HAMPTON MINISTER'S BROTHER ESCAPES FROM PRISON CAMP IN GERMANY

Good News Comes to Rev. James F. Rowley - Stirring Story of Nerve Act—Inside News of Treatment by Enemy

The good news that his brother has escaped from a prisoners' camp in Germany and has reached England in safety was received last evening by Rev. James F. Rowley, Methodist minister at Hampton. His brother, Corporal Walter Rowley, of the 2nd Royal Warwickshire, was wounded in France at the end of October and captured by the Germans and since then has spent his time first in a hospital and then in a prisoners' camp. The letter telling of his escape is his first to give any insight into actual conditions among the prisoners in Germany. Previous letters, strictly censored, were confined to the extreme limits of harmlessness and, even in these, parts were expurgated by the censor.

His escape is evidently the result of long and careful planning and was executed with a daring and resourcefulness which well merited the reward of freedom. At the time war was declared Corporal Rowley was with his regiment at Malta. They were ordered home and had barely reached Southampton when they were sent to France to help repel the German drive toward the coast cities. In the heavy fighting which occurred there the Warlets were badly cut up and Corporal Rowley was wounded and captured. Corporal Rowley has many friends in this province and the news of his escape will be received with deep satisfaction. As a sample of the letters he has permitted to write while a prisoner the following is taken from the West London (West) Lager III, 14 July, 1915.

Dear Jim— "Just a line in answer to your letter. I was glad to hear that you are all good on all right and enjoying good health. I received the book all right and enjoyed it, although I had read it before. There are a great many Canadians in number two camp here, but I could not ascertain if Lieutenant R. 688ves or Leonard Sharp is in the camp. The lieutenant would, in the probability be near Berlin. Remember me to all the folks at home and over in Canada. His Escape. "This was the last word received from him until the letter containing the news of escape which is as follows—

EVERY MAN IS NEEDED IN FIGHT That is Message Brought From Front by Wounded Montreal Major Montreal, Sept. 21—"When we get to the front, there is no such thing as French, English, Scotch or Irish-Canadian. We were all Canadians, and we fought as best we could. I am proud to think that our work won recognition and that the Canadians are now known as men who can hold their own in the battle line. I am home on leave, but as soon as I get into shape it is my intention to give my time to the aid of recruiting amongst my French-Canadian compatriots, because every man is needed in this fight."

Russians Get German Submarine in Black Sea

Odesa, Sept. 21—Russian ships have sunk a German submarine which has been operating recently in the Black Sea. A despatch from Petrograd some days ago said a submarine of the new German type had exchanged shots with the Russian coast on the Kerch peninsula, in the Crimea. The size and type of this boat and the interruption of land communication between Germany and Turkey, made it appear that the submarine had been sent from Germany to Turkey by sea. The feat of eluding the British blockade and passing through the Straits of Gibraltar, and the Dardanelles, was accomplished last summer by Captain Otto Herring, with the submarine U-51, which was said later to have been sunk in the Black Sea by Russian warships.

End of Next Spring Before Germany Begins To Feel Losses

Paris, Sept. 21—Colonel Feiler, a famous Swiss military critic, says: "Germany has now 4,000,000 men in the fighting line and 1,250,000 with which to make good the wastage of the coming winter. "At the end of the winter, she will have a further 500,000 of young troops of the 1916 class, who will fill the gaps for the spring campaign. "Not, therefore, until the end of the spring of 1916, can the allies expect Germany to begin to feel the lack of men to replace the losses."

TWO MORE SPIES FOUND GUILTY IN ENGLAND

London, Sept. 21—Two more spies have been convicted by court martial. A man and a woman of German origin were found guilty of attempting to communicate information regarding the fleet. The man was sentenced to be shot. The woman was sentenced to ten years in jail. Both will be permitted to appeal.

LETTER FROM PRIVATE EARLE

Private R. A. Earle of the 28th Battalion, writing to his wife, Mrs. Earle, 700 Main street, says they were having a quiet time in East Sandring camp, but that they were having plenty of fun in the sports. He says he sent a letter by the boat that went down (presumably the Hesperian). He sends home some badges and buttons of the battalion for his wife and children. One of these, he says, was specially made that is in only one like it exists and that is in Carlisle. Private Earle adds that they expected to leave for France in a few days as they were all fitted out with the Web equipment; it looked better than the one they had before. Jim McFarland, Franz Guntz and Elmer Ingraham were mentioned. "There is a lot to be done before the Germans will give up," Private Earle says. He did not get to London, but expects to see it when he comes back from France.

GARAGE BY-LAW MATTER TODAY

The petition protesting against the recently adopted garage by-law will be presented to the common council this afternoon. Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, the city solicitor, will present an opinion and recommendations; E. P. Raymond, who appears in opposition to it, on behalf of the vestry of St. John (Stone) church, and Dr. W. B. Wallace will appear in support of the petition. It is understood that there will be opposition in the council to the granting of the petition.

TEMPORARILY SUSPEND CHANNEL SERVICE

Paris, Sept. 21—Channel service between Boulogne and Folkestone, which was stopped on Friday, because of a false alarm regarding submarine activity, again was suspended yesterday. According to Boulogne advices on Friday, a trawler reported sighting a submarine and a floating mine. The port defenses were mobilized but nothing was seen of a submarine and the "mine" proved to be a bale of hay.

HEAVY ARTILLERY DUELS ON WEST FRONT

Paris, Sept. 21—An artillery bombardment of continued violence to the north of Arras and to the east of Noelle and Lorette, both sides taking part, is told in a French official communication given out in Paris this afternoon. Further activity in which artillery and infantry took part, has taken place at other points on the front in France.

L. C. R. BRAKEMAN IS KILLED NEAR MONCTON

Todd Graham Meets Death in Much the Same Manner as Brother Moncton, Sept. 21—Todd Graham, a veteran I. C. R. brakeman of Moncton, was instantly killed this morning by falling from the Maritime Express as it was entering the yard here. The accident occurred about two miles west of the city. There were no witnesses of the accident, but it is believed Graham lost his balance and fell off while opening the vestibule door. It was apparent his heel had caught and he had been dragged about twenty-five feet. He was well and favorably known in Moncton, was a native of Newcastle and is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Adair of Newcastle, and two young sons, Clayton and Herbert. The latter now is in the city hospital with a broken leg. Fred, a brother of the deceased, formerly employed on the I. C. R. and later on the Grand Trunk, met death in much the same way.

London, Sept. 21—One member of the crew of the Zeppelin concerned in the most recent raid on London, either fell or was blown from the car and his body was found lying on the ground, somewhere in England, says the Daily Express, which asks whether this explains the reported death of Dr. Joseph Sticker, a civilian and railway engineer, who was killed in a raid on the city of London.

RAILWAY SHOPS BURNED

Malone, N. Y., Sept. 21—Fire starting from an oil-burning locomotive destroyed the shops of the New York and Ottawa Railroad at Santa Clara, N. Y., yesterday. The loss was estimated at \$80,000.

Held on Too Long at Vilna

Von Hindenburg Given Opportunity of Which He Took Full Advantage—London Military Writer's View of Russian Change of Strategy

London, Sept. 21—Commenting on Field Marshal Von Hindenburg's latest coup, the military correspondent of the Times suggests that in the record changes in the Russian higher command, the wise strategy of Grand Duke Nicholas seems to have lost favor and instead of continuing their orderly retreat the Russians held on too long. This gave the German commander an opportunity which he availed himself fully. Major Pohl of Tilsit, as mayor of Vilna, has been announced. The announcement, following so quickly the capture of Vilna, is regarded here as showing the certainty with which the Germans counted on the taking of Vilna and the German progress according to the schedule of Field Marshal Von Hindenburg's campaign.

MANY "IFS" IN COUNT'S APOLOGY

Berlin Writer on the British and German Fleets — Excuses For Failure Berlin, Sept. 21—Count von Reventlow, naval expert of the Tages Zeitung, in an article on the comparative strength of the British and German fleets, says in part: "No one cognizant of the circumstances brushed the statement at the beginning of the war or before, that it would be impossible to dispute with success British mastery of the ocean. "If the building programme of the German fleet had been further advanced at the beginning of the war and if, in consequence of Viscount Hall's negotiations, the building had been accelerated and if it had been possible to start this acceleration for a year, the situation unquestionably would have been better. But the British may thank their supremacy not alone because of their great numerical superiority, but because of their geographical position."

CORPORAL BURRIS, WOUNDED AT YPRES, TO SPEAK TONIGHT

Soldier Who Was in Famous Charge That Recaptured Guns, Reaches City Corporal Dan Burrows, a member of the 8th Royal Scots of Montreal, who was wounded and gassed at Ypres, arrived in the city this morning to take part in the recruiting campaign. He joined the 17th Nova Scotia Battalion, but transferred to the Montreal Battalion. He was in the famous charge that recaptured the 47 guns of the Canadian battery. Corp. Burrows will give his experiences at tonight's recruiting meeting and the committee considers it fortunate in getting so good a man to speak.

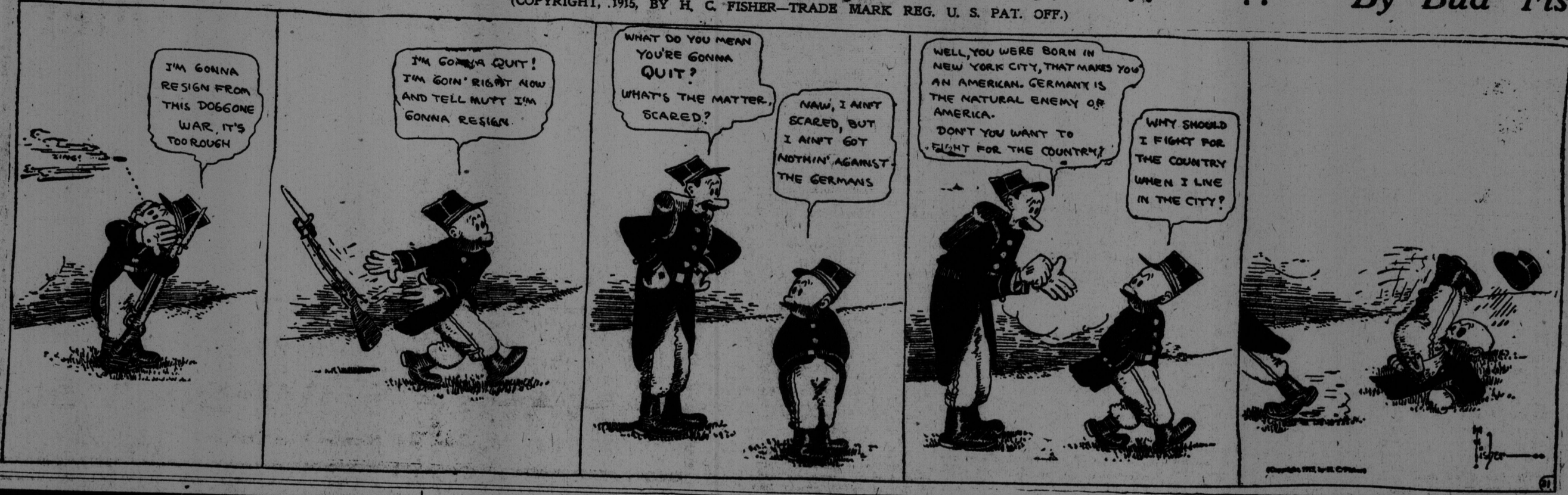
Called to Washington

THE PATRIOTIC FUND.

Criticism of the Patriotic Fund are thoughtless offered by some persons who take no trouble whatever to learn the facts. They hear one side of a story, or they accept a mere rumor passed from month to month, and base thereon remarks that are eagerly caught up and sent on their mischievous way.

The aim of the Patriotic Fund is to be fair. It would doubtless rather err on the side of leniency than that of an injustice, but it cannot entertain some of the claims made by persons who have no more right to assistance from that fund than the writer of this article.

Apparently there is also a disposition to criticize the committee and hold it responsible for the manner in which every cent of an allowance is expended by the soldier's wife or mother who gets it. The man may give his life, but his wife or mother must be followed by spies of the Patriotic Fund, and instructed as to what she shall do with the money he has earned for her.

A definite announcement about the battalion to be commanded by Lt. Col. Fowler would help recruiting in New Brunswick. In Nova Scotia the idea of the paid platoon is gaining favor. Young men like to be associated with their personal friends if possible. The plan should work out well in New Brunswick.

If Bulgaria means to assist the Germans, Austrians and Turks, she must show her hand without much further delay. Britain and her allies are anxious for a favorable settlement of the Balkan controversy, but time is now an important factor in the case.

Apparently Germany does not yet despair of her ability to strike Russia a crushing blow, and leave herself free to strike in another quarter. If so where will that blow be struck? The Balkan situation continues to disturb the calculations of more than Germany.

Sir Sam Hughes is said to have predicted that the Allies will be in Berlin within a year. He is much more optimistic than those in England whose judgment is based on wider knowledge. As Mr. Hazen said last night, no man can tell the duration of this war.

Hints for the Cook

Butter Cakes.
Mix and sift one quart flour, one teaspoon salt, two teaspoons baking powder. Rub in three tablespoons butter. Mix to a soft dough with milk. Roll out 1/4-inch thick. Lay on moderately hot greased griddle and when pale brown turn and brown on other side. Tear open, butter liberally and take to table piping hot.

Apple Pudding.
Four tart apples peeled and sliced, one pint stale bread crumbs, 2-3 cup sugar, butter size of walnut, cinnamon. Butter pudding dish, put in layer of apples and layer of crumbs, sift over some sugar, little dots of butter and little cinnamon. Repeat until all is used, having top layer of crumbs. Pour over one cup water. Bake until apples are soft. Eat with milk and sugar.

Poysters.
Two eggs, 1 cup of milk, 1/2 tablespoon of butter cut into the flour, 1/2 teaspoon of salt, 1 teaspoon of baking powder and 1 cup of flour. Mix the dry ingredients and add the milk and eggs. Bake half an hour in a moderate oven.

Smothered Potatoes and Onions
Pare potatoes and onions and slice thin. Put in spider with salt and pepper, and just enough water to keep from burning. Cover and cook until done. Add a good piece of butter and serve hot.

MORNING NEWS OF WAR

Much importance is attached to the report that 45,000 Macedonians have been ordered under arms by the Bulgarians. Macedonia and Thrace are the parts that were originally won by Serbia and Greece at the end of the war, and the mobilization of the Macedonians is regarded as the effect of pro-German policy. The leader of the Agrarian party in Bulgaria is reported to have threatened revolution if the pro-German plans were continued.

Once again the German official denies that the Hesperian was not sunk by a torpedo have been given the lie. A piece of torpedo is actually in the possession of the Admiralty which was picked up on board the Hesperian before she sank.

It does not look as if the Joint Anglo-French commission in New York is going to be hampered in floating the big loan of \$500,000,000 to \$600,000,000 in consideration of whether the money is to be used for paying for munitions of war. The great idea of establishing the exchange between New York and London is being recognized more and more as the one essential for American trade. Certain German houses desired to take part in the loan on condition that the loan should not be used for paying for munitions of war. But the other bankers felt that the establishing of the exchange would be all that could be asked for.

The Russian army of about 800,000 men which defended Vilna and which has retired with the loss of comparatively few men, is said to be the objective of Von Hindenburg's attack. Petrograd announces its confidence in the ability of the Russian to hold their own. Farther to the south the Germans and Austrians have had to fall back before the advancing Russians. German artillery has been used to shell the Serbian positions across the Danube.

In the west the artillery duel continues and it is now surmised that another winter campaign may be looked for here.

Allan is understood to be not in command, but his successor has not been announced); 21st battalion, commanded by Lt.-Col. W. S. Hughes, of Kingston.

The 5th infantry brigade is under the command of Brigadier General Dave Watson, of Quebec, and is composed of the following battalions: 22nd battalion, commanded by Col. F. M. Gaudet, of St. Jean (P. Q.); (French-Canadian battalions); 24th battalion, commanded by Lt.-Col. J. A. Gunn, of Montreal; 25th battalion, commanded by Lt.-Col. G. A. Lescan, of Halifax; 26th battalion, commanded by Lt.-Col. J. L. McAvity, of St. John (N. B.).

The 6th infantry brigade is commanded by Lt.-Col. R. C. B. Ketchen, of Winnipeg, and is composed of the following battalions: 27th battalion, in command of Lt.-Col. J. R. Snider, of Winnipeg; 28th battalion, in command of Lt.-Col. J. E. L. Embury, of Winnipeg; 29th battalion, in command of Lt.-Col. J. S. Tobin, of Vancouver; 31st battalion, in command of Lt.-Col. A. H. Bell, of Calgary.

The 22nd and 30th battalions, which are not in the division, were drafted as reinforcements to the first division several months ago and have already appeared frequently in the casualty lists.

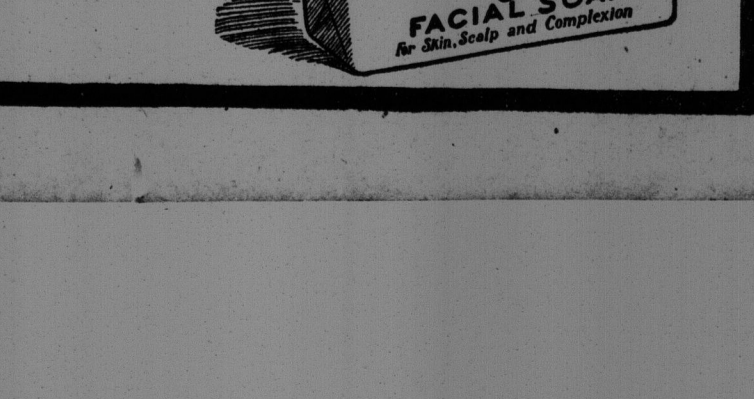

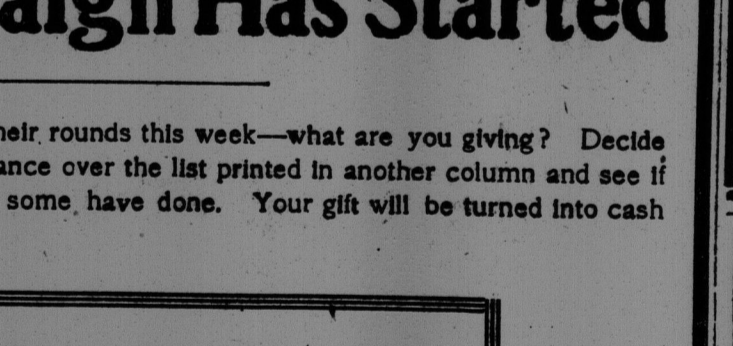

ASSAULT ON A POYAS IS TOLD OF IN COURT

Samuel Cohen was charged in the police court this morning with aggravated assault upon Abraham Poyas, Mill street jeweler, at the Synagogue, Hazen Avenue, on last Sunday evening. A meeting was being held there to organize a Hebrew school for religious purposes, when Mr. Poyas was chairman. The defendant, who was not one of the Hazen-Avenue congregation, it is said, interfered and called Mr. Poyas a "paid dog" and used other insulting terms in Jewish. He persisted, and after several times being told to be quiet, or to go out, Poyas called H. B. Young was called to eject him. Just as the policeman arrived, the lights, which had been put out, were turned on again, and it is charged that the defendant struck Mr. Poyas in the face, blackening one eye and making the other bleed. There was much confusion, and Cohen was thereupon arrested.

Mr. Poyas said that Cohen had disturbed the Jewish congregation before that occasion, when he had been one of the congregation, and had also then been ejected. Corroborative evidence was given by Bernard L. Amdur, who said that when Mr. Poyas went out to telephone for the police, he ordered the janitor to put the lights out, and when Mr. Poyas came back the meeting re-assembled just as the policeman arrived.

The hearing was adjourned until tomorrow morning at 9.30. G. H. V. Belyea appeared for complainant.

Y.M.C.A. CALL FOR HOME PARCELS FOR THE LADS AT THE FRONT

Well Looked After, Writes Captain Hill, But Many Things Additional Are Needed

In a letter, Captain R. H. Hill, Y. M. C. A. representative with the 26th Battalion, tells of some of the needs of the men and suggests that friends at home might help them out by sending parcels. Those who wish to make sure that their gifts will reach the 26th may send them to him, direct, addressing them as follows: Captain R. H. Hill, Y. M. C. A. West Coast contingent, West Palace Hotel, London, England, and they will be forwarded to him free of charge. It is pointed out that parcels sent from St. John through the Soldiers' Comfort Association—Paris of his letter follow: "I received a number of parcels of magazines and I wish I could tell you how much these things are needed and appreciated. One of our men was over from France a short time ago and he said that reading matter is very much needed, especially in the trenches. He said the boys just beg for something to read. "Do you think the people at home do any of this? It is a little of their time and money would mean so much to these boys. I wish I could go through Canada and tell them of the needs and make them see them as they are. "Don't misunderstand me and think that the boys are not well and happy, for that is not the case, and don't think that they are not well taken care of by the government, for they are, but there are lots of other things that must be thought of. I know that if the people of St. John and other places could see the boys here they would help even more to give the boys the things they need. "We have a tent-ninety feet long and it is packed most of the time, with the boys writing letters home. A great many of them say 'What would we do without the Y. M. C. A.?' Just to see what they think I remarked that they would simply have to do without it. They replied that, in that case, there would not be nearly so many letters written home, and to tell you that would be the case. "We have had some very fine concerts here in my tent since we came over and the men say that many of them could not be enjoyed elsewhere for less than a couple of dollars. At our last concert we had with us, and she sang four songs, Lady Maude Warrington. She is a sister of the Earl of Shaftesbury and her husband is in command of the second northern fleet, sent in command to Jellico. "I wish you would send me all the socks, cigarettes, chewing gum and candy you can get for the boys, for they will be needed very much in the trenches this winter. We have had all our advance work for the front and know just what is needed and when to get it out." **ROBERT J. MCACHERN DEAD**

Young Man Whose Life Came Much of Health

Numerous friends throughout the city will regret to learn of the death of Robert J. McEachern, which occurred this morning at his parents' residence in Thorne Avenue, after a lengthy illness. For some time previous to his illness he was in the service of the L. C. R. He was an active member of the Tabernacle church, and was interested in all its various endeavors. For many years he had been connected with the L. O. G. T. and was for some time chief templear of St. John District Lodge. He was also a member of Vernon Lodge, L. O. L. Mr. McEachern, who was twenty-three years of age, was popular with a large circle of friends. Though he had been ill for several months, his death was not expected when it came. He had gone out of the city to drier climates seeking to improve, but to no avail. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. John McEachern, survive with four brothers, Archie and John of Boston, Donald of Presque Isle, and Henry of this city, his twin brother, and one sister, Mrs. E. N. Stoddard. Rev. J. D. Wetmore, of Chance Harbor, former pastor of Tabernacle church, came to the city yesterday to see the young man, and was with him when he died. Mr. McEachern's family will have the sympathy of many friends in their bereavement. The funeral will be held on Thursday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock.
