20 per ton cheaper than Sydney coal. I am told that a heavy stockholder in both Sydney coal interests and street railway stock, insists upon buying Sydney coal for St. John use. Can that be?

In a letter dated Nov. 9, Mr. Hopper says: "At no time since the St. John Railway Company came into existence has the business earned or paid more than 6 per cent. on the capital invested." Is this quite correct? Will the company say that they have never had a very large amount of working capital? We could then supply gas lighting for the first few years at \$1.20 and fuel gas cheap to factories.

**TELEPHONE CASE IN EQUITY COURT AT FREDERICTON**

**Argument of Counsel Was Heard and Judgment Reserved--Miss Whepley and Gile Osgoode, Dead.**

Fredericton, N. B., Nov. 11--The case of the Cumberland Telephone Company vs. the New Brunswick Company was argued before Judge Barker in the Equity Court here yesterday afternoon. C. N. Skinner appeared for the Cumberland Telephone Company, Attorney General and Dr. G. C. Stokton for N. B. Company, and A. P. Barnhill and Dr. A. W. Macrae for the Central Company.

Mr. Skinner, on behalf of the plaintiff company, made an application for an injunction to prevent the Central company from amalgamating with the New Brunswick Company. He claimed that his clients had a ten year contract with the Central Company to transmit messages over the lines of the latter company in this province and if the amalgamation took place, their interests would be sacrificed. He made a lengthy legal argument and cited a number of authorities in support of his case.

The attorney general in reply stated that the New Brunswick Company recognized the Central's contract with the Cumberland Company and would reserve to them every right and privilege set forth in the said contract. As they would be allowed the use of the Central lines he could not see how any injustice would be done by amalgamation. The attorney general also pointed out that the charter of the New Brunswick Company gave them authority to acquire other lines while the Central Company had authority, under their charter, to amalgamate with other companies.

Dr. Stokton and Mr. Barnhill spoke briefly along the same lines and the court reserved judgment.

**DETECTIVE KILLEN FINDS MISSING AXE**

Elgin, N. B., Nov. 10--(Special)--The long sought for axe with which it is believed Miss Mary Ann McAuley was murdered in the home of her brother, Rev. E. J. McAuley, parish priest of New Ireland, Albert county, has been found by Detective P. Killen, of the St. John police force, and is now in his charge.

One of the mysterious features of the murder which stirred the country in August last was the disappearance of the axe which was known to be on Father McAuley's premises when the priest left home on his visit to the missions under his care from which he returned to find his housekeeper murdered and her body placed in a cellar.

Search was made for the axe and when Collins was arrested on suspicion of the murder he was questioned as to its whereabouts, but repudiated he left it near the priest's woodpile, but no trace of it could be found there.

On Tuesday of this week Detective Killen came from St. John to the scene of the murder and spent Wednesday and Thursday in the vicinity and, though he kept his business to himself, it now transpires that his mission was none other than a search for the missing axe. As to the circumstances of the finding suffice it to say that the axe was found in a box in Father McAuley's barn which had been used for an out box. It had not been concealed with any great degree of care except that portion of the barn is dark, but the axe had been laid away there and the out box is now apparently overlooked in the hurried search which was made at the time.

Now interest in the murder case will be aroused by the announcement of Detective Killen's find and he will be congratulated on another successful accomplishment in connection with the public work in the case. He left here Friday for St. John taking along his find in a bag.

The axe is a double headed one. There are some marks upon its end of course it is surmised that these are blood stains. Probably an analysis will be made to definitely ascertain their character. **FRANCE AND THE VATICAN**

Paris, Nov. 10--Unless the Vatican authorities cause some radical changes in the situation the fears of a religious crisis resulting from the enforcement of church providing for the separation of church and state are regarded as dissipated in consequence of the middle course steered by the Clemenceau cabinet. 
