"The correction of visual defects results in a marked improvement in school progress," the report continues. The records of 20,000 cases sent to a public school eye clinic for correction

of refractive errors show that from 60 to 70 per cent. of the children were classified as backward, mentally deficient, stupid or habitually left back. The careful follow-up system proved that after their defective vision had been corrected, 70 to 80 per cent. of these children progressed and took their place in the class with the normal average child. The reason the remaining 20 to 30 per cent. did not progress was because their retardation was due to causes other than defective vision.

"The proportion of retardation in another group, all with visual defects, was found to be 85.4 per cent. One year later, after the defective eyes had been corrected by glasses, only 17 per cent.

Accompanying the statement is a report revealing that heavy moral and financial losses arise from this evil. Approximately 25 per cent, of all school children in the United States, the countries of the Countrie proximately 25 per cent, of all school children in the United States, the council finds, are retarded in their studies and fully one-third of this retardation is conservatively estimated as due to defective vision.

If this is a correst estimate, there are at least 2,000,000 school children in the United States one or more years behind in their studies because of defective vision, says the council's report. Leads to Other Troubles.

John J. Tigert, United States commissioner of education and a member of the Board of Councillors of the Eye Sight Council, is quoted as asserting, after a cereful review of the situation, that "one of the greatest disturbing factors in measuring the effects of defective vision upon retardation is the fact that faulty eyesight invariably leads to other troubles and the effect of these is not attributed to defective vision."

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
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

HAY MADE WITHOUT

HELP OF THE SUN

Results of Electricity on Farm is Demonstrated in England.

Interest aroused at the British Empire Exhibition in the development of electric power in agriculture led to a recent demonstration, arranged by the British Electric Development Association at Greater Feleour Farm, East Grimstead, England, before a group of newspaper men. The demonstration was a revelation of the limitless extent to which science may profitably be applied to the oldest of industries.

The operations for plowing, havevesting, poultry rearing, milking, and even bee keeping were all electrically driven. Irrespective of the improved production and decreased costs, the saving in labor alone is demonstrated by the fact that only three horses are employed on Greater Feleour Farm, which is a mixed commercial farm of 600 acres, specializing in eggs and poultry, pigs and milk.

One of the more important developments of electric power applied to farm production is the "making of hay without sunshine." Instead of "curing" the hay by the slow process of allowing the sun to shine on it, the cut grass is seasoned by air conveyed through vertical tunnels in the ricks by electric fans. This method, the demonstrator said, enabled the farmer to counteract the vagaries of the weather and also to save labor.

Electric power also is used in the incubator sheds and brooding houses. Fiftern hundred White Leghorn and White Wyandottes are kept on the semi-in-





Briefly, the reason for this homeward frend is the lack of work across the line. Through our special news service arrangement with the N. C. W. C. News Service we are able to throw a little light on labor conditions in the United States as they

"According to the latest reports of the U. S. Department of Labor unemployment in that country is on the increase. Between June, 1923, and June, 1924, there was a decline of 12.9 per cent. in the number of employes working in manufacturing establishments, while many at work, today, are on part time. Pay checks are smaller than they were a year ago.

"Further, the official report states that only 76 per cent. of the normal number of men at work are now being employed in manufacturing departments reporting to the U. S. Labor Department. The situation is about like this: Out of 100 men working in a factory, 24 have been discharged and, the 76 remaining are working and being paid only for part time.

"General indications are that unemployment will be more pronounced in the fall. In fact, a severe industrial depression is the forecast, during which three or four million persons will be unemployed.

"A national system of employment

three or four million persons will be unemployed.

"A national system of employment bureaus and extensive public works by the federal, state and city governments has been urged for several years to help the unemployment. The first is included in the Republican platform and the second is in the Democratic and Progressive platforms of this year.

"Wage reductions have been forced

this year.

"Wage reductions have been forced here and there and if the expected hapens and unemployment grows much larger, further and more extensive wage cuts will' be attempted.

"We give the above official information for Canadians who may still be thinking of 'seeking their fortunes' in the United States."






The New York branch of the Daughters of the American Revolution gave a silk flag of the Sulgrave Institution of America at the same time.

Inventor Describes Before one kilowatt of energy at the trans-London Scientists His Historic Test.

London, July 26—The secrets of his mysterious yachting cruises were partially revaied to many famous scientists by Senator Marconi at the Royal Society of Arts when he described the results of his wireless "heam" experiments over long distance. For the first time he gave the full details of the historic telephane test from Poldhu to Sydney, Australia, on May 80, when a message was successfully despatched more than 12,000 miles.



While there was a decrease of less than one per cent. in quantity and about four per cent. in value, due to the lower price of silver in 1923, the production reported for the year 1922 included an adjustment of 1,222,450 fine ounces which was applied in order to take account of the silver bullion on hand at the end of 1921 that had not previously been included in the reports on the mineral production of Canada. On the basis, therefore, of actual yearly production, the records for the year 1923 showed a creditable increase in silver output. The Dominion Bureau of Statistics

During the war years chromite and molybdenite were produced in Canada in considerable quantities while manganese and tungsten were produced in less amounts, but since then the output of chromite and manganese has fallen off greatly, and molybdenite and tungsten have not been mined at all. Chromite is mined in the parish of Coleraine, Quebec province. The mill rock after primary and secondary crushing is ground, screened and concentrated, and the resulting material which runs about 48 per cent. Cr203 is exported to the United States, where it is consumed in the iron and steel trade. The production during 1923 totalled 3,558 tons valued at \$52,650 as against 1,087 tons valued at \$19,566 in 1922.


