HAIG'S TROOPS AWAY TODAY ON ANOTHER OFFENSIVE

Bore Through Hun Lines, In Some First Class To Be Places To Mile Depth

Start at Six O'Clock in Morning — Ger- U-BOAT DANGER mans Soon Surrendering by Hundreds; Crest of Important Ridge Gained by British

London, Oct. 4-Field Marshal Haig has begun a new offensive east of Ypres. The official statement from British headquarters in France issued today says that the British attacked about six o'clock this morning on a wide front and are making satisfactory progress. Some prisoners already have been taken.

The British already have penetrated well beyond the Hamlet of Broodseinde, in which lie the cross-roads formed by the highways between Zonnebeke and Mooresled and Passchendaele and Beclaire.

Farther to the south, Cameron Covert, where there has been much hard fighting, was left well in the rear. Today's battle was along the Passchendaele-Cheluvet Ridge.

The northern wing of the onrushing British troops was battling forward this morning within a short distance of Poel Cappelle. It had a footing on the famous Gravenstafdt Ridge, which juts out from the Passchendaele Ridge to the west.

Ottawa Announcement of Drafting Under The Military Service Act

Ottawa, Oct. 4.—The first class of recruits under the military service act will be called up on Saturday, October 13. A proclamation will be issued on that date notifying men in Class 1 that, within a specified period, they are elthat date notifying men in Class I that, within a specified period, they are either to report for military duty or to file a claim for exemption.

It was at first hoped to have the proclamation issued by the end of September, but unforeseen delays prevented such a course. The board of selection was unable to make its appointments to local tribunals and will not complete them till next week. The enormous mass of printing required has also been somewhat of a difficulty. Fifty classes of forms are required in connection with the administration of the act; and millions of forms and circulars have been printed. When the board of selection finishes its work, however the board will meet again on Oct. 9—everything is expected to be if or the call.

"How Many of our Men are Liable to be Drafted?"

The Canadian business man is asking this question often, now that the Military Service Act is the law of Canada. A simple means of answering it at once is being provided.

Medical Boards are in process of formation throughout the country for the free physical examination of all men who apply. The first class liable to call includes all single men and widowers without children between the ages of 20 and 34 inclusive, all men married after July 6, 1917, being classed as single for the purposes of the Act. In a very port time, the average employer may learn how many of his staff are liable for selection. Those adjudged physically unfit will be given a certificate which will secure them exemption from any Exemption Tribunal. Those found physically fit may still apply for exemption on any ground. The employer will be given a chance to decide if he should seek exemption for any employee whose physical condition renders him liable for selection.

This early medical examination, which quickly decides if a man is liable for selection or not, is a feature of the operation of the Military Service Act calculated to appeal strongly to the business community. It assists in definite planning for the future, enabling an employer of labor to learn at once what men will be left at their work and those who may be removed for military service. Haphazard withdrawals, the nightmare of business men of method and precision, are insured against by this timely arrangement.

Every employer of labor will find it to his advantage to note carefully the formation of Medical Boards in his locality and to be sure that his employees secure as early as possible this very important information as to their status under the Military Service Act.


